Report Summary

Lincoln Police responded to 1014 incidents, which resulted in 99 case reports written for the month of February. Officers responded to 23 vehicle crashes. Patrol officers wrote 84 traffic citations, 73 written warnings citations, along with 2 City Ordinance Citations and 2 City Cannabis Ordinance Citations.

Of the 62 arrests for the month, officers arrested several for warrants, domestic battery, driving with suspended/revoked driver's license, driving under the influence and retail thefts. Detectives continued investigations on many cases including participating in CIEG task force operations.

Fines

Fines collected, by the Logan County Circuit Clerk, for Lincoln during the month of February were \$4241.91.

There were no fines collected, for Parking Tickets, during the month of February.






National Incident Based Reporting System (NIBRS)





Criminal Investigations

The detectives of the Criminal Investigation Division of the Lincoln Police Department conducted further investigation on <u>24</u> active criminal investigations in the month of February. The types of investigations are listed but due to the sensitivity of those investigations, specific information is not available for release.

Lincoln K9




Officer Phillips and K9 Diesel were busy the month of February. The K9 Unit had 17 deployments. On those deployments, there were 17 search areas with 16 being vehicles. There were 16 indications out of the deployments with 13 items being seized including drugs (cocaine, methamphetamine and marijuana), drug paraphernalia and ammunition. These indications resulted in 4 arrests.

DARE/Community Policing

The Department supports the DARE program and its efforts to assist youths with sound judgement and decision making, including but not limited to resisting drug/alcohol abuse and prevention of bullying at home, at school and in their community.
