Central Province aiding Ukrainian refugees with help from many

Since early March, the Ursulines of the Central Province have been sending money to their Roman Union Ursuline Sisters in Poland and Slovakia to help the Ukrainian refugees crossing their borders. The ability to send funds regularly is due in large part to the generosity of Central Province alumni and other donors and friends.

Many people have responded to posts about Ukraine on the Central Province website and Facebook page. One alumna in Springfield, Illinois, sent a letter to her former classmates and other Ursuline Academy alumnae to let them know that money sent to the Central Province Ursulines is a good way to get immediate aid to Ukrainian refugees. Several other Ursuline communities in the United States also have sent the Central Province gifts to transfer to the Ursulines in Poland and Slovakia, which

is deeply appreciated. And last week, Sister Elisa Ryan, provincial, received word that the province would be receiving a

sizeable grant for Ukrainian relief.

The Ursulines who have been receiving the refugees are using the funds for food, clothing, medicine and other needs, including beds and another washing machine for the refugees they are housing and a little travel money for those who are moving farther on. The sisters in Poland and Slovakia have little time to write but have sent notes with news of the current situation and expressed their gratitude for all their fellow Ursulines are doing in support of this humanitarian aid.

The serviam spirit was alive in Arcadia, Missouri, on May 12 when Central Province Ursuline Sisters and co-workers at the province offices—along with a few special helpers—spent a day cleaning the gravestones in the Ursuline cemetery there. Ursulines arrived in Arcadia from St. Louis in 1877, soon opening a boarding school that continued to serve the Arcadia Valley for nearly 100 years. The last of the sisters in the Arcadia Convent left in 1991. The cemetery remains the final resting place for many of those who served there, with the oldest gravestones dating to the 1880s.



Central Province Ursulines Ginger Cirone and Regina Marie Fronmüller were joined by Ursuline Academy alumnae in celebrating International Serviam Day, May 14, by working with the St. Bernard Project (SBP) on rebuilding houses in New Orleans. International Serviam Day is a day when Ursuline community members around the world join together to volunteer in their local communities, continuing to answer the call to serve others. Many Ursulines and alumnae from throughout the country and beyond have worked with SBP on rebuilding projects since Katrina struck in 2005.



brothers. Only four shelters are Catholic, which means that there are not many Catholic volunteers. The good news is that there is only one God who collaborates with God's plan to give bread to the hungry and a place where each migrant who arrives in Juárez can rest.

I visited the "Hope for All" shelter that is in Anapra, Juárez. Puerto de Anapra is a neighborhood within the city of Ciudad, Juárez, in the Mexican state of Chihuahua. Anapra is west of the Rio Grande, on the border of the U.S. state of New Mexico. It is one of the poorest communities within the city.

There are 190 people in the shelter, including adults, youth and children from different countries. They organize themselves to cook and thus everyone assumes responsibility in the house. On the outside of the shelter



in ANAPRA, there is a motto that states, "We are neither criminals legal, we are international workers."





Ursuline Sisters of Mount Saint Joseph look to the past and the future for new Leadership Council

The Ursuline Sisters of Mount Saint Joseph looked to the past for the person to lead them into the future, selecting Sister Sharon Sullivan as congregational leader, six years after she left the same office.

Sister Sharon was congregational leader from 2010-16. The native Texan becomes only the second Sister in the community's history to be elected to nonconsecutive terms as leader. Mother Teresita Thompson served as superior from 1928-34, and then again from 1937-43. Sister Sharon is celebrating her 40th year as an Ursuline Sister this year, with most of her time in ministry serving at Brescia College/University. She is currently coordinator of special education and a professor at Brescia.



Sister Martha Keller was elected as assistant congregational leader. She is a native of Whitesville, Ky., and is serving in her 46th year as an Ursuline. Sister Martha has served as a teacher, parish minister and director of Vocation ministry. Since 2012, she has served as a pastoral associate at St. Jerome Parish, in Fancy Farm, Ky. She was instrumental in leading relief efforts for people in Mayfield, Ky., following the deadly Dec. 10, 2021, tornado that devastated the town.

Sister Monica Seaton was elected as first councilor. Sister Monica is a native of Owensboro, Ky., where she attended St. Stephen Cathedral as her home parish. She is the community's youngest Sister, serving in her 20th year. Sister Monica served as a teacher, and since 2016 has been the director of Vocation ministry for the Ursulines.

Sister Ann McGrew was elected as the second councilor. The Grayson County, Ky., native previously served as a councilor from 2004-2010. Now in her 57th year as an Ursuline, Sister Ann brings a wide variety of ministry experience to her role. She has been a teacher, parish minister and secretary to the Council. She was also director of novices and of the temporary professed, and she served in the ministry formation program at Brescia. She is a spiritual director and a

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Sisters celebrate graduations of Vietnamese Sisters and Derby Day

The first Saturday in May 2022 was a time for celebrating for the Ursuline Sisters of Mount Saint Joseph at Maple Mount, Ky. – both Kentucky Derby day and the Brescia University graduation. The final two Vietnamese sisters living at Maple Mount earned their degrees from Brescia and shared their joy with the Ursuline Sisters.

Since 2013, Maple Mount has been home to sisters from various communities in Vietnam. That year, Sister Sharon Sullivan – then congregational leader for the Ursulines – was asked by Brescia officials if the Sisters could offer a home and transportation for two sisters from the Lovers of the Holy Cross community in Vietnam. Brescia agreed to grant scholarships to the sisters following the request of Father Bao Nguyen, a Jesuit priest who sought American education for religious sisters in Vietnam. Sister Huyen Vu and Sister Anh Tran were the first two Sisters to arrive.

In the ensuing nine years, seven Vietnamese sisters have earned their degrees from Brescia while living at Maple Mount. On May 7, 2022, Sisters Trang Le and Hang Nguyen, both Missionary Sisters of the Blessed Virgin Mary-Queen of the World, earned their degrees. There are still Vietnamese sisters attending Brescia, but they live in Owensboro.

To celebrate with the Ursuline Sisters, the Vietnamese sisters spent time on YouTube learning balloon and napkin decorating, then performed a dance to "Such a Happy Day" by the Monroes.

A Vietnamese couple from Evansville, Ind., who have helped support the Vietnamese sisters since they've lived at Maple Mount, prepared grilled pork, fried rice and wonton soup. The sisters at Brescia made their beloved egg rolls and provided a display of fruit for everyone to enjoy.

Following the graduation party, the Ursuline Sisters enjoyed a Kentucky Derby celebration, which concluded with longshot Rich Strike pulling an amazing upset.

Sister Angela Fitzpatrick renews her commitment to Network issues

Ursuline Sister of Mount Saint Joseph Angela Fitzpatrick submitted a letter to the Kansas City Star opinion page in April 2022 to raise awareness of the need for prison reform, especially dealing with racial disparity.

"That was a first for me, I've never sent my opinion to a newspaper before," Sister Angela said.

Despite a long history of being involved in social justice issues, Sister Angela found the motivation to try something new after spending three days in Washington, D.C., celebrating 50 years of Network – the justice | Care Act, which Network supported."

advocacy group she helped begin.

"I'm glad I went, it was a wonderful experience," Sister Angela said. She was a young Ursuline Sister of Paola, Kan., in the winter of 1971 when she was among 47 women religious who sojourned to Washington to determine how they could make a difference if they united. In April 1972, Network was formed and has been engaged in political activism for social justice ever since.

When Network planned its 50th anniversary celebration on April 21-23 with a Justice Ablaze Gala and Advocates Training in Washington, Sister Angela was invited as one of the founding members. She was one of four founders who attended.



"I was so happy with all the diversity and young people," Sister Angela said. "There were college-age people, it wasn't just gray-haired sisters."

The Ursulines of Paola merged with the Ursulines of Mount Saint Joseph in 2008. Sister Angela has continued serving in her native Kansas, now as a caregiver in metropolitan Kansas City. She was joined at the celebration by Ursuline Sister Michele Morek.

"It was a learning experience," Sister Angela said.

"We had this workshop on how to organize, and met with people from our area, although mine was only Sister Michele. We asked for a list of Network members in our area, so it's possible we could find some more people."

This gathering was quite different from her first trip in 1971, Sister Angela said.

"It was encouraging, hopeful. We knew it was possible to have an effect," she said. "We were seeing things that had been accomplished, like the Affordable

> The early days of Network were quite different, Sister Angela said.

"We were foundering back then, until Sister Carol Coston (a Dominican Sister) took over in April 1972. She had \$147 to work with, but she started hiring a staff. She was the mother foundress."

Sister Carol's attendance at celebration was a highlight. Sister Angela said. A banner Network produced featured some of the

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founding members' quotes, including ones from Sister Angela and Sister Carol. Sister Angela's quote read, "We felt if we formed a group to lobby we'd counteract the influence of the rich and powerful ... If we really were united, we could be a dangerous force."

"The fact they chose those two quotes really made me feel special," Sister Angela said. "I was happy and surprised."

Sister Angela read that Network now has 100,000 members from all 50 states, compared to the 47 people who began. Anyone can join Network, not just women religious. Sister Angela said she would be happy to forward Network information concerning how to sign on to support an issue for anyone who wants it.

"I found a deeper appreciation for Network. I felt what's possible," Sister Angela said. "We have the power to change things. To be silent is wrong."

Sister Angela said she is committed to being more involved with Network issues.

"It's going to take everybody," she said. "Together we can do something."


