A comment was recently made to me, which went something like this:

'Don't you get fed up that many people come to church only at Easter & Christmas? Why is it that they don't attend at other times?'

I found myself inwardly sighing and wondering what to say in response? As I feel these sorts of questions need to be asked in a different way. Being critical is not the way forward, rather I think the question ought to be: What is it that brings people to church at Easter and Christmas?

This is not an easy question to answer, people's reasons for coming is I suspect complex. Perhaps ranging from, 'it just feels right', to 'it's what you do' or 'to belong to something bigger than yourself'.

Easter arrives at the end of this month. It's the festival where chocolate eggs are eaten and enjoyed – of course! It is the festival which speaks of newness – birth, resurrection, hope; all these speak of our humanity.

I believe we are spiritual beings, as well as physical and emotional ones. And at times such as Easter and Christmas this can rise within us and we may reflect on questions such as beginning of new life and its ending.

Easter and Christmas are celebratory festivals and so those who do not normally come to church, come. And perhaps by coming they give themselves permission to ponder on the baby born and the man who died and rose again. And maybe during these festivals love is born again in each of us.

The services in the centre pages of this magazine give details of what is going on in church during Holy Week and the Easter period. If you feel the desire to come; for whatever reason (including the Easter Egg Hunt on Easter Day!), together we can share in the wonder and awe of the season.

Should you walk through the church door, welcome and not criticism awaits......Come & see.



New life for all the world



Sowing seeds, chitting potatoes, choosing varieties. Easter acts as starter's orders for the gardening year. Beds are cultivated, lawns mown, plans for all the growth and new life that spring and summer will bring made and then turned into action.

There's a much greater connection between gardening and Easter than it merely being the time to dust off forks and spades. For in the Bible, a garden is the setting for Easter itself. In John's Gospel (Jn 20:1-18) Mary Magdalene meets the risen Jesus in a garden. Indeed, Jesus's appearance to Mary is so unexpected that at first she can't believe it's really him. So she mistakes the man she meets 'supposing him to be the gardener' (John 20:15).

In John's account, all the new life contained in the first Easter chimes with a much earlier story set in a garden too. This is of the new life of another man and woman, the creation story of Adam and Eve in the Garden of Eden and contained in the book of Genesis (Genesis 2:4- 3:24). In that story, Adam is the gardener (Gen 2:15), only for things to go wrong.

In John, Jesus is portrayed as the new Adam – come to bring new life that has no end.

What would happen if we were to think of our churches as gardens, primed to welcome the spring that is the new life of Jesus this Easter? What would happen if we imagined ourselves called to be gardeners – like our father Adam and the new Adam, Jesus? What would we expect to grow? What might need pruning or weeding? What new plans for the coming season would we make and turn into action? What would be the harvest that we'd sow for, tend and then reap?

For I reckon we should see Easter as the starting point of all that God wants to do among us and with us. Jesus's resurrection opens us to being part of God's new creation. Easter offers us a fresh start for life, relationships and the life of our churches: new life for all the world.

Happy gardening and a very Happy Easter to you all.

Contemporary Ethics Forum:

Support or Abuse?: The Mental Capacity Act in Practice St. Peter's Church: Monday, 15th April 7:30 - 9:30pm

Most of us have concerns about what will happen if we are no longer able to manage our own affairs due to a loss of mental capacity. We are delighted to welcome Dr. Peter Carpenter, retired Consultant Psychiatrist, to lead the next Ethics Forum. Peter will help us explore mental capacity, principles and conundrums in practice, the Mental Capacity Act and other related legal issues. His presentation will be followed by questions and open discussion.

Peter worked as a consultant psychiatrist in Bristol. He was for several years a special medical visitor for the Court of Protection and for the Public Guardian, writing legal reports on capacity and assessing people when there were concerns about lasting powers of attorney. He was co-opted to advise on the NICE clinical guidelines on mental capacity and advance directives and has taught extensively on the Mental Capacity Act.

All are welcome. No tickets are required and admission is free (donations towards costs are invited). We also plan to livestream the forum to the church YouTube channel:

Ammerdown @ 50!



The Ammerdown Centre opened in 1973 and I have been a friend of the Centre since its early days. Last September, on a sunny weekend we celebrate the 50th anniversary. It was a joyful occasion and Lord Hylton who is now over 90, was there and spoke about the origins of the Centre. The Hylton family own Ammerdown House and estate near Radstock and in the 1970s he with John Todd the publisher and others, felt the need for an ecumenical Christian Centre. working for peace and reconciliation and for greater understanding between people of different faiths. Their dream became a reality and the extensive stable buildings were developed into a conference and retreat centre with bedrooms and a beautiful simple chapel. The horses must have been very well housed and the dining room is still on the site of their stables!

The first director was Andrew Aldrich, a Methodist and the house was run by the Sisters of Zion, a Catholic order who promoted good relations between Christians and Jews. We were delighted that six of

the Sisters came back in September and they told many tales of the early days! One of the Sisters had the job of catering for the resident community and guests, having had little previous catering experience.

From the start the programme was full and varied, including an annual Catholic week and many courses and retreats which were usually open to all. The Centre offered so much, a warm welcome from a caring community and a chance to meet others of different religious backgrounds, a rare opportunity for many of us at that time. I have vivid memories of a Christian Jewish weekend which started with the Passover meal on the Friday evening, when Rabbi Lionel Blue presided with his fund of stories!

Later there were courses for sixth form students as part f their RE studies on Judaism and Islam. The opportunity to meet and share experiences with those of other faiths was challenging but very rewarding.

Over fifty years, we have seen a variety of directors and the Sisters left a few years ago when they were needed elsewhere.

The Centre buildings have been extended, the bedrooms updated and are now all ensuite and the facilities for people with mobility problems much improved. With inspired leadership Ammerdown weathered the challenges of the pandemic and a much reduced income. Rough sleepers were housed for a while, the rooms were redecorated and old mattresses replaced. Importantly using zoom to offer several short courses, meetings and events the Centre connected with many old friends and kept Ammerdown alive. One event I joined in was a Passover meal presided over by a woman rabbi and her son, a wonderful opportunity to understand the meaning of the rituals of this special meal.

Good relations with local groups, churches and other faiths in Bath and Bristol have been formed. Some evening events with speakers such as Lord Dibbs and Terry Waite have attracted large audiences and have also made the Centre and its objectives better known.

At the anniversary we started with the Passover meal and heard the traditional prayers and together we broke bread and drank grape juice. Over the weekend there were sessions looking at the history of Ammerdown and sharing memories and of course thinking how we go forward. Working for peace and reconciliation and justice remain central and the Centre is very aware of the demands of climate change.

Bishop Peter Price spoke movingly on Justice and Reconciliation, an excellent speaker who is a child of the Windrush generation spoke of the legacy of that time. On Sunday there was an interfaith "service" when we learned more of other faith traditions and which started with a young rabbi blowing the rams horn – very loud indeed!

Later that day a Christian ecumenical service was held and attended by many local people. A fitting close to a memorable celebration.

Ammerdown is at its heart a Christian Centre, open to those of other faiths or none. The work for peace and reconciliation, justice and interfaith dialogue remain central. There are retreats and a variety of courses on offer and a full programme is available each quarter. The house is warm and welcoming, the accommodation simple but comfortable, the food excellent and plentiful and the grounds are beautiful with many walks. In the spring the birdsong is amazing and in autumn the avenue of beeches is all reds and gold! What more could you wish for? Do go and see for yourself!

Thoughts on the Rapture

One of the most astonishing promises in Scripture is contained in the prophecy recorded by the Apostle John in Revelation 7 9-17 where it is stated that a huge (too many to count) number of Christian believers will be taken by God, away from a future, very troubled world to serve Him for ever in heaven. That is, without having first gone through the process of dying. The Church has called this future event the Rapture, although that word is not a translation from the Greek.

The seven years preceding the Second Coming of Christ are often referred to as the Tribulation. It seems that the Christian Church will only be partly tolerated in the first half of that period. After the leaders of the ten most powerful nations hand over their authority to a single world dictator (Rev 17 12,13) otherwise known as the Anti-Christ or the Beast or Satan, the plight of believers will greatly increase. The Anti-Christ will proclaim himself as God and even set up an image of himself in Jerusalem for people to worship. John would have understood this prophecy only too well. In the second half of the first century AD, several Roman Emperors proclaimed that they were divine and expected that temples should be built to allow people to worship him or his image. In fact John had been exiled from Asia Minor to the Island of Patmos almost certainly for opposing Emperor worship.

The prophecy concerning 144,000 believers not taken to heaven at the time of the Rapture is perhaps even

more interesting than the above story. It appears that God will choose exactly that number of Jewish Christians, 12.000 from each of the 12 tribes. to witness to Him in an increasingly hostile world but God will take great care of these witnesses, in particular by marking their foreheads with God's special seal, probably the sign of the cross although John does not say this. This sign will be a direct challenge to an order from the Anti-Christ or in anticipation of such a ruling, that everyone should have the mark of the Beast on the forehead or right hand. Without this mark, no-one will be allowed to buy or sell or in effect conduct any business. The Beast's mark will be the number 666 which some commentators say is a code for the name Caesar.

We don't understand quite how, but God's seal will always be superior to the Beast's mark. When God's witnesses on earth are next mentioned. on the day of Christ's second coming, the number of these witnesses remains constant at 144,000, demonstrating God's special care for his people (Rev 14 1). The 144,000 will join Jesus in the air along with resurrected Christians taken from their graves and the whole assembly will enter Jerusalem in a latter day Palm Sunday type parade to initiate Christ's presence there and His rule on earth at the start of the millennium.


