Michael Jordan was cut from the Emsley A. Laney High School basketball team in Wilmington the first year he tried out. And he never forgot it.

He lost his high school championship game facing West Charlotte, losing 84 to 67 at the Chapel Hill Smith Center. And he never forgot it.

His memories didn't weaken his ambition. They haunted him. He knew he could be defeated.

As a pro, he missed almost 9,000 shots. He lost almost 300 games. He's taken game winning shots and missed. Yet, he became one of the best athletes in the history of civilization.

Although he had the world's cockiest swagger, he was basically the most teachable and coachable player any team ever had. He became one of the greatest basketball players to ever play the game. He made 12,192 shots, was a six-time NBA champion, five-time MVP, 10-time All-NBA First Team, All-NBA Second Team, Defensive Player of the Year, nine-time All-Defensive First Team, Rookie of the Year, 14-time All-Star, three-time All-Star MVP, and Olympic gold medalist.
