August District 35l Service Project Humanitarian: Projects that "Hug Your Heart"

Lions have always done humanitarian projects that they've just put into "other category" – BUT **it's time to change**.

Humanitarian efforts can overlap with other categories such as youth, environment, hunger or any other areas we support. I look at humanitarian as projects as projects that "hug your heart." For August I am giving two suggestions but please don't limit it there if the suggestions do not work for your club. As a reminder you must put service into the portal for your club then let me know you did the project & reporting. I am looking at children and their needs as school is approaching. Find a local school, community center or any other similar. Once your choice is made buy school supplies for them to hand out at open houses or other event they may be hosting. Think outside the box when looking at supplies - some schools are more underprivileged than others and they hand things out like socks, shoes, shirts (remember some must wear uniforms). Check with your local center to see what they the most. Walmart and other stores will at times donate school supplies such as pens, pencils, paper, crayons, glue, markers, etc. Though this could also work under "youth" – it's more of a hug the heart project because you can imagine a child using what they need and not feeling out of place because they might not have the required items. Right now both Target & Walmart have school supplies on sale from .25 and up, they also have backpacks from \$5. \$7 and up.

If the above project doesn't fit your club then make cards signed by your club to give to senior citizens home, abuse counseling facility or similar. Cover all holidays from New Years to birthdays, and Halloween to the 4th of July. **Everyone wants to feel loved and remembered and sometimes something as simple as a card can to do that**.

Several years ago there was a lot of drama going on around me at work. It was NOT my drama. But the situation evolved people I cared deeply about and, in order to distance myself from the chaos, I had to step away, not from the people, but from the madness. As time went by, I began to remind people, "This is not my circus. These are not my monkeys!" as an explanation for why I will not become embroiled in whatever is happening that threatens to consume me. This story will be pertinent in a moment.

Anyway-on July 17th I was thrilled to be part of the massive Swearing-In Ceremony of District Governors that was part of the International Convention in Orlando. I guess I kinda expected there to be an instant change of some sort. You know-like a magic moment where you feel transformed into someone wise and capable. Well-it didn't happen. No magic knowledge was imparted. No omens from the cosmos, no voices from on high (okay if I'd started hearing voices, they might have come to lock me up...so perhaps that was a good thing!) Still-everything kept on going like before. My luggage still had to be packed to come home. I still had to drive myself back to Tampa. Life was the same...or so I thought.

On July 18th my husband and I had to be in Wesley Chapel and I walked past a car. Now-you need to remember my story from above. As I walked by that car, I noticed a sticker on its back window (I compulsively read everything....cereal boxes, signs, bumper stickers and, yes, window decals). I had to read it twice! It said, "Oh darn! Turns out this <u>is</u> my circus and those <u>are</u> my monkeys!!" I just about fell out! I had been looking for a sign in the wrong place! Still-no omens from the cosmos or voices from on high...but maybe my sign was on the back of an SUV at Wiregrass Mall in Wesley Chapel??

Today I went to Moffitt Cancer Center for Day 47 post Bone Marrow Transplant follow-up with my husband. It's a routine weekly thing we do. I've been in the BMT unit probably 75 times over the past 3 years. There was a sign on the door today that I never saw before (or I never noticed before!) "Kindness begins here". Now doesn't that sound like a Lions' sign? And here it is on the door that I've been through countless times and have never noticed before.

Again.....a Sign.

A reminder that kindness matters and caring is important.

These two signs have really made me think. How many times do we look for big changes, big signs that we are doing it right? Big signs that point us in the right direction? A big neon, flashing sign that screams, "YES!" And how many times are the small signs there all along that are telling us this is the direction you need to be headed. This is right...go this way. Tales from the Treasurer, Lion Tom Mavor

There are a lot of bragging rights that Lions enjoy because we make the promise that all of the funds raised from the public are returned to the public. As treasurer, one of your jobs is to keep the numbers separate. To help you here is the definition from the LCI Policy of what public funds are.

Definition of Public/Activity Funds. Funds raised from the public are the net earnings of income raised from activities open to the public, public contributions, bequests and money accumulated from invested public funds.

Note the key word "net" because it is important. That means you take all of the direct expenses from the fundraiser out of the proceeds and what remains is Public money.

Definition of Administrative Funds. Administrative funds are contributions from Lions through dues, fines, advertisement revenue, rental fees and other individual Lions contributions. These funds may be used for either public projects or for internal Lions use such as meeting and convention expenses, incorporation fees, audit fees, newsletters, bulletins and other club and/or district operating and administrative expenses.

If you invest public money and make a return, that money is public money too.

Clubs don't generally have an issue raising money that is going back to the community, what we have difficulty with is having enough money to operate a proper club. This is true of small clubs more than the larger clubs. There might be people who will disagree with me on this, but I believe we can sell advertisements and rent facilities with that money going to the Administrative fund. I also believe you can encourage businesses to sponsor the club members to cover their costs. You can promote them as sponsors at events and at your meeting nights. What we do is important and it costs money to have an organization like Lions. LCI dues are going up and the cost of operating the club is not going down. You are going to have to find money from somewhere.

You can't run a fundraiser for club expenses outside of getting the money from our own Lions who are already overburdened. You cannot arbitrarily skim money from each fundraiser either although there are rules for mixed use property expenses.

Be honest, be transparent and serve your club with pride. Thank you for your service and feel free to email me any questions you might have.

A short Message from PCC Bill Ringelstein

Clubs with Foundations, I recommend that you order several copies of the new "Compliance Guide for 501(C)(3) Public Charities". It is under Publication 4221-PC from your friends at IRS. This information may keep your Club Treasurer out of jail!

There has been renewed interest in Lions Clubs establishing 501c3 tax exempt Foundations using the IRS 1023-EZ form that is cheaper, much easier and faster than the old IRS 1023 form. Most Lions Clubs are eligible to use the shorter version. Although LCI Legal provided considerable information for using the old long 1023, they do not plan on providing any help for the EZ version.

So now that LCI is not going to be a resource, I intend to publish an updated "1023 EZ Cook Book". It will have all the resources needed to successfully establish a tax exempt Foundation for your Lions Club. It will be available on-line only, free to all Lions Clubs and sign-up details will be in the next issue of this Newsletter. You can e-mail me with any questions.







Lions History & Traditions: Emblem & Motto

When the Lions Clubs International was founded in 1917, Lions displayed both their pride and their sense of humor in creating the first Lions emblem

As for their pride, the lion in the emblem was based on a famous painting by the 19th century French artist Rosa Bonheur of a regal lion at rest in the wild. The painting's title, Old Monarch, become the nickname for Lions' earliest members and clubs.

As for their humor, the first emblem was also a pun. The emblem depicted the lion holding a club in its mouth with the word "international" emblazoned on the club. The play on the words" lion" and "club" and "international" was clever, but by 1919 Lions asked its members to come up with a more polished logo.

At the 1919 convention, there was a move to change the symbol, but a young attorney from Denver, Colorado rose to speak. His name was Halsted Ritter. "The name Lions stands not only for fraternity, good fellowship, strength of character and purpose, but above all, its combination of L-I-O-N-S heralds to the country the true meaning of citizenship:

LIBERTY, INTELLIGENCE, OUR NATION'S SAFETY."

How does LCIF choose the causes and projects to support?

LCIF chooses projects that are in our four main areas of focus: providing disaster relief, supporting youth, saving sight, and meeting humanitarian needs. Grants are available to Lions for projects in these areas, according the specific criteria within each grant program. Additionally, LCIF partners with appropriate organizations to achieve larger goals in these areas, such as Gavi, the Vaccine Alliance, Special Olympics and The Carter Center. These partnerships are entered into under the direction of the LCIF Board of Trustees.

Does LCIF offer grants for individual assistance? (scholarships, medical expenses)

LCIF supports large-scale projects that address unmet humanitarian needs for entire communities. These projects are led by local Lions who identify the need, develop the plan of action and carry out the project.

LCIF does not have a grant program that supports individual assistance. These requests are more appropriately directed to the local Lions who often have programs in place to support these types of requests within their communities.

"The ABC's or "ACDGGLMIPRSTVZ's" of Lions International organizational structure.

ID and PID ID stands for International Director

An ID shares the general responsibility for the management of the business and affairs of Lions International. The ID's have the legal duty to use reasonable care and diligence and must act within the scope of authority conferred upon them.

An International Director is one of the small number of Lions who have been entrusted with the responsibility of giving leadership and direction to the world's largest and most successful service club organization.

An ID should be available to help districts solve local problems, assist Lions Clubs International in the resolution of problems with the districts, and give guidance and motivation to local Lions and their leaders.

If you attend a Multiple District conference you will have the opportunity to meet and talk with one of the Directors who usually serve as a Key Note Speaker. There are several PID's who now live in District 35 I who share their experience as District Advisors including PID's <u>Buster Hall (Arcadia Lions Club)</u>, <u>Roderick Wright (Zephyr Hills Lions Club)</u>.
