From Your Pastor

Dear Friends,

I look out the window of my home office into a small forest of trees, whose branches have gone bare. They appear to be lifeless. Yet, on sunny days, I can remember that leafless branches are not dead. The trees still live and in a couple of months will put out shoots and buds that will restore the trees to their summer fullness.

When Jesus began his ministry, he went first to the Jordan River for his own baptism and then to the Sea of Galilee to call his first disciples. He called them with a promise: the kingdom of God has come near.

Those first disciples—Peter, Andrew, James and John—might have looked around them and thought that all the world was dead. They lived in a fearful world of frequent conflict, ruled by a distant emperor. These four men labored through each night struggling to catch enough fish to make ends meet. It is possible that they thought nothing would ever change.

And then Jesus called out to them over the waters of the lake: “Follow me!”

From that point on, the world around them began to reveal the truth: that the life which comes from God was not gone. They could see signs of life everywhere Jesus took them.

This year, I want to study the Gospel According to Mark with you and note the signs of God’s gift of life coming into fullness. I invite you to open your Bible at home, with friends, and in church meetings, and let us study together how the call of Jesus can help us to see ourselves and the world around us with more hopeful, Spirit-filled eyes.

Christmas Leftover Treats



Once again, we will be doing our 8th multi-generational packaging event for Rise Against Hunger (RAH) on March 8th, 2026. **RAH is a global movement to end hunger by empowering communities, nourishing lives, and responding to emergencies.** To date NSPC has packaged in excess of 140,000 meals. **Our goal for this spring is to package another 20,000 meals.**

As this is not a budgeted mission for our church, fundraising is a major part of this event, and we are most fortunate to have an opportunity to partner with OUTBACK STEAK HOUSE in Springfield.

Outback's offer is for NSPC members and friends to pre-purchase a \$25 gift card. **The card can be redeemed at the Springfield Outback Steakhouse from January 1—January 31, 2026.** For every card redeemed, the Springfield Outback will only charge us food costs for the item ordered, roughly between 40-50%. This is a very generous offer.




Men's Christian Fellowship

For January, we will begin Max Lucado's book "Life Lessons from Mark" on Tuesday, January 6th.




