Getting in touch...

Before or after school chat on the playground

Most mornings, your child's class teacher or Mr Creasey will be on the playground at the beginning of the day between 8:45am and 8:55am. This is often the case at the end of the school day too. This is the perfect opportunity to have a brief chat or to arrange a phone call or a meeting.

Give us a call

You are welcome to give the office a call, either to chat directly to your child's teacher, if they're not teaching, or leave a message to call you back.






Arranging a meeting

If you would like to discuss anything regarding your child, the best person to speak to is the class teacher. You can catch them at the beginning or end of the day to arrange a face to face meeting or alternatively, you can email or call the school office and the class teacher will get back to you.

Avoid the emails, if you can...

As a school, we take great pride in our approach to staff wellbeing.

As we've mentioned before, we much prefer a two-way, verbal conversation between school and home; it's the most ideal way to share any concerns from both home and school and come up with a solution.



Our teaching and leadership staff work lots of hours outside of school. To protect the balance of work and home, as much as we can, and to avoid any concern or issue impacting upon their own lives and those of their families, we kindly ask that this is respected, particularly outside of working hours, i.e. evenings, weekends and during the holidays.

Easy Fundraising


We are using a great website called easyfundraising to help raise money for Ashill School PTA - Thetford - simply by shopping online. Easyfundraising turns

A few bits from our last newsletter... Hot Weather

With us reminding you all about the heat, we've probably jinxed the weather now and probably in for months of rain ©



During spells of hot weather, please ensure each day your child comes to school with sun screen already applied and that they wear a peaked sun hat.

Children may bring in sun cream (named) and apply a top up at break or lunch if required. Depending upon their age, appropriate supervision and support will be given.

We kindly ask that children do not share sun cream due to the possibility of skin reactions.

If we feel the midday heat is too intense, there will be times where we review the risk and opt for the more shaded playground (thanks to the large oak tree) or possibly even indoors.

We've had a few questions about children wearing sunglasses recently. After reviewing this last year, we would only encourage children to wear sunglasses for medical reasons. Instead, we advise children to wear peaked sun hats, which should be adequate to protect their eyes from the sun in most situations.

Being realistic, like glasses which are naturally worn for appropriate reasons, sunglasses are often lost, found damaged, difficult to name and can potentially be more of a hazard when playing at break/lunch and in outdoor lessons. Therefore, we only encoruage the wearing of any glasses if really needed.



Dukes Award

Dukes Presentation Afternoon Tea – a little awards ceremony will be held in the library on Wednesday 9th July at 2.30pm for all those children who have completed their Dukes Awards (and their parents). Lots of children have made a start with two children finished, well done to you. Invitations will be sent out nearer the time but the deadline for an invitation on the 9th is Friday 4th July (so I have time to get everything ready). If your child has not finished by then, they can still complete the award over the weeks/months following. I look forward to seeing what they have been up to.

Sports Day - Tuesday 20th May - 1pm

We're hopeful that our Sports Day will be going ahead on Tuesday 20th May from 1:00pm. Here's some information about how we run our sports day. Remember, you and family members are all welcome.

How it works

Our sports day is held in the afternoon, between 1:00pm and 3:00pm. We have a traditional sports day in that we use our running track on the field, with the finish line being nearest the school building.

We do this as a whole school event and there will be a mixture of running and obstacle races throughout the afternoon, with the children racing in their year groups and representing their house.

Each event will be scored by the children's houses and we'll give you updates throughout the afternoon on which house is first, second and third. Last year's winners were Conifer (blue) by the way...no pressure there!

Sports Day is kindly run by Mrs Grigg and supported by our house captains, staff and governors. Between the adults, there will be some tough decisions as to who comes first, second and third but, as we haven't invested in 'finish line technology', please be respectful of any decisions made.

The Friends of Ashill School will be kindly providing refreshments, located just near the Bumblebee and Squirrel Class outside area.



What does your child need to have on the day?

Please can we ask that your child comes to school in their P.E. kit and ideally if they can wear their house team colour. If the weather isn't overly warm, they can come in either shorts or jogging bottoms, with a hoodie or jumper if needed (this can be removed for a race when needed). It would also be helpful for children to have a water bottle too and sun cream if the weather is warm.

Coming to watch Sports Day

The double black gates at the car park entrance will be open from 1pm, in order to access our field. We will set up several rows of chairs along one side of the running track for you as parents/carers to watch.

The children will be sitting on the opposite side of the track in their house teams, with lots of staff supervising and supporting your children. Please ensure that you do not cross the track to see your child whilst sports day is running, even if you feel there is a need to. With so many staff available, we will ensure your child is well looked after and we'll always come to get you if we feel it's needed.

Spectator area

This year (having trialled this last year), just near the finish line, we will have a special standing area for parents/carers of children who are currently racing. We kindly ask that this area is simply used for your child's race and that you return to the main viewing area afterwards. We know many of you will be keen to be near the finish line but we hope this gives people a fair chance of seeing their child race.

Photographs/Videos

Based upon GDPR guidance and our current policy, you are allowed to take photographs and videos during Sports Day but we kindly ask that you only share or post images on social media of your own child(ren), unless you have consent from other parent/carers to include others.



Just like in recent years, we will also allow time at the end of the afternoon for you to see your child(ren) and take a photograph if you would like to, particularly as they like to 'show off' their rosettes.

However, and maybe we're being a bit old-fashioned here but, we would strongly encourage you to keep use of mobile phones to a minimum and simply enjoy watching your child take part.

We will also be taking photos and video clips and we will share a large selection of these in our next newsletter. Unlike the years post-covid, we do not intend to send these out to parents/carers.

Weather

We will probably jinx this my mentioning that since moving our sports day to May around nine years ago, we've been pretty fortunate with weather.

We will make the decision by mid-morning on the day and text you if sports day isn't going ahead. We will then look to make an alternative date in June and let you know as soon as possible.




St Nicholas Church Recycling Scheme

FREE Family Learning Sessions



I wasn't taught like that - English KS1/KS2

FREE courses to engage with parents and show the current English curriculum and terminology, with a heavy emphasis on the reasons this is taught and how it upscales writing. Parents shown the content but also how to make it engaging and carry this on at home.



English through story sacks EYFS/KS1

Parents and children choose a story then discuss stories (and story-telling) and create interactive and multi-sensory characters, props, story maps, scenery, and a non-fiction fact sheet based on their book of choice. The book and items then get placed inside a decorated 'Story Sack'.



English through illustrated books KS1/KS2

4-week family-focused workshop showcasing a different way of approaching story-writing by creating a traditional illustrated children's book (KS1) or manga comic (KS2). Combines elements of art (with Maths) and English.



English through real writers KS2

Instilling a love of writing and clear explanation of National Curriculum terminology, punctuation and grammar, these workshops are not only designed to show parents the SPaG which is now in SATs, but also WHY we use them and HOW these authorial techniques upscale writing.



I wasn't taught like that - Maths KS1/KS2

Workshop to engage with parents and show the current Maths curriculum and terminology, with a heavy emphasis on 'modern' methods and use of manipulatives. Parents shown the content in an engaging, hands-on way, and also covers progression to High School, and fluency & reasoning.



Maths through games KS1

Parents and children can take part in contextual learning involving clear explanation of the maths in sports; scoring and data collection with darts, archery, bowling, throwing games and 'playground games' involving shape and time.



Maths through football LKS2

Designed for pupils (and parents) who may be uncomfortable with Maths, but love football data. Conversely, it could be useful for parents who are comfortable with Maths but find it hard to create a relatable context for when they are trying to explain it.



Maths through Baking UKS2

Workshop for parents on how to bake but with an emphasis on the National Curriculum Maths contained in it. This is not just limited to weighing and measuring but overt concepts that parents and pupils may find tricky outside of a baking context. Improve baking, Maths skills or both!










I Wasn't Taught That at School - Maths EYFS/KS1 & KS2










Maths through Football



FREE 4-week course for either parents-only or parents and children.

Designed for pupils (and parents) who may be uncomfortable with Maths, but love football data. Conversely, it could be useful for parents who are comfortable with Maths but find it hard to create a relatable context for when they are trying to explain it.

Course contains more UKS2 topics such as circles, algebra, equivalent fractions, types of angles etc, but hopefully could be accessbile for most pupils.

National Curriculum topics include:
Fractions; Mixed Numbers; Kilo- conversion
Algebra; positive and negative numbers
Angles and circles; shapes, including quadrilaterals. Symmetry

Percentages and decimals; graphs
