

Planning a School Visit to a Hindu Mandir: **A Guide for UK Teachers**

Organising a school visit to a Hindu Mandir can be an enriching and educational experience for pupils, offering them the opportunity to learn about Hinduism and its practices first-hand. This guide provides practical steps to help you plan a meaningful and respectful visit.

Step 1: Research and select a Mandir

- 1. Identify a Local Mandir: You can find a list of Hindu Mandirs online. Alternatively, you can use online searches to find a Hindu Mandir near your school. Consider its size, facilities and willingness to host school groups.
 - o For larger Mandirs, such as the BAPS Shri Swaminarayan Mandir in London, check their website for school visit programmes.
- 2. **Understand the Mandir's Practices:** Research the specific traditions followed at the Mandir to tailor the visit to your curriculum goals.

Step 2: Contact the Mandir

- 1. **Make Initial Contact:** Reach out via phone or email to introduce yourself and explain your intention to organise a school visit. Confirm they can accommodate your group size and age range.
- 2. **Discuss the Visit:** During your communication:
 - o Explain the purpose of the visit and its connection to the curriculum.
 - o Confirm availability, suitable dates and timings.
 - Ask if a guide or speaker can provide a talk or tour.
 - o Check if any materials or worksheets are provided.



3. **Clarify Costs:** Inquire about any suggested donations or fees. Most Mandirs welcome donations to support their activities.

Step 3: Prepare the Students

- 1. **Teach Key Concepts:** Provide an overview of Hinduism, including beliefs, practices, and the significance of Mandirs.
 - o Focus on concepts like dharma, puja (worship) and the importance of deities.
- 2. Discuss Respectful Behaviour: Educate students on cultural etiquette:
 - o Dress modestly (e.g., no sleeveless tops or shorts).
 - o Remove shoes before entering the prayer area.
 - o Speak quietly and behave respectfully.
- 3. **Plan Questions:** Encourage students to prepare thoughtful questions to ask during the visit.

Step 4: Logistics and Planning

- 1. Organise Transport: Arrange transport to and from the Mandir, ensuring the journey fits within the school day.
- 2. **Obtain Permissions:** Send permission slips to parents, detailing the purpose, location, and timings of the visit.
- 3. Confirm Numbers: Inform the Mandir of the final number of attendees, including teachers and any parent volunteers.
- 4. **Prepare Resources:** Bring notebooks, pens, or pre-prepared worksheets for students to complete during or after the visit.

Step 5: On the Day of the Visit

- Arrival: Aim to arrive on time and assemble the group before entering the Mandir.
 Shoes must be removed before entering a mandir. Please place shoes neatly on rack provided.
- 2. **Introduction:** Follow the instructions provided by the Mandir staff or guide. They may start with a brief introduction about the Mandir's history and significance.
- 3. **Observe and Participate:** Encourage students to observe rituals, listen attentively, and participate respectfully if invited (e.g., receiving prasad, a sanctified offering).
- 4. **Ask Questions:** Allow students to ask their prepared questions during appropriate moments.



Step 6: Follow-Up Activities

- 1. **Classroom Discussion:** Reflect on the visit by discussing students' observations and what they learned.
- 2. **Student worksheets**: Please see Hindu Education Board UK website for downloadable student worksheets to complete, which helps to consolidate learning.
- 3. **Creative Projects:** Encourage students to create posters, author essays, or give presentations about their experience.
- 4. **Send Thanks:** Write a thank-you letter to the Mandir, expressing gratitude for their hospitality.

Additional Tips

- Involve Parents: Invite parent volunteers to join the visit for additional support.
- Adapt for SEN Pupils: Ensure the visit is accessible for students with special educational needs by discussing requirements with the Mandir in advance.
- Photography: Ask in advance if photography is allowed and explain restrictions to the students.

By following these steps, you can ensure a well-organised and meaningful visit that fosters respect and understanding of Hindu Dharma and culture.
