Notes from the Editor:

Bay Pines is not the only site for this event. Even small National Cemeteries all over the United States (such as Fort Bayard, New Mexico where my parents and my grandfather are buried) have wreath laying ceremonies. PCC Chip & I will be attending the Ceremony at Bay Pines, where his parents and uncle are buried.

Suggestions:

- __Google the location first to determine the times of the opening ceremony __If you are actually going to lay a wreath(s)... instructions may vary ...
 - A local Fort Bayard volunteer will lay the wreaths specifically on my relatives graves. Bay Pines is "huge" so wreaths will be spread out over different areas and are not site specific.
- Wear long sleeves and Bring a broomstick or pole to hang the wreath(s) on while you carry them. They are sticky with pine sap which can irritate skin

Be Respectful... Pause and reflect before placing a wreath (even if it is a stranger). Remember, even though we are honoring ALL of our veterans, it may be recommended by the cemetery's guidelines to identify Star of Davids or Crescents on the headstones and honor those sites with a simple reflection, rather than a wreath.



Lions Clubs International Awards

International President's Certificate of Appreciation

is usually awarded personally by an International Director, after the recipient has been nominated by the District Governor. The award is in recognition of distinguished achievements in fulfilling the service mission of Lions Clubs. This is the 4th highest LCI award.

International Leadership Medal

is awarded for outstanding leadership by a Lion on Lions issues or service issues. Nominated by a District Governor. There are a limited number awarded each year and in each State and is the 3rd highest award from LCI.

International Presidential Award (Service Award)

is awarded for outstanding service by a Lion to the causes or activities Lions are active in. Nominated by a District Governor. There are a very limited number awarded each year and is the 2nd highest award from LCI.

Ambassador of Goodwill Award

The Ambassador Award is generally awarded to high level Lions for their many years of service. There are only a maxium of 35 awarded each year and is the highest award from LCI.

Other Lions International Awards: The following are awarded when a Lion or Club meet and document specific requirements.

100% District Governor
Club President Excellence Award
Extension Award
Guiding Lion Award
Member Key Award

Club Excellence Award: The criteria for this award has been changed for the 25-26 Lion Year. (following page for details)

Club Excellence Award

Membership

- Induct a minimum of two or 20% new members, whichever is greater (not including transfer, reinstated or charter members). Eligibility is determined based on the club's membership count on June 30th of the previous Lion year.
- Or sponsor a new Lions club.

Service

Report a minimum of four service activities to Lions International.
 Three of these activities must show participation in each of the three International <u>Weeks of Service</u>.

Leadership

- Report newly elected club officers in Lion Portal by May 15 of the current Lion year.
- A minimum of 10% of the club's members complete any three courses in the <u>Lions Learning Center</u>.
- The club president for the current Lion year must not have served more than two consecutive terms.
- A minimum of two or more club officers (president, vice president, secretary or treasurer. Of which, one must be the club president) complete Club Officer Training (online with the Lions Learning Center or in-person as reported by a GLT coordinator in Learn) between May 1 – December 31.

Donations

• Contributed to LCIF a minimum of the club's membership total on June 30th of the previous Lion year, multiplied by US\$20.

Lions History & Traditions

Tail Twister

Tail Twisters have added elements of fun and surprise to Lions club meetings since the 1920s when many U.S. clubs had pep committees charged with enlivening routine club meetings. Lions entrusted this function to a single energetic and enthusiastic officer, known as the Tail Twister.

How did the name Tail Twister come about? The World's Biggest Doers, a 1949 history of the Lions, described this origin story, as recounted by Lions founder Melvin Jones: "One Sunday afternoon three or four of us were discussing this matter of putting pep into the meetings. One fellow who had been born on a farm said we needed to do what used to be done on the farm. When a cow refused to go through the gate, someone would grab her by the tail and twist. We all laughed, but one of the boys said, 'Why isn't that a good name—tail twister?'"

Now optional for all Lions clubs, the role of Tail Twister had been an established office under charter bylaws for decades. But as a 1941 article in LION Magazine made clear:

"Of all the officers in the club, (s)he [the Tail Twister] has no rigid code, no well-defined plan of action. (S)he must be a Lion of originality."

Lions Toast

Not above you Not below you But with you

Was used as a toast by Lions Clubs as early as 1923. The Lions Toast emphasizes the Lions goal of working together with the people they serve.
