We are also grateful for the first year of ministry celebrated at the ABCNJ Center, a new home for the Region and a hub for learning, worship, and community. We launched our new ABCNJ website, reflecting the work we do together as the body of Christ.

Reflect on a moment when your current worldview was challenged. What prompted this change? Include an example of how you can listen to experiences and perspectives contrary to your own and how your faith impacts your pre-existing viewpoint.



Growing up, I was taught to follow a specific belief system without question. Constantly moving exposed me to different people, cultures, and worldviews. When you're young and still forming your identity, being told there's only one right way to believe starts to feel more like pressure than guidance. I accepted religion out of rebellion. I wanted to discover what faith meant, not just repeat what I was taught. Today, my relationship with faith is more personal and less structured. I still talk to God, especially when I need to release what I hold in. I am slowly rebuilding my faith, not because someone told me to, but because I want to. – Hannah Acosta



This past year was my first time being eligible to vote in a U.S. presidential election in my lifetime. In the context of election night, much of our conversation at Bible Talk, a campus ministry, was about how we respond to hate, especially when the Bible is weaponized by Christians and others harm one another in the name of "politics." Moments where conversations felt dismissive of my complex feelings that lingered tempted me to approach other people in fight mode. However, I kept reminding myself of the kind of unconditional love that is expected of us in the Bible in return for the same love that is given to us by God, and used that mindset to shift from listening-to-attack to listening-to-understand. – Jadyn Beckett



Coming to the United States at the age of nine, I was faced with both an amazing opportunity and a great challenge. I learned that the cultural differences I encountered were not as great an impediment as my inability to speak the language, which presented a challenging obstacle to moving forward. However, I have learned that obstacles do not have the power to either paralyze or neutralize my way forward. Obstacles instill in me the responsibility of working to help others and impact future generations. I have learned to embrace the teachings of Jesus that help me stay focused every day on the things that truly matter. — **Bryan Cali**



Growing up, I believed success depended solely on personal effort. This view changed during a summer internship, where I learned about systemic inequities affecting individuals from diverse backgrounds. Since then, I've made a conscious effort to be more aware of the circumstances and systems that affect people's lives. My faith encourages me to lead with compassion and an open heart. One of the most pivotal moments in my life was a mission trip to Haiti. I always believed in helping those in need, just as Jesus has called us to do, but I never understood the depth of the broken world we live in. As our plane got closer to landing, I looked out the window, noticing the stark contrast between my life and the lives of those I was about to meet. Before this trip, I did not understand poverty. I assumed that if people made better choices or "tried harder," they could escape poverty. This all changed when I met the people in Haiti who worked tirelessly, but still struggled to meet their most basic needs. This experience has reshaped and deepened my faith. I had to challenge my misconceptions and recognize that poverty is not the result of individual choices, but of barriers and lack of opportunities. – Sofia Spriggs





Embracing Community: Showing Love to Our immigrant Families

In 2024, the American Baptist Churches of New Jersey (ABCNJ) made significant progress in creating a welcoming and supportive environment for immigrant families, thanks to the "Embracing Community: Showing Love to Immigrant Families" grant awarded by ABHMS through a Palmer Grant. This initiative has enabled our churches to develop programs and build partnerships that address the unique challenges faced by immigrant families. Through various efforts, we have made a meaningful difference in the lives of those we



serve.



Hope and Hospitality Webinar

One of the key initiatives supported by the grant was the "Hope and Hospitality: Listening to the Children of Immigrant Families" webinar. Rev. Dr. Elizabeth Conde-Frazier discussed the challenges faced by immigrant children in the US, emphasizing the need for empathy, understanding, and advocacy. She highlighted the importance of churches providing emotional and spiritual support, creating safe environments, and advocating for policy changes to improve the treatment and protection of unaccompanied minors.

Embracing Community Website Hub

To better support our churches, we launched the Embracing Community website hub. This comprehensive online resource offers a directory of partners and organizations committed to providing advocacy and legal assistance to immigrants. By offering this centralized resource, our congregations can easily connect with experts and services that support immigrant families, ensuring they receive the help they need.

2024 Annual Clergy Retreat

Twenty-eight ABCNJ clergy gathered at Camp Lebanon for our annual retreat, featuring Rev. Ray Schellinger, Global Servant of International Ministries, with the theme "Embracing Community: Showing Love to Immigrant Families." The retreat included three segments: "Our Biblical Call," "The Immigrant Landscape Now," and "How Do We Respond?" These sessions provided clergy members with valuable insights and practical strategies for supporting immigrant families in their communities. The presentation provided depth and relevance, equipping our pastoral leaders with tools to make a difference.


Building Bridges: Cultural Sensitivity Training

Additionally, we hosted "Building Bridges," a cultural sensitivity training for our staff and several pastors, led by Rev. Katy Choy-Wong. This training aimed to enhance understanding and communication among our staff and the diverse congregations we serve. The conversations encouraged us to develop cultural confidence and competence, enabling us to better serve this varied region. Three online sessions were held, concluding with an in-person session at the ABCNJ Center.



ABCNJ Council Engages in Meaningful Dialogue

Rev. Ray Schellinger facilitated the ABCNJ Council retreat, where discussions emphasized the significance of recognizing and addressing the unique challenges faced by immigrant families in our communities. Council members were encouraged to reflect on their roles in cultivating inclusive and supportive church environments. The conversation underscored a shared commitment to upholding the principles of justice, mercy, and humility in outreach efforts, ultimately aiming to foster a thriving community for immigrant families.



Communities in Action Grant

The "Embracing Community" grant supports the Communities in Action (CIA) initiative, now in its third year, providing seed funding for innovative solutions to local challenges. This year, it focuses on helping churches reach immigrant families by addressing their academic, physical, and emotional needs. A total of \$12,000 was awarded to four congregations: Oklyn Baptist Church, Fountain of Life Baptist Church, Haitian Baptist Church at the Crossroads, and Bethel Haitian Baptist Church.

In 2026, we will host an intercultural festival to celebrate the diverse cultural heritage of our congregations. This event aims to unite community members, fostering understanding and appreciation of different backgrounds and traditions. ABCNJ remains committed to embracing immigrant families and ensuring they feel welcomed. We anticipate that this initiative will have a positive impact on our church communities and beyond.

Supporting Pastoral Transitions and New Beginnings in ABCNJ

The journey of pastoral ministry is beautifully captured in Ecclesiastes 3:1, which reminds us that "there is a time for everything, and a season for every activity under the heavens." This truth is embodied by both retired pastors and those newly called to serve as they navigate various stages of their spiritual leadership. Each season presents opportunities for growth and renewal—not just for the pastors, but also for the congregations they support. The ABCNJ staff works to guide and assist both congregations and pastors during these times of transition.

Currently in its third successful session, this program creates a space for interim leaders to engage in comprehensive training, continuous education, and networking opportunities. The gatherings take place at the ABCNJ Center in Westfield, NJ, which offers a warm and resource-rich atmosphere that promotes learning and collaboration. Facilitated by Rev. Miriam Méndez and Rev. Dr. James Jackson, cohort meetings support interim leaders by providing a tailored curriculum that enhances skills and fosters connections among participants.



Harnessing the Power of Story for Congregational Renewal

In late 2024, ABCNJ, in partnership with Sidebar Stories, was awarded a grant from the Calvin Institute of Christian Worship to support church revitalization through narrative worship. This initiative is designed to equip 6–8 small and mid-sized congregations to discover and share their faith stories as a means of renewal. Led by Rev. Ron King and Rev. Tameka Gerow of Sidebar Stories, with support from Rev. Eric Hoheisel of ABCNJ, the project launched with a retreat in March 2025, where 15 participants from five churches were trained in narrative theology and the practice of gathering testimonies from their members.

Over the course of the year, participating churches are weaving these stories into three worship services that celebrate God's faithfulness and invite congregations to imagine new possibilities for their life together. A second retreat in Fall 2025 will provide an opportunity to reflect on their experiences, share insights, and explore how storytelling can serve as a catalyst for renewal across other churches in our region. It is our prayer that this initiative will not only strengthen participating congregations but also grow into shared resources to help more churches embrace the power of story in worship and mission.

Retreat Ministry

This past year, Camp Lebanon has continued to serve as a place of rest, renewal, and fellowship for churches, ministries, and community groups.

- 2,788 people stayed overnight for retreats.
- The property was in use for 265 days throughout the year.
- 43 weekends were filled with events.
- We hosted a total of 58 retreat groups.

This steady use of the camp reflects its ongoing role as a trusted space for spiritual growth, connection, and leadership development.

Picnics and Day Rentals

Camp Lebanon's facilities continue to provide space for large community gatherings and day events.

- A total of 1,443 picnic guests enjoyed the grounds across 8 groups.
- Our largest event, the Latino Picnic, welcomed 575 participants in a single day.
- We also supported 5 day rentals throughout the year.

These activities remind us that the camp is more than a retreat center—it is also a hub for fellowship and celebration for the wider community.

Strengthening the Faith of Parents

The American Baptist Churches of New Jersey (ABCNJ) are pleased to highlight the significant progress made in our initiative, "Flourishing in Exile: Strengthening the Faith of Parents." Thanks to the generous Palmer Grant awarded by the Multi-Regional Corporation, this multi-year project is dedicated to providing a wealth of resources and educational opportunities that aim to shape the spiritual landscape for the next generation.

The Launching

We hosted a webinar titled Strengthening the Faith of Parents, featuring co-authors of Growing Together: Insights and Practices for Raising Faithful Kids. The discussion highlighted the significance of personal faith practices, relationships, and community in fostering children's faith.

Key points included:

- Parents reflecting on and prioritizing their own spirituality.
- Integrating daily faith practices into family life.
- Addressing challenging questions and experiences with children.
- Modeling positive behaviors for kids.
- Differentiating between punishment and discipline in parenting.

Collaborative Effort Across Congregations

Our initiative has successfully engaged a cohort of 9 ABCNJ covenanting churches. These individuals—comprised of parents, grandparents, and caregiving adults—are instrumental in exploring and sharing effective ways to integrate faith formation into daily activities. Our objective extends beyond individual faith development; we aim to assist congregations in transitioning from traditional information-sharing instruction to implementing incarnational discipleship models.

A Three-Part Initiative

The "Strengthening the Faith of Parents" initiative is organized into three transformative parts:

- Online Survey: Participants completed a ten-question survey, providing valuable insights into what parents and caregivers find most beneficial and challenging about raising children in faith.
- Zoom Listening Session: Following the survey, participants engaged in a detailed Zoom Listening Session. This session served as a platform for sharing experiences and insights, fostering a supportive community of learning and discussion.



In-Person Workshop: A one-day workshop at the ABCNJ Center was led by Dr. Jessica Brown, a licensed clinical psychologist and assistant professor at Virginia Commonwealth University. This workshop offered strategies and practical assistance for parents and mentors, with a focus on the intersection of faith and mental health. Each participant also received a copy of the book "Raising Faithful Kids" (Judson Press).









Empowering Parents and Church Leaders

This initiative presents a unique opportunity for parents and church leaders to develop new skills for nurturing children's faith. Participants are encouraged to reflect on their faith practices, prioritize their personal spiritual journey, and incorporate daily faith practices into their lives. The annual session webinar further emphasized the importance of personal faith practices, relationships, and community in fostering faith in children, encouraging parents to be intentional about their faith journey.



By working together, we can empower families to weave faith into the fabric of daily life, creating a foundation for a vibrant spiritual future. We are excited to witness the profound impact this initiative will have on parents and church leaders alike, as we collectively strengthen the faith of parents and, in turn, the next generation of believers.
