Your Will is one of the most important documents you'll ever write. It ensures your loved ones are looked after when you're no longer around and that your final wishes are respected. With our hospital transport service, staffed by volunteer drivers, we take thousands of patients to and from hospital for treatment and other cancer related appointments. 
Our drivers now make between 1,000 and 1,500 patient journeys each month on behalf of Ayrshire cancer patients.

Our counselling services provide the client with an opportunity to share their thoughts and feelings with a sensitive

and responsive listener. It can help people to come to terms with their own illness or that of a loved one.

Our counsellors and therapists are all experienced, fully qualified and hold full accreditation with their relevant professional body. Therapeutic staff are trained to support cancer patients, families and carers.

We have a warm and friendly drop-in centre in Kilmarnock where we offer support groups, workshops and cancer information, as well as the counselling and complementary therapies.


## John Currie shares his story of how Ayrshire Can became a lifeline for him and his family.

As John Currie took the hand of his new bride Kim, to lead her onto the dancefloor for their first dance at their wedding in September - never in a million years could he have imagined that two weeks later he would be receiving the most devastating news of his life.

Whilst on their honeymoon, on the way back from a trip to the zoo, John

began to feel unwell. His wife took him straight to his GP's surgery, where he was then sent to A&E.

John was admitted to hospital and had many different tests and an MRI. When the doctors came to his bedside the next morning on their ward rounds, they asked John if he had anyone with him - on replying no, he was told that he'd best get



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his wife to the hospital as soon as possible.

At only 32 years of age, with his new wife by his side, John found out he had Burkitt lymphoma - an extremely rare but highly aggressive non-Hodgkin lymphoma. The scans had shown quite advanced tumours on the underside of his diaphragm.

The only option available to him at that point was palliative care.

After six sessions staying in hospital throughout, the tumour in John's stomach reduced in size and he began to have hope for the future. With two young children at the time, John could not bear to think about what could have happened if he hadn't decided to accept the only treatment that was offered to him - In 2019 they had a son to add to their family.

"You can't undervalue the help offered to me and my wife, Kim, during my cancer treatment. From the transport service, to the counselling and therapies - it was so reassuring to me to know that we were supported every step of the way"

A few weeks later, at an appointment with Ayrshire & Glasgow consultants, one of the oncologists said they'd like to have a shot at treating it, but it would be a very robust and rough treatment - would John be up for it? For John it was a cut and dried decision. In his own words "What were the other options? It was an easy decision, I just thought to myself, let's do this!"

John was admitted to Station 15 at Ayr hospital to undergo his treatment, he clearly recalls sitting before his first session, feeling nervous and excited, desperate to get started. He envisaged himself carrying on going for runs & feeling great. Reality was much tougher. The first three sessions were rough with John passing out numerous times, experiencing hallucinations and generally feeling wiped out.

His wife, Kim, a staff nurse, was his rock throughout and kept everything together. She was there explaining the more technical medical terms and kept the family going. Kim is not reluctant to say she found it all overwhelming, especially so early in their marriage when they should have been enjoying their honeymoon period. Kim got in touch with us and had a few counselling sessions, which she said made a massive difference in her ability to cope day to day.

John still worries about the cancer returning. Sometimes he feels weary - his body aches and he feels tired most of the time.

"Nevertheless" he says, "It's a small price to pay to still be here and watch my kids grow up."



## Making or changing your Will has never been easier.

Writing a Will gives you peace of mind, because you know that your wishes will be carried out after after you're gone. Many of us put it off, worried that will be expensive or difficult.

### Questions you might have before you start

#### Q. Why should I write a Will?

A Will makes a difficult time a little easier for those closest to you and, if you don't, the government could divide up what you own contrary to your wishes.

#### Q. Why should I update my Will and how do I do it?

Your circumstances may change if you marry, divorce, start a family, Α. lose your parents, or retire, so it's wise to review your Will regularly. To amend your Will, you need to add a codicil - a document your solicitor will help you draw up that's kept with your Will.

#### Q. Why should I remember a charity in my Will?

A gift in your Will is a tax-efficient way to support a charity, because it's not subject to inheritance tax - and could reduce any tax to pay from your estate.

#### Q. What are the different types of gifts I can leave to charity?

- There are three main ways to leave a gift (also known as a legacy or bequest) to charity.
  - A residuary legacy is all or part of what remains of your estate, when all other gifts have been distributed.
  - A pecuniary legacy is a set amount of money.
  - A specific legacy is a particular item of value, such as jewellery.

#### Q. What is an executor?

An executor is someone responsible for making sure the instructions Α. in your Will are carried out. You can choose up to four. Please remember to check they're happy to take on this role.
