ADVENT & CHRISTMAS WORSHIP SCHEDULE

God broke into time and space and entered our world" Over the centuries have come many traditions connected with Advent. Lighting of candles is a primary focus in many homes and churches. Each Sunday a candle is lit representing a focus of the true meaning of Christmas.

SUNDAY, NOVEMBER 28 ~ The first Sunday of Advent includes Communion at the 10:30 worship services. The First Advent Candle to be lit is **Hope**, celebrating the coming of Jesus as the Hope for a hurting and lost world.

SUNDAY, DECEMBER 12 $^{\sim}$ The third Sunday of Advent celebrates The Candle of **Joy** symbolizing the message the angels brought to the lowly shepherds that coming of the Messiah was for all people. The 2021 Christmas Program will be presented by our children in the Sunday School as the feature of the 10:30 a.m. worship service.

SUNDAY, DECEMBER 19 ~ The fourth Sunday of Advent celebrates the Candle of **Love** representing that God loves the world and through faith in Jesus Christ humankind can find eternal life and purpose in life.

FRIDAY, DECEMBER 24 ~ CHRISTMAS EVE 7:00 P.M. ON THIS SPECIAL NIGHT OF COMMUNION AND CANDLELIGHT the fifth candle, the Christ candle proclaiming Jesus as the Light of the world is lit on Christmas Eve.

Please join us during this Advent Season as we meet midweek on Wednesday evening at 7:00 p.m. for Advent worship. Those dates are December 1, 8, 15, and 22.

A Stewardship Moment

How can we thank God enough for you in return for all the joy that we feel before our God because of you? 1 Thessalonians 3:9

This year the first Sunday of Advent comes right on the heels of Thanksgiving. Even with all of the sports, shopping, and overeating associated with Thanksgiving—not to mention its cultural and historical baggage—the celebration does provide a handy bridge to entering Advent with a focus on stewardship.

The epistle lesson from the first letter to the Thessalonians is all about gratitude, joy, and prayer in the face of suffering and persecution. Paul and Silas have experienced persecution. The

Christians at Thessalonica who have turned away from the cultural norm of worshiping idols have also experienced a considerably less-than-hospitable response from their community. And yet they pray. They claim joy. They choose to be grateful.

How about us today? Here in the 21st century we live in a land of abundance with plenteous choices, yet not everyone is doing just fine, and as Christians we dare not forget our neighbors in need. One in five U.S. children goes to bed hungry or wondering where they will find their next meal. More and more of our Muslim brothers and sisters in our country face persecution in response to the heinous acts of a few radicals. We remember neighbors of color who live in the shadow of racism every day. So where do we start, knowing that poverty, problems, and plenty live side by side, hidden in plain sight? We begin in fervent prayer with humility, with gratitude, and with purpose.

Like Paul and Silas, we can give thanks for God's abundance. Even if we are suffering from illness, loss of job or financial stress, broken relationships, depression, or stress, we are still called to give thanks. And in giving thanks and expressing our gratitude, we may experience attitudes shifting, circumstances becoming more manageable, and hope rising like the winter sun. So yes, begin in prayer with praise and thanksgiving.

Next move from prayer to relationship. Give thanks for those around you, for your church community, your family, your friends, and co-workers. Initiate small and simple acts of gratefulness. When was the last time you wrote a note of appreciation to your spouse? How long has it been since you've praised your child simply for being unique and worthy as God's child? When did you last thank your server or grocery store check-out clerk for a job well-done? Be on the look-out during this season of Advent for

ways to connect with both those you know and those whom you encounter in your daily comings and goings.

Finally, take action. Prayer, gratitude, and connection lead to action. If you see someone in need—whether it's material, relational, or emotional—take a simple step to meet that person's need. How about instead of an Advent Calendar this year, you make each day with a simple act of gratitude? It could be a smile to a harried shopper. It might be a note of thanks and a gift card for your mail carrier. It could be the anonymous purchase of a cup of coffee for the person behind you in line. Or it could even be skipping your own cup of daily coffee to make a special offering through your congregation or another ministry.

This year enter Advent with prayer and Thanksgiving. Focus on building relationships rather than credit card debt. Do random acts of kindness and generosity rather than stressing over the perfect Christmas. Lift up your soul to God and watch your spirits lift in response. Know this, as your pastor, I give thanks for your faithful witness and partnership in sharing the gospel. You are in my prayers.

Dear Members of St. Paul's,

During a recent tuning of our organ at church, it was noted that due to the age of the organ (67 years), it will soon be needing some major refurbishing. The Schantz organ in our church was installed in 1954 at a cost of \$13,470.00. As directed by our Consistory, quotes of refurbishing and updating from three companies have been received and reviewed.

Several issues were addressed and to update it, it would take a minimum of two to three months to complete the work. Items would be removed and taken to their shop, updated, then returned to St. Paul's. The quotes received ranged from \$155,000 to \$225,000.

The sound of the organ playing "Joy to the World" at Christmas is a sound that stays with us long after Christmas. We do not want to lose that musical memory.

To help with the cost, we are looking for tax deductible donations. Won't you be an organ donor? Stay "tuned" as this project progresses.

NURSERY SUPERVISOR POSITION AVAILABLE



Jim's Musical Notes



Good King Wenceslas

(1854)

"But when you give a feast, invite the poor, the maimed, the lame, the blind. And you will be blessed, because they cannot repay you; for you shall be repaid at the resurrection of the just." Luke 14:13-14

This story is about two men - a Bohemian Duke and an Anglican minister – who lived nearly a thousand years apart.

Wenceslas was born in Bohemia, in modern Czechoslovakia, in the early 900s. His father, the Czech ruler, Duke Ratislav, gave him a good education supervised by his godly grandmother. When his father died, Wenceslas, seeing his mother mishandle affairs of state, stepped in at age 18, seizing the reins of government. From the beginning, he proved a different sort of King. He sought good relations with surrounding nations, particularly with Germany. He took steps to reform the judicial system, reducing the number of death sentences and the arbitrary power of judges. He encouraged the building of churches and showed heartfelt concern for the poor. He reportedly cut firewood for orphans and widows, often carrying the provisions on his own shoulders through the snow.

Wenceslas' brief reign ended suddenly. His pagan and rebellious brother, Boleslav, murdered him on September 28, 929, as he left for church. His people venerated him as a martyr, and today Wenceslas is the patron saint of Czechoslovakia.

He would be hardly remembered, however, but for John Mason Neale, an Anglican minister with a passion for returning church architecture and music to their ancient grandeur. Neale helped establish a committee to investigate and restore dilapidated church buildings in Great Britain. He was particularly upset at the ugly stoves installed to heat churches in Victorian times.

Disliking the hymns of Isaac Watts, he also sought to return the church music to its medieval routes. Neale worked hard to translate ancient Greek, Latin and Syrian hymns into English. In so doing, he gave us the Christmas Carols, "Good Christian Men Rejoice," (a fourteenth century text set to a fourteenth century tune), and "O Come, O Come Emmanuel," (a ninth century text set to a fifteenth century tune). He also translated the Psalm Sunday hymn "All Glory, Laud and Honor."

Good King Wenceslas is not a translation, but an original poem

written by Neale to honor a godly monarch's concern for the poor. Neale himself worked with the needy, serving as warden of a charitable residence for indigent old men.

John Neale's antiquated opinions were widely scorned in his own day, but we're still singing his songs.
