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## Wyoming Hospitals Unite for Historic Rural Health Funding Opportunity

Wyoming's hospitals are gearing up for a potentially transformative funding opportunity that could bring between \$500-700 million to the state over five years through the federal Rural Health Transformation Program.

The Wyoming Department of Health, led by Director Johansson, scheduled a critical meeting on October 8 in Casper, where hospital representatives collaborated on developing the state's application strategy. All but one Wyoming hospital were represented, along with the Wyoming EMS Association and other partners. Franz Fuchs facilitated the session, which focused on gathering comprehensive information and innovative ideas from across Wyoming's healthcare community.

#### A Collaborative Approach

The meeting reflects an unprecedented spirit of cooperation among Wyoming's healthcare providers. The Wyoming Hospital Association has stepped forward to consolidate and coordinate proposals from multiple hospitals, aiming to create stronger, more unified submissions. The Department of Health has emphasized that this is not a competitive process at the provider level—all strong ideas will strengthen Wyoming's overall application.

"There's no competition at this stage," officials noted, encouraging both collective and individual submissions from healthcare organizations across the state.

### The Opportunity

Created through HR1 legislation passed on July 4, 2025, the Rural Health Transformation Program represents a significant federal investment in rural healthcare infrastructure. Wyoming stands to receive funding through two tranches: a baseline equitable distribution and a competitive portion based on application quality

The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) released the final Notice of Funding Opportunity and application guidance on September 15, setting the stage for states to submit comprehensive proposals.

#### **Critical Timeline**

The window for action is tight:

- Early October 2025: Stakeholders must submit ideas and proposal concepts to the Department of Health
- November 5, 2025: Wyoming's state application due to CMS
- Late December 2025/Early January 2026: First awards expected to be announced

This collaborative effort, supported by ongoing public meetings, stakeholder sessions, and legislative engagement, represents a once-in-a-generation opportunity to transform rural healthcare delivery across Wyoming.



### WCHS Offering Hybrid CNA Classes

Kim Scharf, director of quality at Weston County Health Services (WCHS), is taking new steps to help students succeed in the hospital's certified nursing assistant program, which she has led since 2023. Scharf coordinates the CNA program and views the program's success as a collective effort supported by leadership and staff.

The hospital has introduced aptitude tests, which are entry-level tests that assess whether program candidates will be able to pass the CNA test on their first attempt, Scharf said. She said that she has told students that the program has had difficulties with their skills and knowledge tests, so they need to study and come to her if they're having trouble, so she's aware. To reinforce communication, students sign an expectations form agreeing to maintain regular contact with Scharf.

The program also now uses an obligation form requiring students to schedule the test within 30 days of applying for their license to reduce the risk of forgetting what they learned.

Scharf said the program's students are adapting well to remote-proctored knowledge tests, which make tests more accessible and convenient for rural students. She said at the meeting that the knowledge test can be taken at home or at a testing site. The test covers basic nursing skills, mental health issues, infection control and "anything they might see at the nursing home," Scharf said. "While technology always comes with a learning curve, we've found that with preparation and support, such as having user names, passwords and the Zoom app ready ahead of time, students are navigating the process smoothly," she said.

Scharf said the hospital has added additional practice, direct feedback and structured reflection to help students pass the first time. Earlier this summer, the class introduced an aptitude test and reflection form, and early feedback has been positive, she explained. "Students tell us the integrated forms help them understand expectations up front, while the reflection form encourages growth," Scharf said.

The reflection form asks students who fail the knowledge exam to explain why they think they did not pass, whether they believe they were prepared for it, how they prepared, what other test preparation might have been helpful, whether they were anxious during the test, whether there were skills or questions they found especially difficult and what they plan to do to prepare to retake the exam.

WCHS offers both in-person and hybrid options for the CNA program. The hybrid program is very popular because it offers students ample flexibility, according to Scharf. "They complete the

didactic portion on their own time, then come in for in-person skills checks and clinicals," she told the NLJ. "This structure allows us to meet students where they're at while still ensuring they get the hands-on experience that's so essential in healthcare."

## **HSCC Launches Toolkit to Strengthen Essential Health Care Services and Prevent Cyberattacks**

The Health Sector Coordinating Council released its **Sector Mapping and Risk Toolkit**, created to help health care providers and other organizations visualize key services that support essential health care workflows and determine which of them present critical risk of cyberattack disruption capable of impacting care delivery, operations and liquidity. The toolkit consists of 17 health care workflow maps and usage guidelines and encourages organizations to prioritize their risks, mitigate them where possible and develop recovery and continuity plans.

The SMART initiative was created in April 2024 as a response to the cyberattack on Change Healthcare two months earlier. The AHA contributed the development of this project, which has helped identify these systemically important, mission-critical services for health care.


