From Pastor Jim



As the church came into being after the Day of Pentecost, Luke describes what the church was like. "The disciples devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers. Awe came upon everyone, because many

wonders and signs were being done by the apostles. All who believed were together and had all things in common; they would sell their possessions and goods and distribute the proceeds to all, as any had need. Day by day, as they spent much time together in the temple, they broke bread at home and ate their food with glad and generous hearts, praising God and having the goodwill of all the people. And day by day the Lord added to their number those who were being saved." (Acts 2:42-47)

A little boy came home after his very first Sunday School class and Mom asked who his teacher was. Her son answered, "She was a real nice lady. I don't remember her name, but she must've been Jesus' grandma or something, because she didn't talk about anybody else all morning." ... It is obvious this woman was a devoted teacher and a devoted Christian. The question this story and Acts 2:42-47 asks us is: Are we as devoted? Do our actions and our conversation reflect our love for Jesus? Do our words and actions give away our relationship with the Savior? Is our faith visible to others?

This passage from Acts is a living snapshot of the life of the early church. It reveals her devotion and faith. It reveals what was central to the disciples' lives and the character of their discipleship. The passage says they were devoted. But to what? First Luke says, "They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching." I interpret that to mean they spent time in Bible study and worship. Both are very important aspects of our faith. We learn about and are drawn closer to God and become better disciples through Bible study and worship.

Luke then adds, "They devoted themselves to fellowship." This is an extremely important aspect of our faith. God created us to be in fellowship with one another. God did not create us to be alone. It is always easier when two people share the load. I think about the number of times I have set up tables for meals or meetings. While the tables being used were not very heavy, I must admit that it is a whole lot easier when someone helps with the task. It is the same with our faith. Fellowship through worship, through play, in work and in missions allows us to share the load with one another. And together we grow in faith.

Third Luke says, "They devoted themselves to the breaking of bread." This definitely deals with celebrating Communion, but it also deals with sharing of meals. I believe there is a very rich blessing that comes from sitting down across from a friend and fellow Christian and eating together. To me, it is almost sacramental. It reminds us of the meals Jesus shared with His disciples, especially the Last Supper.

Just think how much enjoyment there is when the Church gathers for a meal. Think how much love has been shared and given through those meals. Fellowship groups are an important aspect of the Church. They build up our faith and they feed the faithful. The early Church knew this.

Fourth, Luke points out, "They devoted themselves to prayer." Prayer keeps our hearts and minds on God. Try an experiment. Look around you and find five things that have blue in them. Go ahead. It did not take long, did it? With a "blue" mindset, you find that blue jumps out at you: a blue dress, a blue book, blue furniture and so on. Have you ever noticed how after you buy a new car, you start to see that make and color of car everywhere? That is because people find that for which they are looking. When we develop a "God" mindset through prayer, we begin to see God's work everywhere. The early Church devoted

During this past week, the cooler evening temperatures have begun to return, and my night blooming Cereus has been celebrating by blooming each night. It is always such a joy to go out and gaze at those beautiful white trumpet blooms that last for only a

night. Each fall, as an act of faith, I plant bulbs and seeds in my garden. For me, it is a way of participating in the ongoing creation. For by digging, weeding, planting and pruning, we encourage new life to flourish.

Working in the garden is for me a time of Sabbath - of resting in God. As I plant, I remember verses of Scripture that have helped me grow. Each bulb or seed becomes a prayer. Every bulb or seed might not grow; we may never see the full harvest from which we have sown. But that should not discourage us from planting.

Jesus talks of our lives as being seed. Our lives produce something of real value only when we share what we have. We contribute a little here and there, until before long we are giving in a variety of ways. As we do, and as those seeds are planted, there are opportunities for new things to come to life. We may never see the fruit, but we have planted the seed.

Desert Palms is a place of dreams and hope. We hear God's call and we see what "could be" looks like. God shows us the potential. Jesus gives us the seed and the Holy Spirit works beside us as we plant. Just as the seeds of God's Word have rooted and grown in us, we plant the seeds in others and then water and nurture their growth.

An unseen dynamic happens when people come together because of Jesus Christ. If Desert Palms were not here, we would not have a group that gathers to make quilts or prayer shawls, we would not have groups gathering to rehearse anthems for Sunday morning or to discuss life issues in Bible study.

Our church has many opportunities that create a fellowship that provides everyone with the power for living. Although there are opportunities outside the church to experience fellowship, the church offers this experience as though we were branches that need to stay connected to the vine of God.

When we come together in worship, we recharge our spiritual batteries, but the real source of strength comes from serving as an Elder or Deacon, becoming a part of the choir, Turkey Day, Stephen Ministry, a mission project, the Men of the Church, Presbyterian Women, a Bible study, Habitat for Humanity -- and the list goes on and on.

The miracle present at Desert Palms is that few of us ever take for granted what we experience here. Through what each of you contributes in your time and talents and in your giving, your faith is made visible. It has been said that where there is no vision people perish. Where there is vision, people from all walks of life have the opportunity to plant seeds, to blend their abilities and financial resources, and as they do they produce a substantial magnet that attracts others to become part of a process that Jesus said would change the world.

Sabbath Rest: God's Prescription for Burnout

"Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest."

Matthew 11:28

In our busy world, rest often feels like a luxury, or even something to feel guilty about. But from the very beginning, God modeled rest as not just important, but holy. After six days of creation, God rested on the seventh day, blessing it and setting it apart (Genesis 2:2-3).

As Desert Palms faith community nurse, I see firsthand how chronic stress, full schedules, and lack of rest impact our health - physically, mentally, emotionally, and spiritually. Fatigue can lead to anxiety, high blood pressure, immune system compromise, depression, and burnout. But Scripture gives us a countercultural command: "Remember the Sabbath day by keeping it holy" (Exodus 20:8).

Sabbath rest isn't just about attending church (although that's a wonderful part of it!). It's about intentionally creating space in your week to stop, breathe, and reconnect - with God, with your loved ones, and with your own soul. True Sabbath invites us to:

- · Pause from work and responsibilities
- Restore our minds and bodies
- Delight in God's creation and blessings
- Trust that God is in control, even when we stop producing

Tips for Practicing Sabbath in Your Life:

- Set boundaries: Turn off devices, decline non-essential tasks and make rest a priority.
- Start small: Even a few hours of intentional rest can be a step toward healthier rhythms.

- Make it worshipful: Read Scripture, listen to worship music, take a walk and thank God for His creation.
- Include your family: Rest can be a shared gift—unhurried meals, prayer together, playing games or just being present.

As fall ramps up and our calendars fill, I invite you to reflect on what Sabbath could look like in your own life. Where can you carve out time for stillness? How might God be inviting you into deeper rest—not just for your body, but for your soul?

Remember: rest is not a reward for finishing your to-do list. It is a **gift** from a loving God who knows your limits and cares deeply for your well-being.

Cardio Drumming



"Confessons of faith are first of all the church's solemn and thankful response to God's self-evaluation, expressed with a sense of responsibility to be faithful and obedient to God. Secondly, in a confession of faith members of a Christian community seek to make clear to themselves who they are, what they believe, and what they resolve to do." (Confessional Nature of the Church Report, The Book of Confessions)

The Book of Confessions is Part 1 of the Constitution of the PC(USA). Each Sunday, during worship, we affirm our faith together by reading an affirmation of faith, usually taken from The Book of Confessions. The creeds, confessions and catechisms are both historical and contemporary. Each emerged in a particular time and place in response to a particular situation.

The Quilters have been busy, even through the summer. Last May, we sent 30 quilts to the United Cerebral Palsy of Arizona organization. This group offers comprehensive service to individuals with disabilities and their families by providing physical and development support as well as educational growth both for adults and children.

In July we delivered 12 quilts to Eve's Place. They provide services on the Navajo Nation.

In the future, we will be sending our quilts, along with the Angel Bees, to the **Sleep in Heavenly Peace** program. This is a charity providing hand-made bunk beds to children who don't have beds of their own. The beds are entirely built from scratch by volunteers at events called Build Days. When they are delivered and assembled in the home, they are complete with mattresses, pillows, sheets and pillowcases, and -- a quilt! **SHP** has multiple locations throughout the country and we are proud and excited to become a part of it.

Our group meets twice a month on the first and third Thursdays from 9:00 a.m. – 12:00 p.m. We would love to have some help – no sewing experience needed. A few more ladies working with us will allow us to offer more quilts to SHP. For more information, please call Joan Nahass at 623-584-4700.


click "Sign Up Now". If the computer is not your thing, just call the office and someone will help.

Desert Palms Presbyterian Church is in Sun City West, Arizona, which is a large retirement community. Less than a 15-minute drive from Sun City West is El Mirage, a town founded by migrant farmworkers in the 1930s. In the 1960s, the Dysart Community Center was established in El Mirage to offer support to families experiencing poverty. The early volunteers identified educational programs as a key way to support individuals and their families. Dysart continues to nurture families and children by offering programming focused on education. The Mission Committee at Desert Palms has chosen to support Dysart Community Center through financial support, material donations, and volunteers.

Presbyterian Women of Desert Palms and the broader congregation have donated children's books, puzzles, coloring books, crayons, games, and other educational items. Children attending the after-school programs and day camps at Dysart have been able to enjoy these items. Our Mission Committee has helped provide money for children to attend day camp during the summer.

Dysart Community Center also offers English classes, GED classes, and U.S. citizenship classes for adults. Staff at the Center emphasize that education will help individuals obtain greater employment, and that this progress lifts not just the family, but the community. Educational and life-skills training for West Valley families are the goals of the Center.

Pentecost Offering, which was for children, a transport scholarship provided four children from the same family transportation to school. They had been walking two miles each direction. The family was very grateful.

Annie Ansell, the executive director of Dysart Community Center, states "This center has many challenges. Practical and thoughtful support has helped to meet the needs--to accomplish the Center's everyday miracles, and Desert Palms Presbyterian Church has been part of that support."

This is truly our goal, and we rejoice that we can share God's love with others to create a better world.

PEB Update

Thank you for lifting up Pakistan in your prayers during this time of devasting flooding. While the crisis continues across Punjab, we are grateful to share that all PEB schools and students remain safe.

Nearby communities are still reeling--hundreds of thousands have been displaced, and recovery will be long and difficult. Yet within our campuses, many children returned to classrooms on September 1,



to learn and grow in places of safety and hope. Our schools in Sialkot, Pasrur, and Kasur are scheduled to resume classes on September 8, provided the flooding does not worsen.

We ask you to please keep praying:

- For floodwaters to recede quickly and prevent further loss of life
- For strength and protection for families facing hardship and displacement
- For continued safety over our schools, students, and staff

Your prayers and faithful support mean so much. In a season when so many are facing overwhelming challenges, your love for the children of Pakistan is a light that cannot be hidden.



Daily Devotionals




Desert Palms encourages everyone to spend time in the Word of God each day. One way to do this is by using a devotional.

"I heard the voice of the Lord saying, 'Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?' And I said, Here am I; send me!" (Isaiah 6:8)

In attempting to find a meaningful life, we try many things; crafts, work, education, attending cultural events and exercise -- which are all important activities to give meaning and purpose to our lives. When we belong to God's family, we look for ways to serve others as Christ has served us. Are you looking for a way to serve or answer God's call? Stephen Ministry could be just what God has in mind for you!

Stephen Ministers are congregation members trained by Stephen Leaders to offer high-quality, one-to-one Christian care to people going through tough times. Through Stephen Ministry training, you will gain insight into the thoughts, feelings, and actions of people who are hurting; and you will develop relational and caring skills you can apply to all aspects of your life. After training you will be matched with a care receiver which is the start of a caring relationship that might be just a short period or could last several months or longer. This depends on the care receiver's needs.

A Stephen Minister usually provides care to one person at a time, meeting with that person once a week for about an hour. Stephen Ministers gather with their Stephen Leaders monthly for supervision and continuing education. This one-on-one ministry is very important to our congregation and will benefit both the care receiver and the Stephen Minister caregiver.

If you are feeling down, lonely, stressed, or discouraged, perhaps you could benefit from the support and encouragement of a Stephen Minister. themselves to prayer which focused their attention upon God. Soon they saw God in every aspect of life.

That leads to the question: "Has Jesus made a difference in your life?" That is basically what life boils down to, isn't it? Faith is about what Jesus has done in our lives. Living the faith is about what WE do in response to what Jesus has done in our lives. The early church, as described here in Acts, devoted themselves to God through Christ. To what have you devoted yourself? Some folks devote themselves to their jobs or to making money. Some folks devote themselves to their family. Some folks devote themselves to living a life filled with material possessions. I am not saying that jobs, family and things are bad or evil. When put in their proper context of a life devoted to Christ, these things can enhance one's life. But it is the context in which they are pursued that makes the difference. Only Christ can give new life. Everything else falls short. Only Christ gives meaning and purpose that will last for all eternity.

The early disciples were devoted to God. Their lives reflected that devotion. People saw the risen Christ in their relationships with one another, in their cooperation, in the way they cared for each other, in their worship, in their study and in their giving. "They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers." ... "And day by day the Lord added to their number those who were being saved." This passage challenges us and asks us: To what or whom are you devoted? Do others see the likeness of Christ in your actions? Are others invited to accept Christ through the witness of your life? Do you exemplify the Christian life with a "glad and generous heart?" I hope you do because God desires that we make our faith visible to others every day.

World Communion Sunday October 5, 2025

"We trust in God the Holy Spirit...Who...feeds us with the bread of life and the cup of salvation..." These words from A Brief Statement of Faith, reiterate the importance of the sacrament of the Lord's Supper for Presbyterians. They affirm that the initial action of this divine meal begins with God. God in Jesus the Christ offers the bread and the cup and bids us come. It is the Lord's feast, hosted by the One who promises an ultimate continuous feast in the Kingdom of God. Under the enabling power of the Holy Spirit the divine host is made present so that a bond of unity can exist among those present and those unseen.

On Sunday, October 5, we will celebrate World Communion Sunday. Did you know that World Communion Sunday is a gift of the Presbyterian Church? In 1933, the first celebration took place at Shadyside Presbyterian Church in Pittsburgh, PA, with the Rev. Dr. Hugh Thompson Kerr serving as pastor. Dr. Kerr first conceived of the idea of World Communion Sunday in 1930 when he was serving as Moderator of General Assembly.

His younger son, the Rev. Dr. Donald Kerr, (pastor emeritus of the Roland Park Presbyterian Church in Baltimore) was sixteen in 1933. He has shared that World Communion Sunday grew out of the Division of Stewardship at Shadyside. It was their attempt to bring churches together in a service of Christian unity - in which everyone might receive both inspiration and information as well as to know how important the Church of Jesus Christ is, and how each congregation is interconnected. Donald Kerr said, "The concept spread very slowly at the

start...It was during the Second World War that the spirit caught hold, because we were trying to hold the world together. Worldwide Communion symbolized the effort to hold things together in a spiritual sense. It emphasized that we are one in the Spirit and the Gospel of Jesus Christ."

Celebration of Worldwide Communion Sunday was adopted as a denominational practice in the Presbyterian Church (USA) in 1936. Churches in other denominations were invited to celebrate with us from the beginning, but the process didn't become widespread until 1940 when the Department of Evangelism of the Federal Council of Churches promoted extending the celebration to churches around the globe. Today, World Communion Sunday is celebrated around the world, transcending boundaries of denomination. geography, and language. Let us gather around the Lord's table and entrust our lives to the one who holds the world together, giving generously to the work and witness of Christ through the life of the Church.

God continues to bless our church, both spiritually and financially. August financial results were slightly below planned. Contributions for the month were \$14,000 better than planned and were \$75,000 greater than planned year to date. Expenses for August were \$13,000 greater than planned due to three payrolls during the month. Expenses were \$41,000 better than planned year to date. The resulting Net Income remains nicely ahead of planned year to date. If you have not already contributed \$41 per person, please remember to support our Per Capita responsibility.

Our Endowment investments have continued to grow. Our year to date growth through August is 10.8% and our trailing 12-month growth is 15.8%.

We are doing very well through these summer months with our Operations cash position currently at \$412,000. Be sure to take advantage of qualified charitable distributions from your IRA so that you don't pay taxes on the amount of your distributions.

Please remember the church in your will. You can also designate the church as a beneficiary on specific financial accounts as an alternative approach.
