
The Communion Procession and Song

Moment of Silence—The General Instructions remind us here of the need for moments of silence in the Liturgy. As it does after the readings and homily, the Missal calls for the priest and the faithful to "spend time praying privately." A song may be sung at this point, but the same instructions expect that it sung by the whole assembly together as a sign of the communion they now share.

The Prayer After Communion—After a suitable time or private prayer, the priest rises and invites the people to pray. According to the Missal, this prayer has a specific purpose—to pray that the Communion we have just received may bear fruit in our lives, in the Church and for the world.

The Concluding Rites

Announcements—Here is the appropriate time for making announcements. If there are relatively few, the people may remain standing or the presider may ask them to be seated. Announcements should **NOT** be made as part of *the Rite of Communion*. However, they may be made before the beginning of Mass.



The Final Blessing—Again, the priest greets the people and the deacon invites them to bow down for the final blessing. This blessing may be simple—the Sign of the Cross or it may be enriched on special occasions with a longer solemn prayer of blessing or a four-fold invocation before the Sign of the Cross.

The Dismissal—After the priest makes the Sign of the Cross in

blessing, the deacon announces one of several forms of the dismissal—in Latin "Ite Missa est!" Literally, "Go forth, the Mass is ended." The Latin word "missa" gives us the name for whole Eucharistic Liturgy, the Mass. The other dismissals help us to understand that—"Go and announce the Gospel of the Lord" and "Go in peace glorifying the Lord by your life." The sense here is that we, having heard the Word of the Lord and received the Body and Blood of the Lord, are sent on mission. The Catechism of the Catholic Church explains that "the liturgy in which the mystery of salvation is accomplished concludes with the sending forth (mission) of the faithful, so that they may fulfill God's will in their daily lives" (CCC 1332). Sharing the mission of Christ, we are sent to use God-given abilities to evangelize, to comfort and to help build up the Kingdom of God.

Knights of Columbus

The Knights of Columbus regular monthly meeting is the second Wednesday of every month at 6:15 p.m. in the OLPH church basement. The Rosary will be recited before the meeting. Try to attend 5:30 Mass before the meeting. Any man over 18 years of age interested in becoming a Knight of Columbus is invited to attend as a guest.

The Holy Family

The feast of the Holy Family is a liturgical celebration in the Catholic Church in honor of Jesus of Nazareth, his mother, the Blessed Virgin Mary, and his foster father, Saint Joseph, as a family. The primary purpose of this feast is to present the Holy Family as a model for Christian families.

As we honor the Holy Family, one of the best ways to do so is to prayerfully ponder the daily life that the Holy Family shared. Because Scripture does not record many of the family interactions in Nazareth, much is left to prayerful imagination. What we do know is that human familial virtue within the Holy Family, especially between mother and Son, was at a level of perfection. The kindness, respect, obedience, unity, charity, and every other Christian virtue that they lived must become the model for Christian living and for family life.

As you ponder their inner family dynamics, relationships, and charity, use them as a model of how best to relate to your family. Some families more fully imitate those sacred virtues; others fall gravely short. Look into your own heart and ask the Holy Family to teach you how to show greater love to those in your family. Though you will never arrive at perfection, you can receive inspiration from their lives, leading to greater growth and unity, making your own family a greater source of strength for your Christian living.
