COUNCIL UPDATES

FROM THE COUNCIL CHAMBERS

A very busy month, Council held a Special Council Meeting, a Workshop and its Ordinary General Meeting during the month of June 2022.

Special Council Meeting – Rum Jungle Rehabilitation Project

At the Special Council Meeting, Council agreed to enter into a Confidential Memorandum of Understanding with the Northern Territory Government regarding the Rum Jungle Rehabilitation Project. The meeting was a closed meeting and as the project progresses, the Northern Territory Government will release further information regarding developments in the modern phase of rehabilitation of the former mine site. This is a long term project, with works taking place over a five to ten year period. The Northern Territory Government recently announced the graduation of ten trainees from the Batchelor Institute of Indigenous Tertiary Education who have been studying land management and are working at the site, involved in revegetation and weed management programs.

Council Workshop - Sun Cable Project

Council invited representatives from Australia-Asia Powerlink Pty Ltd who are delivering the Sun Cable Project to brief Council on developments and plans for this major infrastructure project. The project will deliver power generated in the Barkly via undersea cable to Singapore. Sun Cable has released the Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) for the project and Council needed to understand the impacts the project will have in the Shire.

The project has a number of elements and includes a 12,000 hectare Solar Precinct near Elliott in the Barkly Region, that will have a 17-20 GWp solar generation capacity. The solar generated electricity will pass through an HVDC Overhead Transmission Line from Elliott to Gunn Point, passing through the Shire via Adelaide River and Lake Bennett. At this stage, the final route through the Shire has not been determined and is subject to community consultation. A map of the potential proposed routes through Coomalie Shire is reproduced here.

Ordinary General Meeting 21st June 2022

Council held its Ordinary General Meeting on Tuesday 21st June 2022.

The meeting began with a presentation from Dr Anne Walters, Chief Health Plant Officer, Biosecurity & Animal Welfare, Department of Industry, Tourism and Trade. Dr Walters outlined for Council the current situation regarding the incidence of banana freckle in the Coomalie Shire and

what steps need to be taken to ensure the disease is contained. At present there are ten properties in the Batchelor – Rum Jungle area that are affected with banana freckle. Banana freckle is a fungal growth that affects bananas only. It is easily identifiable as the spotty leaves and fruit have a sandpapery feel to them. If you think you may have banana freckle on your property it is important that you **do not move the bananas**. For example, do not cut down the plant and bring it to the waste facility. Leave the plant and call the banana freckle line on **1800 084 881**.

Dr Walters advised that at this stage the NTG is trying to contain the outbreak, so it is important there is no movement of plants or fruits from properties or the area. Unlike the previous outbreak, the NTG is not taking an eradication approach. Responsible physical distancing will continue to be observed which may result in limiting numbers in the Chamber. The wearing of masks is a personal decision.

expected to any pay entry costs as well as meals and drinks themselves.



BARRAMUNDI RELEASED INTO RUM JUNGLE LAKE

Bumper barramundi release for Batchelor locals

Media release 6th June 2022

Batchelor residents and visitors are being encouraged to pull out their fishing rods and handlines for

some recreational fishing opportunities closer to home.

For the first time, 300 Barramundi, averaging 15 to 20 centimetres long, are being released into the Rum Jungle Lake on Monday.

The locally raised barramundi are being introduced into the lake as part of the Fish Stocking Program, a part of the Northern Territory Government's \$50 million RecFishing Futures Program.

The initiative is aimed at improving the quality and number of Northern Territory recreational fishing experiences.

Under this program, Darwin Aquaculture Centre grown barramundi are released into waterways where they would not usually occur, but which can support them. A survey of Rum Jungle Lake found a diversity of aquatic life, capable of maintaining a population of resident barramundi.

The release of these fish is part of wider stocking efforts across the Top End.

BATCHELOR POOL DRY SEASON CLOSURE




The Batchelor Swimming Pool will be closed from Friday 1st July 2022 and re-opening on Saturday 23rd July 2022.



WEEDS IN COOMALIE

Weeds in Coomalie Siam Weed



The parachute seeds are dispersed by wind and water and contain fine barbs that readily stick to clothing and fur. Siam weed is easily spread long-distances through contamination of vehicles, equipment and produce. It blossoms in June-July with pinkish-white flowers and is identifiable by its large stem and leaves both of which resemble a 'pitch-forking' pattern.

Siam weed can kill your cattle 2 June 2022

One of the world's most invasive weeds continues to make its way across the Top End and we need

your help to manage infestations.

Siam weed was first confirmed in the Northern Territory in July 2019, and aerial surveys in 2021 revealed the weed had spread 100km from the initial infestation site to cover more than 10 properties.

The Department of Environment, Parks and Water Security continues to work closely with landholders to manage the spread, and is urging the public to be on the lookout and report any sightings to us.

The parachute seeds are dispersed by wind and water and contain fine barbs that readily stick to clothing and fur. Siam weed is easily spread long-distances through contamination of vehicles, equipment and produce.

Siam weed grows and spreads best where annual rainfall is 600mm or more and kills around 3000 cattle annually in the Philippines.

It blossoms in June-July with pinkish-white flowers and is identifiable by its large stem and leaves both of which resemble a 'pitch-forking' pattern.

Detection of new Siam weed infestations across the Top End is fundamental to the success of the current management response.

- "Siam weed is highly invasive and is toxic to livestock. It can also cause skin complaints and asthma in allergy-prone people."
- "We need help from the public to identify the weed on their property and report it to help manage the spread in the NT.
- "If you suspect it, report it. It is critical any new infestations are reported to determine Siam weed's distribution across the landscape.

A working group has been appointed to lead the consultation process with the Rum Jungle Project Team and finalise terms and conditions of the agreement.


A Section 19 request was lodged in may 2022, to the Northern Land Council (NLC) for access to a parcel of land (old Besser Site) situated on the Finniss River Aboriginal Land Trust (FRALT). The reason for the selection of this land is due to the fact that it has the quantity and quality of sand required for the rehabilitation works on the Rum Jungle site, clearing of the land has already occurred and most importantly it will provide direct economic benefits to the Traditional Owners of the land.

Reconciliation Action Plan

AROWS DAM PROJECT UPDATE



Adelaide River Off-stream Water Storage and Manton Dam RTS Projects

The Northern Territory Government, through the Department of Industry, Tourism and Trade and Power Water Corporation, has met with Council on a number of occasions to brief Council on two important projects that will be occurring within the Shire. These are the AROWS and Manton Dam RTS projects. Elected Members have raised questions and concerns on behalf of the community with departmental representatives who continue to provide up to date information so that the community and Council are aware of the latest developments. Both projects are in the early stages and there will be ongoing consultation with the community, particularly with landowners adjacent to the projects.

While these two projects will support the water needs of populations north of our Shire, Council has been working with the Power Water Corporation regarding improvements to the security and quality of the water supply within the Coomalie Shire. Over the next twelve months, Power Water is progressing works to increase water supply security in the Coomalie Shire, with bore drilling occurring in Batchelor and the extension of roads, power and pipework to connect in a new bore previously drilled in Adelaide River. We will keep you informed of updates.

Have you heard of the Adelaide River Off-stream Water Storage project?

In the Darwin region, we are facing water supply challenges. The current water supply (sourced from Darwin River Dam and Howard Groundwater) is operating at or above its supply capacity. A new major source of water is needed to support long term social and economic growth in the region.

The NT Government is working with the Power and Water Corporation on the best approach to

secure Darwin's future water supply.

Over the past two years, the NT Government has completed a detailed business case to explore options to secure Darwin's future water supply. Released earlier this year, the business case investigated a range of supply solutions. These included everything from recycled water, existing infrastructure assets such as Manton Dam, desalination, in-stream dams, such as the Upper Adelaide River Dam, and the Adelaide River Off-stream Water Storage (AROWS) project.

The business case found returning Manton Dam to service and AROWS, as a staged infrastructure program, to be the most cost effective and economically viable infrastructure solution to meet the needs of the greater Darwin region.

What are the next steps?

Now referred to as the Darwin Region Water Supply Infrastructure Program, Stage 1 of the Program includes returning Manton Dam to service and completing pre-construction activities for AROWS (e.g. environmental assessment and concept design). The Department of Environment, Parks and Water Security are also developing an Adelaide River Catchment Water Allocation Plan.

In March 2022, the Australian Government's National Water Grid Authority committed \$300.6 million to deliver Stage 1. It is expected to take around five years to complete this first stage.

Manton Dam was constructed in the 1940's and was Darwin's primary source of water until the construction and commissioning of the Darwin River Dam in 1972. Since then Manton Dam was put into care and maintenance and is not currently used as a source for drinking water. The reservoir opened for recreation in 1988 and will continue to be available for recreation use once returned to service.

Manton Dam's return to service involves refurbishing the existing intake tower and construction of a new pumping station, pipeline and the Strauss Water Treatment Plant, to be located near the corner of Cox Peninsula Road and the Stuart Highway.

AROWS is a major proje

ct that will require a range of approvals and detailed project planning. Supported by the Australian Government, the NT Government will now commence pre-construction work, including environmental assessment and concept design.

Stage 2 is the construction of AROWS and expansion of Strauss Water Treatment Plant. The AROWS project is located around five kilometres north of Lake Bennett, adjacent to the Adelaide River. The reservoir is made up largely of a natural ridge formation that can hold water, with the construction of two main containment barriers at low points, to capture and store the water.

Importantly, AROWS is not a conventional in-stream dam. Rather, the water is pumped from the Adelaide River during our wettest months, into the reservoir. There is no dam wall that would restrict the flow of the Adelaide River.

The construction phase is not expected to start for around five years' time, with the whole project expected to take a total of 7 - 10 years to complete from now.

What does this mean for the Coomalie Council Region?

The NT Government is committed to working with the Coomalie and Litchfield communities. We have already been in touch with directly impacted land owners at the AROWS project site and have spoken with Coomalie and Litchfield Council members to provide a project update.


A Darwin Region Water Supply Infrastructure Program Community Reference Group and website are being established to help keep you informed and provide a way for you to provide feedback as the Program progresses. We will also provide updates into Council publications.

A Water Advisory Committee will be established to enable community involvement in development of the Adelaide River Catchment Water Allocation Plan, with a range of stakeholder engagement exercises to take place.

It will be important that the community members are able to have their say on the development of this project, including:

- Impact on the roads, including road upgrades and traffic management;
- Land use and management in the Adelaide River Catchment;
- Workforce opportunities and accommodation impacts;
- Economic impacts of the project in the area



BANANA FRECKLE



What is it?

Banana freckle is a plant disease caused by the fungus *Phyllosticta cavendishii*. This species is exotic to Australia, and affects Cavendish and non-Cavendish banana cultivars. It is a declared and notifiable pest under Northern Territory (NT) plant health legislation, which means if you notice suspect symptoms, you must report it to NT Plant Biosecurity. Call the Exotic Plant Pest Hotline on 1800 084 881 to report.

Banana freckle is a serious threat to the banana industry. The disease decreases plant health and productivity, and affects fruit quality and appearance. Blemished fruit may not be marketable. Production costs may increase due to the additional costs of fungicide sprays and removal of infected leaves. Some of these increased costs may be passed onto consumers. It is important government, industry, growers and the public all work together to limit the impacts of this pest so we can all enjoy healthy NT grown bananas.

Symptoms

- · 'Sandpapery feeling' spots, predominantly on leaves and fruit.
- Spots can be very small to large (1–4 mm) and dark brown to black in colour.
- The spots can run together to form streaks.
- The spots have a sandpaper feel when touched because the fungal structures protrude through the plant surface.
- Severe infection results in yellowing of the leaf, which can wither and die.

Action

On 31 May 2022, NT Plant Biosecurity received confirmation of a positive banana freckle diagnosis from banana fruit samples collected from a residential property in the Rum Jungle region. The owner of the plants noticed they were looking unusally unhealthy so promptly reported. Early reporting of disease symptoms like this gives us the best opportunity to contain the disease.

During June, NT Biosecurity officers will be conducting on ground surveillance activities to find out the extent of the pest spread in the first instance. They will be conducting surveillance in the Batchelor - Rum Jungle area, as well as commercial growers, nurseries, community gardens and previous sentinel plantings. We will also be contacting banana plant owners for them to check their plants for disease symptoms. During this period, we are focused on obtaining information to assess how widespread the disease is in the NT. Healthier plants mean more fruit for you and a stronger more productive NT Banana industry. Biosecurity is everyone's responsibility and together we can ensure our industries and favourite fruits are protected.

The nature of a biosecurity outbreak means actions can rapidly change. To stay up to date with information follow updates on nt.gov.au/banana-freckle or the Biosecurity Facebook Group objectnose: blue biosecurity Facebook Group <a href="mailto:obj

Key Points

Inspect your banana plants regularly for the presence of exotic pests and diseases.

For banana freckle symptoms - look for small spots 1–4mm in diameter that have a sandpapery feel when you touch them. The spots may join to form streaks.

Under the NT Plant Health Act 2008 (the Act), owners of plants and plant-related material have an obligation to prevent pest and disease infestation, and prevent the spreading of plant pests and diseases. To fulfil your obligations under the Act:

- Keep up to date about pests and disease that may affect your plants.
- · Check your plants regularly for disease symptoms.
- · Do not move plants from your property that you suspect to be infected with pests or disease.



Dogs in Coomalie Shire

PARVO KILLS



All dogs within the Coomalie Region over 3 months of age must be registered.

You can register your dog at the Coomalie Council Office in Batchelor or via email.

Vaccinate your dog

Dogs must be on a leash at all times in any Public Area otherwise they will be impounded.

Fees apply if your dog has been put in the Pound.

Impoundment fees are initially \$95.00 for registered dogs and \$175.00 for unregistered dogs, then \$65.00 per day kept in the Pound. Registered dogs are kept for 3 days and unregistered dogs kept for 2 days. Unregistered dogs must be registered before being released from the Pound.

Dog Registration Charges

Town and Rural - Registration period Sep - Aug Dog registered between Sep - Aug FULL fee \$35.00 Dog registered between Mar - Aug PART fee \$25.00 Concession card holders ½ price.



Council's Feedback Process
