Introduction to The Chronicles 2025


When we applied to the Heritage Lottery Fund for our Storyboat project in 2019, we were asked to give the value of our volunteers' time donated to the church. Our estimation was over £50,000 each year. I was fascinated to discover recently the value of churches' contribution to the UK. Last year independent economic analysis commissioned by the National Churches Trust put the economic and social value of churches to the country at £55 billion a year. You might want to read that figure again. It is an extraordinary amount.

Churches contribute to the health and well-being of individuals and communities in a variety of ways. Some of those are high profile and conspicuous, some distinctly hidden (do you know who cleans the toilets in our churches?). Some people are able to give substantial amounts of money or to give sacrificially (the two are not always the same) to support God's ministry and mission in Portishead. Many give generously and sacrificially of their time, gifts and expertise. Whatever you give to God's work here, thank you.

Why do we give time, talents and money to support the church? We give because we are excited by the impact that the church makes on people's lives, enabling them to experience and come to know the love of Christ and to take a step into the life in all its fullness that he offers. The descriptions of different aspects of the life of our church contained in this year's Chronicles are a fantastic reminder of the vitality, life and impact of the church. Thank you to everybody. Baptisms 2025 – Gill Ogden

We are blessed to welcome families who come to us asking for Baptism for their babies and children.

Baptism numbers have dropped in the last couple of years, so Baptism prep is now done individually by the Clergy who is due to conduct the service. This does now enable the Baptism service to be more personal to the individual family.

Baptisms still happen mostly on a Sunday afternoon. Some church families may have a Baptism in the 9.45am service and there have been a few sea Baptisms over the past few years.

We invite families to bring their child to a church service, usually the 9.45am Special, to be welcomed into the Church family where we will give them a Children's Bible.

Gill C & Lesley F keep in contact with families by sending Birthday cards and invites to Baptism anniversaries in the 9.45 service and we keep families updated with all the relevant church family events.

We pray that this will set the seed for children and their families, that they might come to and engage with church activities to begin their faith journey.

The Portishead ringers have had quite an eventful year. A year or two ago, the sixth bell was deemed to be unfit to ring due to a dangerous crack appearing. We are now enjoying ringing on all eight bells once again and have completed several quarter peals since completion of the work. We are now raising money for new bell ropes!

Our two 'new' ringers are progressing well and enjoying the challenge (I think)! We always welcome anyone who would like to have a go. Just come along to any Tuesday evening practice from 7.30-9.

Bereavement Support Group - Tonya

Betwixt and Between (BnB) – Simon & Sarah Stevens

BnB is the monthly opportunity to reflect on the last Café Church and to plan for the next. We are thankful for the openness of those who come (all are welcome) and to the ways in which God can speak through all manner of topics. We hope that the bonds of fellowship would grow during the next year and that we would be open to the promptings of the Holy Spirit. Please pray that Café Church would continue to minister to all ages and to all the groups of people that come.

CAP - Tonya

Many people are at breaking point due to unmanageable debts and other issues. They live in fear of post coming through the letter box, of phone calls and texts and of enforcement agents at the door. They live with their curtains closed and in fear of confrontation. It affects their physical and mental health. We meet with people and let them talk and make some sort of sense of how they got to where they are. Then we give them a plan and route out of the chaos.

We are thankful that CAP gives us a chance to meet the real poverty in our neighbourhood. We meet their physical needs and also their emotional and spiritual deprivation. We aim to build people up and to restore their confidence in themselves. It is heartwarming to see the change in their physical environment as they begin to realise they are not alone after all and they can take care of themselves and their homes.

Many clients are suicidal. It is seen by society as a way out. Many people feel great shame at being in debt. We have professional people in good jobs and those who have never worked who are at breaking point. To lift the darkness, we need your prayers for these people who maybe unknown to us but never forgotten by God. Please pray for them to have the confidence to reach out and seek help. Pray for us to have the right words, and to be there to help them rebuild their shattered lives.

Church Tots - Lesley Flanders & Gill Colston

Church Tots meets on Tuesday afternoons in term times for parents, grandparents, carers and their children (up to school age) for some action songs, a bible story, short prayer and a craft activity. This is followed by a drink and biscuit and toy time for the children and a cup of tea and time to chat for the adults while the children play.

We are a friendly welcoming group which is valued by those who attend and we are grateful for the support of those who come regularly, but over the years the numbers attending have become fewer.

We would love to be joined by more families and would ask for prayers to help us know how we can adapt to achieve this and develop further.

Eco Group - Lindsay

The Eco Group has been active for less than a year, and we are deeply grateful for the enthusiasm and involvement of the church community in the Eco Church initiative. It has been encouraging to see engagement not only within our congregation but also with local schools, community groups, and other churches in the parish. This shared commitment to caring for creation has strengthened our connections and inspired action.

Looking ahead, we are excited to develop new projects that will further raise awareness of Eco Church and encourage sustainable living. One focus will be exploring ways to promote environmentally friendly lifestyles within our community. Additionally, we hope to introduce sustainable church flowers, ensuring that even our places of worship reflect our commitment to caring for creation.

We ask for prayers for our fragile world and for the small steps we take as a community to make a difference.

Ethics Forum - David Tyers

We aim to hold two meetings per year focusing on contemporary ethical topics. Each session is led by an 'expert' speaker who delivers a presentation followed by a Q&A and Discussion. Our goal is to make the sessions accessible to a broad segment of the community while avoiding a solely Christian perspective.

Over the past year, we have explored two areas: Mental Capacity and International Law. We are grateful to have found excellent speakers willing to donate their time voluntarily without a fee. However, we typically offer a modest donation to a charity of the speaker's choice.

We would appreciate prayers for the planning group's wisdom in selecting suitable topics and speakers who can provide a balanced yet challenging overview of the subject.

Gordano School Chaplain - Simon Stevens

We were sad when Gordano School felt unable to sustain the chaplaincy post, though we remain grateful for all that Becky Cox was able to do. God, though, has continued to work and a number of avenues have opened up.

1. Verity has been appointed as a Flourish Chaplain at both Gordano and Chew Valley secondary schools
2. The RE/PSHE team at Gordano are keen to have visits from Saltmine Theatre Company.
3. We have made a link with Transforming Lives for Good. This will provide mentoring opportunities for church members to be involved with both primary schools in Portishead and at Gordano School.

Please give thanks for these activities and for the willing leaders. Please pray for all these to develop in line with God's will. Please also pray that the messages of hope and unconditional love will come through loud and clear. As many of these are inter-church

activities and also involve large complex schools, please also pray that communication will be straightforward!

Haven – Rob Eastwood Dewing

Haven was conceived out of my experience of mindfulness and contemplative prayer. Many have found mindfulness a useful too - especially in the days during and after Covid when levels of anxiety were so high. Contemplative prayer sometimes feels like one of the Church's best kept secrets. It combines all the benefits of mindfulness with connection with our loving Creator and Sustainer. What is more it is rooted in Centuries of Christian wisdom.

Haven takes place at 6.00pm on the Third Sunday of the month in St Peter's Church. It consists of 45 minutes of silence, mindfulness music and gently guided prayer. Every month a small group gather and spend a little time exploring a theme and connecting with God. Nobody will ask you to speak – it is just a chance to be. It is a joy to see people spending time in a quiet, gently doing business with God. We would love to see a few more people join us.

Tuesday Evening Home Group

We are a new home group that started in the late autumn and now have ten members. We meet weekly on Tuesday Evenings from 8 - 9.30 during term time and start by catching up over coffee, tea and cookies before studying a passage of the Bible together.

Home Group at the Finches – Graham Finch

2024 has been a fruitful year for our group. Attendance remained steady at around 9 and occasionally 11 if we all attend, and we have one "virtual" member who participates on-line.

We meet usually twice per month, with a break in August and this year we have dipped into Acts, (we paused for Lent so we could participate in the Parish Lent course), Psalms, and the book of James.

Beginning with prayer, we read the passage aloud and then discuss what we have gleaned from the words. We spend about an hour in discussion. By getting and offering different views and asking questions we get so much more from our study of scripture.

At the first meeting in the month, we share coffee and biscuits, then at the second we share a simple jacket potato meal. In this way we can nurture our fellowship and care for each other.

We support each other in prayer. There has been need for those unwell, operations and, joyously, we had a wedding to celebrate from within our group. It is wonderful to be able to share our joys and concerns in prayer and we thank God for all his blessings on us.

We pray that our group can continue to enjoy our time together and that God will open our minds to delve deeper into His Word.

Home Group – Rodney Wheeler

Our small group took several weeks to read and discuss the two Letters from St Peter to his scattered followers for whom he specially wished Grace and Peace from his and their God above. He particularly wished that they would build up seven key Christian characteristics, ending with Love. We prayed together and tried to encourage each other to follow suit.

We then spent several weeks studying sections from the second half of Isaiah, looking particularly at and for OT pointers towards the first and second comings of the Lord Jesus. This proved to be a relatively difficult task partly because of the repetitious nature of the writing and also because Isaiah was even more concerned with what was then the future release of the Jews from their Babylonian captivity. (Perhaps the OT prophets are best studied privately at home with a bandage around the ears).

We then changed tack and followed a text book entitled "The seven great 'I am's claimed by Jesus " as listed in St John's gospel, In fact we found about twice that number of 'I am' claims if we included verses equivalent to an 'I am' claim .

We then watched and listened to a series of extremely well produced videos from the Bible Society entitled 'The Bible Course' in which the overall messages from the Bible were distilled into just 8 very tight but rigorous sessions, emphasising the togetherness of God's message to his world . This has put us in the right frame of mind to join the rest of the parish in studying during Lent another video-based course on Prayer.

Lighthouse Café – Gill Colston

The Lighthouse Café opened in 2014 and celebrated the 10th anniversary last year.

Over the years many people have been welcomed to the Café and enjoyed tea, coffee and homemade cakes. There is always someone to chat to and many otherwise lonely people are grateful for the welcome and companionship they receive. We are able to offer lifts to a small number of visitors who would not otherwise be able to attend.

We are so grateful to all our volunteers, whether welcomer's, kitchen helpers, cake makers or drivers. Additional help for any of these roles is always welcome and your prayers are asked that we will be able to continue to run the café in the future. Lighthouse Carer's Group – Pearl Walker

We are grateful to those who regularly help us at the monthly meetings. It is a great encouragement.

As far as is possible, we try to have one to one care for those with dementia, and this leaves the carers to enjoy refreshments, and chat with other carers, and also with Vicky, and other professionals who come to give a listening ear, and advice.

We also have a number of carers, whose loved ones are now being looked after in Residential Homes, who come along to enjoy a natter with others who are in the 'same

boat'. As we are an independent group, we receive a grant from a local charity, and this enables us to provide equipment needed, as well as paying Vicky an allowance for her professional leadership and paying the church for the heating etc.. Last year, Rosemary and Paul Reid, organised a concert, which boosted our funds, when they were getting rather low, and we are grateful to them.

This group is vitally important to those who come along. They so appreciate the love and help they are given. Anyone interested should please speak with one of the Trustees.

Llads – Ed Broyd

Once again this year Llads proved to be a valuable community group operating with a small but very efficient group of volunteers from the congregations of both St Peter's and St Nicholas'. On the second Saturday of each month, between 15-20 fathers brought their children to the St Barnabas Children's Centre for an hour or so of fun activities, delicious drinks and snacks and (most importantly) quality time with each other and a supportive peer group. We have hosted families from across the local area and we have seen an increase in this since similar groups in Clevedon and Nailsea stopped operating, either through lack of volunteer support or through lack of funds. We thank God that our group has been able to continue to flourish so positively.

Over the coming year I hope that we continue to develop the relationships we have with the families that use our group, as well as providing a safe space for new members to come and join our community. I hope also that others can see that volunteering can be as simple as giving two hours a month to the parish community. I would ask that you hold in your prayers those fathers and families who use our group as a welcoming haven in what might be an otherwise unpredictable and challenging set of circumstances.

Martha's Kitchen - Lindsay

This will save time setting up, and also avoid barging through the coffee queue at the end of the service.

Please pray for continued inspiration as we lead, and for the children to be able to attend regularly so that we can get to know them better. More helpers would also mean the possibility of adding an extra monthly session. A proper space of our own would be ideal - which would become a necessity if numbers of children attending were to increase. But most of all, pray for our children, that they will know that they are loved and valued, and that their names are 'written in the palm of God's hand'.

Refresh is such a special place where parents, grandparents and carers can bring their babies and toddlers into St Peter's Church on a Tuesday morning. We are so thankful for the relationships formed, the journey's shared and the support and encouragement shown - usually over a coffee and slice of Gill's wonderful cake! It always makes me smile to see the church building filled with such colour, vibrancy and joy. It has been a privilege to walk with some families over a number of years and to be able to welcome new families who have just started attending.

There is a transient nature to such a group as children grow up and go to school. We'd appreciate prayer for how we can maintain connections with families we have built strong relationships with and that they might deepen their connection with the wider church family through ministry such as The Gathering and 9.45am Special.

Setting Sail – Rob Eastwood Dewing

Setting Sail was conceived as an opportunity to explore together some of the foundations of the Christian Faith. It is aimed particularly at those who are exploring the possibility of faith. Over 5 weeks we look at God as Creator, Son and Spirit as well as Community and Service. It begins where people are and give some simple exercises to try at home to enable us to open ourselves up to the God who, as we believe, longs to be in a relationship with us.

We have had two small Setting Sail groups which I have led. Thanks to Trish Margerison who joined me on the most recent. It has been an encouragement to see participants being open (with one another and to God) and to see faith grow within them. I am thankful to God for their involvement and engagement. St. Nicholas Choir - Roy Jukes

St. Nicholas Choir is small in numbers (nine members normally, but ten on the third Sunday of the month when I am relegated to the choir pews) but enthusiastic in leading the singing during Sunday worship. We meet to rehearse in the Lady Chapel at 4.30pm on Thursday afternoons.

Over the years patterns of worship have changed and the requirement for an introit and anthem at each service have long gone. The annual choir festival at Wells and the yearly Deanery Festival have become a thing of the past. The presentation of a Good Friday cantata is no longer possible and the incentive to prepare for these events is no longer with us.

Nevertheless we will work to the best of our ability to play our part in the work of the church. Short anthems arranged for the voices available and the introduction of new hymns and others no longer available in the books we use are introduced during the taking of communion and we pray that our efforts are an acceptable part of morning worship.

Table Talk – Mark

Table Talk offers the chance to meet with others, share coffee and cake together and talk about things that matter. We get together once a month in the community room at Portishead Library, and use 'Table Talk' cards to provoke conversation around a variety of issues. These have included themes such as hope, justice, bereavement and wellbeing.

We are thankful to see God at work in the deepening of relationships among those who attend. A gift of this space is that it allows people to share their stories together and to be as open and vulnerable as they feel safe to do so. We don't shy away from talking about difficult things and the conversation is always life-giving. Even when there is disagreement, people's views and experiences are always heard and held with grace and care.

Please pray that Table Talk would continue to be a safe space for people to share in this way, for the strength of relationships to continue to grow, and that it also might be accessible for any who would value being a part of such a group.

The Gathering – Mark

The Gathering is a Messy Church which creates space for all who attend to encounter and deepen their connection with God and each other through songs, stories, food, crafts and fun. Meeting in St Peter's School, it is a welcoming, joyful, creative and intergenerational community, and is particularly accessible for those who might not attend more traditional forms of church.
