Overview

The ENAL After School Program (ENAL) is a 21st Century Community Learning Center funded program specifically designed to captivate and improve the academic success of its students. To accomplish this, ENAL provides year-round STEM-based after school tutoring in math, reading and ELA and enrichment to students who have an incarcerated parent or are performing 2 - 3 grades below Grade Level Expectations (GLE). Students also receive a hot, healthy dinner and snack during the school year and breakfast and lunch during the summer. ENAL programming operates within the Riverview Gardens School District and serves students in kindergarten through eighth grade at Danforth Elementary, Koch Elementary School, Lemasters Elementary, Meadows Elementary School, Moline Elementary School, and Westview Middle School.

Summer Initiative Program

The ENAL Summer Initiative occurs every summer during the months of June and July. The program keeps youth engaged in learning while also providing ample opportunity for summer fun. Monday-Thursday, youth are involved in daily tutoring, enrichment, and activities from our many partners. These activities include but are not limited to logic-based reasoning through Black Squares chess, science project with Mad Science, and robotics with Brick4Kidz. They also go on educational field trips every Friday to places like the Magic House, St.Louis Zoo, St.Louis Science Center, Olivette Bowling, and AquaPort Water Park.

Missouri Learning Standards

The ENAL After School Program provides a safe, supportive and engaging atmosphere by following Center for Youth Program Quality standards. TSM is constantly refining its curriculum based on academic data collected and feedback received from yearly student and parent surveys. Staff and volunteers are provided with professional development trainings to ensure that each of the four standards (safe environment, supportive environment, peer interaction, and youth engagement) are being met in the after school program. Active Learning, Building Community, Conflict Resolution, and First-aid and CPR are just few of the trainings we provide. TSM also provides free family engagement events throughout the year to promote community among the families we serve. Some of the events from 2024 included Flip That House the Board Game, a family STEM night and a Shoe Carnival trip sponsored by Old Newsboys. Each year, TSM has large groups of volunteers, including students, for annual events like Special Olympics and Old News Boys Day. We are preparing our students to be engaged leaders in their community.

I have been a part of The SoulFisher Ministries after school program since I was in 3rd grade. I like the program because we learn a lot about math and reading and it enriches us in everyday life. I also like the extra activities we get to do, like chess, mad science, and boys on the run. My favorite is Boys on the Run because we get to learn how to be a leader and support our friends and family. We also get to run and play together and it's good exercise. My mom loves this program because it helps her out and it's our village now.

My uncle is incarcerated. He used to be a father figure to me and since he's gone, I feel sad because I lost part of my support. He used to take me and my cousin to different places, and we used to do fun things. He also used to cook for us. Now we don't do anything, and I don't talk to my cousin, I miss them so much. My uncle was such a support for us but now we have SoulFisher, and we are very grateful. I think it's important for the community to support programs like The SoulFisher Ministries because without support people in prison can't learn how to be better. They also need help and support when they come back home because they probably don't even have family. This is what makes SoulFisher so special. So, I ask that you all continue to help SoulFisher so they can continue to help kids like me.

AGAPE RENTRY PROGRAM

ADULT GENERAL ACADEMIC PROGRAM OF EDUCATION





Overview

The AGAPE Reentry Program offers transitional and permanent supportive housing for women and men, financial Literacy classes, Identity class, Discovering My Path Substance Use classes, and Successful Second Chances Workforce Development classes. These classes collectively promote overall wellbeing by teaching participants valuable life skills, hard skills and soft skills that support with obtaining livable-wage employment while building a satisfying and sustainable career. The Workforce Development program now includes an internship opportunity and is open to male participants.

The AGAPE Reentry Program also includes Restored for Success, a program that offers a continuum of wraparound services like a cell phone, transportation assistance, utility assistance, obtaining valid identification, health care assistance, and case management. TSM prepares women and men for successful reentry while ensuring they have real credentials that aid in removing barriers that having a felony conviction can cause. Through the AGAPE Reentry Program, TSM is working to decrease recidivism rates and improve success rates among formerly incarcerated women and men in our community.

Goals

of the AGAPE Program

- Provide formerly incarcerated women and men with educational and functional competencies instrumental in reintegrating into society and regaining control of their lives and families.
- Reduce recidivism among justice-impacted women and men by providing a holistic approach to reentry that prepares them to transition successfully from incarceration back into the community.
- Maintain programs and services at Women's Eastern Reception Diagnostic and Correctional Center (WERDCC), Chillicothe Correctional Center (CCC), Northeast Correctional Center (NECC), Missouri Eastern Correctional Center (MECC), and St. Louis County Justice Center, through alternative channels (virtual, telephone, email, mail) that ensure safety for both DOC, TSM staff, and women and men in the program.
- **Identify** barriers to successful reentry and collaborating stakeholders and partners in the community to alleviate them.
- **Expand TSM's** workforce partnerships with employers where justice-involved women and men can obtain employment and earn a livable wage.

Fisher Transitional Living

FOR WOMEN AND MEN

Fisher Transitional Living for Women and Men is a community-based transitional housing program committed to assisting and empowering women and men to successfully rebuild relationships with their family and community. This is accomplished through providing case-management, home management, money management, goal setting, budgeting, and employment assistance. Fisher Transitional Living for Women and Men offers free, mandatory educational opportunities for those lacking a high school diploma or GED. Individual, family, and housing counseling are available and highly recommended for all participants. If a participant has a substance use problem, she/he will be required to attend outpatient treatment and subsequent substance abuse meetings. Those participating in Fisher Transitional Living for Women and Men program are also subject to random urinalysis. Psychological and/or psychiatric counseling is available through referral.

TSM provides a continuum of reentry services that promote successful transition from incarceration back into the community. In addition to transitional housing, these services include supportive housing, financial literacy, identity class, and career readiness classes. Supportive services include transportation assistance, utility assistance, obtaining valid identification, mental health services and health care assistance.

SUPPORTIVE HOUSING TIMELINE

Phase 1

MONTHS 1-6

Enter transitional housing and complete all required TSM courses.

Complete volunteer hours at a Second Chance agency and secure livable-wage employment.

Move into permanent housing unit and begin working full-time. TSM pays 100% of rent and utilities.

MONTHS 9-10

Participant pays 75% of rent/utilities

Participant pays 100% of rent/utilities and the lease is transferred into their name. Participants may choose to remain in their apartment, or begin the home-buying process with Habitat for Humanity.



Decreasing Recidivism Rates

TSM prides itself on sending program participants away better than they came. The core goal of the AGAPE Reentry program is to reduce the risk of recidivism and help participants transition back into society as productive community members. Collectively, the 32 pre- and post-release classes that ended in 2024 averaged a completion rate of 67%. Pre-release classes had an average completion rate of 50%, and post-release classes had an average completion rate of 75%. Completion rates were higher in post-release for all classes except for Identity, which was only slightly higher in pre- release (50% and 54%, respectively).

Of the 64 clients who engaged in the wraparound services post-release, only eight (13%) had recidivated. This is well below the Missouri's recidivism rate of 44%. Among the eight clients who recidivated, time from prison release to recidivism ranged from 4 months to 1.6 years. Three clients had more than one instance of recidivism, resulting in 14 unique instances of recidivism. The most common form of recidivism was being re-arrested.

Requirements for Completion

Pre-Release:

- 1. Complete initial assessments for baseline (e.g., WRNA, IAP)
- 2. Remain engaged in the program until their release from incarceration
- 3. Refrain from any behavioral violations of a violent or sexual nature during their engagement
- 4. Meet with case manager on quarterly basis (by phone or in-person when possible)

Post Release:

- 1. Complete all TSM-facilitated courses within first 6 months of release
- 2. Abstain from substance use or enroll and stay in substance use treatment
- 3. Secure job with income above poverty line
- 4. Secure housing with rent or mortgage that is less than one-third of income
- 5. Participate in program for at least 12 months

AGAPE Courses

The AGAPE Reentry program courses are carefully curated to work together to equip participants for successful and fulfilling lives after incarceration.

Hands on Banking

In Hands on Banking, participants learn the basics of financial literacy, creating budgets, building wealth and credit, and home ownership.



Identity

The Identity course empowers justice-involved women and men to regain control over their lives by rebuilding their selfesteem and confidence.



Discovering My Path

The Discovering My Path course guides currently and formerly incarcerated women and men in creating a roadmap to success for their personal and professional lives.



Workforce Development

The Successful Second Chances Workforce Development course equips women and men with tools to secure fulfilling careers after incarceration.



Testimonial

St. Louis native Kimberly Miller is a participant in TSM's AGAPE Reentry Program. She came into the program in October of 2023 after a vicious cycle of addiction and incarceration. For more than 20 years, she experienced homelessness, abuse, damaged relationships, and hopelessness. Kimberly constantly battled between wanting better for herself and feeling like she deserved all the trauma she was subjected to. She was determined to change but struggled to recognize the distorted thinking patterns that led to unhealthy habits. It wasn't until her last prison sentence that she decided to take back control of her life. Through hard work, perseverance, and resilience, Kimberly has transformed into the woman she has always dreamed of becoming. She successfully completed the AGAPE program yesterday and will have her graduation ceremony next week. Kimberly is employed full-time at Pretium Packaging as a Quality Inspector, is currently enrolled in college full-time, and she has been sober for over 2 years. For Kimberly, the last year has been one of the most challenging phases in her life, but she is grateful for the opportunity to live a life free of substance abuse, criminal behavior, and self-doubt.

Kimberly's Story

My name is Kimberly Miller, and I am a participant in The AGAPE Reentry program with The SoulFisher Ministries. My childhood was cut short at the age of 13. My family dynamic consisted of my father and mother often violently fighting. So, vacations, outings, or family reunions were not something that my sister and I had the pleasure of experiencing. My parents finally decided to call it guits after 13 years of marriage; I was 9 and my sister was 12. My pre-teen years were spent figuring out how to take care of myself without parental guidance. I started smoking cigarettes, hanging with an older crowd, and not going to school. My mother was too busy to notice, and my father really wasn't a part of my life anymore. I was running away and cutting myself, to ease my pain, with no one to

notice. At 13, my mother told me that I could not live with her anymore because of my behavior issues and smoking marijuana with her boyfriend. Her solution was to send me to my aunt's house which made my behavior issues more aggressive due to feeling even more unloved, unwanted, and unworthy. That led to me moving around from one place to another before I decided that I was going to be an adult. I didn't know what that consisted of, but it had to be better than the hell I was going through. I got pregnant with my first child and married at the age of 16. My first husband and I divorced after the birth of our second child. I ran off to try and capture what was left of my wasted youth, but things only got worse.

I was 20 when I started my first prison sentence due to my addiction. Ironically, that's when my streak of abusive relationships started. Methamphetamine was the answer to all my problems emotionally, mentally, and physically. There's a song that says, "you don't have to talk, think, or feel." This is the place where I found myself, not having to talk, think, or feel. I had no relationship with any family members, all I had was the streets. I fell hard into doing whatever I had to do to get my high, sporting black eyes and bruises from head to toe. That was my life, an endless cycle. A sad part of my story during this traumatic time in my life is that while I was out committing crimes and catching felonies, I was also bringing life into the world, children that would not have a mother or father to raise them. I was repeating the same cycle that I had grown up in. In 2003, I had state and federal charges pending for three counts of felony forgery and conspiracy to manufacture methamphetamine.


I was sentenced to a 120-day shock treatment in the women's prison in Vandalia, MO. This sentence was for forgery, and I received 2 years of probation for conspiracy. Some people said the short prison stay would have been enough to scare them straight but not me. After my brief stay in Vandalia, I moved to Salem Mo, not to start a new life, but just to continue the old one in a new location. There, I met my second husband. He was not an addict, but he was very controlling and mentally abusive. In 2006, I had my daughter, the last child of seven. Between 2018 and 2021 I caught five more felonies, 3 possession charges and 2 driving while suspended. I had frequent flyer miles at the local jails. However, nothing could compare to the prison of addiction I had been living in for 25 years, wanting better just not knowing how to be better.

The judge had given me chance after chance and finally in 2022, he decided no more. I was sentenced to 7 years in the department of corrections. However, I only completed 15 months. While incarcerated, the fog began to lift and I decided to make a change but had to start with me. I signed up for gateway treatment. I was assessed and given a year of treatment. I also enrolled in Ashland University to get my associate's in general studies. I completed two semesters before I was released. I was blessed to be accepted to The Soul Fisher Ministries AGAPE re-entry program. After being released, the reality that the only thing I had changed in prison about myself was doing drugs hit me. I had the same thinking distortions and if it had not been for the strict routine and classes along with the AGAPE team, I would have never seen the errors in my thought process. The person I was a year ago is definitely not who I am today. The program has not only helped in setting me on the path to living a life of recovery but has also provided for me financially, so that I can focus on healing and becoming a better person. I work full-time, I am a full-time student at Ashland University working towards a bachelor's degree in business administration, and I am actively working towards being the mother that my children needed me to be a long time ago. For once in my life, I feel capable of living this life without the use of any narcotics. I want to extend a special thank you to Mrs. Fisher and her AGAPE team for helping me find myself so that I can bloom like the flower I am. Your dedication and compassion to those of us that were deemed a lost cause a life worth living is priceless.






Revenue & Expenses

Some of our goals for 2025 include:

- TSM will continue to support ENAL students and families through our expanded Social, Emotional Learning (SEL) supports in ways that promote student and parent well-being and success;
- ENAL will maintain partnerships with organizations that provide meaningful enrichment opportunities that support the overall well-being of our students;
- ENAL students will continue to grow academically, socially, and emotionally;
- ENAL students will continue to have access to nutritious meals and snacks year-round;
- The AGAPE Reentry program will maintain programs and services at Women's Eastern Reception Diagnostic and Correctional Center (WERDCC), Chillicothe Correctional Center (CCC), Northeast Correctional Center (NCC); and expand services to St. Louis County and City Justice Centers;
- Fisher Transitional Living for Women (FTLW) will remain at full capacity, serving 13 women in transitional housing;
- The Homeward Bound and Home to Stay supportive housing programs will continue to provide safe, stable permanent housing for at least 10 women;
- The Restored for Success reentry program will continue to serve at least 30 women by providing cell phones, bus passes, utility assistance, and other basic needs;
- The AGAPE Reentry Program will continue to expand its workforce partnerships to include at least 5 new employers where justice-involved people can obtain employment and earn a livable wage;
- TSM will fully utilize our new transitional housing location;
- TSM will reveal its Capital Improvement renovations at our main office location

As you can see, we've accomplished much more in our service to the community this year than we ever dreamed possible. Now, more than ever, there is still much work that needs to be done to help our youth become and remain successful in the learning process and to help currently and formerly incarcerated people to make a smooth and prosperous transition back into the community.
