The Ursuline Sisters were invited to share an uplifting, lighthearted or positive memory from their current or past ministries. While these are only snapshots in time, we thank the Ursuline Sisters for dedicating themselves to serving countless individuals over many years of ministry.



"On March 17, 1968, my Mom and Dad brought me a guitar when I was stationed at St. Teresa School. I named it "Paddy." For 56 years, I have played in the different parishes and schools, working with kids from Grades 3 through 8, and at times with some high schoolers also. At Regina Coeli, I had for a while 12 students playing for Masses. This was

at times challenging and rewarding. I have also been involved with playing for Masses and prayer services at TOCI – Toledo Ohio Correctional Institute. Again, at times, it was challenging and rewarding. This activity has helped me bring Dad's loving presence to a lot of His people." - *Sister Janice Ann Brown*

"Like many of our Sisters, I taught in the grade schools for many years. I also was honored to teach Religion in the CCD program to the children with disabilities for 30 years. Along with this, my favorite ministry was giving 'Sacred Dance' programs with both children and adults in nursing homes, churches, and various other places." - Sister Margaret Anne Carstensen

"A joyful memory is Sister Margaret Welter, then Sister Eileen Simon, and myself obtaining a Suburban Chevy Wagon donated by Stroh's Brewery Company in Detroit, Michigan and driving it from Toledo, Ohio to Belize, Central America for the Sisters who led Eucharistic services for their faith communities in the mountains of Belize, Central America,"said Sister Nelda Chafitelli. "One of my favorite memories is creating with



then Sister Eileen Simon, the Ursuline Counseling Services in Washington, D.C. and having the privilege to serve others through this ministry for 30 years."

"At the beginning of the school year, I gave a short presentation on St. Angela Merici to the new Junior Academy students. Time passed and an 8th grader saw me in the hallway and said she had something to tell me. Whatever I shared about St. Angela made an impression on her and because of that experience she decided to take the name "Angela" for her Confirmation name. This tells me that even if you reach one student and made a difference in her life, it was well worth the time I spent that particular morning." - *Sister Donna Frey*

"When I was teaching, the most important thing to me was how successful my students were in the subjects that I was teaching. But now I realize that might not have been the most important thing because, when I meet former students, they don't mention the content of my lessons. They remember that I cared about them. And one person said that I always loved them even when they were bad."

"Volunteering at the Hospitality Kitchen at Our Lady of Lourdes and at the Information Desk at St. Anne's Mercy Hospital enables me to help those in need, and to realize how much it means to them."







"During adventures of moving our Sisters to their appointments, we never know what will happen. It all just depends on the weather, the appointment itself, or how one is feeling. Some Sisters are happy

to be in a different place, some get promised an ice cream cone, or others simply enjoy seeing the spring beauty or winter snow. One time I took a Sister to an appointment and on the way back I asked if she would like an ice cream cone – so off we went! While at Handel's my phone rang. The office was calling to say it was a hot day and they were leaving for Handel's to get some cool treats. So I had to confess we were already there!" – **Sister Margaret Manion**

"During my past ministry I had mostly young children 6 years old to seniors in high school. I retired from Maria Child Care, working with babies 6 weeks old. Then, I continued to work with children until they were six years old. Their eyes and smiles made it a joy to



come to work to teach. Remember Jesus told us to be as simple as a little child. Now I have changed my ministry to older people – Sisters, Priests – their years are in my collection of my ministry."

The Desert

I listened to a homily recently and it really put some things in perspective for me (Thank you, Fr. Weber!). Lent was its theme, being the first Sunday of Lent, but the message made the purpose of Lent more clear for me.

In the past I would get to confession, and maybe give up something as a reminder that it was Lent. But this was different for me. It was suggested that we take ourselves to the desert. The physical desert, if you've ever traveled to one, can be an isolated, unique place. I have visited a real desert and could appreciate this isolation – no roads, traffic, houses, or stores. There is just the sound of the wind blowing through the sand and yet, a place for a variety of beautiful unique wildlife and plants.

Taking ourselves to the desert during Lent suggests we take time - Father suggested it could be as little as a few minutes a day - to get away from all the busyness and commitments we encounter in our day-to-day lives. For me it is a time to settle, close my eyes, and think about what I am thankful for or who is in need of my prayers at that moment — to go to the "desert" and focus. I'm really thankful for Father's message and hope I can continue even after Lent to remember to intentionally take time to spend time in the "desert."


Sister M. Martina Berres

Sister M. Martina Berres followed her Aunt (Sister M. Petronilla), sister (Sister Helen Marie Berres) and her cousin (Sister Mary Florence Berres) into the Ursuline Convent on February 11, 1937. She attended DeSales College and received her AB degree from Mary Manse College and a Master's degree in Home Economics from St. Louis University. She did further study at Bowling Green State University, Case Western Reserve, Fontbonne, and Cornell. Sister Martina started teaching in the elementary grades at Rosary Cathedral and Our Lady of Perpetual Help. She then taught at Calvert High School and St. Gerard High School in Lima and at Lima Central Catholic High School. She spent over 30 years teaching Home Economics at Toledo Central Catholic and introduced a popular course, Bachelor Living, which appealed to the young men at Central. They learned to bake, cook, sew, and budget for themselves and for a household. Many of

them were amazed at themselves, finding they were quite the bakers or cooks. Sister M. Martina was both an excellent seamstress and could make a peanut butter and jelly sandwich taste like a gourmet food item. After retiring, Sister Martina helped in the Business Office and at St. Angela



Hall. She retired to the Ursuline Convent and died there on March 4, 2007 at the age of 90.



n Ash Wednesday last year, I arrived in Malakal to visit Solidarity missionary Mike Bassano, MM. That evening we went for a liturgical celebration at the Protection of Civilians camp, the largest camp parish of persons who have been displaced due to violence. I met beautiful people of deep faith, but what was so poignant to me was thinking of the Catholic Lenten practices in that context -- fasting when they had no food, almsgiving when they had so little to give, and penance when they experienced daily life in a camp as a penance.

Fr. Mike, however, beautifully contextualized these practices, assuring the faithful that partaking food to ensure one's survival and health is in fact good and godly. Since my visit last year, the situation in Malakal hasn't improved much, nor has the rest of South Sudan for that matter. The value of their money decreases weekly and unreliable climate changes mean that agricultural efforts turn to naught or yield far less than is needed.

Your continued prayerful and financial support is appreciated and needed for our women and men religious who have given of themselves to minister in South Sudan. Further information may be found at Friends in Solidarity website.

From the LCWR Presidency

Pilgrims on a Lenten Journey of Trial and Grace

aving just put away my boxes of Christmas decorations a few days ago, I find it hard to believe the Lenten season is upon us. Excuses for such procrastination are numerous, but such resistance to moving past celebratory engagements toward more somber and penitential days rises to the top of the list. Ashes that trickled down my nose on Ash Wednesday, an unambiguous insignia of the ebb and flow in our liturgical seasons, reminds us of who we are: pilgrims on a journey of trial and grace.



Prayer, fasting, and almsgiving are three essential practices we carry in our knapsack on this Lenten journey. How will they be made evident this year? For me, prayer has become more deliberate and filled with lament due to global violence, immigration catastrophes, destructive climate change, political unrest, and weariness with the status quo. At times I am tempted to sit within this cacophony of grief, fear, and anger without seeing beyond to the reality of Christ's presence. I must remind myself that prayer,

whether contemplative, liturgical, or intercessory, is not uttered in a vacuum, but united by the Spirit to our God with whom we each share an intimate relationship. The trials of life throughout the world are held in the heart of our Creator and embraced by the prayer expressed within our faith-filled voices. Grace keeps us from despair and widens our hearts for communion. Might we remind one another of this more often?

Over the years, fasting has taken on new meaning in my life. Giving up chocolate and potato chips has its place,



yet it feels trivial as we look at the varying poverties that are global. Food deserts in major cities, tainted water sources, lack of access to basic nutrition, and politically motivated withholding of humanitarian aid must lead us to question how we live in solidarity with those most affected. Gratitude for what we have, attentiveness to our use of resources, and self-sacrifice for the common good are some of the ways we fast from preoccupation of self to humbly reach outward. How might this Lenten journey give us opportuni-

ties to refocus our awareness and commitments?

Often I hear myself and others say, "We are so blessed!" How true, how true, But what does that mean in light of our vow of poverty, living a life of simplicity so that others may simply live? Almsgiving may too often be associated with filling the parish collection basket as it comes by or giving a few dollars from our wallets to the homeless person on the street. We know that what people and Earth need more than anything from us is our

presence, our availability, our time. Carving out time for spontaneity to be attentive to another almost seems like an oxymoron when calendars are filled to the brim. Yet, might we take these Lenten days to allow this to unfold?

I hear the voice of a sister, now living in the fullness of God, encouraging me to pray, "Loving God, give me the grace to accept the grace you give." May that be our collective prayer as we journey as pilgrims on this Lenten journey of trial and grace.

Religious Conferences Meet with Newly Appointed Secretary of the Dicastery for Institutes of Consecrated Life and Societies of Apostolic Life

hat a joy it was to meet with Sr. Simona
Brambilla, MC, the newly appointed
secretary at Dicastery for Institutes of
Consecrated Life and Societies of Apostolic
Life (DICLSAL). Sr. Simona welcomed the executive
directors of the Australian Conference of Religious
(Anne Walker); the Canadian Religious Conference
(Alain Ambeault, CSV); and me while we were in Rome
for the Jubilee Year meeting from February 1-4, 2024.

The conversation provided a time to welcome Sr. Simona to her new ministry, affirm the work of the dicastery in inviting conferences to work more collaboratively with one another and with the dicastery.

We shared updates on how the three conferences have been working together since our meeting in Rome in March 2023 and maintain mutual dialogue about the realities facing historical institutes belonging to each of the conferences as well as the similarities across the conferences.

The conferences were encouraged to continue to work with their members in addressing their realities, to initiate ways to work more collaboratively in responding to those needs, to share the fruits of discernment about ways canonical governance might be imagined for these times, and to remember to frame this moment of historical reality in the context of the Paschal Mystery.

Other members of the dicastery joined the conversation: Sr. Carmen Rose Nortes, NSC (under-secretary); Daniela Leggio (conferences of religious) and Sr. Rosemary Rese, lsp (English-speaking administrative support). The spirit of synodality and solidarity was palpable in the room and the shared commitment to working together was deepened in ways that will continue to unfold.

The LCWR presidency and executive director will meet with prefect Cardinal Braz de Aviz, Sr. Simona, and other members of the dicastery during their annual visit to Rome in March and continue this dialogue as it relates to the particular realities of LCWR institutes regarding shared leadership and collaborative governance.
