#### **HEALTH AND WELLNESS**



Advancing Health Literacy: The Center served 18,355 clients by focusing on health literacy, decreasing poor communication between patients and health care providers and by increasing COVID-19 public practices and vaccination rate.



**Food Distribution:** The Center provided food to more than 5,000 families and individuals at its drive-through pantry at the Mary Ella Brown Community Center and senior distribution at the Maxie L. Parks Community Center.

**COVID-19 Vaccinations:** Every week, the Center sponsored a vaccination clinic where 390 individuals received their vaccines.

#### AHL PROCLAMATION - CITY OF FRESNO



Fresno Mayor Jerry Dyer, City Manager Greg Barfield and members of the Fresno City Council presented a produmation to the Center's Advancing Health literacy team for its work with National Health Literacy Awareness.



Thirty-three residents received certificates of completion for finishing 5 health literacy sessions on Navigating the Health Care System, Hypertension, Diabetes, Asthma and Stress Reduction.

### EDUCATIONAL ADVANCEMENT

Family Reading Night: Family Reading Night: During the year 147 children attended Family Reading Night: the year, 147 children attended Family Reading Night which **CHILDREN** focuses on improving literacy, family bonding and the **85 BOOKS** importance of reading. During the four sessions, 85 books were distributed to the 85 families that participated. Topics discussed included nutrition, water safety, diversity and cultural celebrations. Our partners included the City of Fresno, PARCS and REC, Children's Hospital and the Fresno County Library.

**Internships:** Thirty four interns contributed 648 hours at INTERNS the Center. The internships focused on hands-on training, skill \$648 enhancement and relationship building. Our partners included **HOURS** Fresno State, Fresno City College and the University of New England.



**Books:** More than 600 books have been distributed to the community, thanks to several organizations, including the Little **600+** Libraries sponsored Fresno Chapter of Jack and Jill of America **BOOKS** Inc., the Fresno Housing Authority and Reading Heart.

## CHARACTER AND LEADERSHIP

The Center hosts several programs and events that focus on strengthening character and leadership skills in our youth.



**Sweet Potato Project 2: Fifty-five youth** received certificates of completion for finishing the program that focuses on prevention and reducing school drop-out and gang involvement and substance use initiation for African American youth, 12-15.

The program's goal is to decrease internalized oppression, hopelessness and low collective efficacy, while increasing engagement in collective economic activity, college intentions, mentors and leadership development.

Families Together: The Center held outreach events to meet the needs of families challenged by adversities within our social system. 843 A total of 843 clients received educational materials, cleaning and hygiene supplies, clothing, diapers, peer support, household items along with credit repair counseling.

97K+ September 1978 Family Matters: The center distributed 97,204 diapers during **DIAPERS** • meetings with this support group. The focuses of the meetings were to provide a safe place, a sense of community and a platform where families could share their needs and concerns. A FAMILIES total of 75 dients were served in 2022. Besides diapers, families

were eligible for other resources such as formula, baby supplies and baby food.



Volunteers: The Family Resource Center is grateful for the 158 volunteers who graciously gave of their time and talents to help at 158 the Center.

# **ECONOMIC EMPOWERMENT**



\$160 K+ Through the Housing Retention Grant sponsored by the City of Fresno, the Center distributed \$160,752 to 33 families and individuals to prevent eviction.



**Gladiator Welding Program:** Thirty-two participants graduated from the V.O.I.C.E Gladiator Welding Program. The purpose of V.O.I.C.E. is to provide workforce training and job placement.

**Professional Staff Training:** Staff of the Family Resource Center obtained 800 hours of training including HOURS OF Mental Health First Aid USA, Peer Support Specialist TRAINING Training, Civil Rights Training, Centering Pregnancy, Mandated Reporter, Motivational Interviewing, 24/7 Dad/Fatherhood Engagement, National Parent Instruction, Nurturing Parenting, Fresno Madera United Way: Building Black Leaders Cohort; and Health Literacy. Two staff and 6 community members also received training on community organizing, movement strategy, how to recruit other leaders, understanding issues and how they affect public policy; and participation in the planning executing of Action Forum, in partnership with The Children's Movement Resident Council.
