#### YOUTH PROGRAMS













The Sweet Potato Project II at West Fresno Family Resource Center (WFFRC) is a community-based program that aims to prevent and/or reduce school drop-out rates, gang involvement, and substance use. The program targets African American youth, ages 12 to 15. This food-based collaborative project provides support services, education, and training in urban agriculture, business skills, healthy choices, life skills, and mental health issues.



#### Phase I February 24th & March 2nd, 2020

Informational sessions were held at the Maxie L. Parks Community Center from 5:30 PM to 7:00 PM. Over **20** participants and parents attended each day. March 10, 2020, was the first day of the program. Over **60** participants attended filling the lobby and hallways at Maxie L. Parks Community Center.











#### Phase I April 2020 – May 2020

In April of 2020, California mandated the Shelter in Place Law to protect its citizens from the COVID-19 Pandemic. Consequently, all social events and gatherings were canceled, forcing the Sweet Potato Project to shift completely to virtual meetings. The youth continued to participate by joining our online curriculum through Google Classroom. A total of 31 students enrolled in the project.

#### Phase I June, 2020

In June 2020, California lifted the Shelter in Place for a small period of time. During this time, Greater Faith Missionary Baptist Church facilitated the program with space and the opportunity to continue the program inside the church. Youth and staff followed all the proper procedures and guidelines during this time. To ensure everyone's safety, the youth were separated into two different sessions. There was a morning and afternoon session to accommodate different times for the youth. In the different sessions, the youth participated in leadership, entrepreneurship, and mental health activities.

#### Phase I July, 2020

In July 2020, the members participated in the Youth Leadership Ropes Course. The California State University, Fresno Ropes Course Team, conducted these activities. Through these activities, the youth learn how to improve teamwork skills and increase communication among each other to enhance productivity.







#### Phase I August & September 2020

The Sweet Potato Project II youth volunteered at West Fresno Family Resource Center's (WFFRC) 18th Annual Back to School Backpack Giveaway. This event took place at Maxie L. Parks Community Center serving over **1,000** families.

Due to COVID-19, the event was solemnly drive-by. All participants were required to stay in the vehicle to promote safety and prevent the spread of COVID-19. The youth were responsible for distributing food, cleaning supplies, care products, and school supplies to those who attended this socially distanced event.













#### Phase II October 2020

The youth participated in the Mary Ella Brown Community Center's Drive-Up Halloween Trunk or Treat Event. This event served more than 300 families with healthy food, cleaning supplies, and COVID-19 testing.









#### Phase II November 2020

On November 7th, 2020, The Sweet Potato Project II in Southwest Fresno harvested all the Sweet Potatoes. With the assistance of Assemblymember Dr. Joaquin Arambula, the sweet potatoes on two arches of land were harvested. The youth utilized entrepreneurial and business skills during the harvest to take orders and produce the best product. Overall, there were approximately **40,000** pounds of sweet potato at the end of the harvest.
