FROM THE COUNCIL CHAMBERS

At the April Ordinary general meeting of Council, Commissioner Ken Fleming QC, Independent Commissioner Against Corruption and Ms Anna Collins, Director, Assessments, Office of the ICAC, held a joint staff and Elected Member briefing on the role, functions and responsibilities of the ICAC. The ninety minute presentation was informative and valuable. For more information about the ICAC, please follow this link to the ICAC website www.icac.nt.gov.au

Another busy agenda followed the presentation. Key matters that were considered by Council included:

- Vet Clinic Days – Following on from the very successful clinic held in both Batchelor and Adelaide River, Council requested staff explore these becoming a regular service feature for the community. The recent vet clinic days were subsidised by a \$15,000 Commonwealth grant, which enabled Council to offer free services to concession card holders. Staff will explore options of providing user pays services in the future that are subsidised by council through the provision of a venue, marketing and promotion and administrative support.
- NT Local Government Election August 2021 – Council discussed polling booth options for the August election. Promotional information will be provided as soon as it is available. The good news is in addition to early polling options as per previous elections, there will be an “on the day” polling booth in Batchelor on Saturday 28th August 2021. Council will run a free bus service from Adelaide River to transport electors to Batchelor who wish to vote “on the day”.
- Smoke Free Workplace and Public Places – Council also revised its Smoke Free Policy to provide clear direction to the community where voluntarily declared smoke free areas

matter has been ongoing for some years. Residents may be aware that Council has leased a portion of the NT Land Corporation parcel to provide residents with legal access to their properties. Following a public exhibition period, Council resolved to proceed with opening these roads. The Chief Executive officer will continue to liaise with NT government departments and the NT Land Corporation to finalise this process and have both roads gazetted.

- Draft 2021-22 Shire Plan and Budget – Council endorsed the Draft Plan and Budget for public consultation and comment. Documents are available on Council’s website, Council office or the Community Libraries. Get your copy and ensure you provide Council with comments by Thursday 10th June 2021.
- Overriding Statutory Charges – in the confidential section, Council discussed registering overriding statutory charges on properties for non-payment of rates. If you are having difficulty meeting your rates obligation, please contact the friendly staff at the Council Office to discuss Payment Plan options.

The next meeting of Council is Tuesday 15th June 2021.

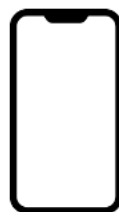

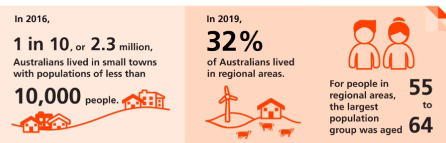

How to help people in regional and rural areas participate in the 2021 Census

Around one third of Australians live in regional areas. The Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) knows that internet connectivity is lower in regional areas. While we encourage people to get online to complete their 2021 Census, we understand there can be barriers. We'll hand deliver paper forms to areas where we're less confident that mail will reach. Others will receive either a letter with instructions on how to complete online, or a paper form in the mail. We're also providing face to face help at fill in the form sessions and pop-up hubs around the country. This fact sheet will help you answer questions that people from regional and rural areas might ask about the 2021 Census.

Questions people in regional and rural areas might ask

How does the Census benefit me and my community?

Census data is used to inform decisions on issues that impact on our lives, from schools, healthcare, transport and infrastructure to local services for individuals, families and communities. For example, knowing the number of people living in regional and remote areas informs where doctors are needed, and understanding local birth rates and languages spoken at home links Australians to the community services they need.

How and when do I complete the Census?

You can complete your Census online, by paper, or with help from us. You can start your Census as soon as you get your instructions if you know who will be home on Census night, **Tuesday 10 August 2021**. Census staff will visit most households in regional areas to provide a paper form. In some areas, instructions will be sent in the mail to complete online. This will have your unique Census number and temporary password.

Can I complete the Census on paper instead of online?

Yes. Most people will receive a paper form in regional areas. From early August, if you receive a letter, you can get a paper form by calling the 24-hour automated paper form request service on **1800 130 250**. You'll need your 16-digit Census number from your Census letter if you have one. Paper forms will also be available at selected locations www.census.abs.gov.au/find-us.

I've already completed the Agricultural Census. Do I need to do the Census of Population and Housing too?

Yes. The Agricultural Census asks different questions. The Census of Population and Housing is compulsory*. Every household and every person in Australia on Census night must be included, excluding foreign diplomats and their families. You should complete the Census wherever you are on Census night.

I'm away on Census night. What do I do?

If your address will be unoccupied on Census night, you will be able to report this online from early August. If you have a house-sitter or anyone staying on Census night, they will need to complete the Census form at your address. People who are overseas on Census night don't need to complete the Census.

I think I've seen Census staff around. Can you tell me more about them?

Census staff might be driving or walking around your area. They can be identified by the bright yellow satchel and ID card they wear. Locating houses in rural areas can be hard, so sometimes they might ask neighbours about houses in the area or to confirm if a house is occupied. This is so they don't continue visiting or leaving materials if nobody is home. Census staff will leave all gates as they found them. They may try to leave information tied to a gate. In regional and rural areas, the 'front door' might not be at the front of the house as it is in urban areas. So, Census staff might approach what they can see is the common entrance to a house.

I missed filling in the form on Census night. Do I still need to do it?

Yes. Everyone in Australia on Census night, Tuesday 10 August 2021, must complete the Census. If you receive your letter or paper form after Census night, you must complete it as soon as possible to show who was in your home on Census night.

FOUNTAIN HEAD GOLD MINE PROJECT UPDATE

May 2021 Project Update



Fountain Head Gold Project



PNX Metals Limited (PNX) is proposing to re-open the historic Fountain Head gold mine, which is situated on granted Mineral Leases just north of the Mt Wells road between the towns of Pine Creek and Adelaide River in the Northern Territory.

A project update was provided to stakeholders in July 2020 describing the impacts and benefits of the proposed development; and included details of layout, processing methodology, key studies being undertaken and potential environmental and social impacts.

In late 2020, PNX amended the proposed processing methodology from heap leach to carbon in pulp (CIP), which in turn has reduced the project footprint and required updates to previously completed studies.

This project update summarises these changes and provides revised timing of the Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) which is currently being prepared and will provide the community with the opportunity to formally comment on the proposal.

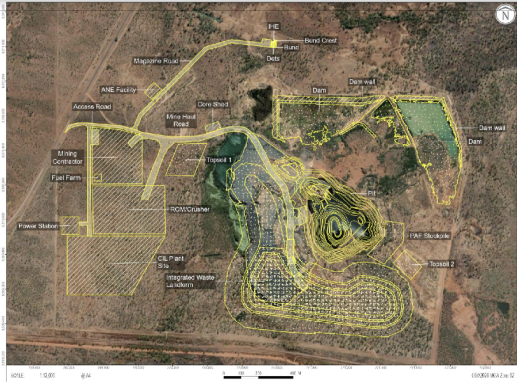

Key changes to the Project include:

- A change in the processing methodology from heap leach to carbon in pulp.
- The existing waste rock storage will become an integrated waste rock landform (IWL) and be used to store filtered tailings and benign waste rock.
- The approach to tailings management is unique to the NT and offers long term environmental benefits. Filtered tailings have up to 90% of water removed and this subsequently reduces the risk of seepage from the IWL.
- Increased energy requirements which will be sourced via an on-site power station.
- Additional equipment for the crushing and grinding of ore.
- The project footprint on non-disturbed land will be reduced with the new design, from 82.3 ha to 80.6 ha
- The original mine schedule was for 3 years, and to begin in late 2020. The new schedule is for mining to take 3.5 years and if approved, will begin in the first half of 2022.



Studies PNX has updated for inclusion in the EIS include:

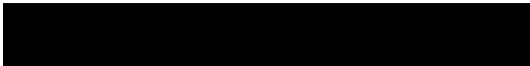
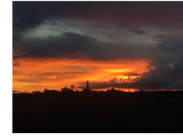
- Air quality
- Noise
- Traffic
- Hydrology
- Groundwater

Key findings to-date from these studies include:

- Ground-level concentrations of particulate matter and dust deposition rates caused by the Project will comply with air quality criteria of nearby receptors.
 - Project noise will comply with the noise guideline criteria of the nearest receptor during construction and operations.
 - The increase in traffic is minimal and has not changed the previous assessment or recommendations.
 - Overall results indicate that the majority of waste materials to be mined will be non-acid forming, with a minor proportion of potentially acid forming (PAF).
 - It is proposed that the PAF material will be stockpiled and then backfilled into the mined void following completion of mining. The PAF material will be covered with water eliminating the potential for acid drainage.
- Updated ground and surface water modelling is yet to be finalised and additional geochemical testing of waste rock and tailings is currently underway to inform the water management component of the studies.

The aquatic and terrestrial ecology and cultural heritage studies were not required to be updated as the changes in processing methodology did not require the impact assessment to be updated.

Management plans addressing the key issues and impacts will be released with the EIS, and include a Water Management Plan, Stakeholder Engagement Plan, Cultural Heritage Management Plan and Closure Plan.

Stakeholder consultation is an important part of the environmental and social impact assessment process. Consultation with stakeholders, including government authorities, businesses, Traditional Owners and landholders, commenced in June 2019, and feedback has been built into the Project design.

PNX provided a Project information flyer in July 2020 inviting the public to ask questions or provide comments on the proposed project.

PNX has also been engaging with industry and government stakeholders about the project, including the AustralAsia Railway Corporation, APA (owners and operators of the nearby gas pipeline) and the Aboriginal Areas Protection Authority.

In 2019, the draft terms of reference for the EIS were exhibited for public comment. Once the draft EIS is submitted to the EPA, it will be available from the EPA website and in hard copy at selected locations for the community to review and provide comment. The EPA will consider community submissions in their response to the draft EIS.

If the Project is approved to commence, consultation with local communities will continue and be focused on employment and procurement opportunities and the timing of Project activities that may impact road, railway or other stakeholders.

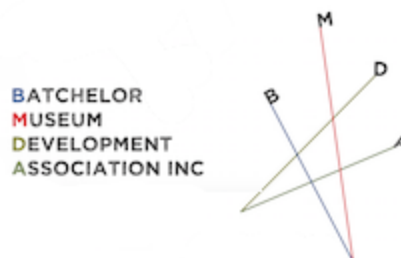

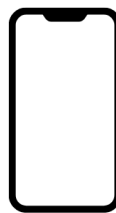

COUNCIL INFORMATION

DOGS IN THE COOMALIE SHIRE

All dogs within the Coomalie Region over 3 months of age must be registered. You can register your dog at the Coomalie Council Office in Batchelor or Adelaide River or via email.

Dogs must be on a leash at all times in any public area otherwise they will be impounded.

Fees apply if your dog has been put in the pound.

Impoundment fees are initially **\$90.00** for registered dogs and **\$165.00** for unregistered dogs, then **\$60.00** per day kept in Pound. Registered dogs are kept for 3 days and unregistered dogs kept for 2 days. Unregistered dogs must be registered before being released from the pound.

Registration Fees

Town Dogs - A limit of 2 dogs per household applies
Registered **Sept-August** (1 year) **\$30.00**
Registered **March—August** (6 months) **\$20.00**
Concessions **1/2 price**

Rural Dogs - Registration is free and no limits apply
