

150th Celebrations Begin for Youngstown Ursulines

September 18 started our 150th year of ministry in the Mahoning Valley. The day before, we began a yearlong celebration of that milestone. Youngstown Diocese Bishop David J. Bonnar celebrated Mass at St. Luke Parish, Boardman, where Leadership Team

member Sister Mary Alyce Koval is the Parish Leader. We worshiped with our families, Associates and close friends – including some Ursuline Sisters of Cleveland, from whom the Youngstown Ursulines were founded, then dined afterwards at a nearby banquet center.

Over the next 12 months, we'll continue to celebrate in a variety of ways.

An exhibit about our history officially opened at the Tyler History Center, 325 W. Federal St., Youngstown, on September 22 and runs through April 21, 2024.

Coordinated by Sister Patricia McNicholas and a committee that worked over the last several months, it features such artifacts as our 1878 incorporation papers, a large gold chalice with rubies gifted to Mother Lawrence McCaffrey, our first elected Superior (who was from Toledo), delicate lace and other artwork by our Sisters, photos from the 19th century to present and much more.

More gatherings with family and friends are on tap, and they're helping us do more outreach to the poor. We're planning additional service to the St. Vincent de Paul Society and Dorothy Day House, both in city-center Youngstown, as well as special celebrations for people served by our ministries.

We're also being honored by local organizations. Ursuline High School, which we founded in 1905, recognized General Superior Sister Mary McCormick as Alumna of the Year October 24.



Also later this month, the St. Vincent de Paul Society will recognize us for our contributions over the years.

We also have a book coming out March 11, 2024. *The Ursuline Sisters of Youngstown: Serving the Mahoning Valley Since 1874* was authored

by Thomas Welsh, a local history author and Ursuline Associate who counts two of our late Sisters as close family members.

The foreword is penned by another friend, actor and writer Ed O'Neill. The Ursuline High graduate shares his story in the book about our Sisters' influence in his life. It also recounts the important role the Cleveland and Toledo communities had in starting ours.

Published by History Press, it'll be available through popular online sellers and at local stores for \$24.99.



Ursulines of Mount Saint Joseph to celebrate 150 years in 2024

When five Ursuline Sisters of Louisville traveled west on a flatboat in 1874 along the Ohio River to open a new mission in Daviess County, they couldn't have known what a lasting impact they would have.

The Sisters opened Mount Saint Joseph Academy that year, and at the turn of the 20th century, began teaching at elementary schools as well. In 1912, the community at Maple Mount became independent, the Ursuline Sisters of Mount Saint Joseph.

In 2024, the community will celebrate 150 years since its arrival 15 miles west of Owensboro. A committee has been at work since March 2023 planning the celebration year, which will begin on January 27 – the feast of Saint Angela. An original one-act play about the Sisters' arrival will be performed that day.

Other events being planned include a concert in April, a reunion of participants from the popular summer music camp in June, a special Mass on August 11 – the closest Sunday to the original Sisters' arrival – and a former sisters reunion in October.

Acts of service will be done throughout the year, displays at local museums and art galleries are in the works, and the community's website and social media will chronicle the history and evolution of the Ursuline Sisters of Mount Saint Joseph each month.

Stay tuned for more details in 2024.

The Archives Relocated

The Archive space was tragically flooded in November of 2022. All the displayed items and the artifacts housed in that area had to be moved, cleaned and relocated. The tedious and lengthy process of cleaning was accomplished. The equally lengthy process of setting up a new home for displayed items and treasures that required proper storage was undertaken. With the closing of Chatfield College in January of 2023, the classroom building was available for the cleaning and temporary storage operation. The Library and Learning Center has become the new home for relocation and display. On August 3rd we opened the doors for the first tour of the new facility to the Faculty, Staff and Administrators new to Ursuline Academy, followed by the UA Board of Trustees. In September we welcomed two Ursuline Sophomore retreat groups. The archives were opened for the annual Car, Quilt and Craft show sponsored by The Chatfield Edge on October 21st. The new location is larger than our previous site and provides enhanced opportunities for display of our artifacts. We are excited about our work in this new location and the possibilities of sharing the story of the Brown County Ursulines with a larger audience.

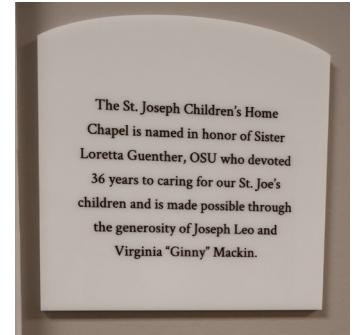

Environmental Justice Outing

On Saturday, June 17, several Ursuline Sisters of Louisville and Associates of Ursuline Sisters of Louisville took part in an environmental justice bus tour with Tim Darst of the Passionist Earth and Spirit Center. It featured an interactive drive through the West End of Louisville, which is—not coincidentally—home to both Louisville's largest pollution challenges and its poorest and most marginalized citizens. After going past the green spaces of Chickasaw Park and Shawnee Park, the group saw Rubbertown, a large industrial area and the major cause of toxic pollutants in the West End; a superfund waste site; Lake Dreamland along Campground Road; and parts of the southwest area of Louisville. Guided by veteran conservationist Tim Darst, the tour was an eye-opening look at environmental justice issues right here in Louisville.

Around the Mount: Sisters honored for their service to God

Two Ursuline Sisters of Mount Saint Joseph (Maple Mount, Ky.) were honored this summer for their service, and a third is being memorialized posthumously for her dedication to education.

On Aug. 27, 2023, Sister Pam Mueller received the Maple Leaf Award, bestowed annually to a graduate of Mount Saint Joseph Academy who personifies the values of their Mount Saint Joseph education in contributions to their local faith communities, civic communities, and/or Mount Saint Joseph.

Sister Pam is a 1968 graduate of the Academy, who in 2022 completed six years of serving on the Ursuline Leadership Council. She continues to serve as director of Campus Ministry at Brescia University in Owensboro, where she began in 2005. She has also served as a teacher, speech pathologist for the Diocese of Owensboro, professor of speech language pathology at Brescia, director of the Speech and Hearing Center at St. Louis University, and director of Vocations for the Ursuline Sisters.

Her classmate and nominator, Carole Caummisar Sanders, said Sister Pam's energy, passion, and selfless service cannot be surpassed.

"Through all the years I have known Sister Pam she has demonstrated kindness, cheerfulness, and honesty," Sanders said. "Her considerate nature is a quality that

makes her a natural leader. After graduating from Mount Saint Joseph, she dedicated her life to God." Sister Pam has been an Ursuline for 53 years.

Another Ursuline with Brescia University connections – Sister Vivian Bowles – will be forever remembered at the Catholic college after the school's Academic Mall was renamed in her honor on June 30, 2023.

Sister Vivian served as president of Brescia from 1995-2007, following 22 years as a psychology professor and director of the Counseling Center. From the time the Ursulines began buying property on Owensboro's Seventh Street in 1950 to open Brescia, until Sister Vivian arrived as president, the street had split the campus in half. Sister Vivian led the effort to ask the city of Owensboro to close Seventh Street and allow the Academic Mall to bring the campus together.

"It was said at the time that students made up their minds in the first three minutes about a campus," Sister Vivian told the crowd of well-wishers in June. "I knew that if they came and didn't find a campus, they would leave."

Today, an archway proclaiming Brescia University leads visitors through a brick lined mall that has a plaque honoring Sister Vivian, a 1969 graduate, for her commitment to Brescia.

"The Academic Mall was Sister Vivian's brainchild," Brescia President Father Larry Hostetter said. "She helped re-energize Brescia University. We stand on her shoulders and the shoulders of all of the Sisters who served as president of this university," Father Larry said. "She envisioned Brescia beyond a small regional university, that it could have a larger impact."

A third Sister's commitment to education occurred at one of the Ursuline community's smallest schools, but

her impact was no less great to the people in Leitchfield, Ky.

St. Paul Catholic School in the small farming community has struggled with enrollment for years, but the people at St. Paul Church have refused to let it close.

One of its fiercest supporters was Sister Anne Michelle Mudd.

On Aug. 2, 2023, the first day of school at St. Paul, the students, teachers and other supporters gathered to break ground for a new building, which will be named the "Sister Anne Michelle Mudd Annex." Sister Anne Michelle spent 31 of her 60 years as an Ursuline Sister serving at St. Paul as a teacher or principal, and was still

serving as a religion teacher when she died suddenly on Aug. 11, 2020.

"She went to school here. She loved this place," said Martha Hall, one of Sister Anne Michelle's sisters who attended the ceremony. "She loved little kids, she loved to teach them."

"The school almost closed one year," her sister Sondra Gavieres said. "She saved everything to raise money – Campbell's soup labels, stamps – she didn't even take any pay," Gavieres said.

The school has 75 students to begin the year, quite an increase from recent years.

"I hope it's because of the message we have here," Principal Todd Johnston said.

Father Steve Hohman, the pastor of St. Paul Church, said the parish raised \$250,000 toward the \$450,000 cost of the building. But the Diocese of Owensboro building committee told Hohman that he had to show where he would raise the rest of the money before the plan would be approved. After just eight more days of calling on

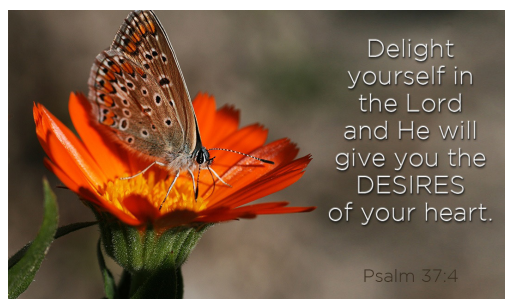
other churches and alumni of the school, the school had all the pledges it needed.

Gavieres, who held a picture of Sister Anne Michelle during the groundbreaking, said she believes her late sister is helping the cause.

"I think she has something to do with this," Gavieres said. "You can't raise that much money this quick."

Ursulines of Mount Saint Joseph learn how to address privilege and bias to better understand all of God's people

Jaklyn-Mahree Hill grew up attending high school retreats at Mount Saint Joseph, and Sister Fran Wilhelm played a major role in her childhood. So she was excited – and nervous – to return to Maple Mount, Ky., during the 2023 summer Community Days to offer training on understanding bias.

Hill is the executive director of the Owensboro Human Relations Commission, an agency that assists the public with filing discrimination complaints. She also leads trainings to educate “anyone who will have us” to prevent discrimination from occurring.

Sister Sharon Sullivan, congregational leader, met Hill at the February 2023 Regional Diversity Conference in Owensboro, where she attended her “Unpacking Privilege and Bias” presentation.

“I found it to be an engaging, insightful, and positive exploration of how bias is simply an integral part of who we are, and how privilege can have so many different meanings and appearances,” Sister Sharon said. “I chatted with her after her shortened presentation to ask about the more developed versions; when she found out I was with the Ursuline Sisters, she was excited because Sister Fran had been such an important part of her childhood. She seemed eager to work with us.”

Among the areas of focus for the Ursuline Sisters during this four-year leadership term is combatting racism and pursuing social justice. Hill and Becky Brandle, community coordinator for OHRC, agreed to present “Unpacking Privilege and Bias” and “Understanding Cultural Competency” to all the Ursuline Sisters during Community Days on July 13.

Hill's mother worked for Centro Latino, the outreach ministry to Hispanics that Sister Fran led for 25 years.

“Sister Fran was a pivotal part of my childhood. I admired the way that she cared for people with humor and kindness,” Hill said. “I was so excited to bring this information to the community. They have the best energy and are the kindest people. They are the complete opposite of the stereotype about nuns.”

Hill admitted that she was nervous about leading the sessions for the Sisters.

“When we bring information to a group of older people, there is often pushback,” she said. “I get nervous that they won't have an open mind. But they came with such open minds and they shared such wonderful stories.”

In her presentation, Hill talked about two types of biases – conscious and unconscious.

“Conscious is what we see, someone harassing someone in person or online,” she said. “Unconscious biases are very internalized, they come from your own traumas, life experiences, and whether you grew up with people just like you. Biases can be in conflict with your values and beliefs. It doesn't mean you're a bad person.”

Humans are very “us-centered,” Hill said, so she tries to help people realize that everyone has some values and beliefs that are important to them, even if they are different from yours. The goal for the presentations was to help the Sisters connect with populations that are different from them, Hill said.

“The Sisters are out in the community doing good things,” Hill said. “They want to understand. They want to love and care for people. This gives them an additional tool.”

Several of the Sisters said Hill's talks challenged them to think differently.

“Jaklyn challenged me to consider more deeply my responses to people who are different from myself – how I look at others from a viewpoint of privilege, which automatically excludes those who do not (and cannot, and need not) share this viewpoint,” Sister Ruth Gehres said. “At the moment I'm reading *White Fragility*, by Robin DiAngelo – a tough book to read, and well worth the effort. This book, and Jaklyn's presentation, makes me want to look at every person as a child of God who is worthy – totally worthy – of my respect and caring.”

“It developed and underscored what a lot of us have been studying and learning about the injustice of white

privilege and systemic racism over the past two years,” Sister Michele Morek said. “She gave good examples from her own life experience as a Latina, and from her work in diversity training.”

“She asked us to play Privilege Bingo,” Sister Rebecca White said. “We marked all of the scenarios that were true for us and she asked if anyone got a bingo. I did not turn around to look, but I doubt many raised their hands. Most of us have been quite privileged. We cannot get rid of our privilege, but we can always take it into account when listening to those who are likely less privileged.”

Sister Carol Shively has served as superintendent of Catholic Schools for the Diocese of Shreveport, La., since 1999. Her experience tells her that Hill’s presentation was very accurate.

“Since moving to the South, I work every day with people of color,” Sister Carol said. “I’m very sensitive to my words and my reactions toward them.”

Sister Sharon said her main takeaway was embracing the presence of implicit bias and accepting that she has her own biases that have grown from or been planted by her own experiences, DNA, childhood and family.

“My biases color my unconscious responses,” she said. “How I integrate my own biases is my choice ... and my responsibility. My bias may or may not match my values; that is not under my control. My actions may or may not match my values; that is under my control.”

Some critics of these types of trainings dismiss them as an effort to make people feel bad about past actions, but Hill said that isn’t the case.

“Every time we give one of these trainings, someone comes up afterward and says, ‘I wasn’t expecting to learn anything, but I did.’ We work hard to make all people feel comfortable,” Hill said. “It’s not to be made to feel bad about yourself, because no one learns if they feel bad about themselves.”

Hill said she was able to learn from the Sisters because they have experiences from a generation that she knows little about.

“They were able to discuss an interaction they’ve had with someone, and asked, ‘How could I have better understood this person?’ They want to learn how to love people even better,” Hill said. “These are people who want to change from how they grew up and learn more. They want to expand their capacity to love and care for people,” Hill said. “They are so amazing.”

Mary Carrico School honors Sister Mary Celine for 60 years as an Ursuline

When the faculty and staff at Mary Carrico Catholic School in Knottsville, Ky., learned in August that their religion teacher – Ursuline Sister of Mount Saint Joseph Mary Celine Weidenbenner – was celebrating 60 years of religious life, they wanted to celebrate. “She’s just a special lady,” said Laura Cecil, in her second year as principal of the small school in east Daviess County near Owensboro, Ky. “She wears a sweatshirt that says ‘Joy: Jesus, Others, Yourself.’ She just radiates joy.” On Sept. 27, Sister Mary Celine was surprised to learn that she was the guest of honor at the school Mass across the road at St. William Church. The pastor, Father Shijo Vadakumkara said after his homily, “Sister Mary Celine has been a great messenger for our parish and school for so many years.”

Nine other Ursuline Sisters joined her for Mass and a reception afterward in the school gym. Two of the teachers at Mary Carrico had Sister Mary Celine as their teacher, and spoke of the joy they have now serving with her. Daviess County Commissioner Larry Conder read a proclamation declaring Sept. 27, 2023, as “Sister Mary Celine Day” in Daviess County. “Sister Mary Celine has made a difference in people’s lives,” Conder said. “She’s taught us how to love and to be good Christians.”

Sister Mary Celine’s 16 years at Mary Carrico surpass her previous longest mission, St. Mary Middle School in Paducah, Ky., where she spent 15 years.

“Nobody is before my time,” Winnie replied with a broad smile.

Winnie was the unexpected star attraction during the banquet, thanks to a couple of numbers associated with her – she is a 1941 graduate of the Academy, who recently turned 100 years old.

She still drives, she’d like everyone to know.

The 100 or so alumnae on hand gave her an ovation to begin the festivities, and Mary Danhauer, A’71, secretary of the Alumnae Association, placed a corsage on her wrist. When the roll call was read after lunch, the crowd once again gave her a hearty round of applause, and she stood to blow them kisses.

Winnie grew up in Henderson, Ky., and still lives there today. She was taught by the Sisters of Charity in elementary school, but she desperately wanted to attend Mount Saint Joseph Academy.

“My mom said we couldn’t afford it. I said, ‘I’ll work to pay my tuition,’” Winnie said. “I thought I’d like to wear the uniforms.”

Her jobs at the Academy included working in the library under Sister Joseph Marie Williams, and cleaning a classroom for Sister Charles Emaline Clements.

“It seemed like I left a part of me here,” Winnie said. “I’ve been back for my 50th reunion (32 years ago), and a few times I drove friends here to look around.” She admitted she was a bit lost when she arrived on campus.

“I was looking for the other auditorium,” she said. The auditorium during her school days was in the Academy building that was deconstructed earlier this year.

When asked for a favorite memory during her Academy days, she recalled the students performing the operetta “The Mikado.”

“We got to wear the costumes,” she said. “Sister Cecilia (Payne) wanted me to try out, she said I had a wonderful voice. But I hate to get up in front of people. I did get a part. I sang two lines.”

Following her graduation in 1941, with World War II beginning, she worked in Evansville, Ind., making bullets for the war effort. Chrysler President K.T. Keller turned the Plymouth assembly plant in Evansville into a factory to make .45-caliber cartridges.

She married and had two daughters and a son. “In my 40s I was a travel agent. I traveled all over the world, with lots of cruises,” she said. “I retired from that after 20 years.”

Her daughter Sandra Lewis Ross attended the Academy for three years, but transferred to Holy Name High School in Henderson to graduate with her friends. Winnie’s granddaughter, Shaun Ross, also attended three years of the Academy, before transferring to Holy Name. Both of them are now deceased, as are her husband and son.

Her remaining daughter, Barbara Elpers, accompanied her to the reunion. She went to the Academy for one year. “I was a daddy’s girl,” she said, and preferred to be home working with the animals on their farm.

“My granddaughters still come to my house when they need something,” Winnie said. “We are a very close family.”

As the reunion wrapped up for another year, Winnie had a message for her fellow alumnae.

“See you next year,” she said.

Black Catholic Congress

From July 20-23, Sister Mary Jean Raymond, Parish Life Coordinator at St. Aloysius Parish in the city of Cleveland, attended the 13th National Black Catholic Congress. Cardinal Wilton Gregory was the first Black U.S. cardinal to address the Congress. Sister Mary Jean stated: "The most powerful moment for me as a woman religious was on the opening day when the representative of Cardinal Gregory, a Black religious woman, . . .welcomed the bishops in attendance . . . the priests . . .the seminarians . . . then "began to launch into her address and a gentleman in the audience stood up and loudly called out, 'What about the sisters?' She hesitated for a moment and then said, 'Oh, yes, the sisters.' The audience then called for all the religious sisters in attendance to stand. The religious women in the audience stood and received a rousing round of applause and cheers—more than any other group."

The attendees were estimated to be 3,000 who attended the Congress in National Harbor, Maryland. Images of six Black Catholics were displayed, including Franciscan Sister Thea Bowman who had given an address to the U.S. Bishops in 1989 and are under scrutiny in the process of canonization in Rome. Cardinal Gregory stated that these Black Catholics "serve as sources of great pride and inspiration for Black Catholics." The theme of the 2023 Congress "Write the Vision: A Prophetic Call to Thrive" came from the second chapter of the Old Testament's Book of Habakkuk. The Cardinal also told the attendees: "As we set about the important work of writing our vision and responding to the prophetic call to thrive in love and service, the Eucharist is our unifying reminder that we belong to one another and are truly entirely interdependent." A concluding message sent

from Pope Francis "encourages the commitment of America's Black Catholics, drawing inspiration from their faith to continue placing the rich diversity of their gifts and talents at the service of the Christian vision of truth, justice, and peace."

Groundbreaking

Creative Living for Life @ Ursuline Sisters

After eleven years of planning for Creative Living for Life at Ursuline Sisters, the groundbreaking for the housing for adults with special needs was held on the Ursuline Sisters campus at 6:30 p.m., Wednesday, September 13th. Over one hundred people, including many parents of future residents, the CEO of Medina Creative Housing, Dianne DePasquale Hagerty, the Mayor of Pepper Pike, Richard Bain, the President of the Cleveland Ursulines, Sister Ritamary Welsh, the President of Ursuline College, Sister Christine DeVinne, many Ursuline Sisters and some future residents who participated in the ground breaking with hats and shovels attended the evening celebration. Occupancy of this housing development which consists of a community of twenty-four separate units with one or two bedrooms for those who can function on their own with some assistance is scheduled to take place in 2024. Some of the adult residents might have a regular caregiver or someone on an "as needed" basis. All of the condos are spoken for with half of the families being from the Pepper Pike area. Since the Medina Creative Living Corporation has leased several acres of land from us Cleveland Ursulines, the Corporation is in charge of the buildings

and the running of them. Our Cleveland Ursulines are sponsoring two condos for two families who cannot afford this opportunity for their special needs children. The Medina Creative Living which has been in existence for thirty-one years in Ohio has stated that this group of people are the most underserved in our population.

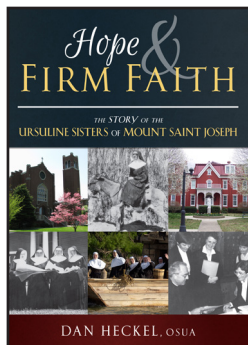

Two members of the Communicators for Women Religious representing Ursuline communities completed the new CWR Strategic Communications Certificate program on Sept. 7, 2023. Kathy Williams, director of communications for the Ursuline Sisters of Louisville, and Jennifer Kaminski, communications specialist/graphic designer for the Ursuline Sisters of Mount Saint Joseph, participated, along with 26 other CWR members. It was the first time the Communicators for Women Religious had offered the certificate. Participants represented women's religious communities from across the U.S., Canada, Italy, and Ireland. The program consisted of nine classes, divided into three modules, that began on May

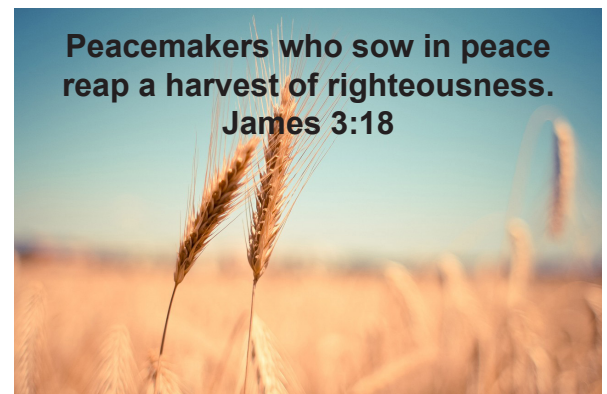
17, 2023. There was a recorded session to watch prior to each 30-minute live session. The final class was a review of the drafts of each community's strategic plan.

The program was described this way: "Strategic communications for religious organizations require understanding long-term and short-term goals of the organization, the audience they are trying to reach, the best methods to reach them, and the nuances necessary to match the organization's tone and voice. This Strategic Communications Certificate will guide participants through learning those specifics, planning a communications strategy to match them, and conducting ongoing evaluation and analysis of the success of their plan." Several different instructors presented the classes, including some CWR members. CWR plans to offer the program again from May-September 2024. especially our personal and communal vulnerability believing that in that vulnerability that Divine Mystery unfolds.



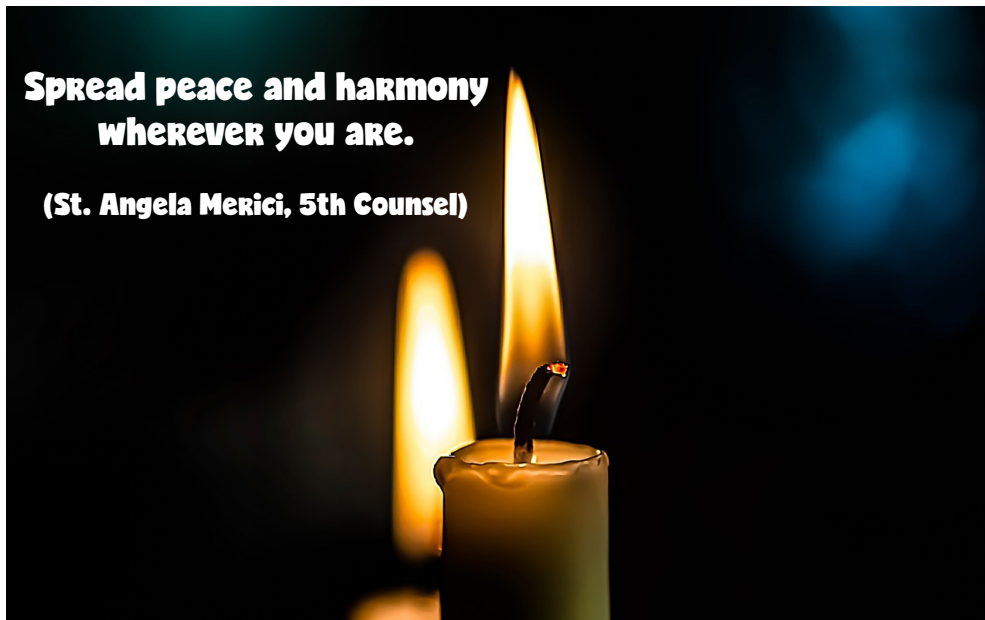
