



Blessed are you, gracious God, creator of the universe and giver of life. You formed us in your own image and called us to dwell in your infinite love. You gave the world into our care that we might be your faithful stewards and show forth your bountiful grace.

But we failed to honor your image in one another and in ourselves; we would not see your goodness in the world around us; and so we violated your creation, abused one another, and rejected your love. Yet you never ceased to care for us, and prepared the way of salvation for all people.

If you prefer not to take communion, you may come forward for a blessing, crossing your arms over your chest, or not come forward at all; no one will judge you.

To receive the wine by intinction, please come to the altar rail. Extend your hands, palms flat, and the bread will be placed there for you to dip the bread into the wine.

To receive the wine by sipping from the chalice, please also come to the altar rail, consume the bread, then please help the Lay Eucharistic Minister guide the chalice to your lips to sip.

Please wait for an usher to release you from your pew to come forward. Gluten-free wafers are available upon request.

THE SEASON AFTER THE EPIPHANY

The Season after Epiphany lasts four to nine weeks, from January 6 to the Tuesday before Ash Wednesday, varying with Easter's date. Its Gospel readings reveal Jesus' divinity, including the visit of the Magi, His baptism, the wedding at Cana, the calling of disciples,

miracles, and teachings. The season ends with the Transfiguration, affirming Jesus as the Son of God. Green hangings symbolize life and growth.
