52nd ANNUAL • TOLEDO, OHIO



On June 7 and 8, the Historic West End celebrated its 52nd annual festival. For those unfamiliar with the event, the festival includes block parties, an art show and a vendor area in addition to formal and informal tours of the interiors of four to five houses in Toledo's Old West End district.

This year, one of the featured tour locations was the Gerber House on Collingwood Avenue, formerly the Ursuline Convent and now known as the Collingwood Arts Center. Approximately 2,000 visitors toured both buildings and viewed a 12-minute video featuring several Ursuline Sisters who once lived there.

Visitors were invited to explore many rooms within the Gerber House, including the tea room, accessed from the portico on the side of the building; the dining room which still features its gas lighting fixtures; and the kindergarten room, once used as a classroom. From there, visitors went down a few stairs into the hallway of Mary Manse College auditorium. Standing on the stage, visitors were shown the Bishop's boxes on either side and learned interesting facts about the auditorium's history.

After this part of the tour, visitors could view a short video which included Sister Margaret Anne Carstensen '55, Sister Beth Hemminger '57, Sister Coletta McAllister '66, Sister Regina Smith '68, and Sister Ann Marie McManus '71 sharing their memories, as well as take a self-guided tour of the upper floors or return to the hallway to exit the building.

From the 1960 Brescian Yearbook:

The last golden weeks of September beckon many newcomers of Toledo when the residence halls at Mary Manse open their doors for a new school year. This year the former St. Angela Hall became the Administrative Building when the grade school moved into the former high school, which is now located on Indian Road! A sidelight of this "musical buildings" arrangement, necessitated by the expansion of Mary Manse, was the conversion of the third floor of the Administrative Building to a dormitory.

Sounds of returning students renewing old acquaintenances inundate Lourdes Hall with the beginning of each school year. The freshmen, shy at first, throw themselves wholeheartedly into the hubbub of their exciting new life. The future looks rosy as new friendships are made and new independence develops.

From the 1975 Brescian Yearbook:

Throughout the 1974-75 year, the Alumni Board initiated several recruitment and fund-raising projects for Mary Manse under the leadership of Peg O'Hearn, including a book sale, Phone-athon, Liturgy Workshop, and the President's Art Exhibit for area high school students.

From the 1965 Brescian Yearbook:

Among the aims of a liberal arts college is the spiritual education of man. Students can better themselves spiritually in many ways daily Mass, visits to chapel, and membership in an on-campus spiritual organization.

The Senior Class, however, has an exceptional spiritual opportunity - a three-day closed retreat. This year the seniors chose to make their retreat at Carey. Afterwards, the general consensus was that a closed retreat is one of the highlights of a Catholic college education.

From the 1970 Brescian Yearbook:

The Art, English and Music Departments of Mary Manse College hosted the First Arts Festival Week. The Toledo Lyric Opera Group presented Menotti's The Medium in Ursuline Auditorium. The English and Music students performed original works in an assembly. A tea for Art, Music and Education majors was highlighted by a Chinese art demonstration by Norma Kao. Throughout the entire week, student art work was exhibited in the library and Sister Jane Catherine's works were on display at the Toledo Museum of Art.

THEN AND NOW

Our newsletter is more than current news of our illustrious alums. It also has served as a collection of nostalgia that we enjoy revisiting. Even the youngest of us now well into the Golden Years can't avoid looking back at the THEN and at our years at Mary Manse College, but also at the lives we have built and enjoyed up to NOW.

Why do we find contentment in these romps through our memories? Maybe because they were considered carefree times when we gave little

thought, if any, to daily news outside of our circles of family and friends. Why? Perhaps because we didn't expect anything of serious consequence to concern us or anything to upset our lives. We were doing

well and our country was doing well. Americans were respected by people around the world. We felt safe and were reasonably content. There was usually good news being reported by newspaper, radio, and television. The cell phone didn't enter our lives until the eighties and social media did not yet exist. Oh, and The Statue of Liberty offered a welcoming and safe country to all.

More recently, in the NOW, we've shared some dark and harrowing days and nights. If the COVID pandemic bringing its masks, vaccinations, and massive death toll wasn't enough to introduce us to a new era, surely the weather with its almost daily episodes of severe flooding, wind, tornadoes, hurricanes, and earthquakes, has awakened us from the dream world we had taken for granted.

When we were thrust into paying attention because "breaking news" was the newest gimmick on TV, we also began to acquire, perhaps against our wills, additions to our vocabularies. Offered here are just a few of the currently most used new words, phrases, and acronyms, which many of us had

neither heard before nor wish to repeat presently, and some of these new words have brought on new meaning: woke, new normal, domestic terrorism, hate crime, angsting, banned books, AI, Doomscroll Detox, fake news, Golden Age of America, DOGE, ICE, TACO, deportation, gentrification, anti- fill in almost anything here, and the most disturbing of all - illegal humans.

Do words matter? Of course, they do. Many linguists argue that referring to people as illegal is

grammatically incorrect. While actions may be criminal or illegal, the people committing them are not illegal. There are linguists who argue against using the phrase "illegal immigrant" because it is neither

"accurate nor neutral" and other people who break laws are not referred to as "illegal".

Shahid Haque-Hausrath, immigration attorney and 2017 Jeanette Rankin Civil Liberties Award recipient, writes "the term (illegal alien) is imprecise and is used to encompass individuals who are in the United States under vastly different circumstances... the phrase 'illegal alien' is used to dehumanize immigrants and divorce (us) from thinking of them as human beings."

Who knows a great deal about the horrors of dehumanization is Elie Wiesel, Holocaust survivor, Nobel Peace Prize winner and recipient of the Presidential Medal of Freedom presented in 1992 by President George H.W. Bush. Wiesel has put it succinctly and unforgettably, "No human being is illegal." And that is that.

Let us look ahead to a contemporary, the new Pope Leo XIV, with hope that his guidance will advocate a better course. Initially, he has raised our hope by choosing the name Leo, giving a nod to Leo XIII,

a defender of human dignity and the supporter of struggling workers and immigrants during the Industrial Revolution. The new Pope Leo has said "...the legitimate regulation of migration must never undermine the essential dignity of a person." He, in tune with the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops, has called on nations to "regulate their borders with justice and mercy." The obvious common theme running through these selected citations - the compassionate approach to immigration - currently is absent in our very own country.

Back in 1978 did the College of Cardinals foresee the fall of the Soviet empire when they chose the charismatic Karol Wojtyla as Pope John Paul II? Is their appointment of Robert Prevost, an American born in Chicago, to Pope Leo XIV at a time of crisis NOW for the U.S. and its place in the world, a move to advance him to a merciful and just model of American global leadership? Will his expected impact be successful in resetting the procedure for immigration to the country of his birth? Of the 1.4 billion Catholics in the world, most of the 53 million in the U.S. are surely counting on his impact and success.

We can't go back to THEN, but we can and we, as Americans, must recapture the essence of what has always defined our country - freedom and democracy. With Pope Leo XIV leading us, we can once again aspire to a better NOW. Let us not forget the opening words of our U.S. Constitution "We the people...". The written words of Emma Lazarus still ring true today: "Until we are all free, we are none of us free." As always, it is up to us.



Ursuline Sisters' 170-Year Anniversary: A Celebration of Joy and Gratitude

Beginning December 12, 2024, the Ursuline Sisters began its 170th anniversary year by celebrating their lives, contributions, significant moments, spirit, and mission in the Toledo Diocese and beyond. The theme, "A Celebration of Joy and Gratitude," captures the essence of the message the Ursuline Sisters want to share.

From the Constitution and Directives of the Ursuline Convent of the Sacred Heart:

"We are women of the Church. Jesus bids us to 'read the signs of the times.' St. Angela Merici bids us to 'change with the times.' The Church bids us to juxtapose the signs of the times with the values of the Gospel. We are urged on by the love of Christ."

The above statement encompasses well the driving force behind the works, ministries, spirit, and charism of the Ursuline Sisters. Through their contributions to education, parish life, spirituality, justice, healthcare, and many other areas, the Ursuline Sisters have made visible the presence of God and God's action in their lives. The "Signs of the Times" called forth St. Ursula Academy, which continues to thrive today, St. Angela Hall, Nazareth Hall, Mary Manse College, the missions in Montana, the mission in Puerto Rico, and ministries in Peru, South America, and Bakersfield, California.

One of the current priorities embraced by the Sisters focuses on the Ministry of Prayer and Presence. For 170 years, the Sisters have lived this belief faithfully and fully. Whatever they found themselves "doing" for the glory of God, was based on the "heart" of the Gospel message of love and being PRESENT to others as Christ was while in His ministry. Christ was all about the person, the individual, and how one should be treated as a son or daughter of God the Father. To this day, the Sisters continue to embrace this same attitude of welcome and acceptance.

The Ministry of Prayer and Presence has become a focal point in the lives of the Sisters as they find themselves no longer in "active" ministry,



but more about the spiritual essence of treating others with respect and kindness, with hospitality and being active in a more subtle manner. Reading the signs of the times yesterday is different than the signs of the times seen today.

Today, the Sisters are not so much about accomplishments and successes, but more about the genuine values the Gospels teach us. Today, the emphasis is being person-centered, being God-centered, being filled with compassion and justice. The Sisters surely can list all of their many accomplishments and successes, but more importantly, they remember and hold dear the memories of former students who come back with grateful hearts; memories of smiles and laughter shared at gatherings like weddings and funerals; memories of joy and gratitude for what was, what is, and what is yet to come.

The Ursuline Sisters celebrate YOU, our devoted and supportive family, relatives and friends. They are grateful for your generosity, love and prayers over these many years. Much joy has been shared and gratitude flows profusely in their hearts. It is because of YOU that the Ursuline Sisters still share and minister in love, joy and peace!
