Rhonda's Reflections



Years ago, as I was traveling to a church to be their guest preacher, I got stuck at a light on my way. And I mean stuck. As the stop lights cycled multiple times through for everyone else, the light in my lane remained red. Just as I was

about to do something I shouldn't, the light finally turned green, and I arrived right on time.

The season of Lent, is like that. Ready or not, it's time to pause and make note of the brake lights and the stop lights. Ready or not, it's time to travel through the wilderness, take the slow lane or even a different route, knowing that in forty days (minus Sundays), we will still arrive right on time, exactly where we need to be, regardless of the impediments we experience.

The Christian season of Lent begins on Ash Wednesday and ends on Easter Sunday. During Lent, Christians reflect on events of the life of Christ leading up to and including his death and resurrection. Forty days of penitent reflection is indeed inspired by Jesus' own forty-day experience in the wilderness, accounts of which are found in the books of Matthew, Mark and Luke.


Now, we may not find ourselves led out into the wilderness by the Holy Spirit this Lent, as Jesus did. We may not face a talking serpent or the devil face to face. But in the wildernesses that we find ourselves in, be they physical, emotional, or spiritual, we too find ourselves tested.

Most of us are aware of our limitations and our hang-ups, and the world we live in takes every opportunity to remind us of where we fall short. But from my faith perspective, Lent is not for sacrificial self-improvement by giving up chocolate or TV or some other indulgence. Lent instead takes us through the wilderness to reflect on what more we can be. Not so that we can feel guilty at where we fail. But so that we can allow God to transform our lives and for us to become all who God calls us to be.

We Christians wear the sign of the cross in ashes on the outside to remind ourselves of the work that God is enacting on the inside of us. The confessing of our sins. The embracing of our brokenness. The naming of our grief and disappointments. And thus the slow and painful process of the transforming our lives, enabling us to better love the world and all who live therein. That transformation probably takes more than forty days. But forty days is a good start.

I hope you will join us every Sunday as well as at our Lenten Wednesday night Vespers at 7 pm.





SUNDAY SCHOOL NEWS

Pastor's Report: Rhonda Hainer

- Pastor Rhonda focused on Hospitality using Genesis 18,
 Abraham's encounter with three strangers, which can teach us 6 things about hospitality as a church.
 - 1. ABRAHAM MADE HIS GUESTS FEEL WELCOME-Hospitality means not only greet new guests, and invite them to complete a Welcome Card located in the pews, but additionally to give them a tour of our building, i.e., where the classrooms are for themselves or for their kids. Greet them again the following week, etc.
 - 2. HE REFRESHED THEM by washing their feet. When people come into St. Paul's are we offering them an opportunity to heal?
 - 3. HE OFFERED THEM REST! As a church who cares, we are to be sensitive to the needs of those who come through these doors. They may have endured a difficult

- week or have a burden to carry that we won't know about. We have the opportunity to offer them rest and security. Our sanctuary is a "sanctuary".
- 4. HE GAVE THEM THE BEST SEAT- It was in the heat of the day, and Abraham offered his guest the shade tree to sit under to cool off.
- HE ENERGIZED THEM FOR THE ROAD AHEAD- The
 worship service including prayers, hymns, message and
 sending forth are prepared with the hope being that the
 guests are given what they need to face the week
 ahead.
- 6. HE STOOD READY & WAITING FOR AN OPPORTUNITY TO SERVE THEM. - All this is to say, when a guest comes into our church, we need to ensure that they are welcomed, refreshed, rested, comfortable, and given what they have to face the week ahead, we are to stand ready to serve and invite people to St. Paul's and actively look for them to come in.

 David reviewed the Financial Report for the month of January 2023. There being no other questions, President Kevin asked to file the financial report for review by the church Administrative Assistant.

Budget and Finance: David Dickman

 David discussed that so far this winter, our Dominion Gas MCF usage has been lower than last year. The average temperature has been about 10 degrees warmer so far this year than last, but this lower usage is also due to the new boilers too.

Christian Education and Nurture: (report submitted by Joan Leffel)

- Kids are working on collecting toilet paper for Agape until 2/26/23. A new mission project will start in March/April/May.
- Vacation Bible School is set for three days. Tuesday, May
 30, Wednesday, May 31, and Thursday, June 1, from 6p-8p.
- Kids are singing March 12th during the worship service.
- Kids are doing the Palm Sunday service, April 2nd. The kids are doing everything for the service, including collecting the offering. Pastor Rhonda will provide us with the Call to Worship, and Scriptures. All ages of the Sunday School youth will be participating.
- We are starting a "rewards" punch card for the Nursery-5th grade youth. They will have 12 weeks to collect 10 punches. Punches are mainly to encourage attendance, but we will give punches for other incentives as well. The punch cards will start February 19th and run through May 7th. On May 14th, Jane and Joni will have breakfast with the kids.
- Senior Youth will be serving Easter Breakfast again this year.
- All classes have had steady attendance.
- The kids made Valentine bookmarks and handed out small bags of candy on February 5th to church members in attendance. Several of the Sunday School children passed them out.
- Camp information has been given to all families.
- A Sunday School Facebook page has been started. We will try to link it with the church Facebook page in a few weeks.
 The Sunday School page will have lots of pictures of our youth on it.

Christian Mission and Outreach: Jill Dickman

- Our committee is asking for approval of a \$1000 donation to Templed Hills renovation project. Jill Dickman made a motion for said donation. Lori Now seconded. Motion carried.
- Post meeting request: After the meeting Wednesday night, it was discovered that we had indeed discussed a \$1,000 donation from Christian Mission Outreach at the January meeting (as noted in the January minutes); however, had indicated that it would be brought to Consistory for vote at the February meeting. Thus, we are doing an email motion as follows: Jill Dickman has moved that \$1,000 be sent to Back Bay Mission, from Christian Mission and Outreach. Carol Gehres has seconded the motion. Per the response emails received, motion carried.
- The Committee is looking into the potential of a driver service for those who cannot drive themselves to church, and also a meal service for those who were just released from the hospital.

Organ Refurbishing Committee: Becky Anderson

• The organ committee is planning to kick off their fundraising efforts on Sunday, February 19th. We have a video prepared by Rich Spencer, who followed the organ tuner around when he was here, and he explained what needs to be done. Following that we will be sending a letter in the mail to all who receive the communicator plus some prior folks who had connections with either the church, were in the choir or maybe their parents were in the choir. Each letter will contain a pledge card. A trifold has been prepared to have on display, as well as an organ pipe to show progress. We are also planning on having a question/answer section in the communicator each month. "BE AN ORGAN DONOR".

Old Business:

- President Kevin read a letter from the Auglaize County 175th Anniversary Committee requesting that all churches ring their church bells for 175 seconds (three minutes) at noon on Tuesday, February 14th. Pastor Rhonda has been in contact with Ann Vogel already, and St. Paul's will be ringing our bells on that day and time.
- President Kevin also brought up that there was a request that all the churches hold an Open House (at the same time) sometime in 2023. After some discussion, it was decided to refer this request to the local Ministerial Association.
- President Kevin asked members of the Consistory if they have any recommendations for the Safety Committee after reviewing the Safety Committee sheet handed out at the January meeting. Safety Committee Chairperson, DeWayne Marsee, asked members of the Consistory, "Where do we go from here, and how do we proceed?" Discussion commenced regarding upgrading cameras, since our current system has some age to it. DeWayne is looking into prices and possible Grants for a digital system as ours in analog. DeWayne asked Consistory about ways to "harden" the Sunday School classrooms, with either locks, and window coverings. DeWayne suggested, maybe the quilting ladies and other congregation members that sew, could possibly make the window coverings. DeWayne also mentioned that the local Fire Department has a list of suppliers and ideas to keep the classroom doors locked for safety. After some discussion, it was the consensus of the Consistory for the Safety Committee to pick out the most important items listed and proceed forward. Susan Braun

made a motion to accept the recommendation for the Safety Committee to prioritize and group the listed items, and proceed with what is most important. Jill Dickman seconded the motion. Motion carried. Ruth Knous asked about child abuse training. DeWayne replied that education is "key" and will be addressed. Janet Gibson and Larry Kill agreed to also serving on the Safety Committee with DeWayne and President Kevin.


