From Pastor Jim



During Lent, I have been reading what others have to say about Easter. As I have considered these words and reflected upon them, my appreciation for what God has done for me and you in Christ has multiplied. I encourage you to reflect upon these Easter quotes as you prepare for Resurrection Sunday.

“For the separation of humanity from God is depicted way back in the garden...We have a broken relationship with God, both in the depths of our souls and the actions of our hearts. This is precisely the reason Christ came. “For all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God, and are justified freely by his grace through the redemption that came by Christ Jesus. He bore our cost.” Brad Bailey

“Jesus knew His followers were confused and frightened. They had hit rock bottom. And so He says, ‘Peace be with you.’ This is not simply a salutation; it’s the first application of Easter - peace.” Robert Leroe

“An event can be thrust upon you and it takes you by surprise; you never would have predicted it in a million years. Now here it is - staring you in the face. What will you do? You can't stay the same, you can't pretend it didn't happen. You may not know what to do, but this much is certain, you have to do something. This is the Resurrection.” Ken Sowers

“Easter is the focal point of all history--because Jesus Christ is the focal point of all human history. Every time you date a check, print a calendar...every time this unbelieving world puts a date on a newspaper or magazine they are bearing witness to Him. History just cannot get away from Him.” Steve Malone

“The empty tomb tells us of God’s ultimate power. A power that points to an ultimate purpose. Throughout His suffering, many times Jesus was told to show His power to escape His suffering and His death...but He knew that beyond all demonstrations of power and

miracles...it was the ultimate power over death which had to be revealed.” Brad Bailey

“Jesus had power over death. Death was no match for him. People had feared for centuries that death was a stone-cold grip from which no one could escape. And Jesus very calmly asserted His authority over it.” Matthew Rogers

“Jesus’ resurrected body was a real body...He didn’t return as a ghost or a mist...He told his followers, ‘Look at my hands and my feet, it is I myself! Touch me and see; a ghost does not have flesh and bones, as you see I have.’” Rick Burdette

“When it comes to believing in the resurrection of Jesus, we cannot simply seek knowledge; instead, we must seek faith. Nobody comes to faith in Jesus because of knowledge of Him. Even Satan has knowledge of Jesus, but he doesn’t believe in Jesus.” Michael Deutsch

“Perhaps the message this angel spoke was the most important one in Scripture. The message of the angel is still true today ‘don’t be alarmed - He is risen! He is not here; you will see him again.’ Jesus is alive!” Andy Barnard

“No other holiday is as critical to the Christian faith as Easter. The very foundation of Christianity stands or crumbles on the truthfulness of the assertion that Jesus Christ rose from the dead. Easter is not about religious ritual or tradition. It is about the resurrection of the Son of God, an historical event. It is significant because of what the resurrection of Jesus validates.” Jerry Flury

“Do you want to live life to its fullest? Then aim higher. Don’t set your sights too low. Determine to become all that God created you to be. Give yourself to Christ, follow Him completely, and allow the Holy Spirit to work in you and through you!” Ryan Johnson

Volunteer to pray with members of the congregation after Sunday services. Your being ready to listen, support, and pray with someone would be such a blessing.

Take Home Communion to our homebound members: If you are an ordained elder or deacon, consider visiting someone who is unable to come to church and celebrate the Sacrament of Communion with them in their home or care facility. Your willingness to serve would help us to reach more homebound members.

The Sacred Work of Caregiving: Strength for the Journey

Caregiving is one of the most meaningful roles a person can step into - but also one of the most demanding.

Caregiving is not a single responsibility. It is a daily, ongoing commitment that might include tasks such as managing medications and appointments, assisting with personal care, and monitoring physical or cognitive changes. Caregivers provide companionship and emotional support. As time progresses, a caregiver may face the burden of making difficult decisions.

While it is rooted in love, caregiving can also bring fatigue, emotional stress, changes in personal identity and routine, and feelings of isolation. These realities do not diminish your love; they reflect the weight of what you are carrying. One of the most important truths in caregiving is this: **your well-being matters too**. Without intentional care for yourself, even the most devoted caregiver can become overwhelmed. Some practical ways to sustain yourself include **accepting and asking for help**, scheduling regular breaks - even brief ones, staying connected to friends, church, or support groups, and maintaining your own medical care. Caring for yourself is not selfish, it is what allows you to continue caring for someone else.

Caregiving often brings a mix of emotions that can feel conflicting. It can range from love and devotion to frustration and impatience. You may experience guilt from needing time away and grief over the changes you see in your loved one. These emotions are normal. Rather than judging yourself for them, acknowledge them. They are signals that you are deeply invested and, at times, stretched beyond what is easy.

For some caregivers, part of the journey includes supporting a loved one with cognitive decline or dementia. This adds another layer of complexity. You may notice memory loss or repeated questions, or confusion and changes

in personality or mood. Gentle approaches can help. Offer reassurance instead of correction, keep routines consistent, use a calm tone and simple communication, and focus on the emotion behind what is being said. Perhaps most importantly, remember: the condition is causing the change - not the person you love.

Caregiving is not only physical and emotional, but also deeply spiritual. There may be days when you feel strong and grounded, and others when you feel depleted or discouraged. God meets you in both. In Isaiah 40:29, we are reminded: *“He gives strength to the weary and increases the power of the weak.”* Your strength does not have to come solely from yourself. Even simple spiritual practices can sustain you: A short prayer in a quiet moment, listening to scripture, and sitting in stillness—even briefly.

In Galatians 6:9, we are encouraged: *“Let us not become weary in doing good.”* And yet, God understands that you *do* grow weary. That is why He offers strength, presence, and grace for each day. Take one step today: Reach out for support, rest - even briefly, and bring your honest heart to God. You are not alone in this journey.

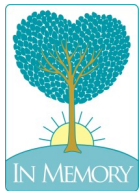

Cardio Drumming

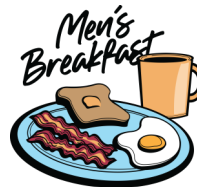

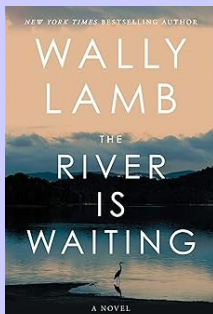

Bulletin Board Help

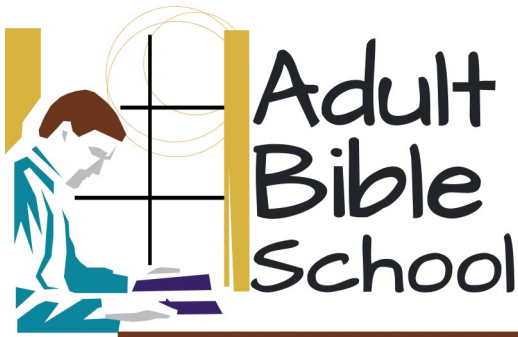

Save the Date for Adult Bible School

Gary Rendsburg, from Rutgers University, is returning as our guest speaker. Come learn about *How the Bible Reached Us*.

We walk into church or synagogue, and take it for granted that the Bible is in our hands, with abundant copies in the pews and in the bookcases: but how did the Bible reach us? This wide-ranging series explores the history of the Bible, transmitted by devoted scribes throughout antiquity and the Middle Ages, up to the age of printing. The form of the Bible changes from scroll to codex (the forerunner of the modern book), while the language of the Bible changes from Hebrew to Greek (in the Jewish tradition) and then from Greek to Latin to English (in the Christian tradition). How did all this happen, when did all this happen, and why did all this happen? Or to repeat the question above, how did the Bible reach us?

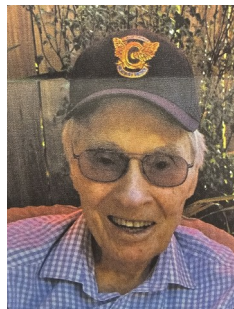
Mother's Day Concert and Luncheon

FINANCIAL SUMMARY

February income was ahead of plan by \$7,000 and ahead of last year by \$15,500. February expenses were greater than plan by \$2,400 and greater than last year by \$6,700. This difference is due to timing of a few maintenance items that were completed in February but budgeted in March. IRA contributions continued in February. God continues to bless our church, both spiritually and financially.

The value of our Endowments invested at Vanguard experienced fluctuations again this year. Our year-to-date results are a modest .7% increase while our 5-year growth remains strong at a 14.1% increase in value. We remain focused on a long-term view of 5 to 10 years and will continue with our current investment strategy.

Be sure to take advantage of qualified charitable distributions from your IRA so that you don't pay taxes on the amount of your distributions. And don't forget your contribution to support the PC(USA) by making your Per Capita contribution.

Please remember the church in your will. You can also designate the church as a beneficiary on specific financial accounts as an alternative approach.

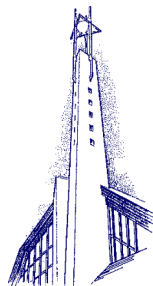
