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INTRODUCTION

In the death care profession, chain of custody tracking isn't optional—it's a legal, ethical, and reputational obligation. On January 1, 2025, Illinois funeral care entered a new era with the Integrity in Death Care Act (SB2643). This legislation requires funeral homes to implement unique identification systems and maintain comprehensive chain of custody documentation for every decedent—without exception.

THE CONSEQUENCES FOR NON-COMPLIANCE ARE STEEP:

- **Immediate inspections** within 10 days of any complaint
- **Class 4 felony charges** for intentional violations (up to 3 years imprisonment and \$25,000 fines)
- **License suspension or revocation** for repeated failures
- **Irreversible reputation damage** in your community

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UNDERSTANDING SB2643: WHY THE LAW WAS PASSED

The **Integrity in Death Care Act** was born out of a heartbreaking scandal in Carlinville, Illinois. When Heinz Funeral Home delivered the wrong cremated remains to over **60 families**, it exposed serious gaps in funeral industry tracking systems. In response, Senator Doris Turner sponsored comprehensive reform, gaining bipartisan support.

Governor J.B. Pritzker signed SB2643 into law on **August 9, 2024**, with full implementation taking effect on **January 1, 2025**.

WHY CHAIN OF CUSTODY MATTERS MORE THAN EVER

For Illinois funeral homes, chain of custody tracking is no longer a “nice-to-have”—it’s the foundation of compliance, professionalism, and family trust. In today’s regulatory and reputational environment, your tracking system must be:

- Documentation must track remains from death through final disposition
- Records must be organized and accessible for inspection at any time

3. Enhanced Inspection Authority

- IDFPR must inspect within **10 calendar days** of any complaint
- Inspectors can review records, facilities, and procedures without limitation
- Failure to produce documentation on demand can result in immediate penalties

4. Criminal Penalties

- **Class 4 felony** for intentionally falsifying chain of custody records
- **Class 4 felony** for false death certificate statements
- Violations may carry **up to 3 years imprisonment and \$25,000 fines**

THE MOST COMMON CHAIN OF CUSTODY COMPLIANCE ISSUES IN ILLINOIS

Based on early IDFPR enforcement actions and feedback from funeral homes across the state, these are the most frequent violations:

Incomplete Documentation

- **The Problem:** Missing signatures, timestamps, or transfer details in paper logs
- **Real Illinois Example:** A Springfield-area funeral home couldn't provide complete custody records for a weekend transfer, resulting in a **\$5,000 fine**
- **Prevention Strategy:** Implement mandatory digital workflows with required fields

Staff Training Gaps

- **The Problem:** New employees unfamiliar with SB2643 procedures; inconsistent practices across shifts
