THE WORD OF THE WEEK: Following on from last week (You cannot be the slave of both God and money) we see a practical illustration of what this means. The division between rich and poor was very striking at the time of Jesus: popular understanding, however, said that to be rich was a blessing from God. Jesus reminds people that riches carry their own responsibility the duty to notice the poor man, especially when he lies at your own gate. In this parable, Jesus is subtly attacking the people's lack of acceptance of the teaching of the prophets They have Moses and the prophets but they obviously haven't listened to them. The twist in the last line is powerful: they will not be convinced even if someone should rise from the dead. Since our world still sees a division between rich and poor, how true those words have become!

Beneath a very aged tree, I saw an aged man, whose mortal days were seemingly Worn to the shortest span.


His dress was ragged, and his brow Deep marks of sorrow bare; His eyes, once bright, were darken'd now, By teardrops of despair.

It was a secret sign and, at the same time, a declaration of belief and trust in the Trinity. The early Christians quickly saw that the anchor could represent the stability of a faith anchored in God. However, they also went one step further: the ring at the top symbolised the Father. The body, shaped like a cross, was Jesus, the Son who was crucified. The curved base denoted the Holy Spirit in the

form of a winged dove. In times of persecution, an anchor meant everything to the early Church as a summary of Christian belief. That is why sometimes, they also portrayed the anchor holding two fish, those who had been called and drawn into a relationship with Jesus.
