In closing, I want to say it was a pleasure and honor to serve as your HOA president. I look forward as Bent Creek continues on this positive trend.



Prior to prom night, the

foundation sets up boutiques so that attendees can shop for dresses, suits, shoes, accessories and everything needed to look like a star. All at no cost. Hair and makeup included. Attendees are assigned a partner to help navigate the process. Prom night begins with limos picking up guests and their families and driving to the event's red-carpet arrival. Exit limo and walk thru a sword archway surrounded by a welcoming crowd and paparazzi. As they enter the venue they are announced by name in true royal fashion. The night is full of dining, dancing, prom favors and ends with a ceremony where every guest is crowned as King or Queen!

Eric is an amazing young man. The fourth son of BCP residents, Sue and Steve Graham, was considered a miracle child as they thought they were done having children. As he grew, his parents knew how special he really was. Eric, now 37, has been involved in the

Special Olympics since he was 8 years old. He is quite an accomplished athlete participating in golf, basketball and moved on to Bocce. He has now become a star athlete in the Special Olympics in the weight lifting category.

While Eric has enjoyed his background in athletics, he has many other accomplishments. He is currently employed at HomeGoods where he has been doing an excellent job assembling lamps and was acknowledged by management. With the support of Project Choice LLC, a provider that serves disabled adults and children, Eric is looking to gain employment at a local Publix. His Project Choice coach assists Eric with his resume and with transportation.

All work and no play, well that's not Eric! He enjoys his title as an Officer with the Knights of Columbus and is a star pancake maker at the monthly Sunday morning breakfast at the KOC hall. Eric is also involved with one of SW Florida's leading nonprofits, STARability. # Ride Smart, Stay Safe: A Heartfelt Campaign for E-Bike and Bicycle Safety

On April 30, two deputies from the Collier County Sheriff's Department held an informational session for Bent Creek residents to provide us with knowledge of the evolving regulations and safety concerns

regarding the use of E-bikes, electric scooters, and golf carts. They explained that there are 3 classes of E-bikes - Class 1 is for E-bikes that require constant pedal assistance to achieve maximum motor speeds of 20 MPH. Class 2 E-bikes are also equipped with pedals and motor driven, but the motor can propel the bike up to speeds of 20 MPH with unassisted pedaling. Class 3 E-bikes are pedal assisted motor bikes that cease to provide motor assistance when the bicycle reaches a speed of 28 MPH. Anyone under the age of 16 is not allowed to ride a Class 3 electric bicycle, and Class 3 bicycles are not allowed on sidewalks.

The regulations for E-bike and scooter usage are primarily defined by 2020 Florida Senate state statutes Title XXIII, Chapter 316, Sections 2065 and 20655, but local governments may also pass ordinances for their jurisdictions as they deem necessary. Collier County recently amended Section Four of Ordinance No. 2022-02 to adopt and document new provisions regarding bicycle usage within the unincorporated area of Collier County over which the county has traffic control jurisdiction. They have restricted speed on sidewalks to 15 MPH. HOA's can also draft their own rules and regulations. State statutes take priority over all other rules and regulations. Any enforcement or compliance with rules other than state statutes would require that the governing body, whether it be a city, town, village, county or HOA community to conform and abide by state laws before any sheriff department enforcement is allowed.

What this means to Bent Creek Preserve is that we can not request sheriff
deputies to come into our private

deputies to come into our private community and patrol for violators without a traffic agreement and bringing our roadways up to meet

state traffic requirements. That would involve increasing the speed limits on our streets to 25 MPH, changing signage, painting lane dividers, providing safety stop lines, pedestrian crossings at intersections, and fog lines along the roadways. Obviously, this will have a negative effect on our HOA fees as we would need to cover the expenses to meet state standards.

Safety concerns were also discussed at the presentation. Helmet use is required for any person under 16 years of age. Lights and reflectors are required for use between sunset and sunrise. All traffic laws must be followed. The sheriff deputies acknowledged that E-bikes have created a very complex situation, but stressed the ultimate responsibility for the rider's safety is with the parent. As an example, they asked if anyone would hand over their keys to the family car to a youngster, say 5-10 years old, with no experience driving a car or complying with traffic laws....yet purchase them an E-bike or E-scooter and allow them to interact with vehicles on the highway, or pedestrians on the sidewalks, without any education or training. These motorized bicycles, scooters, and golf carts are vehicles, not toys. Compliance, common sense, education, and communication are key to preventing serious injuries and parents need to have these very important discussions with their children. Thanks to all the families in Bent Creek that have recognized the need to address the E-bike issue and have taken steps to make our community safer for everyone.
