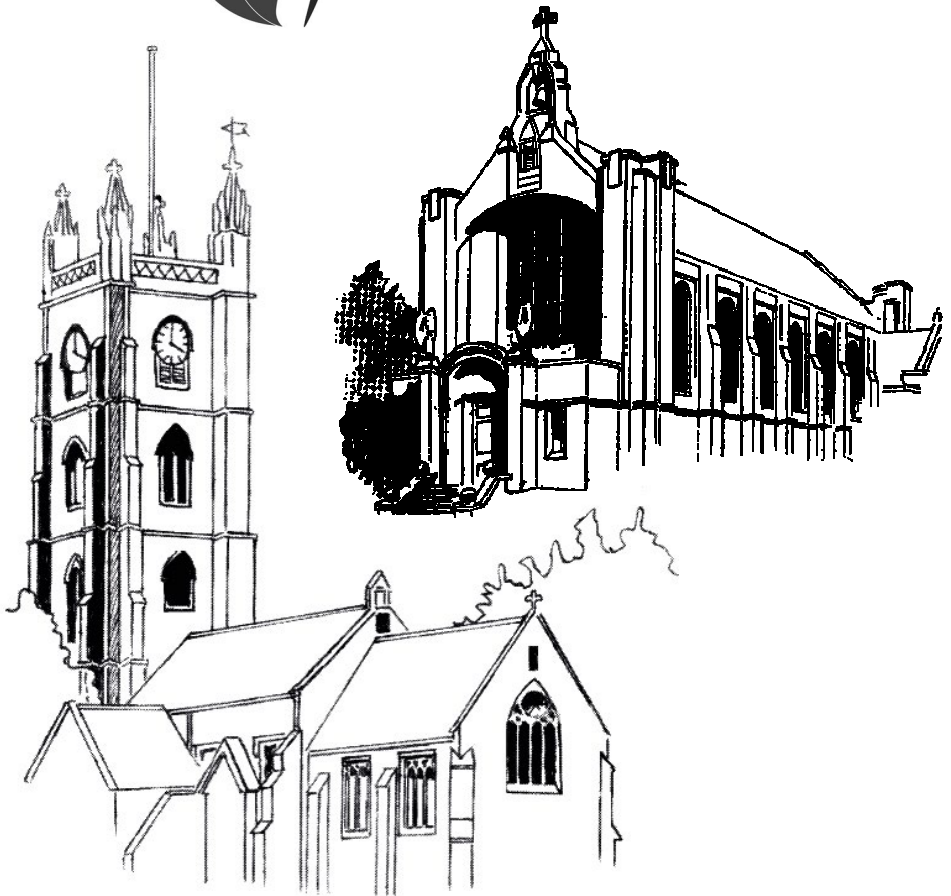

A letter from Simon

Marmite

This month sees the start of the 104 games of the men's football World Cup in Mexico, USA and Canada. Football is a bit like Marmite in that it divides people. If it fills you with dread, then you're in accord with the puritan preachers of the 16th century. They felt there was too much violence in matches. You may be aware, however, that many of the older football clubs in the UK started due, in part, to influence from local churches. The word fan is short for 'fanatic', a word laden with connotations. One unintended dark side to the World Cup is that incidences of domestic violence will, doubtless, rise.

Sociologists tell us about 'collective effervescence'. This is the bond that fans (and players) have due to a common interest, even if they don't know each other. This idea, that we can be part of something bigger that can transform lives, sounds a lot like religion. Why not, this year, try to find out something about Christians in one or more of the World Cup countries? England play Croatia, Ghana and Panama in the group stages so that might be a good starting place.

Five countries that are participating are in the 'top' twenty-five countries that persecute Christians. Can you find out which they are and pray for churches there?

Here's a bit of a challenge. If you are one of the estimated 3.5 billion football fans in the world, do you speak as enthusiastically about your faith or about church? If you buy tickets to matches or subscribe to channels so you can watch football, how does that compare to your giving to church or charity?

"Lord of all the nations, who played the cosmos into being, guide, guard and protect all who work or play in the World Cup. May all find in this competition a source of celebration, an experience of common humanity and a growing attitude of generous sportsmanship to others. Amen"

I trust that you will be happy watching lots of football or happy because you're managing to avoid it! God bless.

How to give advice

Over the last few years, I have attended a lot of training, ranging from safeguarding, first aid, food hygiene and many things in between. But now and then, you attend something that genuinely opens your eyes. Recently, I joined a training session run by Citizens Advice, and it did exactly that. I knew the organisation was helpful. I didn't realise how much they can *transform people's lives*.

We were shown a few figures that stopped the whole room in its tracks. For every £1 spent on Citizens Advice, people receive £13.48 in benefits. Over just one year, their work saved public services £783 million. And their overall value to society? A staggering £5.3 billion. It's an amazing organisation that quietly and steadily gives people hope and a chance to move out of debt and into a place of stability.

What was really brought home during the training was just how much damage we can do by giving well-intentioned bad advice, whether by sharing our own personal experience or, even worse, someone else's.

Their website is a treasure trove of clear, reliable information, and it's always worth checking before sharing a pearl of wisdom that we believe is correct. Another plus: we have a local Citizens Advice drop-in at the Folk Hall every Friday, 9:00 am to 4:30 pm. No appointment needed, just friendly expertise when people need it most.

A Special Concert With Our New Piano

On the evening of 25th April, a nearly full St Nicholas Church played host to a concert celebrating a very special arrival in the parish: the new Kawai electric piano, with a demonstration of its amazing versatility. You want the sound (well, nearly) of a concert grand? Or a harpsichord? Harp? Guitar? No problem, all available as required. The concert was organised by Paul and Rosemary Reid who have already contributed so much to the musical life of the parish and on this occasion enhanced it further with their daughter Helen, who is a professional pianist on the international recital circuit, and their granddaughter Willow Baines, a chorister at Bristol Cathedral who came to sing two solos. As at previous concerts, a women's chorus and men's chorus were drawn from members of the choirs of St Peter's and St Nicolas Churches and Portishead Choral Society.

Helen led the programme with a dazzling performance of three works by Debussy, which was followed by a Handel sonata for treble recorder (played by Paul) and harpsichord setting (played by Rosemary). There seemed no end to the versatility on offer, as the ladies' choir sang two beautiful Moravian folk songs (new to most of us) set by Dvorak, and Paul sang two Shakespeare songs by Gerald Finzi. More piano works by Chopin, Schubert and Gershwin followed.

The second half of the concert also included four Tudor-age madrigals sung unaccompanied, the Serenade for guitar and seductive baritone voice from Mozart's *Don Giovanni*; and for her second solo Willow sang, with exquisite poise and intonation, 'All that Jazz' from *Chicago*. By now we were well and truly into Broadway mood but before winding up, our men's chorus performed a couple of numbers from Gilbert and Sullivan's *HMS Pinafore* and *The Pirates of Penzance*. Finally, the audience joined the singers in four of the timeless songs from *South Pacific*. One or two of the men were a bit worried that the women seemed to be singing 'I'm a gonna wash that man right outa my hair' as if they really meant it!

A wonderful evening. It combined gratitude for the generosity shown at this and previous concerts in raising the money for the piano, and other special donations, with real anticipation for the continuing musical enrichment, in all its forms, of our parish life.

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Earthy God

One of my colleagues in the school Art department got me thinking recently. As I was heaving a pile of small clay houses into a bucket of water to soak down, she stopped and asked me what I was doing. "Recycling Jerusalem" says I. "Students at school and families at church were invited to help bring the Easter story to life by building a mini clay Jerusalem on the steps of the old cross outside St Peter's Church porch. It was fun, but it was always going to be temporary, and I need to recycle the clay."

"Ah yes" said she, "I saw them making the houses. Didn't you do something like that at Christmas too – to make Bethlehem? Have you used the same clay?" Indeed we had.

It is one of the many wonderful things about clay. Until it is fired, it is just mud – earthy clay. It can be recycled many times. It dries out, but can be wetted down, left to soak and mend before being partially dried out then 'wedged up' - ready to be made into the next creation.

So there I was, up to my elbows in a bucket of clay slurry musing on God stuff.

Way back at the Church Decorating Morning in December, we had helped make the church and ourselves ready for Christmas. Folk of all ages had populated a mini-Bethlehem scene with little clay people, shepherds, kings and angels. There were of course - alongside the everyday characters and animals, the odd penguin (and was it an octopus?) peering in at the (several!) baby clay Jesuses in the stable. I love this - the God who came down to earth to be with us was modelled out of earth by us.

And then, fast forward 33 years in a few months. The Bethlehem clay had been recycled, and that same earth was used to create a mini-Jerusalem. Students from Gordano and families at church turned up to literally remember the places where our earthy, down-to-earth Jesus ate with his friends, was tried, killed, buried and raised from death. The focus this time was not so much on God on meeting everyday people, but God in action in the middle of their everyday places of work, worship and leisure. We wondered what the houses would have looked like that Jesus saw. Do you think there should be a well somewhere? Where might they have stood as he carried the cross? Where should we put the tomb? The clay helped us wonder again at this so down-to earth God who met people in their everyday lives and places in first century Palestine.

And now I am recycling the clay again and can't help but wonder what it might get used for next. The next seismic event of course was the sending of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost. Our down-to-earth God envisioning and empowering down to earth people. Sending them out to change the world around them with the news of his love. People not so very unlike us in our everyday muddy, messy lives. It makes me wonder what a Pentecost scene out of clay might look like. Perhaps I'll ask my colleague her opinion. Or the kids. They'll have an idea.

Portishead Ethics Forum -Human Genetic Manipulation: The Good, the Bad and the Ugly

On 27 April the Portishead Ethics Forum was privileged to welcome as visiting speaker Keith Fox, Emeritus Professor at the University of Southampton, former Director of the Faraday Institute for Science and Religion and Curate of Highfield Church, Southampton.

Keith prefaced his talk by remarking that at least some of what he would go on to say would sound to his audience like science fiction; but that the science fiction of today has a habit of becoming science fact tomorrow.

Life isn't fair! – a maxim with which most people would agree. Some are born with inherent genetic advantages: robust health, latent talents and abilities, physical capacity etc, denied in part or whole to others. At the extreme end of the spectrum, some inherit incapacitating or life-limiting medical conditions. Wouldn't it be nice if we could choose our genes? Given the steadily increasing powers of medical science, the question is a reasonable one, which Keith proceeded to answer, not with an outright negative but with a clearly-articulated warning of 'Be careful what you wish for'.

Keith explained that there are between 4,000 and 6,000 diagnosed genetic disorders and that about 1 in 25 children is affected. What if we could 'cut and paste' faulty genes just as we do with computer text? Going on to explain in some detail the types of cells which make up the human body, he revealed that genome editing is already much more easily possible than most of us would think. In a recent case in China, a medical professional claims to have 'made' the world's first known 'gene-edited' twin babies, genetically immune to HIV infection in later life. (Nb Not a criticism of the Chinese regulatory framework surrounding genetic manipulation – if the person in question really did do this, he was acting in direct contravention of the rules). This claim has been widely condemned in the scientific community as: not therapeutic and hence unnecessary; unethical; having limited informed consent; and carrying the unknown risks of unintended consequences. Posing the question 'So is genome modification actually necessary?', Keith answered 'In many cases, no.', as there are other ways to screen for single gene diseases. For complex characteristics DNA is not a blueprint, and genes do very little by themselves; acting within complex networks, they simply provide a landscape of possibilities.

Going on to consider what, then, if anything, we should seek to genetically modify, Keith set out his belief that human diversity is part of what it takes to make society. In short, human life is a gift, not an achievement. Every parent wants the best for their child. But if we begin modifying the gift, where do we stop? Human reproduction is, he underlined, a personal non-manipulative process which includes an element of mystery in the resulting child's future. Contrast this with technological 'making' of modified babies, reducing them to 'products of our own clever creating' and a compromised parent/child relationship. Consumerism also rears its head at this point:

in the US (though not the UK) it is legal to offer commercially-available scientific help to prospective parents to compare and contrast different embryos produced during IVF, so as to optimize the eventually resulting chosen foetus against a range of desiderata e.g. reduced likelihood of autism or cancer; or even simply stature, eye or hair colour and so forth. Is this a form of eugenics [briefly, the belief that society can be manipulated by manipulation of the individuals born into it]. Belief in genetic determinism tends to lead to more conservative ideologies, in particular that society's problems lie not in its structure but in some of the individuals who live in it. The 'solution' is therefore to change, or even eliminate, those individuals. Keith remarked that this is a chilling reminder of the Nazi 'Final Solution'.

Rounding up his talk, Keith set out his belief that, made in the image of God, all people have worth and dignity, regardless of what they can or cannot do, or of their ability to contribute to society. Genetic variation is an example of our individual human uniqueness. It is the whole person who responds to God. Our mandate from God is to act as His representatives and responsibly care for His creation. Curing diseases and alleviating suffering fall within that responsibility, and the properly morally-guided application of science is one way in which we fulfil that calling. We should act as God's collaborators, being careful not to misuse that power or think that we are, or even desire to be, God.

St Peter's Church Ethics Forum committee express their thanks to Keith for his talk on such an important subject. Donations by attendees have enabled the sum of £94 to be donated to Keith's nominated charity, the Faraday Institute for Science and Religion.

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Unplanned Prayer

My days are marked by plans—so many plans. They fill my diary, light up my phone. Meetings to plan meetings. Meetings to reflect on plans. Meetings to reflect on how the plan to plan the meeting went.

I wonder where God's plan (God's mission) is in all this planning. It's not that God is absent; it's that our attention is crowded. It seems that if we are not careful, we can over-plan, pushing God's mission to the edges. Our planning can become so loud that the gentle movements of the Spirit remain unheard, and the Spirit-filled voice dwelling among us has no safe space to speak. She remains unseen because God's mission has been quietly filed under *AOB* (*any other business*), the last item on an agenda already running over.

Even when we begin a meeting with prayer and invite the Holy Spirit into our gathering, we can still miss the moment when a prophetic voice in the room whispers wisdom and truth.

There is a lovely verse in Zechariah, 4:10

“Do not despise these small beginnings, for the Lord rejoices to see the work begin”.

It's such a practical message, to rejoice in the small things, as the paths God invites us to walk are rarely straightforward, and may take us off plan into unexpected directions, and that's part of the adventure, part of God's Mission. It's a call to keep looking for those small beginnings, the small things that God is already doing.

During the tidy-up morning at St Peter's, we took down and prayed the prayers from the prayer tree—seventy-five handwritten prayers. Seventy-five moments when someone stepped into the church seeking connection, comfort, conversation, or simply a quiet moment with God.

The tree covered in fairy lights was a gift donated to the church, as were the used birthday cards cut into labels. God breathed on these humble gifts, made them something really special, and showed us that God is always at work in the small, unnoticed places.

As we held each prayer, read each hope, we were reminded that the simple act of keeping the church open could be a small beginning for many. A quiet threshold where seekers crossed, searching for nothing more—and nothing less—than a meeting place with God.

And as we prayed over those prayers, we rejoiced—not in our planning, but in God's.
