Dear parishioners and guests,

In last Sunday's column, I shared a poem by Billy Collins that described students in a poetry class analyzing a poem to death. I stated that we sometimes treat prayer in a similar way. We want to know what

is meant by a particular experience in prayer: what it means that we are distracted or bored or can't hear anything from God, etc. Some of us who have an analytical outlook on life just can't seem to help it. We naturally try to figure things out; we want to understand not only the who and the what, but also the how and the why. We like to know why things happen the way they happen and how to make things happen the way we want them to happen.

Although God does communicate to us in prayer, and it is good for us to try to understand what God is communicating to us when we pray, the "picking of God's brain" is not the primary purpose of prayer. It's similar to what Billy Collins tried to explain about poetry: poetry is an art for enjoyment, not always a mystery to be solved.

In this vein, I propose that, when we pray, we simply make note of what we experience, rather than rack our brain trying to figure it out. If we worry less about "getting the message" that we think God is trying to give us, we may actually become freer to notice what's happening when we pray and to be more attentive to God in the present moment. Prayer may even become more enjoyable when we set aside the (usually self-imposed) expectation that we are supposed to get some insight or receive some particular grace when we pray.

A lot of people who are deeply committed to their life of prayer keep a journal in which they track the experiences they have in prayer. Daily entries need not be expansive descriptions of what happened; they can be very simple. For example: "October 14: I felt loved by God and assured that everything is going to work out." Or: "October 15: I was completely distracted and couldn't stay focused for more than ten seconds."

Of course, a person can write as much or as little as desired. The important thing here is to answer the question, "What happened when I prayed?" rather than trying to answer the question, "What was God trying to tell me when I prayed?" In the end, if we have been paying attention, over time, to what happens in our prayer, it will become clear what God is trying to show us.
