Message from the Mayor

Greetings, Fellow Walbridge Neighbors!

I hope you've all had a fun-filled and memorable summer! While spring brought us chilly, wet days, summer certainly delivered with long stretches of sunshine and warmth. It was the kind of season that makes you truly appreciate small-town life.

Our village parks were alive with activity—youth baseball, adult softball, pickleball, basketball—there was something for everyone. The Village Pool was buzzing almost daily with families soaking up the sun, and the new playground at Railway Park quickly became a community favorite. I'm incredibly proud of that improvement, and I'm even prouder of how much joy it's brought to our families.

One of my summer highlights was stepping into the role of guest barista at Random Acts of Walbridge! It was a blast (even if I'm no match for our local coffee pros), and let's just say I made up for my lack barista skills with a couple scoops of chocolate chip cookie dough ice cream! If you haven't there been yet—it's a must-visit gem right here in town.

Can you believe we're only five months away from a new year? While the seasons change, the work continues here in the Village. We're gearing up for several road improvement projects, including sections of Raymond, Breckman, and Blair Drive. If our budget allows, we also hope to repave the parking lot by the library, as well as Ivy Court on the south side of the Village.

I understand the need for continued road and infrastructure improvements across Walbridge, and while balancing funding and grants can be a challenge, we're making steady progress. I'm excited to share that for 2026, we've already secured partial grant funding to improve Allen Street and Holly Drive. In partnership with Lake Township, Walbridge Road from Luckey to E. Broadway is also slated for repaving—another win made possible through grant funding.

In fact, through the hard work of our administrative team, we've secured over \$500,000 in grant funding in just the past couple of years. These funds have been vital in supporting our infrastructure and enhancing our parks. And we're not stopping there—we have more grant applications in the pipeline for sidewalk improvements along Union Street and further upgrades at Loop Park. Fingers crossed for great news on those fronts!

I'm also proud to report that Walbridge remains in a **strong and stable financial position**. Since I became Mayor in 2012, we've steadily increased our cash reserves—allowing us to make meaningful improvements without placing additional financial burden on our residents. While many neighboring communities are turning to levies and tax increases, we've stayed committed to fiscal responsibility and grant-seeking to get the job done.

None of this would be possible without the dedication of our incredible Village administrative team. Their commitment to service, transparency, and progress keeps Walbridge moving forward. And remember—we're always here for you. Our open-door policy means exactly that: you're always welcome to share your ideas, questions, or concerns.

Together, let's continue building on the pride we all feel for this wonderful Village we call home. Here's to a vibrant fall season and all the community spirit it brings.

PERMITS |



Completing a Fall or Winter Project? You may need to obtain a PERMIT with the Village. Any time you are building or remodeling commercial or residential properties within the Village of Walbridge Corporation limit you must FIRST obtain a permit. This gives you legal permission from the Village to begin construction work or demolition. permits must be obtained **BEFORE** your project can begin.

Contractors are also required to obtain a CONTRACTOR PERMIT with the Village prior to doing contractor work within the Village Corporation limit.

Our permits are now **ONLINE** and you can apply for a 24-7 through our Village website: https://www.walbridgeohio.org/ under the DEPARTMENTS/SERVICES tab.

MAKE SURE YOUR HOUSE NUMBER CAN BE SEEN FROM THE ROAD

Clearly display your house number so emergency responders can quickly find you.

The Village of Walbridge Ordinance Chapter 1313 (1313.05) requires that the owners and each adult occupant of all houses, and structures located on a public right-of-way on which street addresses have been assigned within the Village of Walbridge shall display the address number assigned to said structure in a legible manner. Said number shall be fixed in a conspicuous place on the front of the building and shall be visible from the public right-of-way. In cases of a corner lot the number shall be fixed on the side facing the public right-of-way to which the number applies. The numbers shall be at least three inches in height and distinct from the building color.

Anyone failing to comply may be fined a sum not exceeding one hundred dollars (\$100.00). Each day of noncompliance may be considered a separate offense. Making sure your house numbers can be seen helps first responders find your location easier.

WALBRIDGE TAX DEPARTMENT

Do I need to file a Village of Walbridge Tax Return? Find out below!

All residents, and partial residents, are required to file a Village of Walbridge Tax Return even if you do not have any income.

Retired

Even if you are **retired**, we still require a copy of your federal 1040, or 1040 SR in order to confirm that you are only receiving Social Security or a Pension. Just for your 1st year of retirement.

Disabled

If you are disabled, we need your award letter from social security, or documentation for long-term disability

What do I need to file?



To file a Village of Walbridge Tax Return, we need copies of the following documents.

- W-2(s)
- Federal 1040(1st page) or 1040 SR (1st and 2nd pages)
- Schedule C, E, or F (if applicable)
- Schedule K-1 (1065) or K-1 (1120S) and the 2nd page of the Schedule E

Please do not drop off originals as we keep them for our records.

What if I'm a Landlord?



Landlords are required to report any new tenants to the Village within 30 days, and must file a Village of Walbridge Tax Return on the rental income. Our landlord tenant form will be available on our website.

Non-Filers

If you receive a non-filing letter from our office, please contact us as soon as possible. We're here to help resolve any issues in order to bring your account into good standing.



Golf Cart Inspections

Golf carts are allowed in the Village of Walbridge and on public roadways, BUT you MUST follow the proper guidelines.

You can schedule an appointment to have a WPD Officer come out to your residence or meet at the Police Department to inspect your golf cart.

Once approved, you can take the inspection form to the BMV to obtain licensing for the cart.

— THE VILLAGE OF — General Rules for E-Bikes



Traffic Laws: E-bike riders MUST follow ALL traffic laws that apply to bicycles

Where You Can Ride an Electric Bike:

- Bike lanes & Paths Class 1 and 2 e-bikes are allowed to use Bike Lanes and Paths; Class 3 may be able to if bike lanes/paths are far away from highways.
 Roads & Streets all Classes are allowed to ride on roads and streets, obeying same
- Sidewalks Riders must turn the power off before using the sid
- Multi-Use Trails Multi-use trails reserved for non-motorized use are off-limits to all electric bikes; also applies to trails for mountain bikes, hiking, or similar puporses. All use trails are accessible to electric bike riders.
- State Parks Most State Parks in Ohio permit the use of all electric bike cla



No License or Registration: E-bikes are NOT subject to the same registration, licensing, or insurance requirements as motor vehicles. **Age Restrictions:** No age restrictions for Class 1 and 2 e-bikes. Riders of Class 3 e-bikes MUST be at least



Helmets: Helmets are REQUIRED for riders AND passengers of Class 3 e-bikes in Walbridge.

Maintenance & Streets Department Update

The Maintenance Department has had a busy and productive year, working hard to improve the appearance, safety, and functionality of our Village. Crews have jetted several storm sewers to help address localized flooding issues during heavy rains. Routine tasks like mowing and weed trimming have kept our public spaces well-maintained, while extra attention was given to keeping the parks clean and inviting throughout the baseball and softball season.

At Railway Park, the team repainted the parking lines and updated the traffic pattern to improve safety and traffic flow. They also played a key role in the recent playground upgrade, ensuring the area is safe and enjoyable for children and families. New blue trash receptacles have been placed around town to maintain a clean and cohesive look throughout the Village.

The Maintenance Department also played a crucial role in the successful operation of the Walbridge Pool at Aqua Terrace this season. With numerous hot days this summer, their efforts were key to keeping the pool open and enjoyable for all. The team ensured water quality was maintained by closely monitoring and balancing chemical levels, while also keeping the facility clean, safe, and inviting for residents and visitors alike. Their behind-the-scenes work allowed the community to fully enjoy the pool during the peak of the season, providing a refreshing escape and a place to gather throughout the summer.

In addition, staff trimmed low-hanging tree limbs over sidewalks, helped install several new street and traffic signs—including the new "Welcome to Walbridge" sign off I-280—and added lighting in response to resident requests. The Maintenance Department continues to take pride in their work and remains dedicated to serving the community with professionalism and care.

2025 Village Highlights & Community Projects



In 2025, the Village of Walbridge has continued its proactive approach to community improvement. Highlights include the new playground and long-awaited zipline at Railway Park, funded through grants, along with a new traffic pattern to ease congestion during busy game nights. A ribbon cutting celebrated these upgrades! We had the installation of new signs at Railway Park, Loop Park, and the I-280 exit welcoming visitors to Walbridge, offering consistency throughout our community. Cleanup efforts at Veteran's Park have improved the space, and pet waste stations and a even pet pantry, that was built and installed by a local Boy Scout—add convenience for park users. We also embraced a show of community pride with "Thank You Walbridge Police Department" signs on lawns throughout the Village. And of course, the Walbridge Library remains one of our most valued community treasures.

Water Service Line Identification

This fall, our crews will continue identifying water service lines in Walbridge to comply with the Ohio EPA's requirement to identify all public waterlines by 2027. The process involves digging a small, 1-foot-diameter hole where your water line connects to the public water main. While most waterline connections are near sidewalks, some in Walbridge are in backyards near fence lines. Homeowners will receive a notification letter before work begins. Hydrant Flushing

Fire Hydrant flushing crews will be in Walbridge this fall to complete their annual hydrant inspection. This process can cause additional sediment in your water, if this occurs, avoid washing clothes and flush your tap water at the faucet for several minutes.

Sewer Camera Inspection

You may have noticed The District's sewer camera truck in your neighborhood. Our team is investigating the underground sanitary sewer system using robotic video technology and GPS to pinpoint issues for future maintenance and possible projects. Please use caution if you see our camera truck crew working in your area.

The Village of Walbridge

"From Owl's Nest to Walbridge: A Journey Through Time"



Celebrating the Roots and Rise of Our Village



In our last issue, we learned that before it was Walbridge, it was known simply—and curiously—as the "Owl's Nest." But it didn't take long for a few determined townsfolk to carve out a new identity for their budding community. The arrival of the Toledo and Ohio River Railroad in 1870 sparked the beginning transformation. A year later, the federal government granted the village its very first post office, marking Walbridge's entry onto the map.

The name "Walbridge" was chosen in honor of Henry Walbridge, prominent Toledo landowner who never actually lived here, but whose influence was felt in the region. In 1874, Emeretta and Harriet Warner commissioned a formal survey of the area, and by 1876, the Hocking Valley Line-what we now know as CSX Railroad—rumbled through town.

With the railroads came railroad workers, and with workers came the need for shelter. Enter The Beanery, Walbridge's first hotel, which stood between two rail lines on Union Street around 1900. The town's momentum was growing, and so was its population. By 1906, a new cement block schoolhouse rose on the site of what is now known as Walbridge Elementary.

Then came a major step forward: the streetcar line arrived in 1908, connecting Walbridge to Toledo, Fostoria, and Findlay. For a oncesleepy train stop, things were starting to move fast.

By 1913, the community was ready to The Walbridge-Lake Township Fire govern itself. On March 25, Walbridge officially incorporated. A.E. Kusian became the first Mayor, and Elery Scott the first Marshal. Just weeks later, the first village council meeting was held on April 7.

Progress swept through the village in the following years. Perry Street became the first paved road in 1919, and the Walbridge State Bank opened its doors. In 1920, Walbridge launched its own municipal electric system, drawing power from the Ballville Dam in Fremont and lighting up the town with pride.

In 1921, William Schier was appointed the first Fire Chief, earning a modest \$10 a year. By 1928, Walbridge had its very own fire engine, delivered by rail Columbus—a from shinv new Seagraves pumper.

Among the most influential figures of the early 20th century was Mayor J.C. Loop, who served from 1930 to 1941. He was instrumental in building streets. drilling the village's first water well, and helping to create Loop Park in 1935. The park was named in his honor and became a treasured gathering spot for generations.

Even in times of challenge, Walbridge showed resilience. The Walbridge State Bank closed in 1932 amid the Depression, and in 1949, on Christmas Eve, the village post office was robbed by safecrackers who made off with \$1,500 in bonds and \$100 in cash. Yet the village spirit never dimmed.



Department was formed in 1945, and in 1958, the Walbridge Bears youth baseball team went undefeated, capturing hearts with an astonishing 58-0 season. Loop Park remained a fun—hostina fireworks. summer movies, and even ice skating in winter, thanks to a flooded section of the park that turned into a community rink.

The 1960s brought major upgrades, includina \$170,000 improvement project in 1961 and a partnership with the City of Toledo for water services. The Exchange Bank opened in 1963, and soon after, the Aqua Terrace Swim Club was built by 10 determined families. In 1994, it became a public amenity, thanks to the efforts of Councilman Cecil Adkins.

As the years rolled on, Railway Park was developed in 1983, followed by the opening of the Village Library in 1987—two projects made possible by Mayor Forrest Scarberry Pasqualone. Councilman Greg Meanwhile. Councilmember Joanne Schiavone negotiated groundbreaking refuse contract in the 1990s that saved residents thousands of dollars.

In 2000, surrounding neighborhoods and businesses, including Walnut Hills and Deluxe Mobile Home Parks, officially joined the Village. The heartbeat of the town was strengthened once more with the creation of Veterans Park in 2001, a cherished Main Street landmark led by Mayor Robert Robson and dedicated to those who served—and to the spirit of a grateful village.
