THIS WEEK'S > ~ Q·U·O·T·E

Q: "I know the Catholic Church is opposed to artificial birth control. But why is natural family planning acceptable?"

A: Men and women are made for procreation. That's not only from the Bible, that's from physiology and genetics as well. By the way we're put together, by our very body parts, men and women are constructed to procreate.

Last week's references to "the conjugal act", and the instruction that every conjugal act has to be open to procreation, reminds us that this act between a husband and wife is sacred and that it contributes to God's continued creation of the world.

Artificial birth control - be it surgical (vasectomies or tubal ligations), mechanical (prophylactics), or chemical/hormonal (contraceptive pills) - seeks to sterilize the conjugal act. To make this sacred act fruitless and empty makes it something God did not intend it to be. To make such a serious effort to circumvent God's will is sinful, whether it's successful or not.

The difference between natural family planning and artificial birth control is that one is natural - cooperating with the fertility cycle God has already implanted in men and women - and one is not. To cooperate with God is far different from trying to undo His plan for us.

However, the use of natural family planning is not absolute. The instruction about the use of natural family planning has this caution: The Catechism of the Catholic Church [CCC #2368] states: "A particular aspect of this responsibility concerns the regulation of births. For just reasons, spouses may wish to space the births of their children. It is their duty to make certain that their desire is not motivated by selfishness but is in conformity with the generosity appropriate to responsible parenthood."

LENT at ST. ROSE

ASH WEDNESDAY: Masses and the distribution of blessed ashes will take place here at St. Rose of Lima on March 2nd at 6:15 am, 8:00 am, 9:00 am (with the school children), and 6:30 pm. Ash Wednesday is a day of fast and abstinence.

DAILY MASS: During the holy season of Lent our morning Mass schedule is expanded to 6:15 am Monday through Friday and 8:00 am on Monday, Wednesday & Friday

STATIONS of the CROSS: Stations of the Cross will take place each Friday afternoon during Lent at 2:15 in church with the faculty and students of St. Rose School.

CONFESSIONS: Confessions are heard each Tuesday from 5:30 - 6:15 pm (just prior to 6:30 pm Mass) and on Saturdays from 8;30 - 9:00 am (just after the 8:00 am Mass) and from 4:00 - 4:45 pm (just prior to the 5:00 pm Mass). Additional Confession times will be added during Holy Week.

HOLY WEEK: The distribution of blessed palms and Masses on Palm Sunday will follow our regular Sunday schedule. On Holy Thursday the Mass of the Lord's Supper will take place at 6:30 pm; Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament at the Altar of Repose will continue until 9:00 pm. On Good Friday the Liturgy of the Lord's Passion will take place at 6:30 pm. On Holy Saturday, the Easter Vigil will take place at 6:30 pm. On Easter Sunday, Masses will be at our regular times of 7:00 am, 9:00 am and 11:00 am.

TRE ORE: On Good Friday afternoon, from 12 noon until 3 pm. Tre Ore will take place with the Sorrowful Mysteries of the Rosary at 12:30 pm, the Reading of the Passion at 1:30 pm, and Stations of the Cross at 2:30 pm. Confessions will be heard inbetween the Tre Ore devotions.

COUNCIL

SRLS PRINCIPAL SEARCH - This coming Sunday we'll interview the 2 applicants we have for the Principal position at St. Rose of Lima School. 2 other prospective applicants withdrew themselves from consideration. Although the interviews will be held on Sunday, there is no commitment to hire a new principal on Sunday. At the same time, we need to make sure we have a principal in place by the end of the current school year. "ALL THINGS NEW" - The "All Things New" program continues to unfold. The next effort will be a survey open to all parishioners of all the parishes of the Archdiocese. You'll find information about it in Sunday's bulletin. Fr. Anderson encourages everyone to take the survey. The initial plans for reorganization of the Archdiocese are due by Pentecost - June 2022. MASS - We discussed whether we should change any of the current Mass practices. We have adapted singing, sign of peace, etc. for the pandemic. It seems people like the changes and there seems to be no enthusiasm for changing any ofo what we're currently doing. It is hoped that this Parish Council discussion will prompt comments from parishioners about whether they want to go back to any of the things which have been adapted to the pandemic.

AUCTION - With the Auction so close, it's helpful that everything seems to be falling into place. The fact that the # of sponsorships is up and the fact that the Auction is sold out give us hope that the Auction will be as successful as we need it to be.

LENT - The coming season of Lent will find St. Rose following its usual Lenten schedule. The full Lenten schedule will be included in Sunday's bulletin. First Penance for our 23 PSR and SRLS Second Graders will be held on the Saturday after Ash Wednesday.

NEW CAFETERIA REFRIGERATOR - The U. S. Government has dramatically increased its funding of its hot lunch program. However, the increased funding must be used for the cafeteria. Accordingly, we're replacing the cafeteria refrigerator and we're looking into putting stainless steel over the butcher block in our cafeteria kitchen. Since the government money won't be available until the end of the school year, we'll pay for the improvements from our maintenance fund and then reimburse the maintenance fund from the cafeteria fund once the funds become available.

CHRISTIAN HORNBECK - The pending charge against Fr. Anderson puts all of us in an awkward situation. There will be an article in this week's *Leader*. As he stated in the Sunday bulletin. Fr. Anderson regrets the less-than-positive publicity this situation will generate. Fr. Anderson has every hope for a favorable resolution of these charges, but getting there will not be comfortable. He also appreciates all the support and encouragement he has received.

AVAILABLE FUNDS REPORT - Our Maintenance Fund stands at \$106,380; our School Reserve fund stands at \$191,166; cash on hand is \$153,107.

LENTEN OBSERVANCE AND RESOURCES - ARCHDIOCESE OF ST. LOUIS

Although Ash Wednesday is not a holy day of obligation and while there is no requirement for the clergy and faithful to receive the imposition of ashes, it is rightly observed as a celebration of high importance and many will surely wish to safely participate even in spite of the current situation.

At the pastor's discretion, ashes can either be applied in the traditional way (on the forehead) or they may be sprinkled on the head of the faithful. This option was allowed last year and the same option may be used this year. In either case, I ask that they follow the blessing ritual as prescribed by the USCCB and Rome. If ashes are to be placed on the forehead, it will be done without saying the formula to those who come forward.

The Blessing of Ashes should take place within the celebration of the Mass or a scheduled service consisting of at least an appointed Scripture reading and a brief homily stressing the meaning of the ashes as a symbol of penance and self-denial. Please refer to the Book of Blessing for additional information that will be of assistance to you in this matter. The Blessing of the Ashes is reserved to the priest or deacon, and priests and deacons should participate in the distribution of the ashes, whenever possible. They are the primary ministers of the ritual. In the case of genuine pastoral necessity,

Archbishop Rozanski has given permission for lay ministers (for example, extraordinary ministers of Holy Communion) to assist the priest and deacon in the distribution of the blessed ashes.

May the Lord strengthen you as you continue to share this message with your parishioners. Be assured of my prayers for both you and the people in your parish throughout this Lenten Season. Together we can make "All Things New" and grow in greater communion as the Body of Christ.

Ash Wednesday & Upcoming Liturgical Celebrations ARCHDIOCESAN LENTEN REGULATIONS

"For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him might not perish but might have eternal life. For God did not send his Son into the world to condemn the world, but that the world might be saved through him." (John 3:16-17) The Church has always helped us fulfill these words of Jesus by prescribing very definite penance for all Catholics, so that we too might have Eternal life.

Accordingly, the Pope and the American Bishops have outlined obligatory fast and abstinence as follows:

Ash Wednesday (March 2, 2022), all Fridays of Lent and Good Friday (April 15, 2022) are days of abstinence (refraining from meat) for all Catholics from age 14 onwards. On these two days, fast, as well as abstinence, is also obligatory for those from the ages of 18-59. Abstinence means refraining from meat. Fast means one full meal a day, with two smaller meals and nothing between meals (liquids are permitted). No Catholic will lightly excuse himself or herself from this obligation.

We should strive to make all days of Lent a time of prayer and penance. Following are several resources that can aid in finding different forms of prayer and penance.

Disciple Maker Index

Every parish in the Archdiocese of St. Louis will be participating in the archdiocesan-wide Disciple Maker Index (DMI) Survey between Ash Wednesday, March 2 and April 4, 2022. This nationally-recognized survey has been administered at parishes around the United States and Canada since 2013. The results from the survey will not only be used for information and planning for parishes, but will also be included in the national results which track trends, growth and Church-related opportunities nationwide. About the Disciple Maker Index

The Disciple Maker Index was developed by Catholic Leadership Institute in 2013 with the guidance and input of bishops and priests nationwide, and the expertise of professional survey teams to be an instrument that is statistically sound while at the same time focusing on important aspects of our Catholic Faith.

The Disciple Maker Index (DMI) is an anonymous survey of parishioners that provides insights into the level of missionary discipleship in the parish in addition to the effectiveness of the Mass experience, preaching and other aspects of parish life.

The data results are visualized for parish and archdiocesan views, and include benchmark information based on all parishes in the national database. The benchmark of parishes of similar size or in similar environments provides a national perspective to local results. The survey and results were designed so that parishes can repeat the Disciple Maker Index every two to three years to see changes over time through longitudinal data comparison.

Catholic Trends in St. Louis

From the trending data that the Archdiocese of St. Louis has been collecting over the past 80 years, there has been significant declines in many of the major data points that require a better use of our Archdiocesan resources to change the trends. There resources include our human resources (clergy and lay leaders), financial resources, physical structures, and parish locations across the Archdiocese.

Number of Catholics

Since 2000, despite having more baptisms than funerals and welcoming about 1,000 people into the Church through RCIA annually, the Catholic population has been declining at the rate of approximately 2,000 Catholic per year, meaning a large number of Catholics are leaving the Church each year. The Catholic population is calculated by adding the number of Catholics registered in our parishes with the estimated number of Catholics who do not register in our parishes but who live in the greater St. Louis area. **Baptisms and Catholic Marriages**

Mirroring the decline in the number of Catholics, there has been a significant decrease in the number of baptisms and marriages each year.

Catholic Elementary School and PSR Enrollment

Additionally, the Archdiocese has experienced a decrease in enrollment in our Catholic school system an Parish School of Religion (PSR) programs. The costs associated with providing quality Catholic education have continued to outpace tuition revenue. causing challenges to provide Catholic education at an affordable cost.

Mass Counts

Prior to the COVID-19 pandemic, Sunday Mass attendance has been declining about 0.5% per year since 2011 (the first year the Archdiocese measured Mass attendance in each parish.) The COVID-19 pandemic has accelerated this decline and it has not been able to rebound to pre-COVID-19 levels.

Number of Diocesan Priests

All of these trends are occurring as the number of our diocesan priests continues to decline impacting our ability to support our parish communities.

Diocesan Priests and Parishes

Even though six priests were ordained in 2021 and two priests are scheduled to be ordained in May of 2022, fewer priests will be ordained over the foreseeable future than the archdiocese will lose each year due to retirements, leaving parish ministry, or death. Within the next few years, the number of active diocesan priests in parish ministry will dip below the number of parishes that need to be served by priests.



Couple Refused Doctors' Suggestion to Abort One Twin to Save the Other. Both Are Now Great!

An English couple, who refused to abort one of their children to save the other, have shared their joy as the twin brothers are still going strong 17 months later.

Ashley and Kate Butcher were offered an abortion after a 12-week ultrasound revealed their twin sons' umbilical cords were tangled and they were sharing a placenta.

The twins, Arlen and Eivin, were born 7 weeks early, by caesarean section in August 2020, and weighed 4lbs 7oz and 4lbs 11oz respectively. At the 12-week scan, Ashley and Kate were advised that the twisted cords could cut off oxygen and blood supply to each baby

Ashley said: "[there was] a 30-40 per cent chance that one or both of them wouldn't make it [but] there was no way that we were going to choose one of our babies over the other".

The couple, who are both Scout leaders, shared how the knot between both boys' cords reminded them of the 'friendship' knot (a knot used to hold a scout necker together), symbolic of the "special bond they had in the womb".

Whilst Arlen initially needed resuscitation, he and Eivin have since become stronger with every passing day, and were even able to meet their great grandmother in May of last year. Ashley told of the boys "close bond" and how they "get up to all sorts of mischief together", describing them as "a real tag team".

In England and Wales, 65 'selective termination' abortions were performed in 2020, where a twin, triplet or more were aborted in the womb. Outside the United Kingdom, some women have spoken publicly about having a selective-reduction abortion, with one woman recounting her story to the New York Times.


The woman described how she was grateful that her sonographer had turned off the overhead screen as she did not want to see the two shadows floating inside her. She spoke of how she tried not to think about them, but that she could often think of little else.

She was pregnant at 45, after six years of fertility treatment in the pursuit of having a baby - yet, as the article recounts "here she was, 14 weeks into her pregnancy, choosing to extinguish one of two healthy fetuses, almost as if having half an abortion"

She later said: "If I had conceived these twins naturally, I wouldn't have reduced this pregnancy, because you feel like if there's a natural order, then you don't want to disturb it. But we created this child in such an artificial manner - in a test tube, choosing an egg donor, having the embryo placed in me - and somehow, making a decision about how many to carry seemed to be just another choice. The pregnancy was all so consumerish to begin with, and this became yet another thing we could control".

Right To Life UK spokesperson, Catherine Robinson, said: "It is so great to hear Arlen and Eivin's story, their parents' choice to protect both of their lives and their amazing recovery and good health since then. Sadly, this is not the reality for some babies as shown by 2020's harrowing statistics".

'Selective-reduction abortions are a particularly disturbing occurrence, with the notion of having to choose one baby over another being hard for most to comprehend. These forms of abortion are also alarming due to their obvious links to able-ism and eugenics, where babies with disabilities are often selected to be aborted". [from LifeNews]
