Key Principles of WCAG

- Perceivable: Content must be presented in ways users can perceive (e.g., text alternatives for images, sufficient contrast).
- 2. Operable: All functionality must be usable via keyboard and assistive tech.
- 3. Understandable: Text, navigation, and interactions should be predictable and clear.
- 4. Robust: Content must work across browsers, devices, and assistive technologies.

Practical Best Practices (AA Level)

- Maintain at least 4.5:1 color contrast between text and background.
- Use real text (not images) for key headings and buttons.
- Label form inputs clearly, and provide accurate error messages that describe what went wrong.
- Ensure all actions can be completed with a keyboard alone.
- Add alt text for images and aria-labels for icons.
- Use clear, descriptive link text (avoid "click here").
- Provide visible focus states for interactive elements.

Common Pitfalls to Avoid

- Replacing readable text with stylized graphics.
- Using low-contrast colors that blend into the background.
- Removing focus indicators (outlines on buttons/links).
- Hiding navigation or disabling zoom on mobile.
- Adding animations or auto-playing videos without pause options.
