

A Story of Courage and Strength

A small pile of letters with a snapshot snug between its pages tell of a career woman in the 1930's, my mother, **Gertrude Miller Schwab**. These letters along with other souvenirs trace the beginning and development of an adventuresome and successful career woman, when while the Great Depression was well underway.

After having graduated at the top of her class at Ottoville High School in 1925, she followed her sister, Emma, to St. Vincent Hospital School of Nursing in Toledo, graduating in 1929. After that, Gertrude received her diploma with a Bachelor in Science, printed in Latin, from Mary Manse College in 1931 – "Collegii ad Mansionem Marianam in MCMXXXI with a Scientiae Baccalaurentus." The graduation ceremony joined together 21 men from St. John's College and 19 women from Mary Manse College, five with a BS in nursing.

Gertrude kept in contact with St. Vincent friends and faculty through the decade. Letters from Sister Decary notes that everything about Toledo was "very quiet,"

meaning that there were few jobs for nurses. Shifts there had been 12 hours. Eight hour shifts were tried to share the limited work, still many nurses were unemployed – one of many unfortunate results of the Depression.

September of 1931 found the new graduate in Dorchester, Massachusetts at St. Margaret's Hospital, having accepted a position as nursing instructor. In a letter from St. Margaret's Hospital, Sister Philomena wrote, "God has given you intelligence and ability to be a very good teacher" and "You really edified me many times by your sweet submission to dictates which I knew were not always to your taste, and yet the smile always managed to get on top." Affirmation was important to Gertrude and encouraging, which may be why she saved the letters.

She had planned to return to St. Margaret's Hospital the following year, but a letter explains that there would be no class the next year due to no jobs for nurses in 1932. The same as in Toledo. Onethird of the country's work force was unemployed. Gertrude was intent on following her calling to help the sick in need.

An offer came in August. She received a mailgram from Hughes Professional Exchange of Kansas City, Missouri with information that Santa Rosa Hospital in San Antonio, Texas had a position as "instructress" for her that paid \$100 per month "plus maintenance." She secured that job and arrived there a week later, defying the Depression's impact.

A newsy letter from her mother addressed to Gertrude Miller BS RN (acknowledging Gertrude's accomplishments with pride) fills us in on the farm community happenings in German-Catholic Ottoville during September 1932: her older brother was renting a farm from an old widow, her younger brother was going to college in Ft. Wayne, a neighbor was

getting married, there was a dance in town every Wednesday evening, a guy got too much booze, was fined, and got stuck in the calaboose, another neighbor had breast cancer, cousin Bertha was nursing a woman with bursted appendix, her older sister, Nora, harvested clover seed that sold for \$5 a bushel, eggs were 18 cents, six hogs were sold for \$52.54. The bottom of the second page was signed, "Mother." This letter is important to me not only for news of the time, but it is written in pencil by my grandmother, who at the time of writing was 65 years old, a widow for 15 years, as Gertrude's father had died when she was 13.

Gertrude was the youngest daughter in a family of eight and grew up in a farm community. Grandmother was hardy and very much a part of

her community while raising her family, a model for Gertrude to emulate.

Her two older brothers did the farm work. There was always work to be done, weeds to hoe, eggs to gather, cows to be milked, and gardens to tend. Surely, Gertrude's work ethic was set and developing early in her life, along with the formation of her aspirations.

A May 29, 1933 plane ticket issued by Bowen Air Lines shows Gertrude flew home to Ohio by way of Chicago to spend the summer. Passenger flight was in its infancy in 1933. The return flight was 10 hours at an altitude of 1500 feet. She proves not only to be both a determined, daring woman...but charming, too, as she got and kept the flight notes of the pilot, Claude Seaton. Airfare was a whopping \$65.03, nearly a month's pay. In today's purchasing power that is equivalent to about \$1,371.55.

Before her return to Santa Rosa, she was sent a letter stating that there would be a pay reduction – from \$100 to \$75 per month. This was during the peak of the Great Depression, nonetheless, Gertrude would have none of that. She rejected this insult made to her and to the value of her contribution to the hospital. Her rejection was no mistake. Her confidence and resolute paid off. No short-sightedness here. A follow-up telegram informed her that her pay was reinstated. In addition, she was offered an extension to May, 1935. The ever patient but steadfast Gertrude prevailed and returned to Texas.

After her extension time came to a close, Helen Wilke, Mary Manse classmate, wrote to her that the Hospital of St. Raphael in New Haven, Connecticut was offering \$125 per month for a practical nursing instructor which also involved improving conditions at the nursing school – a job challenge! How could Gertrude resist? Again, she obtained a coveted position and she stayed in New Haven until 1937, when she also bought her first car, a sporty Hudson Terraplane. There is no doubt that it suited her style and delighted her nieces with rides in the rumble seat. The car remained with her as a family car until 1948.

After setting St. Raphael nursing school on the right track, Gertrude returned to Ohio, closer to

home, and worked at Mercy Hospital in Toledo from 1938 to 1939, as the country was beginning to see hope for the end of the Depression.

Wedding bells rang for Miss Gertrude Miller in July 1939 when she became Mrs. Schwab, after having known John for six months. She settled in farm life again with John, a farmer from Deshler, Ohio, where they lived and raised Tom, Jack, and me, Margaret. She was active, of course, in parish, community, and school events. She put on her nurse's cap occasionally to help neighbors in need and Red Cross services. When her children were in college she went back to nursing as a private duty nurse and later on the night shift at the local nursing home.

All the people in this story are women: nuns at the hospitals, teachers and college friends from Mary Manse, the nursing students that Gertrude taught, the nurses with whom she worked, her sister, Emma, and her mother. They had survived the 1930's, and did that well, by supporting each other, activating the collective strength of women.

After my husband had died, my mother assured me that I would be okay. She knew that she had taught me the art of stick-to-itiveness. For twenty years I owned and operated a quilt ship with three other women. My mother was an exemplar and an invaluable influence on my success.

Education was important. All her daughters are college graduates and I am a proud graduate of Mary Manse College. I am proud of my undaunted mother, a Mary Manse graduate, who made a difference to every person and to every community that she had served as nurse, and teacher, but most important of all to me, as my mother, my guide.

Gertrude was a woman certain about what she wanted to contribute during her career and what she sought to bring into her personal life. She wasted no time putting every effort into getting her heart's desires in both. Not even the Depression of the 1930's was great enough to halt her drive or to crush her spirit.


