
## Elementary | Kit 7

### Engagement 1 | EXPLORE and REFLECT

To begin...

Step 2: After you have finished watching the video, write the word prejudice at the top of a page in your journal. Remember when you break the word **prejudice** into parts, it means pre judge.



Step 3: What is something that someone might think about you just from looking at you? Brainstorm as many things as you can and write them down in your journal. For example, maybe you identify yourself as a boy and people have prejudged that you must love sports, or perhaps you identify as a girl and some people prejudged that you must love the color pink.

### Engagement 2 | DISCOVER and CREATE

For this engagement you will need something to write with and your notebook or journal as well as a paper plate or a piece of drawing paper and a pair of scissors.

Step 1: If you have a paper plate handy, you can use it for this section. If not, cut out a circle about the size of a paper plate. On the edge of your circle, or the bumpy part of your paper plate, write the words that you jotted down when thinking about people's assumptions of you.

Step 2: On the inside of your circle, draw a heart. Then write the words that you know truly describe who you are. Display your plate/circle in a prominent place and see if it becomes a good discussion starter. If you were to make one for a friend of yours, what would the outer circle look like? How about the inner circle?

What does this make you think about pre-judgement and prejudice?

### Engagement 3 | EXPLORE and CREATE




When we look at history, it is clear that prejudice has caused many wars, acts of violence and unfair treatment of various human beings.

Step 2: Now review the printed version of [The Universal Declaration of Human Rights](#). When we look at history, it is clear that prejudice has caused many wars, acts of violence and unfair treatment of various human beings.

Step 3: Use your favorite form of art to create a visual interpretation of Article 1 from the Universal Declaration of Human Rights. Think about the words you jotted down about prejudice and perhaps include that language in your art piece. You can use markers, pencils or paints or you can print images to help create a collage, or you can take a picture and layer language on top of the image. It's your choice! Be sure to write Article 1 and what it says somewhere on your piece, and of course, we hope you will share it to the [RYR gallery](#).
