Miriam Margolyes' Full English LIVE

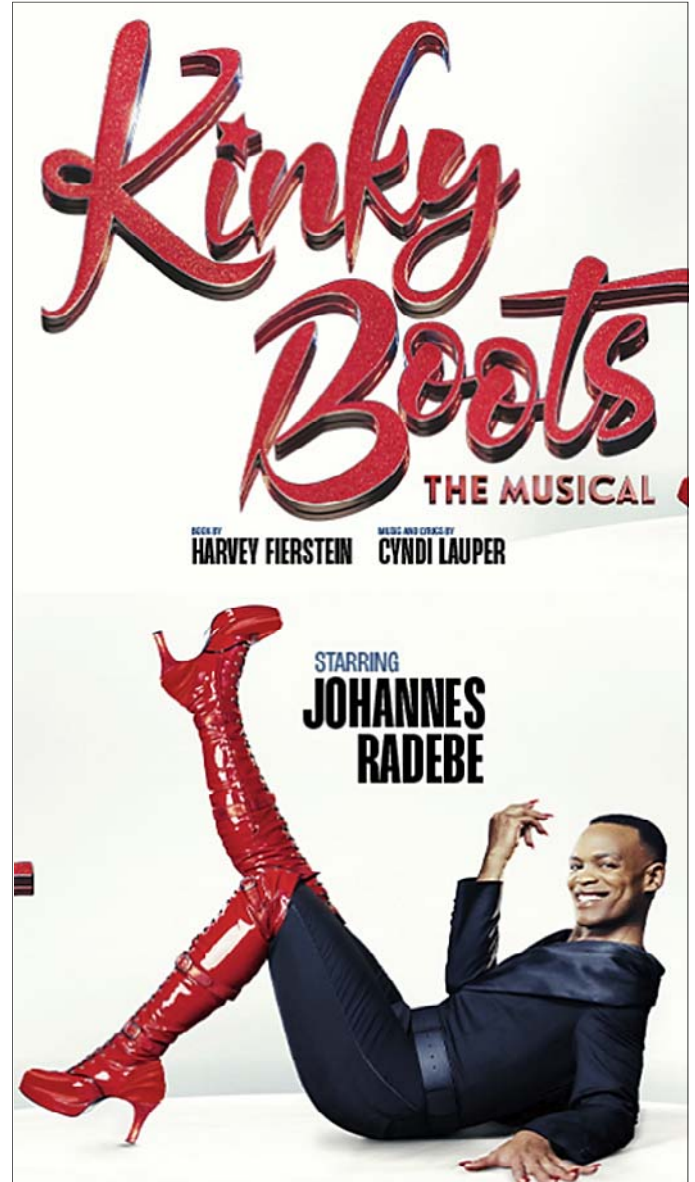

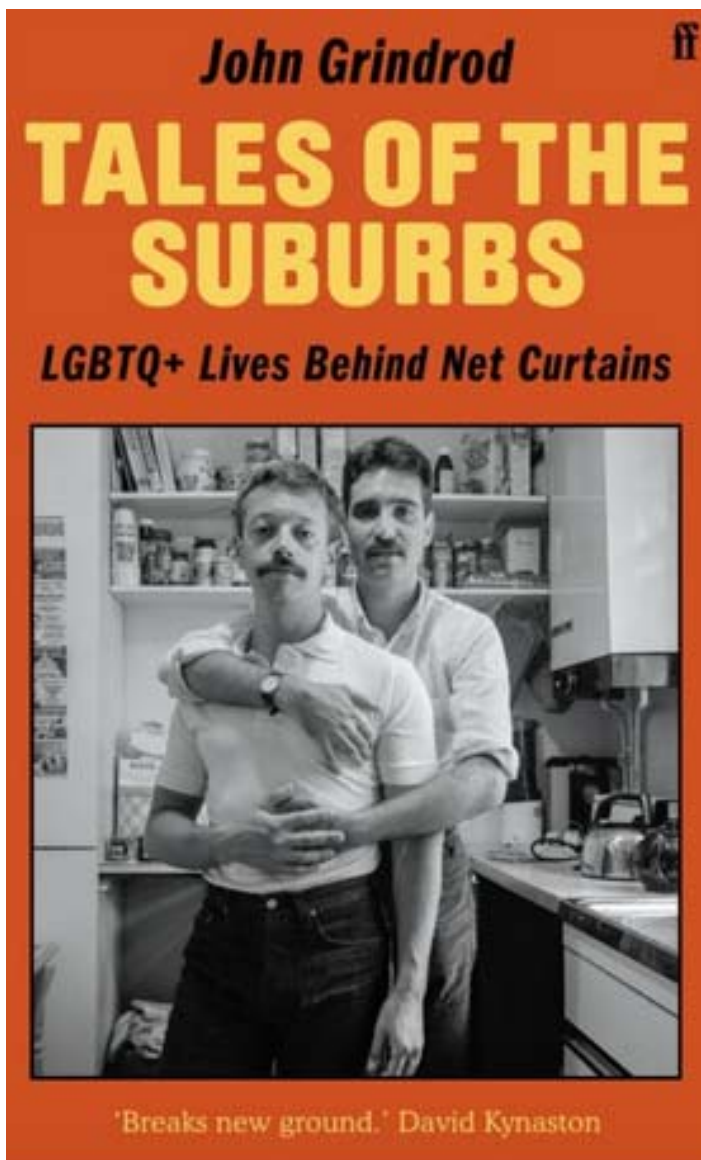

RAINBOW QUARTER LAUNCH



The Rainbow Quarter planning team has released the following information:

The Rainbow Quarter will be launched on May 6th and will cover Broad Street, Heathcoat Street (and the street connecting these) as well as the ends of Carlton Street and Goose Gate.



The Rainbow Quarter aims to achieve several key goals:

- Enhance Safety and Security: Provide a visible and well-maintained space where LGBTQ+ individuals feel safe from harassment and discrimination.
- Foster Community Building: Create opportunities for LGBTQ+ people to connect, socialize, and build supportive networks.
- Promote Economic Growth: Support LGBTQ+-owned/ queer friendly businesses and attract visitors to the area, boosting the local economy.
- Increase Visibility and Awareness: Raise awareness of LGBTQ+ issues and promote understanding and acceptance within the wider community.
- Support Cultural Enrichment: Host events, festivals, and activities that celebrate LGBTQ+ culture and history

Alongside our initial launch event on Wednesday 6th May, we are working with community groups and organisers both local and nationally to plan a suite of events for the Rainbow Quarter. Whether that's summer street parties or touring art exhibits; we envision this leading to a whole host of benefits for businesses situated within the RQ!

LOOKING BACK

CELEBRATION AND AWARDS EVENING 2026

On February 25th, the ballroom at Nottingham Council House was filled with 150 guests and information tables from 18 local LGBT+ groups and services.

During the second half of the evening, five awards were presented. The first went to **CJ DeBarra** for their work in documenting and preserving Nottingham's Queer History.

So far this has included two books (with more to follow) and the establishment of Nottingham's Queer Archive.

CJ was accompanied by their father, who had travelled all the way from Cork.



The second award went to **Nottingham Front Runners** which has become a very successful group in a relatively short time. Not only promoting fitness, but providing a warm social environment and also campaigning against issues such as transphobia.



The third award went to **Lucy and Shell Buckle**. Lucy and Shell have been the organisers of what is now an annual Queer History Walk. Lucy (seen right below) has, in her role as the "Nottingham Forager", organised several nature-related community events such as "Gays in the Garden". Shell has given her professional expertise to the swimming sessions sponsored by the Spencer Trust and has also founded the East Midlands Non Binary Association.



These three awards were from Nottinghamshire's Rainbow Heritage. They were followed by two awards from Notts Pride. The first of these went to the Pastel Project. The project has pioneered the Your Space Too initiative partnering with local venues to highlight the shining stars in our community who are providing safe spaces for trans customers.

The project has also been leading the development of the Rainbow Quarter to be launched in May.

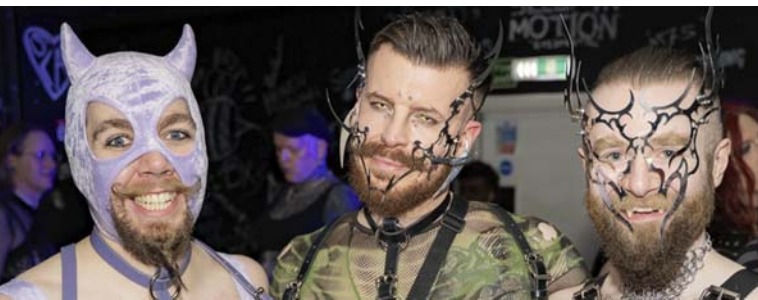

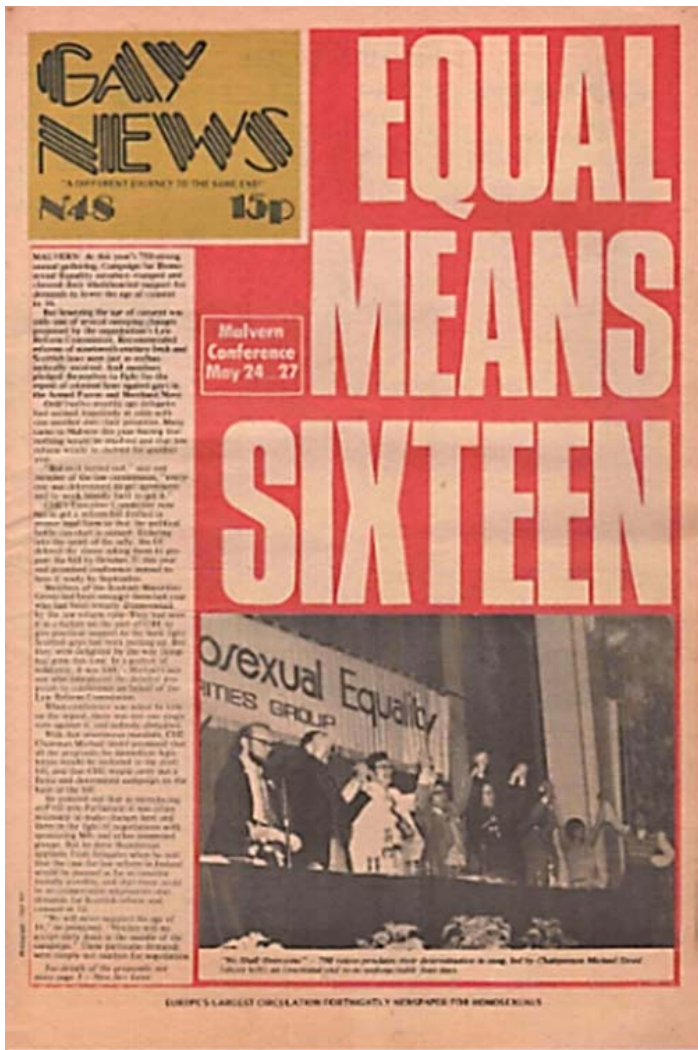

THE GAY NEWS ARCHIVE



Gay News launched in May 1972, and was at first collectively edited by a group of people including Denis Lemon, Doug Pollard and Glenys Parry, all of whom were gay liberation campaigners before, during and after their involvement in the newspaper.

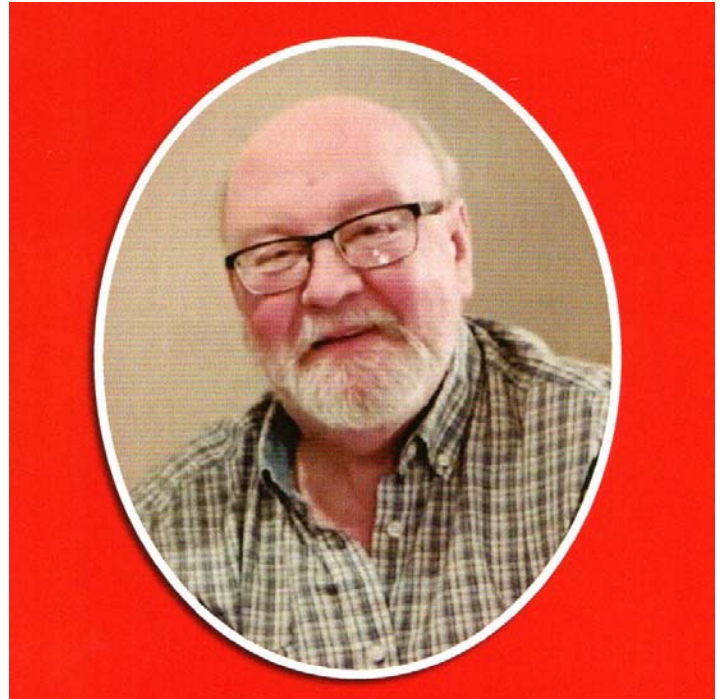
The Gay News Archive Project was created to digitise and make accessible, for free to everybody, the early issues of the UK's pioneering Gay News newspaper.

The newspapers tell an important story in the history of LGBT+ rights in the United Kingdom in the 1970s – an area of queer history that is often overlooked. It was an era of police harassment being the norm – LGBT+ people were not protected from straight crime, were often entrapped and arrested for the nebulous offence of “obstruction” for attempting to go into or out of gay-friendly pubs.

The newspaper revels in the joy of being gay, of having gay friends and of breaking free from the constraints of straight society in a time before the arrival of HIV and AIDS in our community. There are as many laughs to be had in its pages as there are sorrowful stories and angry rants – all of life is in these pages.

FAREWELL TO MARTIN



On January 16th a large crowd gathered at Gedling Crematorium to say goodbye to Martin Fenn. For many years Martin was a campaigner for LGBT+ rights and for much of that time was involved with what is now Notts LGBT+ Network.

Martin's coffin was draped with the progressive rainbow flag; the funeral assistants from Cooperative Funeralcare wore rainbow ties and the ceremony was introduced by Gladrag's own Nana Arthole.

BAHRAIN SAYS NO TO BUTT PLUGS



Grace Bennett is the owner of Bonjibon which sells sex toys online. She received two letters from the Pentagon saying ...

“Adult item Identified during X-ray Mail Screening.” The letter went on to say “pornographic materials or devices are not allowed into the Kingdom of Bahrain.” The adult item was a butt plug. They literally categorize these goods as ‘posing an immediate danger to life or limb or an immediate and substantial danger to property.’”

HATE CRIME LAW CHANGE?



Right now, although anti-LGBTQ+ hate crime is recognised in law, hate crimes based on race and/or religion can have higher maximum penalties than anti-LGBTQ+ hate crime, because they are classified as **aggravated offences**.

Hate crimes which target people on the grounds of their sexuality or gender identity, or a disability, are set to become aggravated offences under a proposed new law.

An amendment to the Crimes and Policing Bill will mean a crime is aggravated if a victim is targeted because of those characteristics, and will carry a higher penalty.

The LGBT+ anti-abuse charity Galop described the amendment as a "landmark moment" for equality. Jasmine O'Connor, co-chief executive of Galop, said: "At a time when our services are seeing consistent rises in LGBT+ hate crime victims seeking support, this long-overdue change sends a clear message that anti-LGBT+ hate crime is as deserving of justice as crimes motivated by religious or racial hate."

The bill, which is currently progressing through the House of Lords and is not yet law, is intended to introduce measures to tackle crime and antisocial behaviour and will apply to England and Wales.

In the year ending March 2025, police in England and Wales recorded over 18,000 hate crimes motivated by sexual orientation and over 3,000 trans-related hate crimes.

Labour MP Rachel Taylor, who first put forward the amendment, said that between March 2024 and 2025 more than 30,000 hate crimes against people in England and Wales had been recorded by police as linked to their sexual orientation, transgender identity, or disability.

While sexual orientation hate crimes decreased slightly by 2% and transgender hate crimes by 11% compared to the previous year, they remain significantly higher than a decade ago. Underreporting is high, with some estimates suggesting fewer than 1 in 10 LGBTQ+ people report such incidents.

NOTTS PRIDE NAME CONFUSION



Nottingham Pride has criticised a group of businesses for scheduling an event – using the same name – for the same day as Nottingham's annual Pride, leading to confusion amongst members of our local LGBTQ+ community. Groovebox, Live Republic, Binks Yard and Horlock House are all jointly running their own event on the same day, under the title "Nottingham Pride Fest".

While Nottingham Pride is always free, Nottingham Pride Fest is paid for, with tickets ranging in price from £16.75 to £29.95. In a statement, Notts Pride called out the businesses using a similar name and scheduling their event for the same day, which the organisers say has caused confusion, "reputational harm" and "false impression of affiliation".

Craig Martin, the co-chair of Notts Pride, says the event at Binks Yard 'undermines' the hard work the charity does and has asked Nottingham Pride Fest, to change the event's name.

AT THE PRIDE SHOP



On February 19th Jessica Lynn, a Kinsey Institute Global Ambassador and international transgender advocate gave a presentation at the Pride Shop for LGBTQ+ History Month.

Jessica has had the privilege of helping to educate tens of thousands of people about the many identities throughout the gender spectrum.

After spending a great amount of time speaking in the UK (and for her love of pastry pies and fish and chips), Jessica has recently relocated to Birmingham from her birthplace of California.



The Council of Europe has successfully voted to ban so-called 'conversion therapy' despite anti-trans lobbying calling for a ban to be reconsidered.

The human rights body, which is separate from the European Union, voted to pass a resolution brought by labour MP Kate Osborne calling for the abusive practices to be prohibited across its 26 member states.

In the UK we still await the long-promised ban.



LOOKING FURTHER BACK

SIR JOHN GIELGUD ARRESTED FOR COTTAGING

On October 21st 1953, Sir John visited his local public convenience with the hope of encountering some casual sex. An undercover police officer arrested him and he was taken to the nearest police station where he gave his name as Arthur Gielgud, a "self employed clerk".

The next day, at Chelsea Magistrates' Court, the case was treated as a bad incident of drunk and disorderly, and Sir John was fined £10 and required to report to his doctor immediately for medical advice. Unfortunately, a better-informed Evening Standard reporter who recognised him was there, too. When that afternoon's paper hit the streets, he was on the front page.

The day that the news broke of Gielgud's arrest he was paralysed with fear. At the time, he was in Liverpool, starring in a performance alongside the formidable Dame Sybil Thorndike, and felt it almost impossible to go onto the stage that night.

As the curtain was about to go up, something remarkable is reported to have happened. Dame Sybil grabbed Sir John by the arm and whispered in his ear, "Come on John darling, they won't boo *me*". With that, she led Gielgud out into the dazzling lights of the Royal Court Theatre.

There was silence. Not a shout. Not a boo. Not even a cough. And then.....a standing ovation. The audience cheered and applauded Gielgud, raising the roof of the Liverpool theatre.

The message could not have been more abundantly clear. The people did not give two hoots what Sir John got up to in his private life, they considered him an outstanding actor and held him and his performances in such high regard. His sexuality did not matter.



Elsewhere he didn't get away so lightly. For several weeks, the newspapers castigated him and his "evil kind" on an almost daily basis.

An editorial in the Sunday Express captured the general tone: "Perversion is very largely a practice of the too idle and the too rich. It does not flourish in lands where men work hard and brows sweat with honest labour. It is a wicked mischief, destructive not only of men but of nations."

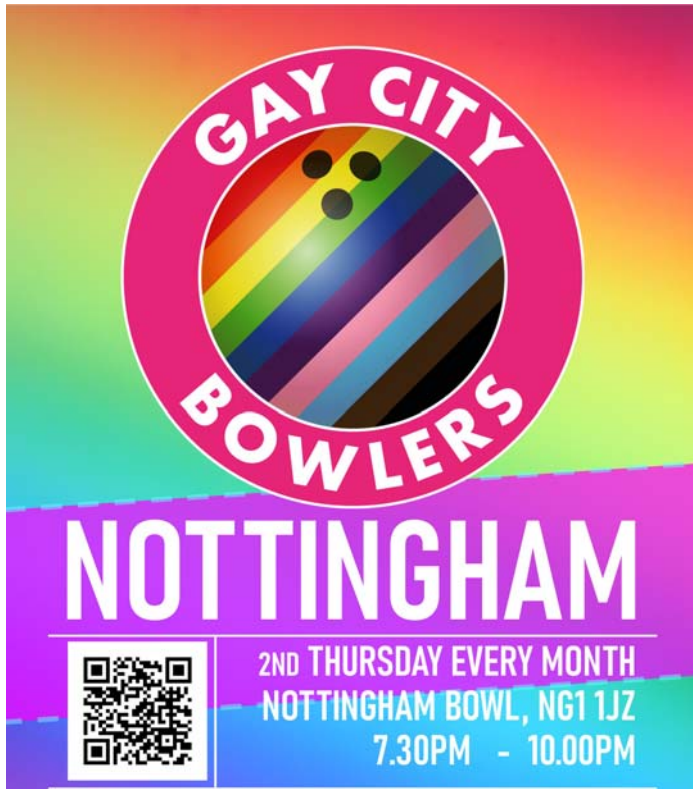
Conservative peer, Earl Winterton, called for the actor to be stripped of his knighthood and horse-whipped in the street.

He was utterly vilified: he received hate mail; a petition was made to demand that he resign from Equity (the actor's union); people called for him to be stripped of his knighthood; even the US authorities refused to grant him a visa to work in America.

The episode briefly affected Gielgud's health; he suffered a nervous breakdown some months afterwards. Between December 1953 and June 1955 Gielgud concentrated on directing and did not appear on stage. He never spoke publicly about the incident. Privately he made donations to gay campaign groups, but did not endorse them in public.

GROUP OF THE DAY

GAY CITY BOWLERS



What started as a small gathering to help a pair of newlyweds make friends has transformed into a national movement. The Nottingham chapter of Gay City Bowlers (GCB) has recently celebrated a major milestone, having hosted monthly socials in the city for just over two years.

Since arriving in Nottingham, the group has become a staple of the local LGBTQ+ calendar, hosting monthly events that prioritise community over competition. The formula remains the same: two games of bowling, followed by drinks, medals for those feeling competitive, and plenty of laughter, creating a consistent space for people to be themselves.

The story of Gay City Bowlers began in Manchester in 2017. Founders Marc and his husband Luke had recently moved to the city and, finding it difficult to meet people outside of the traditional bar and club scene, invited the folks they did know to an evening of ten pin bowling. There were 17 people there that evening and everyone had so much fun, they did it again the next month and the rest as they say is 'Herstory'.

What began as a one-off event quickly snowballed. Today, the organisation operates in 12 cities across the UK—including London, Birmingham, Liverpool, and Cardiff—with a rapidly growing membership that proves queer people everywhere are looking for alternative ways to connect and socialise.

The national group's expansion is fuelled by a significant milestone: the group was recently awarded a grant from the National Lottery Community Fund. This funding will directly help support their ambitious growth plans in 2026 and beyond, ensuring the long-term sustainability of their chapters nationwide.

Beyond the strikes and spares, the core mission of Gay City Bowlers CIC is to tackle loneliness and isolation within the LGBTQ+ community. Research consistently shows that many members of our community face higher risks of mental health struggles, often due to a lack of inclusive spaces that aren't centred entirely around nightlife.

By providing a low-pressure, welcoming environment, GCB helps members:

- * Improve Mental Wellbeing: Reducing the anxiety of meeting new people in a structured, fun environment.

- * Boost Physical Health: Encouraging light physical activity that is accessible to all fitness levels and abilities.

- * Forge Lasting Bonds: Many members report that the friendships made on the lanes have become their primary support networks outside of the group.

As the Nottingham chapter enters its third year, the message to the local community is clear: you don't have to be a pro to join. In fact, most members are there for the "social" rather than the "score."

INTERESTED IN SHAPING A NEW TRAINING RESOURCE FOR MENTAL HEALTH PROFESSIONALS ABOUT WORKING WITH LESBIAN, GAY, BISEXUAL, AND QUEER+ PEOPLE?

We are developing a short training resource for mental health professionals that is about working with people from sexual minorities (for example, people who are Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Queer, Pansexual, Asexual). We are conducting focus groups to understand what different groups of people think the key content of this training should be.

What will the focus groups involve?

You will be asked to attend three focus groups online. Each group will last 1 – 1.5 hours and will be at least three weeks apart. You will be asked about your views on what you believe the content and format of the training should be.

You are eligible to participate if you belong to at least one of the following groups:

- Mental health professionals, in any role, currently working in an NHS mental health service, or with experience of working in NHS mental health services in the last 2 years (including Talking Therapies, primary care counselling services, and other psychological services)
- NHS staff members who have worked on Equality and Diversity as a substantial part of their role (e.g., EDI leads)
- Researchers who have experience of conducting research on sexual minorities in the context of UK mental health services
- Individuals who have experience (present or in the past 2 years) of using NHS mental health services who believe they have the relevant lived experience to contribute to the development of the training

March 1st

Zero Discrimination Day is an annual observance held on March 1st to promote and celebrate diversity, tolerance, and inclusion, and to raise awareness about discrimination and the negative impact it has on individuals and society.

March 2nd

The Sydney Gay and Lesbian Mardi Gras Parade is an annual event held in Sydney, Australia. The parade is one of the largest celebrations of LGBT+ culture and pride in the world, with hundreds of thousands of people attending each year.

March 21st-28th

European Gay Ski Week. Europe's biggest LGBTQI+ Winter Sports Event at Val Thorens, the highest village in Les Trois Vallées ski area.

March 31st

International Transgender Day of Visibility is an annual observance that takes place to celebrate and raise awareness of the transgender community around the world.



April 6th

Asexuality Day, also known as Ace Day, is an annual event to celebrate and raise awareness about asexuality.

April 9th

Sapphic Visibility Day. Sapphic has become a chosen identity for many women, nonbinary, trans and gender nonconforming folks. Sapphic is an umbrella term that expresses the sexuality and romantic attraction of queer women, non binary, and trans people that have sexual and romantic attraction to each other.

April 26th

International Lesbian Visibility Day is an annual observance held to celebrate and raise awareness of the experiences and contributions of lesbian individuals around the world. The day is an opportunity to recognize the unique challenges that lesbians face, as well as their achievements and contributions to society.

LGBT+ AWARENESS TRAINING

Do you belong to an organisation, a company, a group that would benefit from LGBT+ awareness training or would like to have a presentation on aspects of LGBT+ history?

When Nottinghamshire's Rainbow Heritage was set up in 2008 with a grant from the Heritage Lottery, part of its remit was to provide regular training. In the last seventeen years training and presentations have been provided for over one hundred organisations and groups. They include:

- 6 hospitals
- 8 health-related organisations
- 5 care homes
- 5 housing organisations
- 10 schools/colleges
- 3 universities
- Notts Sexual Violence Service
- Notts Police and both local councils

Between 2014 and 2020, the former Police and Crime Commissioner Paddy Tipping supported numerous training sessions which included a focus on hate crime against LGBT+ people.

The main elements of the training are:

- Getting the terminology right - what the "words" mean .. and which words not to use
- Homophobia, biphobia, transphobia: what they are. their frequency, their causes and the effects they have
- Homophobia, biphobia & transphobia in a wider context of general prejudice against minorities
- Myths and stereotypes
- Negative laws and the more recent positive changes in the law.
- "Coming out": what it means; what it's like to be "stuck in the closet" and what happens when you come out

There can be an additional focus on issues such as

- Health issues and LGBT+ people's interaction with health care providers
- Supporting victims of LGBT+ hate crimes; why these crimes are under-reported and how reporting can be encouraged
- Same sex domestic abuse/Male rape
- The special concerns of young LGBT+ people and also of older LGBT+ people, particularly those in residential care
- Local resources and support systems

It's two years since Shell began organising the sessions at Lenton Centre, in Willoughby Street, and now plans additional sessions at the Ken Martin Leisure Centre in Bulwell. The 90-minute Sunday sessions have grown from three in the first year to one a month last year and now twice monthly. Shell said: "They've sold out ever since I've been organising them."

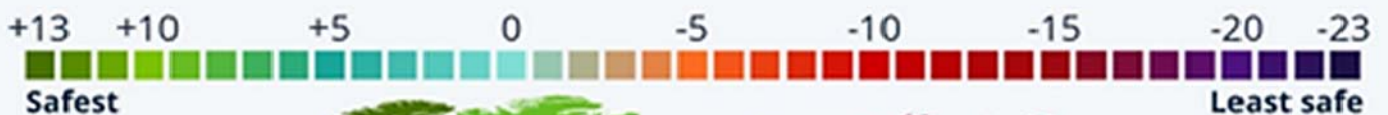

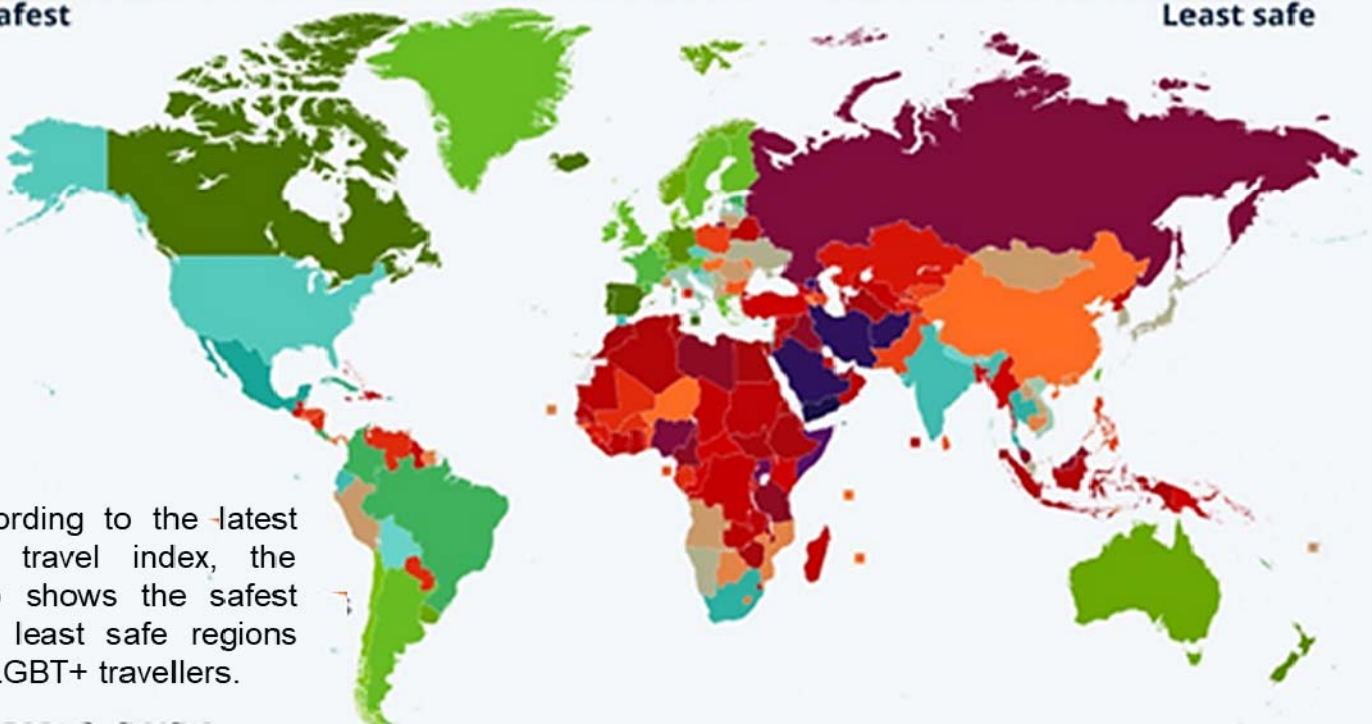

The Robin Hood Half Marathon's website includes stories from several of those taking part. One of those featured is a member of Nottingham Frontrunners. Here's David's story.

When the Nottingham Frontrunners were established in the summer of 2023, no one could have imagined how this inclusive LGBTQ+ group would have grown into the large popular group it has become today, its bright colourful top becoming a familiar sight in the City. It has given people the confidence to run, feel included and make firm friends.

As an older runner I have been made very welcome and running ability has improved. When we were approached to volunteer at the Robin Hood half marathon, a queer squad was established taking on the stretch along Castle Boulevard.

With music, banners, flags, banners and whistles, the squad kept enthusiastically cheered in the runners, giving a flavour of festival time and keeping spirits high. How wonderful that the squad were very much part of the inclusive ethos of the Robin Hood Marathon.

It is so very important that people from the LGBTQ+ community can feel very much a valued part of the event, whether as runners or volunteers. In reflecting on LGBTQ+ History Month it is worth remembering that 40 years ago we were not running but marching against blatant discrimination.

Learning to run fast was a necessity to get away from bullies and hatred. I always feel that the Robin Hood Half Marathon has a wonderful sense of community. Everybody is made to feel welcome and included. Where people can enjoy running and feel safe.
