





ROCK ISLAND COUNTY FOREST PRESERVE 10-21-2025 PAGE 10 The ladies thanked the Forest Preserve Commission for their time and directed them how to complete the C-RAC's 2025 Community Survey.

President Swanson asked, "I've got two questions for you. Off the top of your heads, what are potential partnerships you see with the Rock Island County Forest Preserve District? Secondly, are you working with River Action because a lot of their goals seem to be very consonant with these goals? Either one, in any order."

Susana stated, "So, River Action-yes. They have been a part of some of this action that we have been doing and they've also collaborated with (inaudible) association on some goals as well. They are definitely in the mix."

Nina stated, "Yeah, I think in terms of the Rock Island County Forest Preserve, part of the initiatives with the Clean Water Advisory Council is just kind of getting the word out; about who we are, and what we are doing. So, if there are ways that you all think that there is potential collaboration, we're open to that. A big focus, so far, at C-RAC has been focusing on Tree Equity-ways that we can look at areas that have lower Tree Equity scores and increase those. So, things like tree planting and partnerships with that, finding ways to do that is really important to the group right now. So, if there are ways to partner and support those initiatives, those would be helpful. I think too, as Susana mentioned, the survey. Being able to take it yourself if you can, and share it with people you network with in your communities would be really helpful. The survey is designed to collect responses from the community, in terms of their perceptions of the river and how important it is for the communities in the Quad Cities as a whole, to work together to protect our resources here. We're trying to get to 500 (responses) here. If we get more than that, it would be great. I think the sharing part of that, and helping to get that out for us, having friends and family members take the surveys, it takes about five minutes. That is really helpful for the work that we are wanting to do, and moving forward with it."

Commissioner Brunk was recognized, "Where-you said you brought flyers, if you'd like to pass them out."

They passed out the flyers for the survey, explained the use of the QR code, and stated that they would follow up with an e-mail as well.

President Swanson thanked them for their time and led a round of applause for the presentation.

I don't think those get enough publicity. Dr. Simmer, if you actually catch a fish at Lake George, I hope you'll publicly thank (him). It happened once, it could happen again. If you get a chance in your ways and means to thank Kaleb Cox, the Eagle Scout project created fish habitats which will help create a more vibrant aquatic ecosystem, and hopefully more fish for Dr. Simmer's grandkids to catch. We'll of course entertain questions later on in the meeting."

11. Comments from Commissioners:

Commissioner Adams was recognized, "In Mr. Peterson's report, under misc. notes, I see that the installation of the railroad tracks caused some pot holes and possible damage to the new road. Is the railroad fixing that?"

Mr. Craver was recognized to respond, "Basically, they use our entrance as a loading and unloading zone at the park there. It just so happened, because we were in, what I would consider, a drought. It happened back in July when we got several inches of rain and we were several inches above the norm. Due to the soft ground, the one curb area at the entrance, there's a great big truck rut in there. They showed up when I went to go inspect it, after I was informed of the incident, said 'well, we're in-we don't have a very good reputation but we're trying to do better, and we could maybe get a load of rock into the crevice.' There's some cracking. It's not as extreme as you would think, but when you get something brand new and somebody damages it, you get a little ticked off. I've spoken to several engineers and the State's Attorney's Office, and our options are really kind of limited, due to the authority and the power granted to the railroad by the US Congress. So, we will get a load of rock ourselves and fill up the hole. Hopefully they have completed their railroad work, and hopefully they won't be back anytime soon. Is that a good enough response to your question, Mr. Adams?"

Commissioner Adams stated, "Good enough response but still..."

Mr. Craver, "Yeah, I wish I had something better to say about the incident but..."

Commissioner Morthland was recognized, "Just for a question of clarification, this is on the Forest Preserve property or railroad right-of-way property?"

Mr. Craver answered, "The railroad has 15 feet from the center of the tracks and it is right on that 15-foot line. So, they were working and unloading within their designated right-of-way area, which was still-beyond the ruts that were created, there was hydraulic oil all over the place, and just general scarification of the asphalt. Luckily, we did get some new planks to put in there. For years, our staff has been complaining to the railroad because they were completely deteriorated. When you would go over those planks, they would bounce down. We'd have hikers, walkers, bicycle folks that go through there, let alone the RV's and general traffic into the park. So, luckily, they said it's not on schedule for replacement, but they did end up giving us some fairly (inaudible) boards. The only issue is that those boards stick up about two inches above the tracks, where our asphalt is. Which, we could use a speedbump, just not at our entrance. So, I mean, it is what it is. The railroad, like they said, doesn't have a very good reputation and they're trying to do better. So, at least we have some quality boards at the entrance now that aren't flopping when people go across them."

Mr. Morthland, "Well, the sad thing is that within their right of-way, the railroad's powers are almost infinite. But, as soon as you get out of the right-of-way, then they have to be responsible. Thank you."

President Swanson stated, "Thank you, and for those students of American history, a reminder; even though this happened more than 100 years ago, if you give any one entity power without review from congress and courts, you're begging for trouble. Any other questions or discussion on the reports that were submitted by the Director and Department Heads?"

12. Commissioner Simmer moved to approve all Routine Reports from the Director and Departments Heads of the Forest Preserve Commission, as presented. Commissioner Woods seconded.

A voice vote was taken.

Motion carried.

President Swanson stated, "Well friends, thanks for your good work this evening. I'll just announce that the next meeting of the Forest Preserve Commission will be Tuesday, November 19th, in these chambers, following the Rock Island County Board meeting. We are in recess. Thank you very much."

President Swanson declared the Forest Preserve Meeting in recess at 7:01pm.
