What is Lent?

The Lenten season is upon us. Beginning with Ash Wednesday (Feb. 18), and leading to the hope-filled renewal of Easter, the 40 days of Lent involve fasting (abstaining from something to focus on God), praying and giving as a way to connect deeper with God.

In the early church, Lent began as a period of fasting and preparation for baptism by new converts and then became a time of penance by all Christians. Today, Christians focus on their relationship with God, growing as disciples and extending themselves, often choosing to give up something or volunteering and giving of themselves for others.

The origin of the word Lent comes from the "Old English *lencten* *springtime, spring*" and from "West Germanic *langitinaz* *long days or lengthening of the day.*"

The 40-day period of Lent is not a coincidence but a reminder of the time Jesus spent in the wilderness, enduring the temptation of Satan and preparing to begin his ministry. It also stems from other significant biblical events, including:

- Jesus' 40 days of fasting and temptation in the wilderness (Matthew 4:1-11)
- Moses spending 40 days on Mount Sinai receiving the Ten Commandments (Exodus 34:28)

- Elijah's 40-day journey to Mount Horeb (1 Kings 19:8)
- The 40 days of rain during the Great Flood (Genesis 7:12)
- The Israelites' 40 years of wandering the desert (Numbers 14:33)

Sundays in Lent are not counted in the 40 days because each Sunday represents a "mini-Easter." This is why you will see the designation "Sunday in Lent" in the naming of these Sundays. These days are tempered with the joyful anticipation of the Resurrection.

One of the beauties of the Methodist Lent is there is no rulebook to follow. We should use the 40 days of Lent as a time of personal reflection to prepare our hearts and minds for Good Friday and Easter. It is a time of self-examination and reflection.

We might choose to observe Lent by fasting from something like a specific food or drink, or from habits like social media or television watching. Or instead of fasting from something, other disciples take the opportunity of Lent to add or increase a spiritual discipline such as prayer or Bible reading.

No matter how we choose to celebrate the season, may your Lenten season prepare you well for the celebration of our Risen Lord, and may you share this time of remembrance with others.





Women's History Month, celebrated annually in March, honors the vital contributions, achievements and sacrifices of women throughout U.S. history and the world.

In the United Methodist church, the month is used to honor women's roles as leaders, missionaries and

founders. The month aims to combat the historical omission



of women from mainstream educational texts and highlight their roles in society.

Women's History Month began as a local celebration in Santa Rosa, California, in 1978 before becoming a national, month-long observance in 1987.

As part of this year's celebration, the Trinity United Women of Faith circles share their namesakes or those chosen to be celebrated.

Mary McCloud Bethune (1875-1955) was a lifelong Methodist, an African-American educator and a civic leader.

She opened a school for girls which, with the help of the Methodist Church, merged with the Cookman School for Boys to create Bethune-Cookman College (now Bethune-Cookman University).

The University is affiliated with the United Methodist Church and its core values emphasize Christian mission, service, and leadership.

Throughout her life, she was a delegate to four Methodist General Conferences, was an advisor to five U.S. presidents, and the only black woman who was present at the founding of

the United Nations in 1945.

Dr. Bethune stressed the importance of faith throughout her life. She said, "Without faith, nothing is possible. With faith, anything is possible." This quote exemplifies the values that we, as United Methodist Women, believe in.

Suzanna Wesley (1669 - 1742) was one the 24th child of 25 in her family. The daughter of a popular dissenting clergyman, she grew up surrounded by ideas that differed from the established Church of England. As a child, she was encouraged to read and establish her own views challenging ideas she did not agree with.

She herself bore 19 children with Samuel Wesley, however, with the high infant mortality rate only ten reached adulthood.

For her deep faith and remarkable home education she established vigorous spiritual disciplines that shaped her children.

At one point, Samuel was away and because Suzanna didn't like the substitute preacher, she began to preach sermons. Because the locals also did not like the substitute, her "congregations: received well over 200 people.

Through her influence, both her sons John and Charles shaped Methodism's focus on holiness and lay ministry.

For this she is known as the "Mother of Methodism".

Her writings and disciplined life emphasized spiritual growth laying the groundwork for the Methodist movement's focus on personal holiness and practical Christianity.

We have Suzanna Wesley to thank for her life exemplifies perseverance and nurturing the sons of the United Methodist Church of today!

Barbara Heck (1734-1804), considered to be the "Mother of American Methodism," was born in Ireland in 1734 and immigrated to colonial New York in 1760.

Although she was an active church goer in Ireland, she seemed to fall away from the practice until one day when she discovered some friends and family playing cards and drinking adult beverages. She was so angry by their behavior that she marched off to find a preacher because she felt their souls were at risk. She realized that many of the families failed to keep their Christian faith when coming to the new world by seeking fortune and fun which had become the main

focus of their lives.

Following this incident, she gathered the first congregation of six people for a service. She continued to play an active role in converting and organizing other women and brought in many African American slaves and free persons into the fold, making the New York Methodists a biracial community from the start. As the Methodist society grew, it needed new places to meet.

In a little over a year, building the first proper Methodist preaching house was discussed with the bold decision to buy property at 44

John Street.

Once the property was secured, the preaching house, now known at the John Street United Methodist Church, was built in 1768.

A United Methodist congregation still worships there today, and its success led directly to the decision to send superintendents to America who would combine her society with that of others to form the Methodist Episcopal Church (the precursor to the United Methodist Church).

Dot Jordan is the namesake of a circle formed in April 1986 at Trinity.

She was one of the founding members of the Ocean View Chapel Methodist Church, founded in 1946-47 on the Upper Grand Strand in Crescent Beach, prior to Trinity's official name change in 1951.

She was a leader in many areas of service throughout the church, especially in the aesthetics of the sanctuary

and serving on the Worship Committee.

One of the many stories is how she removed drapes from her own home to be used as the dorsal curtain behind the altar in the sanctuary.

She displayed daily strength in her faith and love for her church and the children who attended. She sponsored youth gatherings in her home which was conveniently located across the street from the church.

She was also the first president of the former WSCS (Women's Society of Christian Service), now known as Women in Faith.

Dot was married to A. Elbert Jordan, Sr., and they had two sons, Billy and Elbert, Jr. She sang in the choir and often times could be seen running around in her choir robe greeting guests at the church.

We celebrate Dot Jordan and all she contributed to our church and circle.


