Dear Council and Mayor,

Here is a Monthly Executive Summary of the past 30 days for the City.

- ♦ The remodel of the Tool Police Department is complete. Outstanding priorities at the Police Department are Information Technology needs, for CJIS compliance.
- ♦ The Paradise Bay Subdivision Drainage Phase 1A Project has concluded. Final elevation numbers were provided to the city on October 29th. Additional lighting and striping is being considered, according to TXDOT standards.
- ♦ The Maintenance Barn project is undergoing construction, with the current steps being the metal building construction having started. The project has been currently stopped, due to more engineering needing to be completed.
- The new fence around the West Cedar Creek MUD lift station has been constructed adjacent to City Hall. However, the lift station is still undergoing construction, according to the WCCMUD General Manager.
- ♦ The City of Tool's Maintenance Department is continuing its "Neighborhood-A-Week" program, in which they focus on one neighborhood each week. The neighborhood/area they are currently in is Arnold Hills.
- A ramp for ADA compliance has been completed in front of City Hall, which nearly closes out the City Hall project. There are a few outstanding items to complete for ADA compliance.

Also, here's a recap of the other business interests and prospects in the city:

- Staff met with the developers of the 81 acres on January 16<sup>th</sup>, February 25<sup>th</sup>, May 27<sup>th</sup>, June 10<sup>th</sup> and July 9th. The Developers gave an update on the project, saying they are still working on acquiring assets to go towards the project. This group continues to have discussions with the city regarding the project. The developers say they are a year away from platting and getting permits for building. However, staff remains ready and willing to work with the developers as they take steps forward to completing this project.
- ♦ Staff has engaged with the city attorney, and other parties, regarding an annexation agreement for Fig's Steakhouse. Staff is hoping to bring this item to the Council in the fourth quarter of 2025.



### Financial and Expenditure Cover Page

#### Council and Mayor,

Welcome to Fiscal Year 2025-2026! Please see the attached monthly financial reports. This information is for the period ending October 31st, 2025, for discussion at the council meeting on November 20th, 2025.

#### Income

- 4020 Building Permits Fees revenues collected are approximately the same vs this time last year.
- 4064 Fines & Forfeitures revenues are down 36% or \$14,344 vs this same time last October.
- 4070 and 4071 (Ad Valorem Revenues) has been collected faster this year vs last. It is up \$43,575 vs what it was in October 2024.
- 4120 Sales Tax revenues is up 9% vs last year.
- 4110 Hotel Occupancy Tax is relatively flat.
- 4121 Mixed Beverage Tax is up \$525 vs \$267 last year.

#### **Expenditures**

- 5050 Auto Fuel is trending about 3% higher than expected.
- 5103 Permits & Building Inspections is trending 10% higher than expected.
- 5510-6 Water Utilities is trending about 5% higher than expected. However, as the season gets cooler, monthly bills are likely to go down.
- 5370 Office Supplies are trending about 7% higher than expected. This category will be monitored closely going forward.
- 5371 Building Supplies is trending about 18% higher. This is due to finishing the Police Building Remodel and the one-time supply furnishings needed to maintain it going forward.
- Payroll Expenses are trending where expected.
- Property Insurance is trending where expected.

#### **Other Items**

- The 2023-2024 Fiscal Year audit work has been resumed and the staff is working diligently to get this completed soon
- Any accrued expenses and revenues for Fiscal Year 2024-2025 have been made and no other changes are expected.
- \$27,000 of Emergency Fund Reserves have been temporarily utilized since the Budget Approval date.

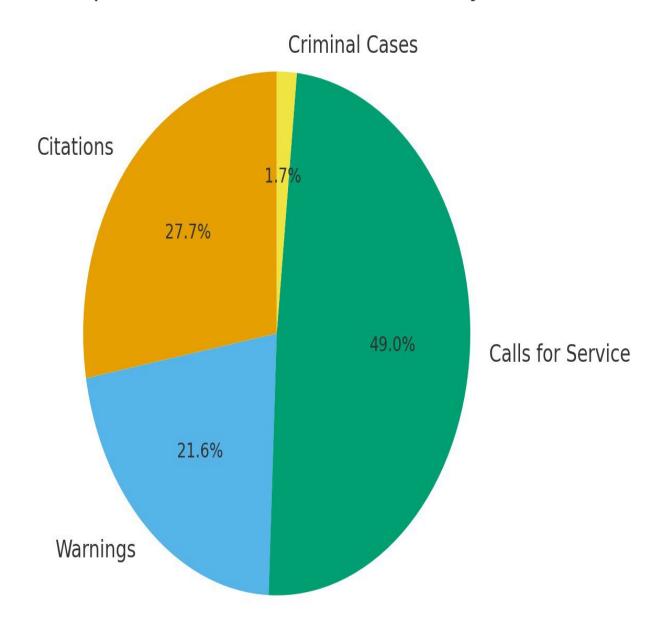
#### Summary

Board of Director Selection for Henderson County Appraisal District

It is time to select the Board of Directors for the District. The Directors will serve terms as indicated in the attached election cycles timeline beginning January 1, 2026. You may nominate one person for each of the two (2) positions. Enclosed are the qualifications for candidates, your number of votes, and a nominating resolution. The Board of Directors serves staggered two-year terms. Two will be appointed Directors for 2026. The remaining three Directors are serving three-year terms and are being reappointed January 1, 2028.

## The Following is The Selection Schedule with Deadlines.

**September 30** - Chief Appraiser calculates and notifies each taxing entity of the number of votes it may cast.

**October 15** - Each taxing entity may nominate one candidate for each position. Therefore, each entity may nominate from one to two candidates. The presiding officer of the taxing unit submits **the names and addresses** of the nominees by **written resolution** to the Chief Appraiser.

October 31 - Chief Appraiser prepares and delivers ballots to each taxing entity.

December 15 - Taxing entity casts votes and submits them, by resolution, to the Chief Appraiser.

**December 31-** Chief Appraiser counts votes and notifies all taxing entities and candidates of the outcome.

## **BOARD OF DIRECTORS QUALIFICATIONS**

To be eligible to serve on a board of directors, an individual must be a resident of the CAD and must have resided in the CAD for at least two years immediately preceding the date of taking office. This residency requirement does not apply to a county TAC serving as a voting director. An employee of a taxing unit that participates in the CAD is not eligible to serve on the board of directors, unless that individual also is a member of the governing body of the taxing unit or an elected official of a taxing unit. Membership on the governing body of a taxing unit does not make an otherwise eligible individual ineligible to serve on the board of directors.

Owing delinquent property taxes disqualifies a person from serving on the CAD board of directors. The person is ineligible if he or she owns property on which delinquent property taxes have been owed for more than 60 days after the date the person knew or should have known of the delinquency. This disqualification does not apply if the person is paying the delinquent taxes and any penalties and interest under an installment payment agreement or has deferred or abated a suit to collect the delinquent taxes.

A person who has appraised property for compensation for use in proceedings or represented property owners for compensation in proceedings in the CAD at any time within the preceding five years is ineligible to serve on the board of directors. A person is ineligible to serve on the board of directors if the individual is related within the second degree of consanguinity (blood) or affinity (marriage) to the following:

- an appraiser who appraises property for use in a proceeding under the Tax Code; or
- a person who represents property owners for compensation in proceedings under the Tax Code in the CAD.

A director who continues to hold office knowing he or she is related in this manner to the above named persons commits a Class B misdemeanor offense.

An individual is not eligible to be appointed to or to serve on the board of directors if an individual has a substantial interest in a business entity that is party to a contract, or the individual is a party to a contract with the CAD. This prohibition also applies to contracts with a taxing unit that participates in the CAD if the contract relates to the performance of an activity governed by the Tax Code. A CAD may not enter into a contract with a board member or with a business entity in which a board member has a substantial interest. A taxing unit may not enter into a contract relating to the performance of an activity governed by the Tax Code with a board member in which the taxing unit participates or with a business entity in which a board member has a substantial interest.

An individual has substantial interest in a business entity if:

- the combined ownership of the director and the director's spouse is at least 10 percent of the voting stock or shares of the business entity; or
- the director or director's spouse is a partner, limited partner or officer of the business entity.

The Chief Appraiser has neither the authority nor the duty of investigating or judging the qualifications of the nominees.

## **City of Tool – Council Presentation**

**Subject:** Proposal for Citywide Telehealth Program Partnership with MD Health Pathways

(Tap Telehealth)

#### Overview

Councilman Greg Figueroa has successfully negotiated a community partnership with MD Health Pathways (Tap Telehealth) to provide telehealth services to all Tool residents and employees working within the Tool city limits.

This program ensures every household in Tool has instant access to basic medical care with no out-of-pocket cost and no insurance requirement.

## **Program Highlights**

- Cost to City: \$5 per household (covers up to 10 people per household)
- Estimated Coverage: Approximately 900 households representing 2,300 residents
- Estimated Monthly Cost: \$4,500
- Estimated Annual Cost: \$54,000
- Resident Cost: \$0 the City of Tool will cover 100% of the cost for the service
- Prescription Costs: Residents will be responsible for paying for their own prescriptions
- Registration: Residents and employees can register through the City of Tool website
- Activation: Once registered, participants can begin using the service immediately

### Partnership and Funding Plan

Councilman Figueroa plans to seek sponsorship assistance from key community partners to help offset the program's cost, including:

- West Cedar Creek MUD
- Trinity Valley Electric Cooperative (TVEC)
- Waste Management Services
- Local businesses within the City of Tool

Whatever amount is not covered by sponsorships will be funded by the **City of Tool** to ensure that **every resident has access to timely medical care.** 

#### **How It Works**

#### 1. Text Access

Residents text the dedicated number to connect with a healthcare provider within minutes — no wait times, copays, or insurance required.

## 2. Provider Response

A licensed medical provider replies within minutes via text, phone call, or FaceTime.

## 3. Treatment and Follow-Up

Providers diagnose, treat, and prescribe for common conditions including:

- o Covid, Flu, Strep Throat
- Rashes and Skin Issues
- Urinary Tract Infections
- o Non-emergency medical complaints
- Medication refills
- Work and school notes

## **Why This Matters**

- Over 60–70% of urgent care and doctor visits involve simple, treatable conditions that telehealth can address immediately.
- Many Tool residents face **limited access to local doctors** and **weeks-long wait times** for basic appointments.
- The service especially benefits Tool's large population of residents aged 65 and older, many of whom struggle with transportation and mobility.
- This initiative helps ensure **everyone has access to care**, from working families to seniors and those without health insurance.

## **Community Impact**

- **Instant access** to healthcare professionals for every household in Tool.
- Reduced strain on emergency rooms and urgent care clinics.

## CITY OF Tool - Eight at Tool Inc. Agreement

## **CONTRACT FOR Eight at Tool Park Services**

This Agreement ("Agreement") is set forth, made and entered into by the City of Tool, a General Law Type A municipality in Henderson County, Texas and herein referred to as "City" and the Eight at Tool, Inc. with an IRS 501(C)3 nonprofit status, as established by the Internal Revenue Services, hereinafter referred to as the "Organizer."

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual promises, covenants

## I. Organizer's Responsibilities

- Organize and manage community events in the park including but not limited to park festivals, holiday celebrations, concert series and major concerts, movie nights when possible and other events that are beneficial to the City.
- 2. Perform fundraising tasks and secure sponsorships for activities as available.
- 3. Fundraise and secure donations for park improvements, park amenities and supplies as needed.
- 4. Operate volunteer programs through the use of committees and other volunteers.
- 5. Organize park clean-up days as needed, or requested by the City.
- Coordinate recreation programs, youth sports leagues fitness and educational classes in park, free or low-cost and open to the general public, without discrimination or membership requirements.
- 7. Make recommendations to City Council of Tool for improvements. Recommendations must be taken at a Park Board meeting and given to City Staff for Council consideration.
- 8. Create and coordinate beautification projects within the park and city.
- 9. Coordinate recreational activities and utilize the Oran White Civic Center for recreational use.
- 10. No City of Tool employee may serve on the Eight at Tool Board of Directors. A Tool City Council member may serve as the Executive Director but may not be a director themselves.

## II. City Responsibilities

- Cooperate with Organizer for promotion of events through their Facebook page and City website.
- 2. Provide space for storage of park supplies and materials.
- 3. Provide Tool Police Department support when events are estimated to be over 150 people in expected attendance.





- 4. Provide Tool Maintenance Department support when events are estimated to be over 150 people in expected attendance.
- 5. Maintain Eight at Tool park grounds during all times of this agreement, including special maintenance accommodations within five business days of the event.
- 6. Provide clean restroom facilities stocked with ancillary supplies.

## III. Compensation and Terms

- 1. The City agrees to provide the Organizer \$ 4266 in Hotel Occupancy Taxes and \$ 12 666 in from the General Fund, for the 2025-2026 Fiscal Year. These payments are to be paid out in 4 equal installments, through each quarter. If payments are to be made outside of this arrangement, the organization will make a request for funds at a City Council meeting.
- 2. This agreement shall commence on September 1<sup>st</sup>, 2025 and end on August 31<sup>st</sup>, 2026.

## IV. Authorized Expenditures of Funds

For the purposes of this Agreement, a public purpose shall be defined as a use that provides a clear, primary benefit to the residents of the City of Tool and serves a governmental, civic, or community function.

- Hotel Occupancy Tax Funds (HOT) Funds, from the City of Tool, are to be used solely
  for concerts and other events that have the potential and intention of reaching
  communities outside of Tool. These funds are to be used for the benefit of tourism,
  specifically attracting individuals from outside of the city staying overnight inside the
  City of Tool.
- General Funds, from the City of Tool, are to be solely used for only supporting events and materials that provide a direct civic benefit to Tool residents. Additionally, the funds can be used for supplies, marketing, entertainment, equipment rentals and related costs, that are a direct benefit to Tool residents.

## V. Non-Authorized Expenditures of Funds

- 1. Salaries, stipends or compensation for directors or officers of the Organization.
- 2. Activities unrelated to the City's public purpose for the City of Tool community.





## VI. Conditions of Funds

- 1. Organizer shall conduct an annual audit and make it available to the City.
- Organizer shall provide the City Council with a quarterly report, throughout the fiscal year, detailing each event and its attendance, activities conducted and explicit use of City funds.
- 3. Organizer shall make financial records, as related to this contract, available to the City, upon reasonable request by the City of Tool City Administrator.
- 4. Any funds expended by the Organizer in a manner inconsistent with this Agreement shall be reimbursed to the City within 30 days of notice.

### VII. Conditions of Funds

- 1. Upon the terms and conditions herein expressed and in consideration of the covenants and agreements herein expressed and of the faithful performance by the Organizer of all such covenants and agreements, City grants Organizer the right to use and occupy the following described space and premises located in the City of Tool, Henderson County, Texas:
  - a. The Eight at Tool Park, and its amenities and facilities, at no cost to Organizer.
  - b. The Oran White Civic Center, as available, at no cost to Organizer.
- Use of the Eight at Tool Park and Oran White Civic Center must be scheduled in coordination with the City of Tool staff and is subject to availability. Organizer shall not sublease, rent, or otherwise commercialize City-owned facilities, other than the activities specified within this agreement.

# VIII. CONTRACTUAL OBLIGATIONS, RESPONSIBILITIES, LAWS, and ORDINANCES:

- VENUE. Every obligation of either party to this contract shall be fully performed in Henderson County, Texas.
- NOTICE UNDER THIS AGREEMENT shall be in writing and may be delivered by hand, by certified mail, electronic mail (e-mail) or by common carrier. Notice to a party shall be addressed to the City, or Organizer, as noted in this Agreement.
  - a. Notice by hand-delivery is deemed effective immediately.
  - Notice by certified mail is deemed effective 3 days after deposit in U.S. Post Office or in a U.S. Mailbox.
  - c. Notice by electronic mail is deemed effective immediately.





- d. Notice by common carrier, is deemed effective upon receipt.
- 3. **ASSIGNMENT.** This agreement may not be amended, changed or assigned without the advance written consent of the parties.
- 4. **AMENDMENTS**. No amendment or change to this Agreement will be effective unless made and agreed to in writing by both parties.
- 5. CANCELLATION OF CONTRACT. Failure to comply with the terms and requirements of this Agreement, and/or produce required documentation in the required manner is grounds for immediate revocation of the Agreement but not of Organizer's obligations to the City under this Agreement. Such revocation is effective upon notice of revocation from City to Organizer.

## 6. NOT FOR CAUSE TERMINATION.

- a. City may terminate this Agreement at any time and for any reason, by giving at least thirty (30) days advance written notice to Organizer.
- b. **Organizer** may terminate this agreement for the following reasons:
  - Organizer may terminate this agreement at any time for any reason, by giving at least thirty (30) days advance notice written notice to City; provided however, that all unused or uncommitted funds and sums are paid back to the City prior to the termination date provided or;
  - ii. The involuntary or voluntary dissolution of the Eight at Tool, Inc.. provided however, that all unused or uncommitted funds and sums are paid back to the City prior to the termination date provided.
- 7. **TERMINATION OF AGREEMENT.** Upon termination for any reason, Organizer must return all unexpended and uncommitted City funds within 30 days.
- 8. FORCE MAJEURE. If the Property, structures and/or improvements are wholly or partially destroyed or damaged by any cause, casualty, or unforeseen occurrence, or circumstances beyond City's control, rendering City's performance impossible, then this Agreement will automatically terminate and Organizer waives and releases any claim for damages or compensation from City on account of termination.
- 9. ORGANIZER'S POSSESSION. City shall permit Organizer to have and enjoy the use of the Property hereinabove specifically described for the purpose and for the term aforesaid. However, it shall be the responsibility of Organizer to obtain any permit(s) that may be necessary or required by any City, County, State, or Federal ordinance/law for all activities. Said permits shall be obtained at the sole expense of the Organizer.
- 10. CITY'S RESPONSIBILITY. Upon request by Organizer, City shall make available electricity, and water according to the present openings available the premises hereinabove specifically described, during the term of this Agreement. City shall not be responsible for or liable to Organizer for any loss resulting from any lack of water or electricity due to an act of God, the failure of equipment to operate or function properly through no fault or act of the City, or the failure of ORGANIZER to proactively manage





- infrastructure users in the proper manner prescribed by appliance, electrical device or equipment manufacturer.
- 11. CONTROL OF PROPERTY. Organizer, at all times, shall control its concessionaires, security, and all of its employees, personnel, volunteers. The City may remove from the premises any and all such employees/volunteers of Organizer engaging in disorderly or unsafe conduct, with its officers and agents, including its police officers, and may eject any objectionable person or persons from the premises. In the event of the exercise of this authority, Organizer hereby waives any and all claims for damages against the City of Tool and its officers and employees on account thereof.
- 12. ACCESS TO PROPERTY. City, through its City Administrator, Police, Fire, Safety, other designated representatives, shall have the right at any time to enter any portion of the Property for any purpose, and the Property at all times will be under the sole charge and control of the City Administrator. Access to the premises shall be controlled by the City during the period by this Agreement, the entrances and exits of the premises shall be open or closed under the direction of Organizer in accordance with the terms of this agreement and the normal constraints for public safety as determined by the City Administrator or designated representatives.
- 13. CONFLICT OF INTEREST. Organizer certifies that no board member, officer, or agent of the organization shall benefit personally from City funds, and that no member of City Council or City staff shall receive any financial gain, directly or indirectly, from this Agreement.
- 14. REMOVAL OF EFFECTS and ABANDONED ITEMS. City shall have the right to collect, remove from grounds, and have custody of articles and personal property left on the premises by Organizer or persons attending the Event. Organizer releases and discharges City from any and all liabilities for any loss, injury or damages to property abandoned or not.
- 15.LAW OBSERVANCE. Organizer shall comply with all laws of the Unted States of the State of Texas, all ordinances of the City of Tool, and all rules and requirements of the Police and local Fire representatives, or other municipal authorities of the City of Tool. Upon violation of law by Organizer, or any person employed by or admitted to the said property by Organizer, upon notice Organizer will immediately take action to correct any such violations.
- 16. CITY ORDINANCES. All ordinances and resolutions of the City of Tool relating to the rental and use of the Property are incorporated by reference for all purposes.
- 17. PAYMENT OF COPYRIGHT CHARGES. Organizer assumes all liabilities and costs arising from the use of patented, trademarked, or copyrighted materials, equipment, devices, processes or dramatic rights used on or incorporated in the conduct of said Event; and Organizer indemnifies and holds harmless the City from all damages, costs and expenses in law or equity for or on account of all claims arising out of the use of any patented, trademarked or copyrighted materials, equipment, devices, processes or





- dramatic rights furnished or used by Organizer, and all claims arising incident this Agreement.
- 18. GIFTS. By City policy, City employees are prohibited from accepting gift of any type from vendors. If Organizer or their company customarily sends a token of appreciation to customers, the City asks that Organizer not send any item to City employees, City offices or City Council members.
- 19. ATTORNEY'S FEES. In the event City requires the services of an attorney to pursue any of the remedies available under this Agreement against the Organizer, including the filing of a lawsuit and Organizer is determined by a court of competent jurisdiction to be in default hereunder, the Organizer shall pay all costs and expensed, including but not limited to, reasonable attorney's fees, incurred by the City in the enforcement of this Contract.
- 20. **ENTIRITIES.** Should any clause, paragraph, sentence or section of this agreement be determined to be void, illegal or otherwise unenforceable by a court of competent jurisdiction, the remaining provisions of the Agreement shall not be rendered void and unenforceable as a result but rather shall remain in full force and effect.

## 21. SAFETY AND SECURITY.

- a. OBSTRUCTIONS. Roads, pathways, sidewalks, entrances and points of ingress and egress will be kept unobstructed by Organizer and shall not be used for any other purposes than public ingress or egress, unless incidental to activities as specified herein.
- b. ORGANIZER RESPONSIBILITY. Organizer will not bring or permit anyone to bring or keep anything onto the Property that will or may increase hazards or adversely affect the Property. Organizer will not bring any personal property onto the Property or place or put up any decorations that may damage Property without the consent of the City Administrator. City reserves the right at any time to require Organizer to remove from the Property any animals, furniture, fixtures, wiring, exhibits, or other thing in its sole discretion.

## 22. PHYSICAL ARRANGEMENTS.

- a. DEFACING PREMISES AND STRUCTURES. Organizer will not cause or permit any nails or other things to be driven into any structures or trees nor any sign to be affixed without permission, nor cause or permit any changes, alterations, repairs, painting or staining of any part of the structure or equipment thereof, nor permit to be done anything which will damage or change the finish or appearance of the structures thereof. In addition, continuing an event in the presence of rain without consulting the CITY places the ORGANIZER at risk of defacing property, incurring additional fees/charges/damages, and all City required repair labor and/or costs.
- b. COST OF REPAIR(S). Organizer shall pay the cost of repairing any and all





injury and damage which may be done to the premises or any of the structures or plant life thereof by any act of Organizer or any of Organizer's employees or agent or anyone visiting the premises upon the invitation of Organizer including the patrons of the attractions or function for which Organizer is hereby renting the premises hereinabove described. It is expressly agreed the Maintenance Director shall determine whether any such damage has been done, the amount thereof and the reasonable cost of repairing the same, and whether it is one for which, under the terms of this agreement, Organizer is to be held responsible.

- 23. **INSURANCE.** Organizer shall maintain an event coverage policy for large (150 people or more) naming the City of Tool as additional insured. The policy limits shall be \$1 million per occurrence and \$2 million per activity.
- 24. **SPECIAL PROVISIONS.** To the extent of conflict with other provisions of this agreement, the provisions in this section prevail.
- 25.**INDEMNIFICATIONS.** Organizer agrees to defend, indemnify, and hold harmless the City of Tool, its officers, City Council members and employees from any claims, liabilities, or damages arising out of Contractor's negligence or willful misconduct in the performance of this Contract.
- 26. **ENTIRE AGREEMENT.** This Agreement contains the entire understanding between the parties regarding the subject matter and supersedes any prior agreements.

### AMENDMENT NO. 1

### TO THE CITY OF TOOL - EIGHT AT TOOL, INC. AGREEMENT

This Amendment ("Amendment No. 1") is entered into by and between the City of Tool, Texas, a General Law Type A municipality ("City"), and Eight at Tool, Inc., a 501(c)(3) nonprofit corporation ("Organizer"), collectively referred to as the "Parties." This Amendment modifies certain provisions of the existing City of Tool – Eight at Tool Park Services Agreement ("Agreement") previously executed between the Parties. Except as expressly modified herein, all other provisions of the Agreement remain in full force and effect.

#### **WHEREAS:**

The Parties desire to clarify and modify certain provisions relating to organizational participation and compensation.

The Parties also wish to add specific policies regarding public communication, non-disparagement, and non-discrimination.

The Parties further desire to clarify that the Agreement is not exclusive and that the City retains full discretion over park use and scheduling.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants herein contained, the Parties agree to amend the Agreement as follows:

### 1. Amendment to Section I.10 - Organizational Responsibilities

Section I.10 of the Agreement is hereby deleted in its entirety and replaced with the following:

"No City of Tool employee, City staff member, or elected official may serve on the Eight at Tool Board of Directors or as Executive Director, or hold any management or supervisory position within the Organization."

## 2. Amendment to Section III – Compensation and Terms

Section III of the Agreement is hereby deleted in its entirety and replaced with the following:

"The City will reimburse the Organizer up to \$40,000 in Hotel Occupancy Tax (HOT) funds for bands and other qualifying items that create a deficit from the revenue generated by the event. All reimbursements must be supported by event financial documentation and approved by the

City Council before payment. This agreement shall commence on September 1st, 2025 and end on August 31st, 2026."

### 3. Addition of Section A – Social Media and Non-Disparagement Policy

The following section is hereby added to the Agreement: "All members, volunteers, or representatives of the Organizer, including those serving on any committees or boards affiliated with the City of Tool, shall refrain from making or posting any negative, disparaging, or defamatory remarks about the City of Tool, its elected officials, staff, or representatives on social media or in any public forum. Violation of this policy shall be grounds for immediate removal from the Park Board or any City-affiliated committee or program."

### 4. Addition of Section B – Non-Discrimination Policy

The following section is hereby added to the Agreement:

"The Organizer and its committees shall not deny participation in, or access to, any event, program, or activity held in the City of Tool park or on City property on the basis of race, color, religion, sex, gender identity, sexual orientation, age, national origin, disability, veteran status, or any other classification protected under federal, state, or local law. All events and activities shall remain open and welcoming to the general public."

## 5. Addition of Section C - Compliance with Laws and Permits

The following section is hereby added to the Agreement:

"The Organizer shall ensure that all events conducted on City property adhere to all applicable federal, state, and local laws, including but not limited to regulations pertaining to public safety, health, taxation, business licensing, and permitting. The Organizer shall be responsible for obtaining and maintaining all required permits, licenses, and health or safety approvals necessary for each event."

### 6. Addition of Section D - Non-Exclusive Use and Scheduling Authority

The following section is hereby added to the Agreement:

"This Agreement is not exclusive to the Organizer or any individual or group. The City retains full discretion over the use of all City park facilities. All event dates must be pre-approved by City staff, and the City may require approval by the City's Park Director to confirm availability and prevent scheduling conflicts. The City may authorize other organizations or individuals to use the park at any time."The city has to approve any proposed event.

## 7. Full Force and Effect

Except as amended herein, all other provisions of the original Agreement remain unchanged and in full force and effect.

## **Essential Duties & Responsibilities**

Suggestions from Councilmember Greg Figueroa

#### 1. Park Operations & Facility Management

- Oversee daily operations and upkeep of all city parks, trails, recreation areas, and public outdoor spaces.
- Schedule and supervise maintenance, landscaping, repairs, inspections, and improvements.
- Ensure parks are clean, safe, ADA-compliant, and aligned with city standards and applicable laws.
- Manage park amenities, shelters, pavilions, restrooms, and athletic or recreational features.
- Develop and maintain an equipment and asset inventory.

#### 2. Staff Coordination & Oversight

- Supervise, train, and evaluate maintenance workers, seasonal staff, contractors, and volunteers.
- Coordinate assignments, safety protocols, schedules, and productivity expectations.
- Provide leadership and direction during events and peak activity periods.

### 3. Budgeting & Administration

- Prepare and administer the annual parks and events budget.
- Manage purchasing, contracts, vendor agreements, and cost controls.
- Develop long-term financial needs assessments for capital projects and improvements.
- Prepare reports, proposals, and presentations for the City Administrator and City Council.

### 4. Event Planning & Community Programming

- Plan, organize, and execute all city-sponsored events, including:
  - Festivals
  - o Concerts
  - Holiday celebrations
  - Vendor markets
  - Movie nights
  - Recreational programs
  - o Special activities requested by the City Council
- Prepare event timelines, layouts, logistics plans, run-of-show documents, and staffing plans.
- Coordinate staging, sound, lighting, security, EMS, public works, sanitation, and vendor setups.
- Serve as on-site manager during all major events.

#### 5. Vendor, Sponsor & Partner Management

- Recruit, screen, and coordinate vendors, food trucks, performers, service providers, and exhibitors.
- Ensure vendors meet all city requirements, permits, and insurance needs.
- Seek sponsorships from local businesses and organizations to support community activities.
- Maintain strong relationships with civic groups, nonprofits, and community partners.

#### 6. Marketing & Public Communication

#### MUNICIPAL ADVISORY AGREEMENT

This Municipal Advisory Agreement is agreed upon this the \_\_\_\_\_ day of \_\_\_\_\_\_, 2025 by and between the CITY OF TOOL (the "Client") and GOVERNMENT CAPITAL SECURITIES CORPORATION ("GCSC").

WHEREAS, the Client periodically desires to issue debt securities or related indebtedness ("Securities") and is in need of advice on such issuances;

WHEREAS, GCSC has advised a variety of governmental entities and maintains expertise in that area; and will have a fiduciary responsibility to the Client and

WHEREAS, the Client and GCSC desire to establish a relationship, which is terminable as provided herein, pursuant to which GCSC will advise the Client on the issuance of Securities, as well as provide advice pertaining to the structuring and sale of the Securities and other matters.

NOW, THEREFORE, for and in consideration of the mutual covenants and conditions referenced and exchanged herein, the receipt and sufficiency of which is hereby acknowledged, the parties hereto, intending to be legally bound, covenant and agree as follows:

1. Scope of Municipal Advisory Activities to be Performed. GCSC shall serve as the Client's Municipal Advisor for the issuance of the Client's Securities. Such advice can include, as applicable to the Securities to be issued, the following:

Assist in the selection of bond counsel and any other professional services entity in connection with the issuance of the Securities.

Advise as to the obligation structure, considering such factors as, terms, features, maturity amounts and dates, coupon rates, call features, reserve requirements, administrative costs, security features, credit enhancements, and other pertinent factors, and make recommendations to the Client with respect to the appropriateness and adequacy of the obligation structure and features.

Advise the Client generally on alternative financing and loan practices, structures, and programs.

Confer with bond and tax counsel concerning all necessary legal documents and proceedings and obtain their opinion relative to the compliance with limitations and constraints of federal tax regulations applicable to tax-exempt obligations.

Assist in the preparation of preliminary and final official statements, if requested.

Arrange for the purchase of escrow securities, if applicable.

Select a paying agent or trustee, as required, or an escrow agent to hold the escrow securities and make payments on bonds refunded, if applicable.

Meet with the Client and personnel to assist in explaining the Client's Securities, if requested.

Advise the Client of the prevailing bond market conditions and recommend the timing of any public sale or private placement of Securities.

Coordinate the preparation of materials for submission to rating agencies for municipal bond rating.

Attend the bond sale, review the bids received and provide recommendations to the Client and its governing board as to acceptance of a bid; and, if applicable, structure the refunding issue based on the bid accepted.

Assist in the preparation and filing of annual continuing disclosure reports, if applicable, with the MSRB.

Advise, assist, negotiate on behalf of, and make recommendations to the Client regarding the terms and pricing for the Client's securities or other obligations with (a) state or national banks, (b) accredited investors, or (c) qualified institutional buyers.

Advise and assist in the preparation and filing of Arbitrage Rebate reports if needed.

Perform all other duties usually performed by a Municipal Advisor incidental to a financing program as may be requested by the Client. However, GCSC will NOT accept or hold "Good Faith" deposits to the Client provided by Underwriters.

- 2. <u>Independent Registered Municipal Advisor ("IRMA").</u> If acting in the capacity of an Independent Registered Municipal Advisor ("IRMA") with regard to the IRMA exemption of the SEC Rule, GCSC will review all third-party recommendations submitted to GCSC in writing by the Client.
- 3. <u>Compensation.</u> Issuer shall pay a fee for each issuance of Securities which shall be equal to or less than the fee schedule below, plus reasonable expenses to GCSC as compensation for advising the Issuer on the Issuance of Securities. Said payment will be due and payable upon the funding of said Securities. <sup>1</sup>

- 4. Term of Engagement. Client agrees to utilize GCSC as its Municipal Advisor for a period of one (1) year from and after the date of this Agreement or for such period of time until the aforementioned Securities have been successfully funded. It is understood that this agreement shall automatically renew for subsequent one (1) year periods of time. It is recognized that both the Client and GCSC possess the right to terminate this Agreement anytime with or without cause upon thirty (30) days' prior written notice.
- 5. <u>Fiduciary Duty.</u> GCSC is registered as a Municipal Advisor with the SEC and Municipal Securities Rulemaking Board ("MSRB"). As such, GCSC has a Fiduciary duty to the Client and must provide both a Duty of Care and a Duty of Loyalty that entails the following.

#### Duty of Care:

- a) exercise due care in performing its municipal advisory activities;
- b) possess the degree of knowledge and expertise needed to provide the Client with informed advice;
- c) make a reasonable inquiry as to the facts that are relevant to Client's determination as to whether to proceed with a course of action or that form the basis for any advice provided to Client; and
- d) undertake a reasonable investigation to determine that GCSC is not forming any recommendation on materially inaccurate or incomplete information; GCSC must have a reasonable basis for:
  - i. any advice provided to or on behalf of the Client;
  - ii. any representations made in a certificate that it signs that will be reasonably foreseeably relied upon by the Client, any other party involved in the municipal securities transaction or financial product, or investors in Client's securities; and
  - iii. any information provided to the Client or other parties involved in the municipal securities transaction in connection with the preparation of an official statement.

#### **Duty of Loyalty:**

GCSC must deal honestly and with the utmost good faith with the Client and act in Client's best interests without regard to the financial or other interests of GCSC. GCSC will eliminate or provide full and fair disclosure (included herein) to Client about each material conflict of interest (as applicable). GCSC will not engage in municipal advisory activities with Client as an financial entity, if it cannot manage or mitigate its conflicts in a manner that will permit it to act in Client's best interests.

6. <u>Authority to Execute</u>. The individuals signing this Agreement on behalf of GCSC and the Client each represents and warrants that he or she is duly authorized to execute and deliver this Agreement on such party's behalf.

#### Disclosure of Conflicts of Interest and Legal or Disciplinary Events

Pursuant to Municipal Securities Rulemaking Board ("MSRB") Rule G-42, on Duties of Non-Solicitor Municipal Advisors, Municipal Advisors are required to make certain written disclosures to clients and potential clients which include, amongst other things, Conflicts of Interest and any Legal or Disciplinary events of GCSC and its associated persons.

#### **Conflicts of Interest**

#### Compensation

GCSC represents that in connection with the issuance of municipal securities, GCSC may receive compensation from a Client or Obligated Person for services rendered, which compensation is contingent upon the successful closing of a transaction and/or is based on the size of a transaction. #### Other Municipal Advisor Relationships

If GCSC becomes aware of any additional potential or actual conflict of interest after this disclosure, GCSC will disclose the detailed information in writing to the Client or obligated person in a timely manner.

#### **Legal or Disciplinary Events**

GCSC does not have any legal events or disciplinary history on GCSC's Form MA and Form MA-I, which includes information about any criminal actions, regulatory actions, investigations, terminations, judgments, liens, civil judicial actions, customer complaints, arbitrations and civil litigation. - We understand that the City, from time to time, will consider the issuance of debt obligations and that in connection with the authorization, issuance, sale and delivery of such obligations you desire the Mark McLiney Municipal Advisory team to perform professional services in the capacity of Municipal Advisors for the City.
- 2. We agree to provide all services related to the development and implementation of a debt management plan. These services include, but are not limited to, the structuring of a bond model, the formulation of a bond program, the analysis and completion of refunding programs, consultation regarding bond elections, consultation regarding bond ratings, consultation regarding the available types of financings, etc. The services include communicating and coordinating with other professionals involved in bond transactions and related services (e.g. bond counsel, rating agent, credit enhancement providers, verification agent, arbitrage rebate provider, etc.). The advice and assistance includes serving as a fiduciary to the Issuer and representing the Issuer's interest in the sale and distribution of any debt obligations.
- 3. We agree to direct and coordinate the entire program of financing herein contemplated. It is specifically understood and agreed, however, that this obligation on our part shall not cover payment of any expenses associated with the issuance of the obligations or the expenses of any litigation, if such would occur.

As consideration for the services rendered by us and as reimbursement for the expenses which we are to incur, it is understood and agreed that the City is to pay and we are to accept, a cash fee for such professional services in accordance with the fee schedule set forth as follows. Such fee shall become due and payable simultaneously with the delivery of the bonds to the purchaser. It is understood that a miscellaneous expense will be added to the fee to cover reimbursables. This amount shall be capped at \$5,000.

As reflected in the Plan Change Study you previously received, when the employee contribution rate increases, the city's contribution rate will increase to **7.19%** beginning January 1, 2026.

## Ordinance #2025-07, TMRS Rate Match

#### **ORDINANCE NO. 2025-07, TMRS Rate Match**

AN ORDINANCE REGARDING THE CITY OF TOOL'S TEXAS MUNICIPAL RETIREMENT SYSTEM BENEFITS AUTHORIZING (1) AN INCREASE TO THE EMPLOYEE CONTRIBUTION RATE; AND (2) A CHANGE IN THE CITY'S MATCHING RATIO.

WHEREAS, the City of Tool, Texas (the "City"), elected to participate in the Texas Municipal Retirement System (the "System" or "TMRS") pursuant to Subtitle G of Title 8, Texas Government Code, as amended (which subtitle is referred to as the "TMRS Act"); and

**WHEREAS**, each person who is or becomes an employee of the City on or after the effective date of the City's participation in the System in a position that normally requires services of 1,000 hours or more per year ("Employee") shall be a member of the System ("Member") as a condition of their employment; and

WHEREAS, House Bill 3161, 89th Texas Legislature, R.S., 2025, amended TMRS Act §855.401(a) to read that each municipality participating in the System shall designate the rate of Member contributions for Employees and shall elect a rate of five, six, seven, or – effective September 1, 2025 – eight percent of the Employees' compensation; and

**WHEREAS**, pursuant to TMRS Act §855.501, the City is electing to change its "current service annuity reserve on retirement" for its Members, which reserve is more commonly referred to as its City matching ratio; and

WHEREAS, the City Council finds that it is in the public interest to: (1) increase the employee contribution rate contributed to TMRS, and (2) in accordance with TMRS Act §855.501, authorize a change in the City's matching ratio so that the City's match of an Employee's contributions at retirement is increased, now:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TOOL, TEXAS, THAT:

# Section I. Increased Employee Contribution Rate

a) The rate of Employee contributions to be made by the City to the System shall be 6% of the compensation of City Employees who are Members of the System, in accordance with TMRS Act §855.401. The City shall submit a monthly payroll report and deposit the

amounts deducted from Employees' compensation to the System in accordance with TMRS Act §855.402.

b) The increased Employee contribution rate under this Section shall be effective on the first day of the month of January, 2026.

#### Section II.

# Authorization of a Change in City Matching Ratio on the Retirement of TMRS Members Who Were Employees.

- a) For each month of current service rendered to the City by a Member after the effective date of this Section, the City elects to provide, at the time of such Member's retirement, a sum that is 200% of such Member's accumulated contributions (as defined in the TMRS Act) for such month of employment, and said sum shall be a liability of the City's account in the System's benefit accumulation fund in accordance with TMRS Act §§854.002 and 855.501.
- b) The change in City contributions pursuant to this Section shall be effective on the January 1 immediately following the year in which this Ordinance is approved, subject to receipt by the System prior to such January 1.

RESOLVED, that the reimbursement of expenditures contemplated by this declaration is consistent with the Borrower's present budgetary and financial circumstances, and no funds of the Borrower have been reserved, allocated, or otherwise set aside with the specific intent or expectation of payment of the expenditures intended to be reimbursed with proceeds of the Obligations pursuant to this declaration. The Borrower is not aware of other, similar declarations of intent of the Borrower that did not result in the reimbursement of the expenditures described therein. Based on the foregoing and other circumstances relating to the costs of the Project, the Borrower reasonably expects that it will reimburse expenditures paid for such Project with the proceeds of the Obligations.
