Relics of St Carlo Acutis to Visit Diocese of Salford: In January, the relics of St Carlo Acutis will be hosted at two of our churches over five days, during which time the Diocese will welcome schools, parishioners and people from all over for veneration. Carlo is the first millennial saint, and is celebrated for his profound faith and his use of the internet to log Eucharistic miracles from around the world. He was passionate about spreading the teachings of the Catholic Church up until his death from leukaemia at the age of 15. The relics will be presented at St Mary's Church, Burnley from 28-29 January 2026 before they travel to St Patrick's Church, Collyhurst from 30 January to 1 February 2026. FROM THE CATECHISM OF THE CATHOLIC CHURCH 606 The Son of God, who came down "from heaven, not to do (his) own will, but the will of him who sent (him)", said on coming into the world, "Lo, I have come to do your will, O God." "and by that will we have been sanctified through the offering of the body of Jesus Christ once for all." From the first moment of his Incarnation the Son embraces the Father's plan of divine salvation in his redemptive mission: "My food is to do the will of him who sent me, and to accomplish his work." The sacrifice of Jesus "for the sins of the whole world" expresses his loving communion with the Father. "The Father loves me, because I lay down my life", said the Lord, "(for) I do as the Father has commanded me, so that the world may know that I love the Father."

607 The desire to embrace his Father's plan of redeeming love inspired Jesus' whole life, for his redemptive passion was the very reason for his Incarnation. and so he asked, "and what shall I say? 'Father, save me from this hour'? No, for this From the cross, just before "It is finished", he said, "I thirst." "The Lamb who takes away the sin of the world"

THE WORD OF THE WEEK: There is no break between Christmas and Ordinary Time – one flows almost seamlessly into the other through the Baptism of Jesus. We ended our Christmas Season thinking about the "revelation" of the Son of God – people realising who this "Jesus of Nazareth" actually was – and this continues today, as we interject a passage from Saint John before we begin our weekly reading through Saint Matthew's Gospel. New Year is about beginnings, and as we return to the beginning of Our Lord's public ministry there is a sense of something exciting about to happen – even though we know the story, we dive into it once more, like returning to a favourite novel or film. So it is with joy that we stand in the country of the river Jordan, and recognise Jesus of Nazareth as the Chosen One of God, who offers himself to do God's work.

A new start

One of the most frequently travelled roads between Jerusalem and Galilee ran through this region [of the River Jordan]. Near where it crossed the river, at a place called Bethabara, John began to preach from a natural pulpit among the rocks overlooking the grove of sycamores that sheltered his listeners from the burning sun of midday pouring down upon John's own unprotected head...

As word of John's fiery preaching in the wilderness began to spread, more and more people stopped on the way to and from Jerusalem to hear him. There had not been a real prophet in Israel for hundreds of years...

Bethabara could hardly be called a town. Actually, it was little more than a customs station where the traveller from Jerusalem passed from the area

ruled by the Roman Procurator, Pontius Pilate, into the region presided over by Herod Antipas, Tetrarch of Galilee and Peraea. A small post of frontier guards was stationed at the fords, more to keep order than to disturb the travellers, who could move freely from any part of the Roman Empire to another so long as they paid the necessary tolls.

John understood that baptism was not, in Jesus' case, an act of repentance, an acknowledgement of sin and a washing away of all uncleanness, as it had been with the others he had baptised. Instead, this was Jesus' way of publicly announcing his subservience to the will of his Father and his willingness from thenceforward to do only God's purpose.

St Mary Magdalene: betrayal, repentance, forgiveness

We first meet Mary in Luke 8:1-3, having been freed from evil spirits. It is not said, but it is strongly suggested, that Jesus freed her. She abandoned her former life and accompanied Jesus. Mary was there at the crucifixion; present also when his body was placed in the tomb. She was the first to meet the risen Lord and to announce this good news. Hers is a story of transformation, demonstrating that Jesus can change our lives, freeing us from old ways and leading us into his new way, involving evangelisation: Mary joyfully told others that Jesus was risen because she had met him. That message is given to us to share also. Through us, Jesus still reaches out to people who are marginalised, including them in his circle of friends and giving them a place on his mission team. Mary reminds us of the great privilege we have been given, which is to tell others about our encounter with the risen Lord and the difference he is making in our lives.
