Chairman's Report

It is with pleasure that I report on the activities of the Central Coast Cricket Association for the 2018-19 season.

I would like to express thanks to all member of the Board for their hard work during the year. Also the members of the sub committees for the work that they put in during the year in ensuring that cricket on the Central Coast runs smoothly and is a success.

During the year we had a major change in administration of cricket on the Central Coast with Garry Burkinshaw being appointed as Conference Administrator by Cricket NSW and Dave Winiata as Cricket Manager. I would like to take this opportunity to thank Lindy Peters for all her hard work as the Executive Officer.

Central Coast Cricket had a most successful year on the representative scene again winning the Hogg Silver Shield for being Zone Champions. This result was achieved through the outstanding work of Glen Rowlands as our Zone Academy Coach, his coaching staff and the dedication of all players selected to represent the Coast in the various competitions. The Central Coast had a number of players selected for higher representative honours due to their outstanding efforts throughout the year and all these players are to be congratulated on their achievements.

A major plus for the Central Coast this year was the continued expansion of Women's Cricket with a majority of the District Clubs submitting teams. The standard of this competition improved markedly during the year and the continued expansion of both women's cricket and the introduction of a girl's competition in the 2019/20 season can only improve the standard of cricket and make our game more inclusive.

The Umpire's Association worked hard during the year to keep their numbers to an acceptable level and with the assistance of the Board an initiative was implemented regarding non fully accredited umpires which attracted a number of new persons to the umpiring ranks. We look forward to continuing with this initiative in the 2019/20 season.

The Board also introduced Friday night cricket on turf wickets for our Under 16A competition and although the weather was not conducive to all games being played in the planned format the competition was a success and we look forward to continuing with Friday night cricket for our junior players next season in a new competition.

The new sporting facility at Tuggerah has been officially opened and it is anticipated that in the near future games will be played at this complex and the Board certainly has plans to play cricket at this facility. We will work hard with the Central Coast Council to ensure this happens.

Our financial situation is extremely sound as can be seen from the financial reports and the Board continues to work hard to reduce costs to the clubs to ensure that cricket is a game affordable to all who wish to play. We will continue to work with the clubs to ensure that cricket is affordable and that we remain in a strong financial position.

The Alan Davidson Medal evening was an outstanding success this year with over 200 persons in attendance. This function continues to grow and it is our responsibility to ensure that it is a major event on our calendar each year. I would like to congratulate all the award winners on the night with a special mention to Dave Frazer who was awarded the Malcolm Chalmers Memorial Award for Services to Cricket on the Central Coast.

Unfortunately, our grand final weekend was ruined by poor weather and very little cricket was played however I would like to congratulate all the Premiership Winners and The Entrance Cricket Club for winning the Club Championship.

In conclusion I would like to take this opportunity to thank all our sponsors who without their assistance many of the programs we run would not be possible. Also, a big thank you to the volunteers at all clubs who give so much of their time for little recognition but without whom we could not function.

Conference Administrator Report

The dust has barely settled on the 2018/19 season and already preparations have begun for the 2019/20 season, a season which will usher in significant change.

I congratulate the 2018/19 Premiers, Wyong who claimed their first CCCA 1st Grade Premiership since 2009/10. Congratulations also to The Entrance on making it back-to-back One Day titles and also Warnervale who claimed their inaugural 1st Grade title, when they took home the T20 crown.

Congratulations also to The Entrance on winning the senior Club Championship award and Kincumber Avoca who took out the Junior award, and such was their dominance they won 5 of the 7 Junior premierships.

The season began back in June 2018 with the holding of the Annual General Meeting (AGM). Retiring members, Paul Deaves and Gary Kavanagh were returned to the Executive, whilst former Chairman Dave Frazer did not seek re-election. This position was not filled at the AGM rather it was filled by Stuart Owen in January 2019.

They joined incumbent Executive Members, Bob Archer, Ashley Roche, Glenn Rowlands and Marion Williams to make up the Executive. At the first Executive Meeting Deaves and Kavanagh were re-appointed as Chairman and Vice Chairman respectively.

There was a significant change in the role of Administrative Officer with the CCCA Executive accepting Cricket NSW offer to participate in a Pilot Program to have a Cricket NSW appointed Conference Administrator appointed to the Central Coast.

This position is one of only nine in the State with the role to provide Administrative Support to the CCCA Executive in the running of Central Coast senior and junior cricket. The role will also play a pivotal role in establishing strong links with Cricket NSW which can only be beneficial moving forward. Thanks to Ivan Spyrdz and the Cricket NSW for having faith in the CCCA Executive to be involved in this pilot program. The position is partly funded via a \$20 levy placed on all senior and junior registered players on the Central Coast.

In September, Garry Burkinshaw was appointed to this role which he commenced in October. Burkinshaw is known in CCCA community having filled the role as player, coach, Zone Administrator, CCCA Executive Member and Executive Officer previously.

A big thank you goes to outgoing Executive Officer, Lindy Peters for her tireless work over many years and also to Gary Kavanagh who filled the role for several months between Lindy leaving and Garry commencing the role.

The Executive were very active throughout the season and introduced a number of policies aimed at making Central Coast Cricket an inclusive and a safe environment as well as improving the way in which the Association is administered. Some of these measures included:

- Adopting Cricket Australia's Policy for Safeguarding Children and Young People
- Adopting Cricket Australia's Community Cricket Concussion and Head Trauma Guidelines
- Adopting Cricket NSW's "Local Country Cricket Associations Code of Conduct Procedures"
- Introducing Extreme Heat Policy
- Implementing compulsory on-line registration and payments for juniors
- Implemented Club of the Year Program
- Established Unaccredited Umpire Program
- Co-ordinated "Peak Performance & Injury Prevention for Cricketers" free seminar

- Completed an Audit on all CCCA Facilities and engaged with clubs to establish a facilities "wish list"
- Obtained Grants to off-set affiliation costs for Ladies cricket

Throughout the year quarterly delegates meetings were held and we appreciate the clubs attendance at these meetings.

Once again a number of sub-committees were held to support CCCA operations and these included; Competition/Grounds Committee, Judiciary Committee, Representative Committee and Finance Committee. I thank those people who sat on these committees and I look forward to more people being involved next season.

The 2018/19 season saw 83 men's teams compete across nine senior grades with all ten clubs fielding teams in both 1st & 2nd Grade as well as the Under 21's competition. The Ladies T20 competition continues to flourish with eight teams from seven clubs competing in this competition. Congratulations to Terrigal Matcham on winning the Ladies T20 premiership.

1st & 2nd Grade played a combination of 6 x two-day (90 overs), 6 x one-day (50 overs) & 6 x T20 matches whilst 3rd – 6th Grade played a combination of 7 x two-day matches (80 overs) & 7 x one-day matches (45 overs) whilst 7th – 9th Grade played one day matches (40 overs). 7th – 9th Grade also saw restrictions placed on batsmen in that they had to retire once they reached 50 runs however could return once the last wicket has fallen and there are overs remaining.

The Under 21's competition played 6 x T20 matches, whilst the Ladies T20 competition consisted of 14 x T20 matches.

All competition saw finals played over two weekends with semi-finals consisting of 1 vs 4 & 2 vs 3, with the two winners progressing through to the Grand Final.

The juniors saw 82 teams compete across nine junior age groups. A significant change took place in the 16A competition with the CCCA Executive scheduling this competition to be played on Friday evenings, on turf. Despite a number of individuals attempting to discredit this competition before it started by urging players not to play in the competition, five teams, Lisarow Ourimbah, Terrigal Matcham, Wyong, Warnervale and a Barbarians team, (made up of players from other clubs) played in the inaugural competition.

There were a number of initial teething problems that were fixed on the run, including the ability to transfer matches to synthetic wickets in the event of wet weather (which seemed to be most Friday nights), however overall the initiative was considered a success and will continue in 2019/20 with more clubs expected to nominate teams. Congratulations to Terrigal Matcham on being the inaugural premiers defeating Barbarians in the Grand Final.

With only four teams nominating for the 16A competition, the Competition Committee had no option other than to have an expanded 16B competition which resulted in a significant talent gap between the leading teams and those towards the bottom. The results throughout the season highlighted this gulf.

A similar situation occurred in the Under 14's competition, with only five teams nominating for the 'A' competition. The Competition Committee once again deemed that this was insufficient to host a competition and therefore resulted in just one competition consisting of 14 teams. Once again there was a significant standard difference across the competition. The fixture was adjusted at Christmas for the 2nd half of the year aimed to having more competitive matches.

We all acknowledge that these two competition structures were ideal, however no doubt the problems could have been alleviated if the clubs who had multiple teams in the age groups had graded their teams based on ability. This would have enabled multiple competitions as more teams would have been placed in the 'A' competition.

What was also disappointing was the vitriol directed at CCCA volunteers by club officials who were disappointed with the decisions made. Whilst not all decisions made will please everyone a certain level of respect needs to be maintained.

It is anticipated that the problems encountered this year will be overcome for 2019/20.

The Under 16A's, Under 16B's, Under 14's and Under 13A's competition were non-formatted competition and consisted of a mixture of two day and one day matches. All other competitions were played under Cricket Australia's Stage 2 Format. Mrs Sharon Anderson was appointed as CCCA Formats Change Manager and the assistance she provided clubs in adapting to the new formats was invaluable.

All competition involving two-day matches saw finals played over two weekends with semi-finals consisting of 1 vs 4 & 2 vs 3, with the two winners progressing through to the Grand Final. The formatted competition finals were played over one weekend with semi-finals consisting of 1 vs 4 & 2 vs 3 being played on Saturday with the two winners progressing through to the Grand Final which was played on Sunday.

The Under 11's once again played non-competition cricket with 22 teams split into a North and South Division based on geographics.

All ten clubs ran entry level programs and it was great to see the youngsters participating in Junior and Master Blaster competitions either on a Saturday morning or weekday evenings.

Female cricket continues to grow with the Ladies T20 competition increasing from four teams in 2017/18 to eight teams in 2018/19. Girls Sixers League played Spring and Summer competitions which were played on Monday evenings and whilst the girls showed plenty of enthusiasm, the numbers were not as high as we would have liked. Next season this competition will be moved to Saturday morning whilst an Under 16's girls only competition will be introduced.

In addition to the formal competitions, Women's Social Cricket was played in both Spring and Summer on a Sunday afternoon. Once again, the numbers were not as high as we would have liked, however the women who participated definitely enjoyed themselves and certainly embraced the "social" component of the event. Well done ladies !!! A big thank you to our Female Co-ordinator, Veronica Brown who did a fantastic job in this role and has introduced numerous girls and women to the game of cricket.

Unfortunately, wet weather played havoc on Grand Final weekend with only three of the fourteen Grand Finals being able to reach a conclusion and four games not being able to take the field at all. This resulted in the age old issue of having back-up weekends for Grand Finals however there are a number of reasons why it is difficult to achieve, despite this the CCCA Competition Committee is looking into this issue.

2018/19 was another hectic representative season with the CCCA fielding teams in 8 senior competitions, 10 junior competitions as well as 6 junior carnivals.

At a senior level the CCCA obtained unprecedented success winning the Plan B Regional Bash, Colts, Bradman Cup and Kookaburra Cup as well as reaching the finals of the Opens Championship. This saw the Central Coast retain the Hogg Silver Shield as the leading Country Cricket NSW Zone for the second consecutive season.

On the junior front the Central Coast claimed the Under 15 DCA EG Weblin Shield competition trophy as well as winning the Hunter Valley Under 15 Carnival.

On the back of this success Central Coast players were regular fixtures in higher representative teams.

A highlight during the season was Central Coast junior Greg West making his Sheffield Shield debut for NSW whilst Lauren Smith was a member of NSW's winning WNCL squad.

The success of Central Coast cricket both as teams and individuals can be attributed in part to the investment the CCCA has made into the local Academy. This investment includes the establishment of Taylor Park as the headquarters for the Academy. This investment includes the obtaining of 12 month lease on Taylor Park as well as the upgrading of the Cricket nets. To have access to a ground, nets and turf wickets, 12 months of the year has enabled the Academy to deliver excellent results.

A big congratulations to Zone Academy Coach, Glenn Rowlands and his coaches and support staff on the work they have done with talented players from Under 11's through to Under 18's. Glenn has decided to stand down from his roles with Central Coast Cricket and we would like to thank Glenn for his contribution over many years which has included being named Country Cricket NSW Coach of the Year on four occasions including the past two years.

The CCCA once again held three Presentation nights to celebrate the performances of those players, clubs and officials who excelled throughout the season.

Both the Junior Representative and Junior Competition Presentation Nights were held at Diggers @ The Entrance with in excess of 200 people attending each function. David Redden acted as MC whilst Sydney Sixers WBBL player Hayley Silver-Holmes was the special guest at the Competition Presentation Night.

The Associations Gala off-field event of the year, the Alan Davidson Medal Awards night was held at Central Coast Leagues Club. The event was attended by approximately 200 club representatives and special guests who had an enjoyable night. Mr David Redden was the MC for the night. Congratulations to Adam Taylor on winning the Alan Davidson Medal as the Central Coast's Cricketer of the Year.

Once again the Central Coast Cricket Umpires Association (NCCUA) was again affiliated with the CCCA. The relationship between the CCCA and NCCUA is very positive and this is due to the excellent leadership shown by President, Don Maisey and his committee.

Umpire numbers unfortunately are in decline, although on all bar one match the umpires were able to meet their commitments. Both the NCCUA and CCCA continue to work together in order to develop strategies to attract umpires.

One of these initiatives included the establishment of an Unaccredited Umpires Program.

This program saw interested persons complete an abbreviated training course held over one evening.

13 persons consisting of junior and senior players and parents participated in the program which saw them appointed to Under 16A matches on a Friday night as well as junior matches on the Saturday morning. They also officiated junior and lower grade finals matches. The CCCA paid these umpires \$50 per day for matches in which they officiated.

This program will continue next year and hopefully some of those who were part of the program will gain their umpires accreditation this year.

The Central Coast Cricket Veterans Association was also one again affiliated with the CCCA and under the guidance of their President, Bob Newman and his committee continues to grow.

The highlight of the Veterans season was the holding of the Over 50's World Cup in Sydney which was won by Australia whose squad included the Central Coast's Greg Briggs.

With the growth of our Junior programs as well as the Veterans, Central Coast is now in a position to offer cricket from "womb to tomb".

As always facilities are an important part of Central Coast Cricket and this year 58 grounds were used for our senior and junior competitions, which included 11 turf wickets. With the competitions continuing to grow we are consistently working with council to access more fields for cricket.

During the season there was much angst regarding the conditions of the grounds and in particular the length of the grass on the outfield and also works being completed in grounds without notice. Several meetings were held with council post Christmas to discuss these issues and measures were put in place towards the end of the season which saw an improvement in both areas. We would like to thank David Norbury, Glenn Howe, Brendan Thew, Kim Moriarty, Jodi Clark and their teams at Central Coast Council for their support during season and we look forward to building on this relationship in 2019/20.

2018/19 saw the CCCA receive the support of a growing number of partners, both existing and new, and I would like to acknowledge those partners: Cricket NSW, Diggers @ The Entrance, Central Coast Leagues Club, Ourimbah RSL Club, National Storage – Berkeley Vale and Wilson Security

Sponsorship is an important part of any sporting body whether it be a club or the Association and we are grateful for the support we received. It is important however that we continue to support those businesses which support us.

During the season the CCCA adopted Cricket NSW's "Local Country Cricket Associations Code of Conduct Procedures". These procedures were introduced to ensure common procedures were in place throughout the State and gave clear direction to the types of offences and also level of offences

Overall player behaviour this year was satisfactory with 12 cases referred to the Code of Conduct Commissioner. Thanks to Greg Tunn for filling the role of Code of Conduct Commissioner.

Social Media continues to be a concern with members taking to this platform to air their views which in some cases are not appropriate. The CCCA has a Social Media Policy in place and it is the responsibility of the clubs and their members to ensure that this policy is adhered to.

By-Law and Rule Changes were minimal in 2018/19. A number of appeals were heard by either the CCCA Competition Committee or the CCCA Executive during the year. One appeal for was referred to Country Cricket NSW for their consideration with the appeal being upheld.

Most appeals related to wording or interpretation of either the By-Laws or the Competition Rules and these processes highlighted the need for both these documents to be reviewed and updated. This review will take place prior to the 2019/20 season.

Volunteers are the lifeblood of all clubs and in 2018/19 they once again played an important role and we thank them for that. Congratulations to Sue Bateup, Terrigal Matcham who was named CCCA Volunteer of the Year, whilst Dave Frazer was awarded the prestigious Malcolm Chalmers Award for his services to cricket on the Central Coast.

We thank everyone who filled a volunteer role, no matter how big or small during the year.

Insurance for clubs, players and public liability was again taken out through JLT Sport as part of the National Cricket Program. The senior clubs were invoiced on a per team basis, whilst the juniors premiums were based on a per player basis with their premiums automatically deducted once the player had paid their registration fee via on-line payments.

The Association continued to use My Cricket as their membership database and competition management platform. Player registration was completed on-line for both seniors and juniors whilst juniors were also required to pay registration via on-line payments. This system will be introduced into seniors from next season. Overall the system seemed to work well although there were some teething issues.

A major step forward this year was the use of Livescoring, with all first and second grade matches required to be Livescored. The CCCA provided each club with a tablet to enable this process to be completed. In addition to this, representative matches were also livescored. It was also encouraging to see a number of junior finals matches being livescored as well.

Livescoring is proving to be popular with the supporters who were able to keep up to date with the scores of all matches via the CCCA website and the MyCricket App with the scores able to be viewed via a mobile device.

Another major initiative was the introduction of the Club of the Year program. This program was aimed at improving the clubs administrative practices by providing them with the opportunity to receive financial rewards up to \$1,500.00 for meeting/exceeding their administrative expectations. This year \$10,655.00 was returned to the clubs under this program. Congratulations to Warnervale on claiming the CCCA Club Administration Award.

The CCCA's exposure continues to grow whether it be by way of the three traditional forms (TV, Radio, Newspaper) or by social media. The media and marketing component of the Conference Administrators role is quite significant with communication is seen as very important part of Central Coast Cricket.

With 2018/19 behind us, we look towards 2019/20 with plenty of optimism as we look to continue to improve and grow Central Coast Cricket.

The Central Coast Cricket Association (CCCA) once again had another successful year financially and remain in a strong financial position.

The books have been audited with the final result showing a loss of \$29,505

In addition to the above Country Cricket NSW paid the Zone Administrator and Honorarium of \$9,500.00

Affiliation Fees remained unchanged at \$1,000/team (exc gst) for Seniors whilst the Junior Affiliation fee was reduced to \$50/team (exc gst). This reduction coincided with the introduction of on-line payments which saw the Conference Administrator Fee and Insurance Premium (total \$25) deducted from each on-line registration fee paid. The Affiliation Fee for Women’s Teams was waived following the CCCA obtaining a Grant from the Central Coast Leagues Club and the World T20 Legacy Fund.

Grants for Cricket NSW via NSW Country is quite significant and funds our Representative programs. We are very appreciative of their continued support.

All clubs paid their invoices within the approved repayment term. I would like to thank all the clubs for their diligence in ensuring all accounts were paid on time.

At the end of the financial year there was only one Accounts Receivables totalling \$125 and one with accounts payable totalling \$1,641.18 for an invoice received after 31 May.

During the year a number of small long terms debts were written off totalling \$6,059, the reason why they were allowed to remain outstanding for long term, many in excess of 24 months is unknown.

This year the CCCA made a significant investment into the upgrade of the nets at Taylor Park which is certainly an investment into the future of Central Coast cricket.

As at 31 May 2019 the CCCA had cash reserves of \$107,819.88 which is considered more than satisfactory to conduct their operations.

All taxation obligations have been met and financial records have been audited by the CCCA's Auditor.

Code of Conduct Commissioner Report

The NSW Country Cricket's Association Code of Conduct Procedures were adopted for the 2018/2019 season. These gave clear direction to the types of offences and level of offences and this was well received by all umpires and clubs. Every club was very supportive and co-operative during my investigations.

Most reported offences were graded as Level 1 and thus did not require any judicial hearings. In all there were twelve reports with all but one relating to dissent. Seven of the reports came from the official umpires. While the offences were minor, I'd like to thank and congratulate the umpires for making the effort to submit these reports as I believe it is important that we seek to eliminate all levels and forms of dissent.

One player was given a suspended one-week suspension, the others an official warning which have been recorded for any future offence. These official warnings followed a discussion with the umpires or the clubs that submitted the reports. All reports were submitted on time and most were appropriately concise. As a result, I was able to conduct an investigation early, and I'd like to thank everyone for the quick response given to my calls. This enabled me to review the reports, make a decision and advise the clubs within 24 hours.

Another player was suspended late in the season for inappropriate use of social media. I believe this is a major problem at all levels of sport and would like the CCCA to review their social media policy to see whether it is structured to cope with this ever-increasing problem. I would like clubs to accept some responsibility in educating their players about its appropriate use.

A pleasing aspect of the season was the lack of reports coming from junior games. In recent years I have received reports from junior games where a conflict situation has arisen from junior coaches/managers not being fully aware of the rules/regulations relating to their particular competitions. I received no such reports this year. Coaches are either fully aware of the rules/regulations or have been able to solve their problems amicably at the ground.

Cricket NSW Cricket Manager Report

It has been a year of change for Cricket NSW (CNSW), both across the state and in the local Central Coast region. CNSW have employed 34 new full-time employees into Community Cricket across the state.

The Central Coast region received 3 new full-time employees which are –
Conference Administrator – Garry Burkinshaw
School Participation Officer – Matthew Williams
Club Officer – Maree Knight

Michael Peacock also moved back home to New Zealand with David Winiata being appointed as the Central Coast Cricket Manager.

I would like to acknowledge the CCCA board on their willingness to work even closer with CNSW to manage and grow cricket on the coast.

Cricket in Central Coast Schools

The Central Coast has 103 schools covering Primary, High and Speciality Schools. Cricket continues to be a go to sport within our school community. CNSW has been offering 4 programs for both Primary & High Schools to be involved with. These programs are:

- Mascot Challenge – K to Yr2 (4-week program)
- Sporting Sports – K to Yr8 (4-week program)
- Health PE Programs – K to Yr6
- Woolworths School Cup Gala Days – Yr3 to Yr8

With the introduction of a new CNSW Staff members, CNSW are aiming to have cricket in 75% of Central Coast Schools by 2021.

Cricket in Central Coast Clubs

Central Coast cricket continues to be strong in both Club and Representative Cricket.

Entry Level Programs

This season saw the entry of Woolworths as the major sponsor for entry level programs, taking over from Milo. The rebranding of the entry level programs is - Cricket Blasters.

While there were some hiccups with delivery of Blaster gear, the experience provided by all 10 clubs, through their volunteers, allowed our junior champions to enjoy our great game of cricket.

Central Coast numbers again performed well with both Terrigal Matcham and Kincumber Avoca having the largest numbers/centres.

Junior Blasters: 11% increase in player numbers

Master Blasters: 26% increase in player numbers

I would like to thank all the volunteers that have helped co-ordinate these programs. These children are the future of our cricket clubs.

Junior/Senior Cricket

Junior cricket numbers slightly grew from the previous year (2%).

The CCCA continued the roll out of Formats cricket with Stage 1 (Under 11's) continuing its format from the previous year.

Stage 2 rolled out for U13B, U12A & U12B competitions. Feedback from players and parents have been very positive with the biggest win being player participation within the game.

U13A – U16B continued outside of Formats with next season seeing these age groups moving into Stage 3 Format cricket.

Senior cricket saw participation slightly decline but this saw a lot of our junior players making their debuts into senior ranks. Also with the changed senior structure for games next season, it is anticipated that senior numbers will increase.

Sixers/Social

This season saw the continuation of Girls Sixers league for all girls to play in their own competition. This competition covered girls up to U13's. The girl's competition saw similar numbers return from both the Spring and Summer Competitions.

NNSW and CCCA have worked together to push for girls only cricket competitions to occur now on Saturday mornings and run similar to the boys competition.

Representative Cricket - Seniors

For the first time Central Coast fielded a team in all Cricket NSW Country Championships, with a standalone Under 15's team entered. In addition to this the Central Coast fielded a team in the Sydney Premier Cricket T20 competition (Kingsgrove Cup).

The Central Coast had a dominant season winning the Plan B Regional Bash, Colts Carnival, Bradman Cup and Kookaburra Cup. Were beaten in the final of the Opens Championships whilst also winning their only game in a rain affected Under 18's Women's Carnival. These results have never been achieved previously and will most likely never be achieved again.

These results saw the Central Coast retain the Hogg Silver Trophy as Country Cricket NSW Champion Zone.

Hogg Silver Trophy

The Central Coast has capped off a magnificent representative season by claiming the Hogg Silver Trophy for the second consecutive season.

The Hogg Silver Trophy is awarded to the best performing Zone across the six competitions contest under the Country Cricket NSW Banner.

Points are awarded based on the finishing positions in each competition with 10 points awarded to the winner right through to 1 point for finishing eighth.

With three carnival wins, a runner up and an eighth from the five carnivals contested (the U18's Women's Carnival was washed out), the Central Coast finished with 38 points, a massive 10 points clear of ACT/Southern Districts who finished in second position.

The award does not include the Plan B Regional Bash which the Central Coast also won as this is a Regional competition.

After rain interrupted the scheduled first round, Central Coast accounted for Newcastle Blasters (scoring three runs off the final ball for a one run win) and Hunter Hitman, whilst the match against Lake Mac Attack was declared a draw.

With Newcastle Blasters accounting for Lake Mac Attack, and both accounting for Hunter Hitman the Central Coast Rush topped their pool and progressed to the final, with the three other pool winners.

With the finals being played at the SCG, Central Coast Rush accounted for Coffs Coast Chargers in the semi-final before playing exceptional cricket to defeat ACT Aces in the final, under lights by 28 runs to claim the title.

Ben Cohen was named Player of the Grand Final, whilst Adam Taylor was named Player of the Tournament.

Match Report

Central Coast Rush has been crowned the 2018/19 Plan B Regional Bash Champions after defeating ACT Aces in the final at the SCG today.

The win continues the marvellous run the Central Coast have experienced this year having already claimed the NSW Country Colts (Under 18's), Bradman Cup (Under 16's) and Kookaburra Cup (Under 14's) trophies and on Sunday will be going for an unprecedented clean sweep of all Country Crickey NSW Male competitions when they take on ACT Southern Districts in the McDonalds Country Cricket NSW Championships Final at Wollongong on Sunday.

Relishing the opportunity to play at the historic Sydney Cricket Ground the Central Coast Rush put in a superb all-round performance to defeat the Aces by 28 runs in the final having earlier disposed of Coffs Coast Chargers by seven wickets in the semi-final.

In the final Central Coast won the toss and elected to bat and were able to put together a very competitive 4/152 off their 20 overs. Openers Tony Cornwell and Adam Taylor got the Rush off to an excellent start putting on 40 runs inside five overs before Cornwell was dismissed for a quickfire 21, which included a big six. Taylor followed almost immediately for 19, leaving the Rush at 2/43. Ben Cohen and Steve McCabe came together and continued the good work putting on 63 runs before McCabe was run out for 20. Cohen continued to be the aggressor hitting the Acers spinner for three consecutive boundaries at one stage and he reached 44 runs off 31 balls before he was dismissed. Hayden Murphy and skipper Peter Gallichan then completed the innings with an important partnership of 36 made up of aggressive running and good shot making to enable the Rush to reach 152. Murphy finished unbeaten on 26 and Gallichan on 12.

The Aces were known to have a strong batting attack so the total was well within their capabilities, however they were rocked in the third over when their key opener Tim Floros was run out by a direct hit from Scott Burkinshaw which could also be attributed to the maiden over bowled by Taylor. Despite the loss of the early wicket the Aces batsmen continued to attack and with captain Ethan Bartlett in ominous form raced to 67 in quick fashion. Unfortunately for the Acers Bartlett, having already taken 13 runs of Blair Lindsay's over went to the well one to many times and was well caught on the boundary by Murphy.

The introduction of young spinner Broc Hardy was a master stroke by skipper Gallichan. Sixteen year old Hardy has risen to the occasion on numerous times this year and struck immediately picking up a wicket with his second ball. A 35 run partnership gave the Aces supporters hope, however this evaporated in the space of two overs as Hardy, two (the second courtesy off an excellent stumping by Harry Woodhead) and Chris Archer one, took three wickets for 6 runs to firmly swing the match the Rush's way.

More tight bowling left the Aces needing a miracle with 33 runs needed off two overs. Taylor stepped up to cap off a great game by taking 3 wickets in the 19th over before Burkinshaw ended the match with the final wicket, much to the delight of the players and the many supporters who had made their way to the SCG from the Coast.

Ben Cohen was named player of the match for his 44 and Gallichan got to raise the trophy for the first time for the Central Coast.

It was a magnificent performance by Glenn Rowlands and the team, who in Round one of the pool games needed three runs off the final ball to defeat Newcastle Blaster, had they not got those three runs they would not have made the finals.

In the semi-final a brilliant 77 not out from Steve McCabe saw the Central Coast Russ record a comfortable win in the end over Coffs Coast Chargers.

Having to field first the Rush had to survive an early onslaught from the Chargers to restrict them to 5/134 off their 20 overs. Burkinshaw was the leading wicket taker with 2/34. After losing two early wickets the Rush firstly with McCabe and Taylor 23, then McCabe and Gallichan 23 not out put together successive 50 run plus partnerships to see the pass the Chargers total with 17 balls to spare and for the loss of just three wickets. Former Narara-Wyoming player Richie Gallichan, captaining Coffs Coast Chargers (In a twist of fate against his brother Peter who was captain of the Rush) scored 31 and took 0/14 off his four overs.

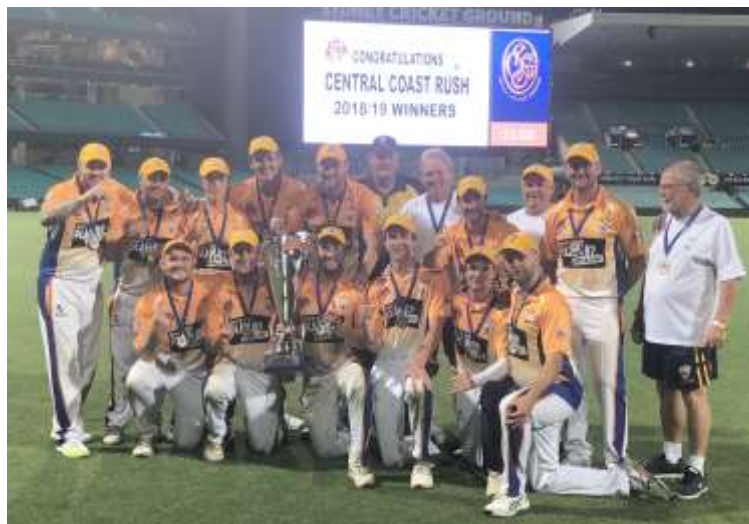

Opens

For the third consecutive season Central Coast came up one game short of claiming their first Country Cricket NSW Championship.

The Central Coast travelled to Inverell to contest the Northern Pool against Central North, North Coastal and Western.

After suffering a narrow loss to the hosts on the opening day, Central Coast hit back strongly with a nine wicket win over Western earning them a bonus point and set up a thrilling final day which had all four Zones still in with a chance to win the carnival having had one win apiece albeit Central Coast were the only team to have obtained a bonus point.

In the final game, batting first Central Coast recovered from 5/49 to post a very competitive 6/257 courtesy of a magnificent unbeaten 118 from Steve McCabe and 63 from Hayden Murphy. In reply North Coastal, courtesy of some brilliant fielding from Broc Hardy and excellent bowling from Scott Burkinshaw and Blair Lindsay were dismissed for 183 and with Western defeating Central North in the other game, without obtaining a bonus point meant Central Coast had progressed through to their third consecutive Country Championship final.


The final was played against newly formed Zone ACT/Southern Districts (formerly Southern Zone) at the superb North Dalton Oval in Wollongong in February.

Match Report

A magnificent century from skipper Peter Gallichan was not enough to lift Central Coast to their first McDonald Country Cricket NSW Country Championship at North Dalton Park, Wollongong today.

Unfortunately, Gallichan's knock was surpassed by ACT Southern Districts, John Rogers who hit a brilliant 175 not out.

It is rare for a century to be scored in the final, but to have two on the same day spoke volumes for the players and also the quality of the wicket.

A former Tasmania and Western Australia Sheffield Shield player, Rogers was the only batsmen of any substance for his side, but his score was sufficient for ACT Southern Districts to score 9/276 off their 50 overs.

Rogers came to the crease in the second over and survived a good spell of bowling from Central Coast paceman Scott Burkinshaw and Kobe Allison.

Once set, he paced his innings superbly and did not give a chance until after he passed his century, which came up in the 34th over.

Burkinshaw finished with the figures of 4/56 and Allison 1/17 off 5 overs whilst youngster Jack Heuston was very impressive bowling at the end of the innings taking 1/30.

The well credentialed left arm spin trio of Chris Archer, Blair Lindsay and Adam Taylor bowled soundly but struggled to make inroads on the excellent batting surface taking just the one wicket between them.

Needing 277 to win the Central Coast lost the early wicket of Tony Cornwall, however Gallichan and Taylor steadied the ship and were starting to get on top when with the score on 74, a misunderstanding saw Taylor run out for 25.

From this point on Steve McCabe 17, Ben Cohen 10 and Broc Hardy 12 all made short cameo's but unable to hang around to establish the one big partnership the Central Coast needed to challenge the big target.

Gallichan brought up his century in the 42nd over, before being dismissed for 107.

The innings was Gallichan's best in a Central Coast shirt with his superb running between wickets and ability to rotate the strike a highlight and provided his side with a chance for victory right up until he was dismissed with the score on 206.

With the chances of victory waning, Harry Woodhead and Chris Archer breathed life into the game with a quickfire 43 run partnership off 5 overs. However, when Archer was run out 14 and Woodhead (31 off 25 balls) became the third run out for innings the final over, the match was over with ACT Southern Districts prevailing by 24 runs.

It was the third year in a row that the Central Coast had finished on the wrong side of the ledger in the final, however the side is resilient and keen to go one better in 2019/20.

Kingsgrove Cup

The Central Coast once again competed in the Sydney Grade Cricket Kingsgrove Cup T20 competition.

The goal of the competition was to be to give the Central Coast's elite players additional opportunities to play against quality opposition.

Due to a number of reasons the Central Coast were unable to consistently put their best team on the field and as such performances suffered with Central Coast failing to win any of their four matches.

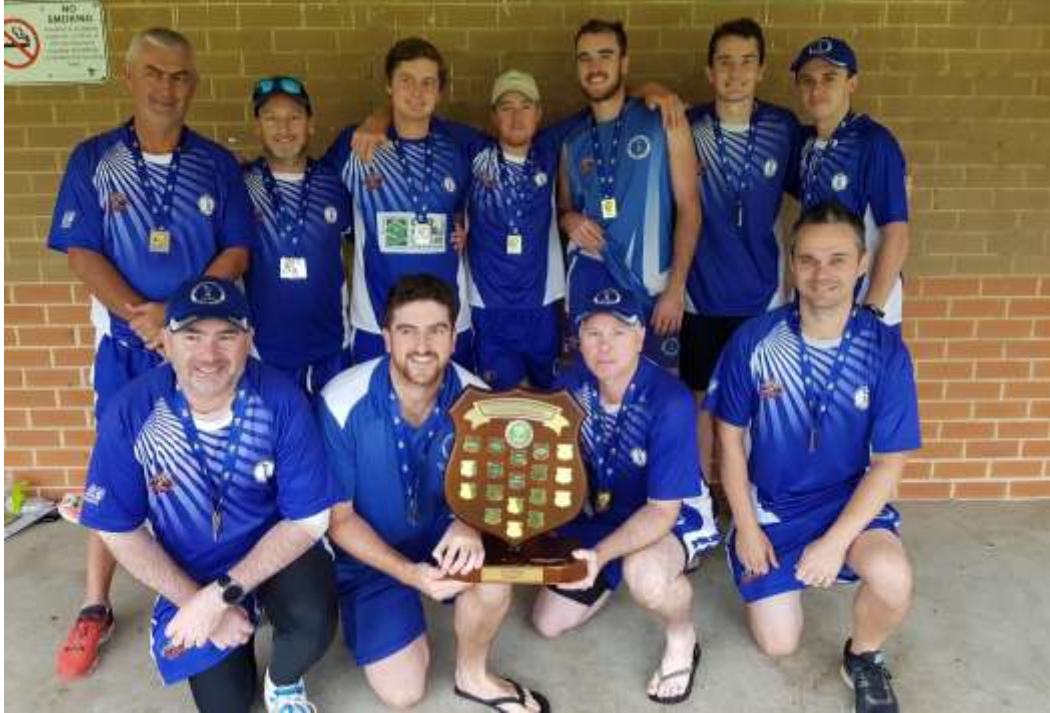

Facilities

As always facilities are an important part of Central Coast Cricket and this year 58 grounds were used for our senior and junior competitions, which included 11 turf wickets. With the competitions continuing to grow we are consistently working with council to access more fields for cricket.

The season began with Council replacing synthetic pitches at Kanwal Oval, Sohier Park # 3 and Rogers Park # 2.

During the season there was much angst regarding the conditions of the grounds and in particular the length of the grass on the outfield and also works being completed in grounds without notice. Council offered reasons or exceptional growing conditions and unusually large amount of machinery breakdown as reasons for the grass height. Several meetings were held with council post Christmas to discuss these issues and measures were put in place towards the end of the season which saw an improvement in both areas.

The highlight of the year was the obtaining of a 12 month lease of Taylor Park. This outcome will enable cricket to have access to a ground, which includes nets as well as turf and synthetic wickets for the whole year. Following on from this the CCCA has invested significantly in the venue by upgrading the cricket nets as well as the turf wicket. Taylor Park is now home to the Cricket Academies as well as the CCCA Representative program.

Another highlight opening of the Central Coast Regional Sporting and Recreational Complex at Tuggerah in March. The facility will attract state and regional events for a number of sports.

The facility will include four cricket grounds with turf pitches including a separate showpiece ground. The turf wickets will be installed in August with plans to have them in use early in 2020.

We look forward to hosting many cricket carnivals at the complex in future years.
