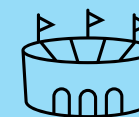

As the 2024/2025 season concludes, we reflect on an eventful and dynamic year for Central Coast Cricket. This season marked significant change and progress for our Association, with a new-look Board and the integration of Cricket NSW's management of the competition. Together, we've achieved great successes, both on and off the field, and have laid a solid foundation for the future of cricket in our region.

We are proud to highlight some of the outstanding achievements during the year from both a Club and Association standpoint:

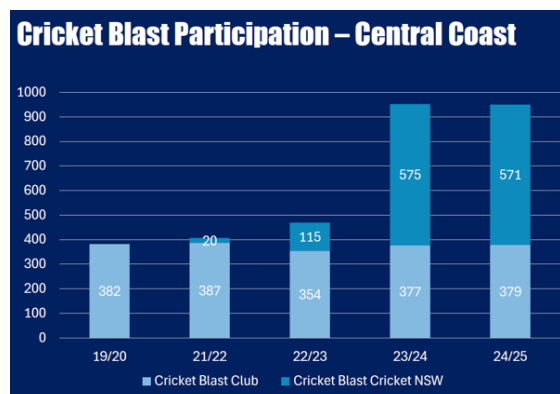
- The Entrance Men's and Lisarow Ourimbah Women's 1st grade teams both achieved the remarkable feat of being crowned champions for the 3rd straight year.
- This was the 1st year of Women's 1st Grade cricket being played with 11-a-side.
- Additionally, we witnessed the Men's 3rd Grade and U14A Boys teams playing on turf for the first time, a sign of the increasing maturity of our competition.



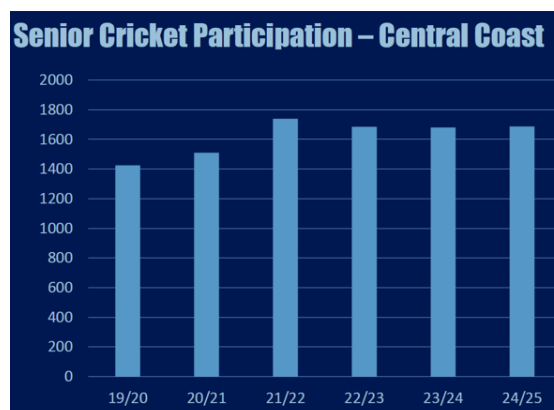
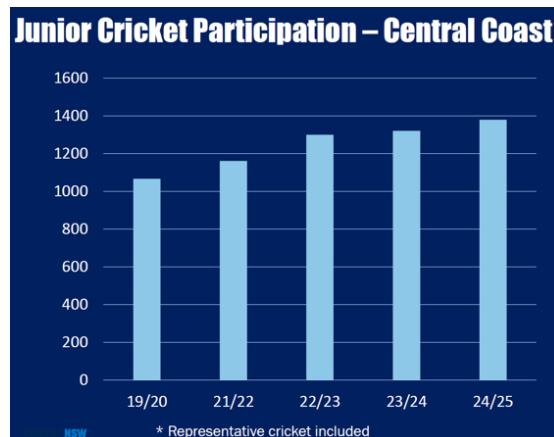
The purpose of this report is to communicate the continued work of the Board and our deep commitment to supporting our clubs and players. We understand the demands on everyone's time, and we are keen to ensure that player participation remains our primary focus. The Board is dedicated to supporting all levels of cricket, from grassroots to elite competition, ensuring that the game continues to grow across the Central Coast region.

Participation and Development:

One of the most promising aspects of the past year has been the continued growth in participation across all age groups and genders. We are delighted to report that our grassroots cricket programs, particularly the Blasters program, have seen an incredible increase, with 379 young Blasters involved.



Our junior cricket numbers have also risen, with 1,380 junior players taking to the field this season, and 1,687 senior players across our clubs. This growth speaks volumes about the growing passion for cricket in our region.



In terms of player development, we have seen significant success with both our male and female youth academies. These academies are producing talented young cricketers who are stepping up to represent not only the Central Coast but also NSW. The quality of coaching provided has played a major role in this, with coaches continuing to deliver world-class programs that help nurture and develop talent.



Facilities and Infrastructure:

Our region continues to improve its facilities, making the experience for players and supporters alike much more enjoyable. This season, more cricket was played at Tuggerah, and all available turf grounds were utilised. The curators have done an excellent job ensuring that our grounds are of the highest standard, which is reflected in the quality of cricket played.

As we look to the future, the focus will continue to be on maintaining and improving our facilities to provide the best possible playing conditions for all involved. Our players, coaches, and supporters deserve the best infrastructure, and we remain committed to ensuring that our facilities continue to improve and evolve.

Volunteer and Community Engagement:

Volunteers are the backbone of any sporting organization, and our clubs are no different. This season, we were fortunate to have so many dedicated volunteers who give their time and energy to help keep cricket thriving across the Central Coast. We are pleased to recognise some outstanding contributions: Brendan Ward was named Volunteer of the Year, while the Malcolm Chalmers award was given to Sharon Anderson and Gary Kavanagh was awarded Life Membership, both for their long-standing dedication to the game.



Our volunteer recognition programs have been incredibly successful, with initiatives such as the Chapman Fruit Volunteer Weekly Award highlighting the invaluable contributions of our community. Additionally, the Club Admin Award was presented to Warnervale for their exceptional administrative support.

Representative Cricket and Performance:

On the representative front, we have seen outstanding performances across our junior and senior teams. The Women's U19 team achieved back-to-back Country Championships, a remarkable accomplishment that showcases the depth of female cricket talent in our region. Furthermore, the U13 Boys team were crowned State Champions, a testament to the dedication and hard work of both players and coaches.

Notable individual performances include Ava Drury, who was selected for the NSW Country U19s, Rochelle Davis, who earned a place in the Australian Country Women's team, and Callum Rainger who was named in the Men's NSW Country side.



Rochelle Davis was recognized as the CCCA Female Rep Player of the Year. Simon Keen was honoured as the CCCA Male Representative Player of the Year, while Alex Cutting and Ava Drury were both awarded CCCA Young Male and Female Representative Players of the Year respectively.

Acknowledgements:

We would like to take this opportunity to recognize the achievements of our clubs, players, and volunteers this season. The Junior Club Championship was awarded to Kincumber, and The Entrance took home the Senior Club Championship. Dave Grainger was named Umpire of the Year for his consistent excellence in officiating, while Peter Cross and Jess Holmes were named Male and Female Captains of the Year.

We also extend our sincere gratitude to our sponsors and partners, whose support makes a huge difference to the success of Central Coast Cricket. A special thank you to Sanitarium, Diggers, Ibis Styles, Aspire Physio, Team Leard Clothing, Sports Coast Trophies, Everything Sports, and Kookaburra for their ongoing contributions.

Finally, we would like to acknowledge the exceptional players of the year. It was with immense pleasure that I was appointed to lead the Competition and Grounds Committee this season and shape the discussions around the future of our competitions at a local level. I want to thank the members of the Committee who put their hand up, as the amount of work this committee does is not always recognised.

The year started off extremely busy as we moved to the Cricket NSW Competition Administrator Support Program, effectively returning the CCCA to having someone fully employed all year round to assist with club administration, finance and competition management. This is something that I have advocated for some time as I believe it allows for the attraction and retention of talent over many years rather than a part time administrator.

This season we were extremely lucky with weather, having the majority of our games and finals played – the unavailability of Harry Moore #1 being unable to be used for the 1st half of the season made for some very difficult fixture placements for the lead up to Christmas, thankfully after Christmas it largely was unaffected.

It was fantastic to get both the Under 14As and 3rd Grade Men's onto turf this season. The feedback from Players and Parents was very positive with the ability to continue to have more Cricket on Turf a continued focus area for the CCCA Executive.

We partnered with Council to deliver more synthetic wicket upgrades, something we are looking to continue to do with grounds that remain problematic across the Coast. The CCCA will also start to develop its long-term Infrastructure Strategy to target key areas on the Central Coast that require upgrading.



Whilst the standard of the grounds and facilities at the Central Coast Regional Sporting and Recreation Complex at Tuggerah are excellent, the cost and availability of this facility is continuing to hamper the growth of Central Coast Cricket – going forward serious discussions need to be had on the use of this facility.

Our competition structure is in my belief needing change – for too long we have focused on mirroring ourselves to align with the Sydney Grade Competition. This obsession I believe is costing us players and the enjoyment of the local competition. The best of our junior players leave before having a solid base in our 1st Grade competition these days as they are wanting to have better coaching and infrastructure opportunities in Sydney. We sit as a part of the Country NSW program with our local competition needing to reflect this.

Whilst Men's grading was relatively fine this year, our player feedback suggests that more needs to be done in the Women's competition, and this is something the CCCA Executive and the Competition Committee will be looking at over the off-season as we do believe there needs to be some changes in this area.

Being more consultive and transparent has been one of the hallmarks of the

Competition Committee and the CCCA Executive this season – moving forward I believe it is not only beneficial to the CCCA but all partner clubs by being as transparent as possible and to have an open communication rather than a combative one.

I'd like to thank the Committee members Sharon Anderson, Luke Mace, Daniel Friend and Dane Stevenson for all their hard work and support especially in my 1st year leading the Committee.

I look forward to coming back next year for what I believe will again be another big year.

It gives me great pleasure to submit my 3rd Central Coast Cricket Association Community Umpire Manager/Educator report.

This season had so many positives which was outstanding to see but knowing there is always room for improvement is also exciting.

Again, I think the relationships, professionalism, knowledge, commitment, rapport and enjoyment across the umpiring group has grown again this year which can only help the cricketing community moving forward.

I personally want to thank the CCCA Board and particularly Trevor Allison for having the faith in me to do this role. The support was incredible throughout the year and for that I am truly grateful. I have thoroughly enjoyed the role and I look forward to doing this for many years to come. It is great working alongside such a great group of people who are so passionate about Central Coast Cricket.

Thank you also to James Figallo, Luke Mace and Clare Thornley for their help and support this season. The relationship between the CCCA and Central Coast Cricket Umpires Association (CCCUA) has never been better and that is a credit to them along with Trevor and the rest of his CCCA Board.



It has been great to work closely with the CCCUA Executive as well in particular David Grainger, Tom Maurer and Stuart Owen. The way they run the CCCUA is a credit to themselves and their members. Congratulations again on other great season gentlemen.

Lastly, thank you so much to the umpires and the Umpires Appointment Panel (James Figallo and Mark Ronson) for your support and hard work this year. It never went unnoticed. You all went out of your way and beyond with your duties throughout the season to assist me so thank you very much.

Please see below a snapshot of the main highlights from the Umpires this year:

- This season has had the most games covered with umpires ever on the Central Coast.
- 95% of games in the top 3 grades (Men's 1st Grade, Men's 2nd Grade and Women's 1st Grade) had 2 umpires in them this season. The remaining matches had 1 umpire.
- All Grand Finals in Juniors and Seniors had 2 umpires in them.
- 3 females umpired a Grand Final. I think this is the first time it has happened on the Central Coast.

- 222 reports have been sent to umpires this year from captains reports for their learning, development and education.
- 60% of games in week 1 of the final series (8th and 9th of March) had 2 umpires in them. The rest of the fixtures have 1 umpire in them across the 58 games on the weekend.
- Had the luxury of using umpires regularly in Men's 3rd Grade games during the year and leading into finals.
- It was so great to regularly have umpires doing Junior games during the season. This is something that hasn't been done before so it was a credit to those umpires who regularly put their hand up to umpire.
- Education Sessions were conducted all the way through the year for all Umpires. This was done through face-to-face sessions and online.
- We had 7 new umpires on board this year.
- 33 umpires were used consistently throughout the year. There were another 6 who assisted throughout the final series.
- Plenty of umpires debuted in higher grades this season.
- Several Central Coast Umpires have umpired in Sydney Premier Cricket this year and numerous representative fixtures across the season.

CRICKET NSW REPORT

Season 2024/25

The 2024/25 Cricket Season on the Central Coast has been a successful one with an increase in the number of Cricket Blasters and Junior playing cricket across our area. Although the wet weather impacted some play, we saw excellent participation outcomes across all age groups and grades. This was the first season of the CASP agreement between the CCCA/Central Coast clubs and Cricket NSW (CNSW). As the local Cricket Manager, I appreciate the way that the association and the clubs worked with CNSW to understand how to make this new arrangement work best for everyone involved.

Cricket Blast

We saw a great reception to the Cricket Blast program again this year with all clubs offering a Term 4 club-based Blast program and half of our clubs offering a second club-based Blast program in Term 1. Special mention to Brisbane Water Cricket Club for getting a Cricket Blast program off the ground this season, and congratulations to The Entrance for increasing their Cricket Blast numbers by 70% to nearly 85 Blasters.




Across the region, CNSW ran Blast Programs in all the school holidays at various locations. We introduced the Breakfast Blast program, which combines Cricket Blast with a healthy breakfast before school starts. We were also successful in receiving a ClubGRANTS from Ettalong Diggers which funded free after school Cricket Blast programs at primary schools at the southern end of the Central Coast.

Junior Cricket


The 2024/25 season saw an increase in Junior Cricket participation numbers. Our new Intro to Cricket Transition program was well-received with 8 teams – including one all-girls team – participating in the program that started just before Christmas and finished up in the first week of March. The move to put U14A cricket on to turf was also a success.



Stage 1 + 2 Cricket Clinics for boys and girls were held in the school holidays at Sohler Park, Taylor Park and Hamlyn Terrace Sports Complex.

Infrastructure

On behalf of the CCCA, CNSW was successful in applying for \$38,000 of ACIF grant money in Round 1 (December 2024) to refurbish/replace 5 synthetic wickets in cooperation with the Central Coast Council. The refurbished grounds (new synthetic laid plus Junior Line Markers) included: Wadalba Sports Complex, McEvoy Oval, Kariong Oval and Pat Morely Oval. The wicket at Patrick Croke was completely replaced and a new wicket was installed that meets CA standards.

PlayHQ and Online Scoring

The Central Coast continues to lead the way with excellence in PlayHQ and online scoring. We finished the year on a 93% rate of games being E-scored (first in the state).



Club Governance

Clubs have continued their reputation of working to comply with all governance standards. As required, each club endorsed the Child Safe Policy and embedded this policy into their club documentation and processes.

Congratulations on a fantastic season. I appreciate everyone's support as I settled into my first season as your Cricket Manager. I look forward to working together with you all as we plan and move into next season.

Competition Administration

With the first year of the CCCA coming on board to Cricket NSW Competition Administration Support Program, I would like to thank all clubs for their patience throughout the year as we transitioned into the new process and systems under this new partnership. CNSW are proud and honoured to have such a successful Association on board with our strategic partnership.

FINANCE REPORT



The Central Coast Cricket Association once again had another successful year financially and remains in a strong financial position.

I want to start by thanking several people who have helped me immensely in my first year as the Treasurer for the CCCA. Firstly, thank you Garry Burkinshaw for providing me with a fabulous handover and always being available to answer any questions I had. Secondly, thank you to Evan Grantham and the team at James M Ryan Partners, our Association accountants, who were always available to help me. Thirdly, thank you David Winiata for always being available for me to bounce questions off. Lastly, a big thank you to Marion Williams, James Figallo and Jack Wilson who were all excellent contributors on the Finance Committee this year.

This financial year the CCCA entered into a Strategic Partnership Agreement with Cricket NSW (CNSW) under which CNSW was responsible, with oversight from the CCCA Board, for both the operational and financial management of the CCCA Competition. Under this Agreement, the income and expenses related to the CCCA Competition sat with CNSW, so outside the CCCA books. This should be noted for year-on-year financial comparative purposes.

For the year ended 30 April 2025, the CCCA has reported a net profit of \$46,353. This result included \$38,000 of grant income that was put towards the resurfacing of 5 synthetic wickets. If you exclude this abnormal item, the profit from normal operations was \$8,353. This compares against the prior year reported net profit of \$11,711. The prior year result also included \$9,446 that related to grant income received that was put towards the purchase of a roller. So, the comparable year on year operating results excluding these abnormal items is really \$8,353 for this year versus \$2,265 for the previous year. A positive variance of just over \$6,000.

As of 30 April 2025, the CCCA had cash reserves of \$228,966 (2023/24 \$95,283) in addition to \$43,970 (2023/24 \$43,866) held in the Zone Account and \$2,451 (2023/24 \$2,455) held in the Grant Funds Account. It should be noted that there was payable outstanding at the end of the financial year for Ground Fees payable to Central Coast Council of \$113,260. The settlement of this amount was delayed due to some points of clarification with Central Coast Council. Netting this amount off, the year-on-year comparable CCCA cash reserves was \$115,706, which compares well against the \$95,283 from the previous year. The CCCA reserves are considered satisfactory to meet the CCCA financial obligations and fund ongoing operations.

The CCCA financials are comprised of two distinct profit/(loss) centres. The first being the Zone, which incorporates our Representative and Cricket Academy programs; the second being the CCCA Operations (excluding the Competition income and expenses which, as outlined above, are now carried by CNSW).

For the year ended 30 April 2025, the Zone profit/(loss) centre reported a net profit of \$7,181.

Cricket NSW again demonstrated its direct commitment to Central Coast cricket by allocating a total of \$66,539 to the CCCA for the development of cricket in the Central Coast Zone. The CCCA used the funds to facilitate Academy, and Representative cricket programs.

The Cricket Academy ran at a net deficit (Income \$11,305 less expenses \$12,590) for the year of \$1,285, compared to \$536 the previous year. The CCCA Board are more than happy to utilise Zone funds to provide subsidisation to this excellent program for our up-and-coming cricketers.

Zone clothing ran at a net deficit (Income \$12,164 less expenses \$26,114) for the year of \$13,950. This represented a \$3,984 increase over the previous year's deficit. This increase reflected that fact that a complete refurb of the Zone clothing was undertaken during the season to cater for the addition of a new major CCCA sponsor in Sanitarium. The CCCA also continues to make Zone clothing available to participants at subsidised rates.

The Youth Championships ran at a net deficit (Income \$20,673 less expenses \$24,256) for the year of \$3,583, compared to \$7,692 the previous year. Again, the CCCA Board are more than happy to utilise Zone funds to provide subsidisation for our up-and-coming cricketers.

The CCCA was also able to renegotiate some improved rates for our Storage Unit (which is largely used to store Zone clothing and equipment), translating to year-on-year savings of approximately \$2,000.

For the year ended 30 April 2025, the CCCA Operations (excluding the Competition income and expenses which are now carried by CNSW) has reported a net profit of \$39,172. This result included \$38,000 of grant income that was put towards the resurfacing of 5 synthetic wickets. If you exclude this abnormal item, the profit from normal operations was \$8,353.

The CCCA can't grow the great game of cricket on Central Coast without the support of our Sponsors. I'm pleased to be able to report that Sponsorship income for the year increased by just over \$13,000 to \$ 30,983. The team at Sanitarium came on board as a major sponsor this year, and we continued to have wonderful support from Diggers at the Entrance as a major sponsor, and Aspire Physiotherapy, IBIS Styles, Sportscoast Trophies and Embroidery, Team Leard, and Everything Sports. Chapman's Quality Fruits also came on board to provide fruit to our Volunteer recognition award recipients. The team at Kookaburra also continued to provide a cricket ball rebate (sitting within the CNSW Competition profit/(loss) centre). Once again, a big thankyou to all our Sponsors.

The CCCA ran a successful U12 carnival on the Coast in January. The carnival generated a net profit (carnival fees of \$8,100 less expenses of \$5,599) of \$2,500. The CCCA is planning another U12 carnival, with an expanded number of teams taking part, for January 2026.

A total of \$18,500 of honorariums were paid from the CCCA Operations profit/(loss) centre in the 2024/25 season. It should be noted that the honorariums paid for the Umpire Manager / Educator (\$5,000) and the Tuggerah Manager (\$5,000) were recovered from CNSW (included in CNSW Recoveries income) as these honorariums were deemed to sit within the CNSW Competition budget. This means that the net honorariums paid from the CCCA Operations profit/(loss) centre in the 2024/25 season was \$8,500, compared to \$35,500 in the prior year.

Printing and Stationery expenses incurred in the 2024/25 financial year reduced by approximately \$4,300 (84%). This reflected the fact that the printing of scorebooks is included in the CNSW Competition profit/(loss) centre this season, and we did not do a formal print run of the Annual Report (we will provide printed copies on a request basis but typically the Annual Report will be made available via our CCCA website in PDF format).

Bank interest received in the CCCA bank accounts was down by \$985 in the 2024/25 financial year, largely reflecting the fact that the affiliation fees and CASP fees payable by the clubs in 2024/25 were payable to CNSW rather than to the CCCA. This meant that the CCCA held less cash in its bank accounts at various times throughout the year compared to 2023/24.

Board member expenses were up by \$479 in the 2024/25 financial year, largely reflecting the fact that board uniforms were purchased for three new Board Members, and the existing Board members were also issued with new uniforms given the addition of a new major sponsor in Sanitarium.

The CNSW Competition profit/(loss) centre preliminary results for the 2024/25 season as shown below. As outlined earlier, this CNSW Competition profit/(loss) centre does not form part of the audited CCCA accounts. The CNSW Competition profit/(loss) centre results will be finalised following the CNSW Financial Year end which is 30 June.

INTEGRITY REPORT

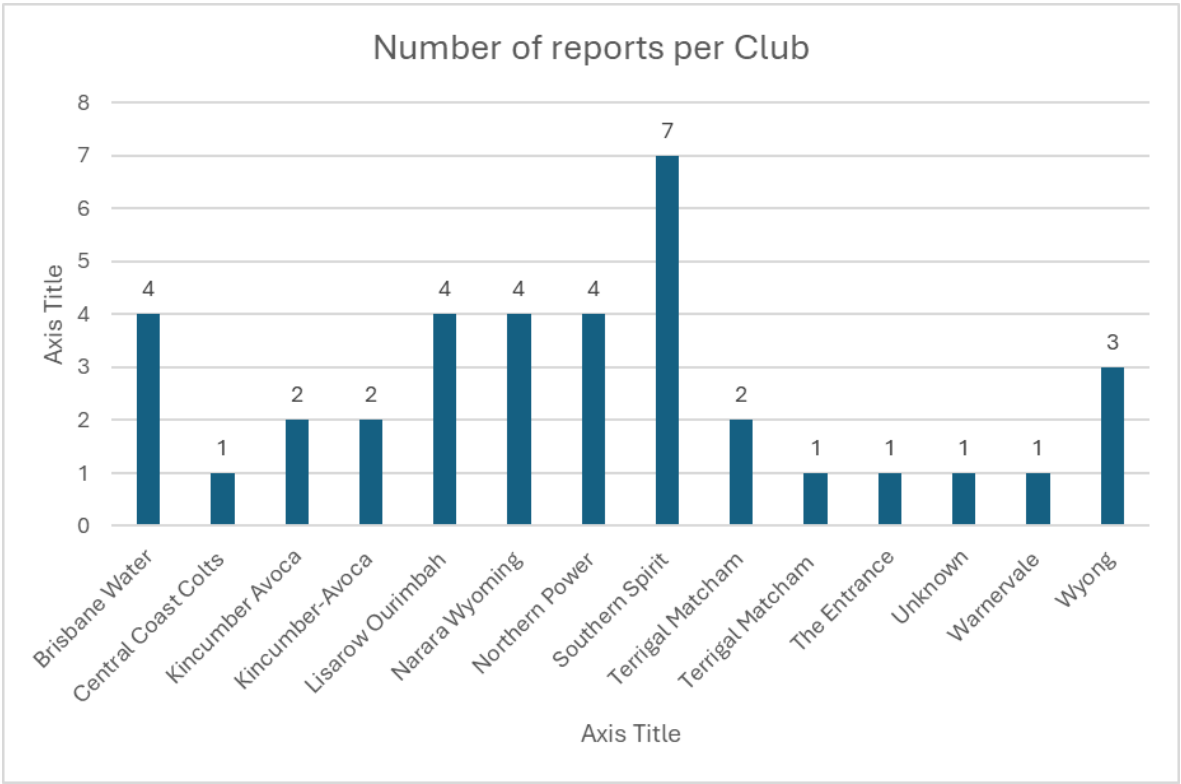
For the 2045/24 season, Cricket NSW assumed management of Code of Conduct reports for the Central Coast Cricket Association. The work of the Integrity Unit seeks to create a respectful, safe and inclusive environment for cricket.

Disappointingly Its first year was a busy one, with the Integrity Unit receiving 37 reports from the CCCA during the 2024/25 season. This is up from 18 reports being dealt with by the CCCA Code of Conduct Commissioner in the 2023/24 season.



Of the 37 reports received, 18 came from Umpires reports, 16 from Clubs, and 1 from Other.

This is an area the CCCA, and all its Clubs and players, will need to improve on in the year head, and we remind everyone that cricket is a game built on respect.
