A Stewardship Moment

Give As the Giver Gives

"As each one has received a gift, use it to serve one another as good stewards of God's varied grace" (1 Peter 4:10).

In today's world gifts are typically thought of as material things we purchase or make for others. During our youth we grow up receiving gifts for special occasions. Recall the anticipation of knowing one of these occasions is around the corner and wondering if we will be given one of the gifts on our list! If we are lucky, we receive just what we wanted. Are God's gifts like these gifts?

The scripture above is the cornerstone of stewardship. We recognize something different about God's gifts, mainly that: 1) God has given us unearned spiritual gifts, 2) we share them for the good of others, and 3) God's gifts are wide-ranging. God gives gifts differently; God blesses us with gifts that are unearned. There is no special occasion other than we have been given the gift of life. Within the gift of life, we receive different kinds of spiritual gifts. For example, some receive the gift of faith. Others may grow to simply offer words of compassion or encouragement to those in need. Others still may have the desire to help people by performing good deeds or works of service. What gifts have you been given?

God's gifts only make sense if they are nurtured and developed for the good of others. Giving freely takes practice. God's greatest gift to us was modeled in the life of Jesus. In his life we learned what it is to give everything for us. I recall learning that he is like a candle with wicks lit from both ends. All consuming. If

we can gain a similar approach, our greatest gift to others very well might be ourself! What opportunities do you have to share your gift(s)?

Remember, God has generously given to us for no other reason than God loves us! God gives a wide-range of spiritual and material gifts not for us to keep or bury, but for the purpose of blessing others and developing the community of God here at St. Paul's UCC and St. Marys, Ohio!

Jim's Musical Notes

"My Country, 'Tis of Thee" 1831

Blessed is the Nation whose God is the Lord... Psalm 33:12

This patriotic hymn was written by Samuel Francis Smith, a native Bostonian, born on October 21, 1808. After attending Boston Latin School, he enrolled in Harvard, then attended Andover Seminary. While there, Samuel became fascinated by the work of Adoniram Judson, America's first missionary, and he developed a lifelong passion for world evangelism.

It was during Samuel's first year at Andover that hymn publisher, Lowell Mason, sought his help. Mason had a stack of German songs and materials needing translation. Learning that Samuel was proficient in German, he recruited the young student to translate them.

On a cold February afternoon, about a half hour before sunset, Samuel sat in his sparsely furnished room, pouring over the materials. He was struck by the words of "Gott segne Sachsenland" ("God Bless our Saxon Land"), set to the tune we know as "America" (used in Great Britain for "God Save the Queen").

"I instantly felt the impulse to write a patriotic hymn of my own adapted to this tune," Samuel later said. "Picking up a scrap of paper which lay near me, I wrote at once, probably within half an hour, the hymn, 'America' as it is now known."

A friend, William Jenks, took a copy to the pastor of Boston's Park Street Congregational Church. There "America" was first sung by the Juvenile Choir at a Sunday School Rally, on July 4, 1831.

In the years that followed, Samuel Francis Smith grew into a powerful Baptist preacher, pastor, college professor, hymnist, linguist, writer, and missionary advocate. He traveled the world in support of evangelism, and he rejoiced when his son became a missionary to Rangoon. Samuel lived to a ripe old age and remained active till the end. He died suddenly in his late-eighties at the Boston train station en route to a preaching appointment.

But he has always been most revered for the patriotic hymn he wrote as a 23-year-old student. As his friend and Harvard classmate, Oliver Wendell Holmes, put it at a class reunion:

And there's a nice youngster of excellent pith,-Fate tried to conceal him by naming him Smith; But he shouted a song for the brave and the free,-Just read on his medal, "My country, of thee!"

WHAT IS A CHURCH CHOIR?



The choir provides experiences that help the worshiper understand our faith, where it could represent glory and beauty, prayer, a psalm, remembering the saints, thanksgiving, advent, lent, spirituals, etc. It plumbs the depths of our emotions and soars to the heights of the glory of God-at least it tries. A choir is like the church-we are one body made up of many parts. Together we make beautiful music.

Please consider using your talents and sing with the choir. You can be any age and have lots or limited talents. If you sing in the shower, that will work!!! We have great fun together as we rehearse and enjoy each other's company. Time and date for rehearsing is TBA, and our first Sunday singing being August 29th.




BREAKING BREAD COMMUNITY MEAL

MINUTES OF THE JUNE 9, 2021 CONSISTORY MEETING

The regular meeting of St. Paul's UCC Consistory was called to order at 6:03 p.m. by President Marsha Landers. Pastor Rhonda opened the meeting with a brief devotion and reminder that the mission of our church is to share the Good News of Jesus Christ and lead others to a relationship with God. While we want St. Paul's to be a place of hospitality, a place to reach young adults and children, a place where people feel they belong, it is important that we always keep God as the end goal and not make the achievement of these areas to be the end goal. The reality is that "We Are Church" 24/7, and not just on Sundays. Everywhere we go, we represent St. Paul's UCC. As we look to the future and our desire for a vibrant and engaged church community, keeping God as "the main thing" is why we exist as a congregation. She followed with prayer.

Also present were, Treasurer, David Dickman, Administrative Assistant Carolyn Garrison, Custodian Bob Schumacher and guest Ann Vogel and Jodi Wireman of ASPIRE.

Guest Jodie Wireman, Coordinator of the Apollo ASPIRE/GED program explained the program to Consistory and that currently they hold classes on Tuesday and Thursday evenings. Jodie explained that their program is lacking in evening attendance, but they are seeing more of an interest for daytime classes. Jodie asked Consistory if they could move their program to Mondays and Wednesdays from 9a to Noon. After some discussion, Kyle Opperman made a motion to allow ASPIRE to change their class days and times. Larry Kill seconded the motion. Motion carried.

Guest Ann Vogel discussed that the church's current organ is 68 years old and she would like to maybe do some type of special celebration when the organ is 70 years old. Ann explained that Schantz Organ tuners were here last week for the annual spring tuning and a minor repair of some worn leather on one of the notes. Ann asked permission from Consistory to refurbish the organ and bring it up-to-date. After some discussion and suggestions of getting at least three quotes, Lynda Hadley made the motion that Ann obtain three quotes for refurbishing/updating our current organ. Joan Leffel seconded the motion. Motion carried.
