Minister and People together say



Almighty Father, whose dear Son, on the night before he suffered, instituted the Sacrament of his Body and Blood: Mercifully grant that we may receive it thankfully in remembrance of Jesus Christ our Lord, who in these holy mysteries gives us a pledge of eternal life; and who now lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. *Amen*.

FIRST READING

Exodus 12:1-4, 11-14

All sit.

A Reading from the book of Exodus.

The Lord said to Moses and Aaron in the land of Egypt: This month shall mark for you the beginning of months; it shall be the first month of the year for you. Tell the whole congregation of Israel that on the tenth of this month they are to take a lamb for each family, a lamb for each household. If a household is too small for a whole lamb, it shall join its closest neighbor in obtaining one; the lamb shall be divided in proportion to the number of people who eat of it.

This is how you shall eat it: your loins girded, your sandals on your feet, and your staff in your hand; and you shall eat it hurriedly. It is the passover of the Lord. For I will pass through the land of Egypt that night, and I will strike down every firstborn in the land of Egypt, both human beings and animals; on all the gods of Egypt I will execute judgments: I am the Lord. The blood shall be a sign for you on the houses where you live: when I see the blood, I will

pass over you, and no plague shall destroy you when I strike the land of Egypt.

This day shall be a day of remembrance for you. You shall celebrate it as a festival to the Lord; throughout your generations you shall observe it as a perpetual ordinance.

A Reading from Paul's first letter to the Corinthians.


I received from the Lord what I also handed on to you, that the Lord Jesus on the night when he was betrayed took a loaf of bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it and said, "This is my body that is for you. Do this in remembrance of me." In the same way he took the cup also, after supper, saying, "This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me." For as often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes.

PRIEST The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John.

PEOPLE Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Now before the festival of the Passover, Jesus knew that his hour had come to depart from this world and go to the Father. Having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end. ²The devil had already put it into the heart of Judas son of Simon Iscariot to betray him. And during supper ³Jesus, knowing that the Father had given all things into his hands, and that he had come from God and was going to God, 4got up from the table, took off his outer robe, and tied a towel around himself. 5Then he poured water into a basin and began to wash the disciples' feet and to wipe them with the towel that was tied around him. 6He came to Simon Peter, who said to him, "Lord, are you going to wash my feet?" Jesus answered, "You do not know now what I am doing, but later you will understand." Peter said to him, "You will never wash my feet." Jesus answered, "Unless I wash you, you have no share with me." Simon Peter said to him, "Lord, not my feet only but also my hands and my head!" 10 Jesus said to him, "One who has bathed does not need to wash, except for the feet, but is entirely clean. And you are clean, though not all of you." "For he knew who was to betray him; for this reason he said, "Not all of you are clean."

¹²After he had washed their feet, had put on his robe, and had returned to the table, he said to them, "Do you know what I have done to you? ¹³You call me Teacher and Lord—and you are right, for that is what I am. ¹⁴So if I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet. ¹⁵For I have set you an example, that you also should do as I have done to you. ¹⁶Very truly, I tell you, servants are not greater than their master, nor are messengers greater than the one who sent them. ¹⁷If you know these things, you are blessed if you do them."

Now the Son of Man has been glorified, and God has been glorified in him. ³²If God has been glorified in him, God will also glorify him in himself and will glorify him at once. ³³Little children, I am with you only a little longer. You will look for me; and as I said to the Jews so now I say to you, 'Where I am going, you cannot come.' ³⁴I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. ³⁵By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another."

The congregation may come to the chapel as the ushers direct. Please be prepared to wash the feet of the person in front of you in line or you may come forward with a friend or family member and wash each other's feet. Or, you may remain seated in the pew in silent reflection and prayer.

If you are unable to move to the level of the chapel, please tell an usher and the clergy will come to you for the washing of feet.

Through Jesus Christ our Lord. For our sins he was lifted high upon the cross, that he might draw the whole world to himself; and, by his suffering and death, he became the source of eternal salvation for all who put their trust in him.

The Celebrant continues

Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself; and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all. He stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world.

On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to

his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith:

Celebrant and People

Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

The Celebrant continues

We celebrate the memorial of our redemption, O Father, in this sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving. Recalling his death, resurrection, and ascension, we offer you these gifts. Sanctify them by your Holy Spirit to be for your people the Body and Blood of your Son, the holy food and drink of new and unending life in him. Sanctify us also that we may faithfully receive this holy Sacrament, and serve you in unity, constancy, and peace; and at the last day bring us with all your saints into the joy of your eternal kingdom.

All this we ask through your Son Jesus Christ. By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever. *AMEN*.

BREAKING OF THE BREAD AND FRACTION ANTHEM

CELEBRANT We break this bread

to share in the Body of Christ.

PEOPLE We who are many are one body,

for we all share in the one bread.

THE COMMUNION OF THE PEOPLE

All who seek Christ are invited to receive the bread and wine standing or kneeling at the altar rail. If you choose not to receive the wine, let the server know that you want only the bread by placing one hand over your heart (receiving only the bread is full communion). If you prefer not to take communion, you may come forward for a blessing, crossing your arms over your chest, or not come forward at all; no one will judge you.

To receive the wine by intinction, please come to the altar rail. Extend your hands, palms flat, and the bread will be placed there for you to dip the bread into the wine.

To receive the wine by sipping from the chalice, please also come to the altar rail, consume the bread, then please help the Lay Eucharistic Minister guide the chalice to your lips to sip.

Please wait for an usher to release you from your pew to come forward. Gluten-free wafers are available upon request.





The People remain kneeling as they are able for the hymn. Toward the end of the hymn, the candles are extinguished by the acolytes and the Priest takes the Sacrament to the place of Reservation.

STRIPPING OF THE ALTAR

All kneel in silence as they are able.

PSALM 22 Deus, Deus meus

The Reader reads the psalm while the sanctuary is prepared and the altar is stripped

- ¹ My God, my God, why have you forsaken me? * and are so far from my cry and from the words of my distress?
- O my God, I cry in the daytime, but you do not answer; * by night as well, but I find no rest.
- Yet you are the Holy One, * enthroned upon the praises of Israel.
- ⁴ Our forefathers put their trust in you; * they trusted, and you delivered them.
- ⁵ They cried out to you and were delivered; * they trusted in you and were not put to shame.
- ⁶ But as for me, I am a worm and no man, * scorned by all and despised by the people.
- ⁷ All who see me laugh me to scorn; * they curl their lips and wag their heads, saying,
- ⁸ "He trusted in the Lord; let him deliver him; * let him rescue him, if he delights in him."

- ⁹ Yet you are he who took me out of the womb, * and kept me safe upon my mother's breast.
- I have been entrusted to you ever since I was born; * you were my God when I was still in my mother's womb.
- Be not far from me, for trouble is near, * and there is none to help.
- Many young bulls encircle me; * strong bulls of Bashan surround me.
- They open wide their jaws at me, * like a ravening and a roaring lion.
- I am poured out like water;
 all my bones are out of joint; *
 my heart within my breast is melting wax.
- My mouth is dried out like a pot-sherd;
 my tongue sticks to the roof of my mouth; *
 and you have laid me in the dust of the grave.
- Packs of dogs close me in, and gangs of evildoers circle around me; * they pierce my hands and my feet; I can count all my bones.
- They stare and gloat over me; *
 they divide my garments among them;
 they cast lots for my clothing.
- Be not far away, O Lord; * you are my strength; hasten to help me.
- Save me from the sword, * my life from the power of the dog.
- Save me from the lion's mouth, *
 my wretched body from the horns of wild bulls.
- I will declare your Name to my brethren; * in the midst of the congregation I will praise you.

- ²² Praise the Lord, you that fear him; * stand in awe of him, O offspring of Israel; all you of Jacob's line, give glory.
- For he does not despise nor abhor the poor in their poverty; neither does he hide his face from them; *
 but when they cry to him he hears them.
- My praise is of him in the great assembly; *
 I will perform my vows in the presence of those who worship him.
- The poor shall eat and be satisfied, and those who seek the Lord shall praise him: *
 "May your heart live for ever!"
- All the ends of the earth shall remember and turn to the Lord, * and all the families of the nations shall bow before him.
- For kingship belongs to the Lord; * he rules over the nations.
- To him alone all who sleep in the earth bow down in worship; * all who go down to the dust fall before him.
- My soul shall live for him;
 my descendants shall serve him; *
 they shall be known as the Lord's for ever.
- They shall come and make known to a people yet unborn * the saving deeds that he has done.

ABOUT THE SOLEMN STRIPPING OF THE ALTAR

This ritual expresses symbolically the starkness and the reality of Jesus' death. He himself was stripped – of his freedom, of his personal dignity, of his clothing, and, finally, of his life. The choir and congregation remain kneeling following the postcommunion prayer and begin to sing the final hymn, "Go to Dark Gethsemane" (*The Hymnal 1982* #171). When the hymn ends, Psalm 22, the Passion Psalm (page 610 in *The Book of Common Prayer*), is read. As it is read, the clergy wash the altar – again, a symbolic act expressing the ancient ritual of washing the body of one who has died. The clergy will then exit to the side. The congregation leaves without a dismissal, and in complete silence.
