From Pastor Jim



As Simon Peter neared the end of his physical life, false teachers were attempting to draw Christians away from the faith by promoting false doctrines. So, Peter was determined to remind believers of the genuineness of their calling and the doctrine they had come to

understand (2 Peter 1:13-15). İ, in my own pastoral role, seek to do what Peter did.

Peter was a highly respected minister at the time he wrote this letter. He had a wealth of experience, having been personally taught by Jesus Christ and having been present at the seminal events in the early history of the Church of God. Undoubtedly, Peter's credential-packed resume empowered him to speak authoritatively against false teachers while at the same time seeking to build up and inspire disciples of Jesus in their calling and faith.

Peter boldly called out the misguided people (false teachers) for their ungodly teaching and conduct. They were bringing into the church "destructive heresies" that permitted people to live "according to the flesh in the lust of uncleanness" (2 Peter 2:1, 10). So, Peter encourages committed believers to focus on growing spiritual maturity by building upon seven character traits which he mentions in 2 Peter 1:5-7. Let us consider Peter's list. I find it helpful to compare translations. I have chosen two, but you may wish to read others.

The NRSV reads, "For this very reason, you must make every effort to support your faith with goodness, and goodness with knowledge, and knowledge with self-control, and self-control with endurance, and endurance with godliness, and godliness with mutual affection, and mutual affection with love."

Same verses but now from the KJV, "And beside this, giving all diligence, add to your faith virtue; and to virtue knowledge; and to knowledge temperance; and to temperance patience; and to patience godliness; and to godliness brotherly kindness; and to brotherly kindness charity."

Welsh pastor, Rev. Lloyd-Jones, preached on these verses noting the difference between a Christian whose whole life seems utterly ineffective and a Christian whose life is effective and life-giving is discipline. The apostle Peter gives specific instruction for discipline, because there is more to the Christian life than just believing the truth. Faith doesn't just work automatically in your life. We must apply energy to our faith the way we would to our vocation. We must supplement our faith, thus Peter offers his readers an expanding list. Peter says, "Add to your faith." Another version says, "supplement it," and another says, "furnish it out."

This Greek word which means to "add to" or "furnish" is a word that was used in connection with the performance of a drama. It means providing a kind of orchestra or chorus. In so doing, you furnish the performance with something extra that rounds it out and makes it a perfect performance. So, when we deliberately add to our faith Peter's list of attributes which includes: virtue (moral energy), knowledge (spiritual enlightenment), temperance (self-control), patience (long endurance), godliness (relationship to God), brotherly kindness (relationship to others), and charity (love towards those who are outside the faith) we have amplified our faith so that it is not a life without music the way a drama would be presented if it had no orchestra or chorus. It is far more effectual and life-giving to have the fully-furnished faith, just as it is to have the fully-furnished drama.

None of us will become perfect in observing all of Peter's traits in this life. But that doesn't mean we should not aim to become perfect. One of the identifying marks of true Christians is that they are continually striving to develop these characteristics in their lives. In fact, after giving this description of spiritual maturity, Peter added: "For if these things are yours and abound, you will be neither barren nor unfruitful in the knowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ ... Therefore, brothers and sisters, be even more diligent to make your call and election sure, for if you do these things then you will never stumble; for so an entrance will be supplied to you abundantly into the everlasting kingdom of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ" (verses 8, 10-11).

Let's continually strive to grow in the characteristics of spiritual maturity Peter highlighted in 2 Peter 1:5-7!

In the Old Testament we remember God's voice is heard, not in the wind, or the earthquake, or fire, but in a gentle whisper. (1 Kings 19:12) God speaks to us through the burning bush and through the voices of God's prophets. We remember God's words

to us, "Be still, and know that I am God." (Psalm 46:10)

John, in the beginning of his first letter, tells us about Jesus this way: "We declare to you what was from the beginning, what we have heard, what we have seen with our eyes, what we have looked at and touched with our hands, concerning the word of life - this life was revealed, and we have seen it and testify to it, and declare to you the eternal life that was with the Father and was revealed to us - we declare to you what we have seen and heard so that you also may have fellowship with us; and truly our fellowship is with the Father and with his Son Jesus Christ." (1 John: 1-3) God with us.

The metaphor that Paul frequently uses for who we are in Christ is that we are sisters and brothers. Jesus has said that anyone who hears God's word and follows it is his sister, or brother. Jesus' vision of community was that of family, and the invitation that is ever before us with Christ is the invitation to relationship — relationship with one another as much as with him and with the God who created us. Jesus' invitation is to live as one family in relationship with and caring for each other.

John Powell tells of a statue of Jesus that was discovered after World War II in the shell of a bombed-out church in Germany. The figure of Jesus was portrayed in this statue as reaching out to the world, but with all the destruction caused by the bombing, the hands were broken off. For a long time afterward, the statue without hands stood untouched. There was a sign placed on the outstretched arms: "He has no hands but your hands." Each one of us as the church is a member of his body. We are called to continue the work of Jesus, and to loving this troubled world into new life.

There have been so many times when I have gone to visit someone in the hospital or in a care facility, that I have found one of you already there – bringing the love of Christ. Whenever you write a card to a friend or call someone to brighten their day, or reach out to a neighbor, you are making love visible. As a community of faith, we never know who we touch with our smiles, whose conflicts we help resolve and whose loneliness is dissolved because of our friendship. God's spirit heals in ways we may never know.

In all the journeys we take and all the adventures we experience, may we never forget that the spirit of our doing is what preserves our peace. As we approach the fall season, there are many ways that you can help in the life of the church. I invite you to stop by the Volunteer Opportunities Table on a Sunday after worship, and see how God might be leading you to use your time and talents.

Listening to God is an ongoing experience. It is being aware of God's continual presence in our lives and becoming aware of all the ways in which God is calling us to reach out to others in our families, in our communities and in our world. Paul calls it walking in the Spirit. In the words of Carolyn Winfrey Gillette, "There are many ways of sharing, but God's Spirit gives each one. There are different ways of caring; it's one Lord whose work is done. God, whose gifts are overflowing, may we hear you when you call; keep us serving, keep us growing for the common good of all.

Honoring and Serving Shut-Ins in Christ's Love

Desert Palms Presbyterian Church is a lifeline for many senior adults who may be widowed, unable to attend in person due to circumstances out of their

control, or those who have lost countless friends or loved ones as years pass by. An older widow confided that the hugs she received each Sunday at church were the only ones she got all week.

Those who are no longer able to attend worship services often lose a vital sense of community, connection, and purpose. Additionally, many others live as shut-ins at home. Health and transportation issues make it difficult or impossible for them to attend church in person. Isolation takes a toll on these individuals - socially, emotionally and spiritually. We can make a big difference by reaching out to them. We must take the initiative and meet them where they are at. It is an opportunity to demonstrate Christ's love in a very real way.

In fact, Scripture compels us to care for the hurting and lonely among us. James 1:27 says, "Religion that God our Father accepts as pure and faultless is this: to look after orphans and widows in their distress and to keep oneself from being polluted by the world."

Small Gestures

Ministry to shut-ins isn't about grand productions as much as small gestures that let people know they still matter. In every community, there are people who cannot leave their homes or care facilities. Thus, the Church must meet them where they are.

Keep in mind six simple ways of sharing Christ's love.

1. Listen. When visiting shut-ins, plan to spend time listening to their life stories. Ask about their childhoods, careers, military service, hobbies, families, achievements, and faith testimonies. Active listening communicates

that you genuinely care. Listening builds relational connections and trust. I feel honored and blessed to hear the stories of those I visit.

- 2. Share. Bring a gift, note, or food treat for each person you visit. Acknowledge birthdays and holidays with cards and decorations. Even the simplest gift can go a long way toward helping someone feel seen and loved. Celebrating fun moments together grows bonds of fellowship and contributes to a sense of thriving and belonging.
- 3. Sing. Many shut-ins love to worship. You don't need a great voice or full worship band to lead them. Simply open a hymnal and sing together, with or without the accompaniment of a piano or acoustic guitar. I've seen frail and confused elderly people come alive as they experience the Holy Spirit's powerful presence amid worship.
- 4. Read Scripture. God's Word is powerful in every season. Throughout a believer's life, hearing the truths of Scripture helps him or her keep growing in faith.
- 5. *Pray*. Seeking God for the needs of those you visit reminds them they are not alone. Not only do they have friends who care, but they also have a loving God who hears and answers prayers.
- 6. *Make a connection*. Never underestimate the power of a friendly hug or gentle touch on a hand. Numerous studies have documented the need for human touch. Yet affectionate touch is missing from the lives of many shut-ins.

Jesus emphasized the importance of visiting and caring for the sick, vulnerable, and lonely. In His Parable of the Sheep and the Goats, Jesus said, "Whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me" (Matthew 25:40).

There are lonely people in our church who are waiting for someone to break through their isolation with the light and love of Jesus. Let's be that light to someone this week!

Per Capita

What is Per Capita? How much is it? How is it used?

The Presbyterian Church (USA) has strong foundations. The US Constitution used much of the written documents of the Presbyterian Church as its foundation. The Presbyterian Church is organized with a General Assembly at the top, then several Synods, next are multiple Presbyteries, and then lots of local churches. And we are all governed by the same foundational principles.

What if a pastor retires or moves to a different church? The foundation of the Presbyterian Church is organized to provide interim pastors, work with congregations on how to organize and manage the search for a replacement pastor. What if an individual wants to become a pastor, attend seminary, and complete the process of becoming ordained in a local church? The foundation of the Presbyterian Church has a defined process and structure to ensure qualified candidates for ordination are vetted and assimilated into that church. What if there is a local, national, or global disaster where immediate help and support is needed? The foundation of the Presbyterian Church has the tools and funds available to provide immediate response.

There is a long list of activities the broader Presbyterian Church provides to every local church. Per Capita is a means by which each member of the local churches contributes financially to maintain and improve upon this foundation. We are not often aware of the value of Per Capita, but it is there all the time – especially when we need it.

Desert Palms Church is very supportive of Per Capita. In January 2025, we paid \$22,793 in support of the broader Presbyterian Church. We recognize the benefits to our church and request that each member do the same with a designated Per Capita contribution of \$41 per member, or \$82 per couple. Only half of our members regularly make that additional contribution, which is above and beyond your annual estimate of giving to the operations of the church. As a result, we are running \$10,000 behind the amount we pay for Per Capita. We truly appreciate the Per Capita contributions that many members continue to make. If you have not already sent a separate check or online contribution designated specifically for

Per Capita, please consider making that contribution. We would like to eliminate the \$10,000 deficit in the Per Capita account.

Again, we thank you so much for your ongoing contributions towards our Operations account and ask that you prayerfully consider contributing towards the Per Capita fund if you have not already done so.



God continues to bless our church, both spiritually and financially. July financial results were better than plan, with contributions for the month \$21,000 better than planned. Contributions were \$61,000 greater than planned year to date. Expenses for July were \$5,000 better than planned. Expenses were \$55,000 better than planned year to date. The resulting Net Income remains nicely ahead of planned year to date.

We are doing very well as we continue through these summer months (when we tend to receive fewer contributions) with our Operations cash position currently at \$452,000. Be sure to take advantage of qualified charitable distributions from your IRA so that you don't pay taxes on the amount of your distributions.

Please remember the church in your will. You can also designate the church as a beneficiary on specific financial accounts as an alternative approach.
