#### When God Whispers

"You don't need to shout. My hearing works just fine."

Are you a parent that has used that one on your kids? I'm not sure at what age they realize that

the volume of their voice doesn't correlate to the likelihood of receiving a favorable reply — it might be sometime in the teenage years, when the talking slows down altogether.

But I've got to admit, it would be nice if God always gave us a loud and dramatic sign when God wanted something — the booming voice and the torn-open heavens ("This is my beloved Son!") really get the message across. Sometimes I find myself envious of the Apostles, who were able to witness such things in person.

The fact of the matter is, in the year 2022, God is more likely to speak in a whisper than in a shout. The prophet Isaiah forewarns that Christ himself will not be a noisemaker — for all his preaching, he will not cry out or shout to bring forth justice to the nations. His way is altogether different than that.

We are not the Apostles, and we do not have the privilege of seeing the Holy Spirit descend on Christ like a dove. But here's the good news: God doesn't need to shout. Our spiritual hearing works just fine. We just have to be listening.

Let's wake up each morning ready to hear God's whispers throughout the day. Let's make a conscious effort to invite those whispers into our hearts, where they can become a catalyst for grace in this world.

#### Time to Praise

from God's Hymnal: Psalm 30

You have turned for me my mourning into dancing. - Psalm 30:11 It was the worst of times. In the first half of the seventeenth century, Germany was in the midst of wars and famine and pestilence. In the city of Eilenburg lived a pastor by the name of Martin Rinkart (1586-1649).

During one especially oppressive period, Rinkart conducted up to fifty funerals

a day as a plague swept through the town and as the Thirty Year's War wreaked its own terror on the people. Among those who Rinkart buried were members of his own family.

Yet during those years of darkness and despair, when death and destruction greeted each new day, Pastor Rinkart wrote sixty-six sacred songs and hymns. Among them was the song "Now Thank We All Our God." As sorrow crouched all around him, Rinkart wrote:

Now thank we all our God
With hearts and hands and voices,
Who wondrous things hath done,
In whom His world rejoices;
Who from our mother's arms
Hath blessed us on our way
With countless gifts of love,
And still is ours today.

Rinkart demonstrated a valuable lesson for us all: Thankfulness does not need to wait for prosperity and peace. It's always a good time to praise God for the "wondrous things" He has done.

Sunday School children will be singing during the 10:30am church service on February 13 and April 10 (Palm Sunday).



A person can do a lot in 3 minutes or 9 minutes. But the real question is, what can you do to impact a child in those 3 or 9 minutes? When can you have the greatest impact on a child?

- The first 3 minutes right after they wake up.
- The 3 minutes after they come home from school.
- The last 3 minutes of the day before they go to bed.

Make those minutes special and help your children feel special, loved and accepted.

- Each day children need meaningful eye-to-eye conversations with a parent. It is especially important to slow down and look them in the eye. Listen to what they are saying. Many of us even in adult conversations think that we are listening but we are already forming our reply. Did we really listen to the conversation?
- Hug your child, give them a pat on the back and tell them how proud you are of them every day. Adults like to hear that reassurance, kids do as well! A simple touch makes them feel connected to a parent in ways that words never will. Remember, actions speak louder than words!
- At Sunday School, Jane and I greet each child as they come to Sunday School. We start with a greeting and then remind them to put their sticker on snowflake for attendance, then we continue to talk to them while we are in the Gathering Room waiting on Sunday School to start. Currently, we

have a LONG-hidden picture for them to find objects to fill some of their wait time. We start Sunday School by asking them how their week was and what they enjoyed about it. We then split into different groups to learn the lesson of the week. In one room we have theatre/Story time which is reading the lesson as a class and sometimes acting it out. In another room we have Art, which is an activity related to the lesson. And we can't forget Music with Maddy. At the end of Sunday School, we come back to the Gathering Room, talk about what they did this week and we ALWAYS take those last three minutes to wish them a good week and we will see them next week.

A lot can happen in 3 minutes. What can you do in 3 minutes to make a positive impact on a child?


