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Plumbing Maintenance Tips

Know What Not to Put Down the Garbage Disposal

Here are some general garbage disposal guidelines:

- · Potato peels and fibrous foods like celery, onions, eggshells, corn husks, banana peels, and asparagus can clog your drain and disposal, so it's best to put them in the trash or compost.
- Bones can damage the blades. Fine bones—like fish bones—can be put in the disposal, but larger bones should be put in the trash bin.
- Hard seeds should be cut up into small pieces rather than ground up. These ground-up pieces could get wedged into various parts of the garbage disposal and cause jams.
- Do not put coffee grounds or tea leaves into the disposal. These can collect in the pipe and cause a clog.
- Avoid pouring cooking oil or fats down your drain. Grease can solidify and clog your pipes. (continue on page 2)

Watch What You Flush

There are certain things that should be flushed and certain things that should definitely not be flushed. If you start flushing things other than toilet paper and bodily waste down the toilet, you could cause some serious clogs that we're betting you really don't want to deal with. That includes hygiene products, cotton balls, prescription medications, and yes...the unfortunate pet fish.

Use a Strainer

Clogs are one of the most common plumbing problems, and when it comes to a shower or sink drain, it can become gross and messy thanks to hair and soap residue. Avoiding the icky is as simple as using a basket strainer or hair catcher. This will help prevent a time-consuming and unpleasant task in the future.

Test Your Toilet's Flush Valve Seal for Leaks

One of the places you'll likely find a leak is in your toilet's flush valve seal. The flush valve seal is what keeps water from flowing from the tank to the bowl of your toilet when it isn't in flushing mode. Catching a leak in your flush valve seal early requires a simple test: food coloring. No, you didn't misread that. All it takes is a couple of drops of food coloring in your toilet tank. Check back in a few hours. If some of the colored water has found its way into your toilet bowl, that means you have a leak.

Avoid Chemical Drain Cleaners

Chemical drain cleaners are straight up awful when it comes to the health and wellbeing of your plumbing. People tend to go for them because they are advertised as immediately effective, but they can do more damage in the long run.

Dogs are the best in just about every way. They're always happy, they give the best snuggles, and they make every day just a little bit brighter. For all the love that they give to us, it's only fair that we take ownership of their safety and ensure that they're cared for. However, there is one duty that is often avoided or overlooked, picking up your dog's poop. By neglecting this job, you can cause havoc on the environment around you. Not to mention, the impact on your dog's health and vulnerability to disease.

The most impactful reason people need to deal with their dog's poop, is because it can lead to disease. When a dog sniffs, licks, or eats the feces of another animal, there is a chance that parasites, harmful bacteria, or viruses are involved. Some problematic issues include:

- Parasites like roundworms and coccidia, viruses such as parvovirus are infections that spread entirely through the digestive system.
- · The pooch will suffer from a variety of symptoms including diarrhea, vomiting, and fever as it becomes a host.
- Even when your pet seems to be feeling fine, they can still be carriers for disease so if their waste is not handled properly, it could affect other dogs.
- Other contaminants like hookworms, giardia, salmonella, E. coli, and campylobacter serve as great examples of disease-causing organisms.
- Humans can become infected by some of the same bacteria, viruses, and parasites that affect dogs.

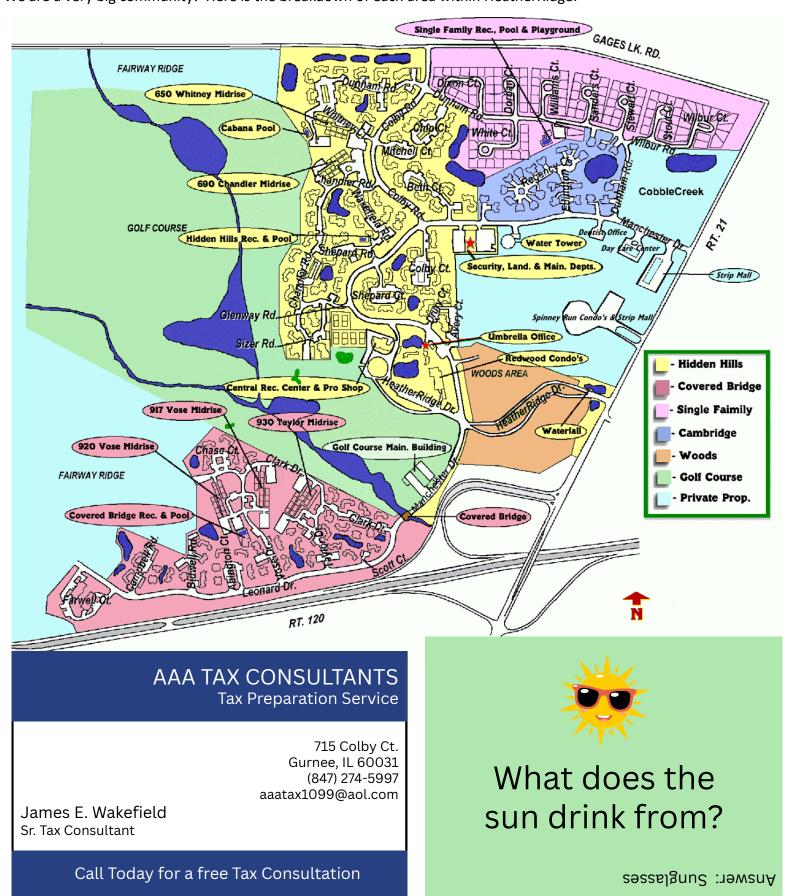

There's no debate: Bruschetta was made for warm weather snacking. Easy to throw together and made up of simple, classic ingredients, it's the perfect dish to serve when you're craving something classic and refreshing. While you can make it all year round, the best time to enjoy this appetizer is summer, when fresh tomatoes are at their peak. It's also the perfect make-ahead snack: The longer the tomatoes sit in the balsamic-garlic-olive oil mixture, the better the flavors meld and develop.

Ingredients

TOMATOES

- 1/4 cup extra-virgin olive oil
- 2 garlic cloves, thinly sliced
- 4 large tomatoes, finely chopped
- Kosher salt
- 1/4 cup thinly sliced fresh basil
- 2 Tbsp. balsamic vinegar
- Pinch of crushed red pepper flakes

BREAD & ASSEMBLY

- 1 large baguette, sliced 1/4" thick on the bias
- · Extra-virgin olive oil, for brushing
- · 2 garlic cloves, halved

TOMATOES

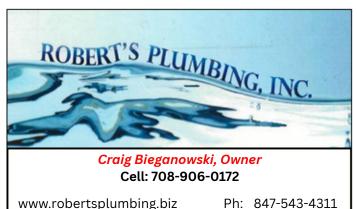
- In a medium skillet over medium-low heat, heat oil. Add garlic and cook, stirring occasionally, until lightly golden, 2 to 4 minutes. Let cool.
- Meanwhile, set a large strainer or colander over a bowl. Add tomatoes and toss with 1/2 tsp. salt. Let sit 5 minutes.
- Transfer tomatoes to a large bowl. Add basil, vinegar, red pepper flakes, and 1/2 tsp. salt and toss to combine. Add garlic and oil from skillet and toss again to combine. Let marinate at least 30 minutes and up to 2 days.

BREAD & ASSEMBLY

- Arrange a rack in center of oven; preheat to 400°. Brush bread on both sides with oil and arrange on large baking sheet.
- Toast bread, turning halfway through, until dried and golden brown, 10 to 15 minutes. Let cool 5 minutes, then rub one side of bread with halved garlic cloves.
- Arrange bread on a platter. Spoon tomatoes on garlic-rubbed side of bread just before serving.

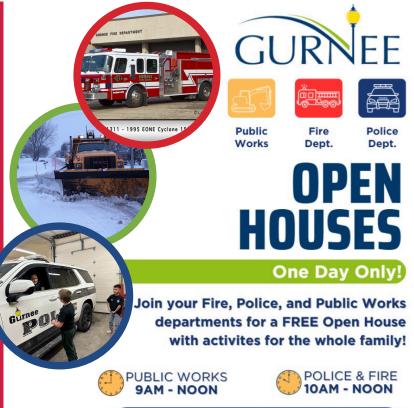

July 22, 2025 Monthly Meeting Minutes

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These minutes have not yet been approved by the HUA Board. Any corrections, additions, or deletions will be made at the next regular HUA Board meeting prior to official approval.

President Todd Campbell called the regular meeting to order at 7:00pm. Present: Todd Campbell, Randy Brooks, Walt Paulson, Janet Schwartz, Debi Kiddle, Janet Peck, Margaret Tai, Laura Kelly and Community Manager Al Villasenor.

Absent: Krystine Miluski. 8 residents were present.

<u>June 24, 2025 MINUTES</u>: Janet Peck made a motion to accept and approve the June 24, 2025 HUA Board Meeting Minutes. Seconded by Debi Kiddle and at vote, all aye, motion carried.

<u>PRESIDENT'S REMARKS</u>: It's going to be hot this week! The rec centers are available as cooling centers for residents if needed. When out and about, please wear reflective clothing or gear when out walking at night. School starts in August and school buses will be out soon, so please use caution.

<u>VICE PRESIDENT'S REMARKS</u>: Check on your neighbors to make sure they are well, especially during the heat. Drink plenty of water!

<u>TREASURER'S REMARKS:</u> Walt Paulson gave the highlights of the Treasurer's Report. The Treasurer's Report is attached to the minutes. Checks and financials are in order and departments are all in line budget wise. The neighborhood reserves are all strong. CBTH is caught up. All accounts are up to date. Randy Brooks made a motion to receive and accept the Treasurer's Report seconded by Janet Schwartz. At vote, all aye, motion carried.

MANAGEMENT REPORT: The annual budget process will start in July. Dates to be July 23, 24 & 25 from 12-2pm. These first meetings will cover draft operating budgets and capital plan considerations to help guide the capital plan process. Property inspections for all properties managed by AFV have begun. We continue to see issues with personal items in common areas. Note that while for the townhomes and Cambridge that there are provisions that residents would be permitted to plant flowering annuals within. Personal decorative items are not generally permitted – particularly when their placement could impede our staff from performing maintenance tasks. Please note that costs to repair any damage caused to common area by residents, their tenants or guests will be charged back to the offending unit. There will be a revised recommendation for recycling bin placement. Please note that the concerns of residents after the previously approved locations were given serious consideration and thus the recommendation to approve a change in locations. HR50!!!! IYKYK. Walt Paulson made a motion to receive and accept the Management Report, seconded by Debi Kiddle.At vote, all aye, motion carried.

STANDING REPORTS:

Architecture and Maintenance Committee: The meeting took place on July 14th at 1pm. Eight residents attended the meeting regarding concerns about the placement of a 6ft recycling dumpster at the end of Chase Ct. All voices and concerns were heard, and it has been decided to take that location off the table. We are currently entertaining other sites. The reason for the relocation is due to abuse and misuse by outside residents and contractors. Current dumpsters are too visible and accessible and have proven to be dumping grounds for those who misuse them. We are currently considering other locations. The next meeting will take place on August 11th at 1pm at the HUA Office. Randy Brooks made a motion to receive and accept the Architectural and Maintenance Committee Report, seconded by Debi Kiddle. At vote, all aye, motion carried.

Audit Committee: No formal report or motion required. In good order.

<u>Finance Committee:</u> Reviewed & discussed the June 2025 HUA financials and checks. Reviewed & discussed the June 2025 CRF financials and checks. Recommend additional funds up to \$10K from CRF for HR 50th Celebration. Recommend TLLCISI revise & update Office Manger & Office Receptionist job descriptions presented. Budget dates are July 23, 24 & 25 and August 12, 13 & 14.

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<u>TLLCISI Committee:</u> Recommend Welcoming Committee move forward and present plan to allow residents to complete the Welcoming Packet online and that they facilitate the process. Recommend BoD clarify age at which a pool key card can be validly issued as 18 or older. CM updated the status of legal matters. Open Meetings Act considerations to relative HUA Committees: Recommend that all Committees formalize their committee roster complete with contact information within 30 days of HUA Board meeting. Recommend purchasing a bulletin board to be placed outside of admin office to post formalized meeting dates/times/locations/changes & supplement with the website location. Additionally, each Neighborhood Committee will purchase and install bulletin boards to be installed at each Rec Center for Neighborhood Rec Committee issues/meetings.

<u>FINANCE/TLLCISI Committee</u>: Reviewed Decs Article 1.02 & clarified tennis court maintenance responsibilities. Presented and reviewed the Staff Job Descriptions. Presented and reviewed the Committee Descriptions. Debi Kiddle made a motion to accept the TLLCISI and Finance Committee Reports, seconded by Janet Schwartz. At vote, all aye, motion carried.

<u>General Election and Oversight:</u> No formal report or motion required. Will meet in the next couple of months. Still need to appoint Chairperson.

Nominating Committee: No formal report or motion required.

<u>Golf and Tennis Committee</u>: Meeting was held July 11, 2025 at 11am. Attendees were Al Villasenor, Sharlene Hink, Margaret Tai, David Grum, Rose Sternberg and Jacob Shwaiko. Green fees are down, due to the weather. Janet Schwartz made a motion to receive and accept the Golf and Tennis Committee Report. Debi Kiddle seconded the motion. At vote, all aye, motion carried.

Landscape and Ponds Committee: The Landscape/Ponds Committee met on Friday, July 11, 2025. The attendees were Brad Banwart, Janet Schwartz, Krystine Miluski, Lisa Feichter, and Walt Paulson. Landscape Department discussion topics: update on daily tasks, update on HR ponds and update on yearly budget progress. Butterfly Garden: no report. Other topics: Discussion referencing residents who would like to replace trees. The procedure starts with contacting the HR Office for direction. Discussion concerning the Landscape Department cutting and trimming a SB resident's yard at the request of the SBRA. The owner will be charged back for all expenses incurred by the Landscape Department. Next meeting date is August 15, 2025 at 11am. This will be followed by a golf outing at 9am. There will be everything from the Navy band performing, a professional band performing in the late afternoon, a magician, a face painter, a portrait sketcher, 9-hole mini golf of course, and of course a Bago competition!
