INFORMATION NEEDED FOR REGISTRATION

IN PERSON/MAIL-IN

Final four digits of your Social Security number OR NYS DMV number (9-digit number located on the front near the top of your license, permit, or non-driver ID)

You must SIGN your voter registration application

ONLINE

- Final four digits of your Social Security Number
- Your NYS DMV number (9-digit number located on the front near the top of your license, permit, or non-driver ID)
- NYS ID document number (8 or 10-character combination of numbers and letters on your license, permit, or non-driver ID)
- An email address

WHO IS ELIGIBLE TO VOTE?

In order to vote in New York State you must meet all of the requirements below:



Be a United States Citizen



Not be in prison for a felony conviction



Be at least 18 years old on the day of



Be a resident of New York State and the county you are voting in for at least 30 days prior to the election

VOTING 101

Election Day is Tuesday, November 4, 2025.

ON ELECTION DAY

Vote in person at your polling place on Election Day (Tuesday, November 4, 2025) from 6:00 a.m.- 9:00 p.m. If you are in line by 9:00 p.m., they **cannot** turn you away.

EARLY VOTING

In New York State, from
Saturday, October 25 to Sunday, November 2,
voters may visit any of their assigned Early
Voting Centers in their county, except in New
York City, where voters are assigned to one
early voting site.

ABSENTEE VOTING

Online Application Due: October 25

Last day for board of elections to receive an application, submitted by mail or through the

online portal, for general election ballot

In Person Application Due: November 3

Last day to apply in person for general election ballot

Last Mail Postage Date:

November 4

Last day to postmark general election ballot. Must be received by the county board of elections no later than November 12

Last In-Person Submission Date: November 4

Last day to deliver ballot in person to the board of elections or your poll site, by 9:00 p.m.

WHO IS ELIGIBLE TO VOTE ABSENTEE?

In order to vote using an absentee ballot you must meet one or more of the following conditions:



Absent from your county or, if a resident of New York City absent from the five boroughs, on Election Day



Unable to appear at the polls due to temporary or permanent illness or disability



Unable to appear because you are the primary caregiver of one or more individuals who are ill or physically disabled



A resident or patient of a Veterans Health Administration Hospital



In jail or prison for any reason other than a felony conviction. This includes anyone awaiting grand jury action, awaiting trial, or serving a sentence for a misdemeanor

What's on the ballot?

2025 BALLOT MEASURE: PROPOSAL NUMBER ONE

In addition to voting for candidates, New Yorkers can amend or change the State Constitution through a ballot measure, also known as **Proposal Number One**. Please note, the Ballot measure may require you to flip the Ballot over.

Proposal Number One will decide a statewide ballot proposal that would allow the construction of Olympic sports trails in the Adirondack Forest Preserve. The project would develop up to 323 acres for Nordic skiing and biathlon trails, while requiring the state to acquire at least 2,500 acres of new forest land as compensation

A "YES" vote would authorize this development.

A "NO" vote would reject it.

Issues Impacting Women

Every Election carries consequences for women due to issues that disproportionately impact women, such as the equal pay gap, the child care crisis, access to reproductive health, education, and more.

Currently...
In NYS, 32.2% of female-headed families live in poverty and make up two-thirds of workers in the low-wage workforce.

Support fair wages.

47% of women aged 25 and older hold a bachelor's degree, compared to 37% of their male counterparts, yet they still earn \$2.74 less per hour.

Empower women.



The child care system is struggling to keep up with needs, while families devote between 8.9% and 16% of their median income to it.

Expand opportunities.

ACCESS TO COMPREHENSIVE HEALTHCARE
